## COOLIDGE UPSETS STOCK MART

### Men Who Robbed Cisco Stores Believed Held

### Prices Fall Precipitately On President's Announcement; Cotton Suffers Loss of \$2.50 Per Bale

#### OLD HOME TOWN

Postmaster J. W. Triplett has received a letter from an 82-year-old mother who is in search of her son whom she has not heard from for eight or ten years. Giving her address as Fruitland Park, Fla., she has written: "In my great need I write to you as to many others to ascertain the whereabouts of my son, John. The last I ever heard about him was about nine to ten years ago. He was then in Cisco working in the oil fields. As soon as I heard this I wrote him at Cisco, but the letter was returned. I was then at Silver City, N. M. Since, I have moved to Florida. Have been here seven years last April. I am all alone, am 82 years of age, and if it is possible I must find him or at least know if he is alive. He was born in Missouri, Grundy county, Nov. 18, 1838. He will be 89 in the same month I am 82. If you can hear of the name, John T. Holman, or know of anyone who ever knew of his name, please, oh please, let me hear from you or from them, even if he is not alive. He is in my thoughts all ways. I have written to many points in many states, but no John. Can you do this for me? Just to hear from or of him will be a great consolation to his old mother.—Mrs. A. E. Barker, Route 1, Box 104, Leesburg, Fla."

#### FOUR ARRESTED AT FORT WORTH FACING CHARGES

Four men believed implicated in three robberies here last week are under arrest in Fort Worth and are charged with a long string of robberies in West and North Texas. This was word brought back Wednesday by E. O. Elliott, one of the Cisco victims of the burglars, who went to Fort Worth to identify some of the loot found on the men. Each of the four men had a knife identified by Elliott as having been stolen from his store last Tuesday night. Loot taken from the store Thursday night had been recovered previously when two men in a Chrysler automobile were surprised while robbing a safe near Weatherford and fired upon by the proprietor of a store there. The men abandoned the car, in which were found articles taken from the Elliott store on Thursday night, \$700 worth of men's clothing taken from the De Luxe Cleaners here Wednesday night, and some barber supplies taken from the Shirley barber shop. A lively gun battle was participated in, and the men escaped, although the merchant told officers he believed he had shot one of the men. This occurred early Saturday morning.

Sunday morning four men were picked up as suspicious characters by Fort Worth police. One of them had been shot in the foot, and told conflicting stories as to how the shooting occurred. They gave their names as W. L. Thomas, Frank Osborn, J. D. Boyd and "Shorty" Bowlegs. One of the men is alleged to have been an escaped convict from Oklahoma. An investigation by officers from Cooke county Wednesday morning resulted in filing charges against the first three alleging they participated in the robbery of the Chicago store at Gainesville July 2. The men are said to have admitted being in Cisco on July 6 when it is said they bought an automobile and paid cash for it. Later they are said to have been in Cisco following the robbery of a small bank near Abilene of \$50 in nickels and dimes, and are said to have paid their hotel bill in change of these denominations.

It also became known Wednesday that two men in a Chrysler car and bearing an Oklahoma license plate corresponding with that on the car taken near Weatherford, passed through Eastland last Saturday night. It was said they drove up to a drug store there and ordered drinks. One man got out and stood on the curb, looking back in the direction of Cisco. Before leaving they went back to the rear of the car and took out two pistols, arming themselves. Clerks at the store debated whether they should notify police and when decision was finally reached, it was too late to catch the men at Ranger and they got away.

Deputy Sheriff Payne went to Fort Worth with Mr. Elliott and questioned the men in custody. Charges have been filed against them, and it is probable they will be brought to Eastland county as soon as the officers at Gainesville are through with them.

#### TEXAS CONVICT FLEES TO DEATH FROM PRISON

HOTSPON, Aug. 3.—Taylor Odum fled from the Imperial state prison farm only to meet death. Odum, 29, one of 19 convicts who escaped Monday night, was drowned in the Brazos river a few hours after his escape, it became known when simple funeral exercises were held at the prison farm. L. Arnold, who escaped with Odum and saw him drown, was so unnerved that he voluntarily surrendered and told of his companion's fate.

#### Pioneer Postmaster Is Yet to Be Named

Isaac C. Plumlee has been named acting postmaster at Pioneer following death of Postmaster Alexander, who died after serving the office three or four years, it was announced Wednesday. The permanent appointment is yet to be made.

#### 2 ADDITIONAL HOUSES TO BE ERECTED HERE

Two more building permits were granted Wednesday by the city clerk, following the granting of three totaling \$10,000 on Tuesday. The two additional permits for new residences total \$7,800.

One house is to be erected by G. T. Parrack in the Harris addition at a cost of \$2,800. It will contain five rooms and a bath. The other residence is to be built by Eddie Little at N avenue and Sixteenth street at a cost of \$5,000. It will contain six rooms, bath and sleeping porch.

#### POSTOFFICE SHOWS GAIN OVER 1926

Cisco postal receipts for the first seven months of this year continue to be ahead of those for the same period of last year in spite of the fact that July receipts were under those of last year, according to Postmaster J. W. Triplett. July receipts this year totaled \$3,083.82, as compared to \$3,125.57 last year. For the first seven months of this year, however, receipts reached \$23,182.57 as compared with \$22,777.87 in 1926.

Another indication of the continued prosperity of Cisco is the fact that postal savings at the present are about three times as great as the savings at this time last year, Postmaster Triplett said.

#### 4 CANDIDATES FOR CONGRESS OVER COUNTY

RANGER, Aug. 3.—It begins to look as if Eastland county would have at least one, and possibly four candidates of its own for congress in the coming campaign. Judge N. N. Rosenquest of Eastland former county judge of Stephens county, former district attorney of the old 42nd judicial district and present governor of Texas Lions, friends claim, is making preparations to make the race for Congressman Blanton's seat in the lower house of the National Congress, and that he will make the race regardless of whether Mr. Blanton is a candidate for re-election or not.

Friends of R. Q. Lee of Cisco, former president of the West Texas chamber of commerce and the builder of the Cisco & Northwestern railroad, now owned and operated by the Texas & Pacific, are urging him to enter the contest for Mr. Blanton's place in congress provided Mr. Blanton does not offer for re-election.

Hon. M. H. Hagaman of Ranger, present Eastland county representative in the State legislature and one of the most competent men in this district, has many friends who will urge him to enter the race for Congressman Blanton's seat in the event Mr. Blanton is not a candidate for re-election.

R. N. Grisham of Eastland, who once made the race against Mr. Blanton, is also spoken of as a possible candidate from the 17th district should Mr. Blanton retire or become a candidate for the United States senate in the coming campaign. Mr. Grisham is considered by many as one of the strongest men in this congressional district.—Ranger Times.

#### Chicago Jeweler Held in Robbery

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Aug. 3.—David Blumenfeld, Chicago Jeweler, was found guilty by a jury here today, of the \$180,000 robbery of the Farmer's bank at Chertoo, Ill. two years ago. The verdict carried a sentence of from three to 20 years in the penitentiary.

#### CISCO TO SEE TRANS-OCEANIC PLANE SUNDAY

Cisco will have the opportunity of seeing a trans-oceanic airplane in full flight within the next few days, according to an announcement received by the Daily News. A letter from Col. William E. Eastwood, Jr., of Dallas states that Captain Wm. P. Erwin, American ace and contestant for the \$25,000 Eastwood prize, will fly over Cisco some time during Sunday or Monday on his way to San Francisco to compete for the Dole prize for a Honolulu flight. Erwin's ultimate goal will be Hong Kong, China. Erwin is a nephew of J. H. Erwin of Cisco and is well known here where he has visited a number of times. His huge plane was only recently completed by the Swallow Aeroplane factory of Wichita, Kansas, which is headed by J. M. Moellendick, brother of Fred Moellendick of Cisco.

#### ERWIN'S PLANE TO BE CHRISTENED SATURDAY

DALLAS, Aug. 3.—Elaborate preparations were being completed today for the christening ceremonies at Love field Saturday when Captain "Lone Star" Bill Erwin's airship in which he hopes to make the Dallas-Hong Kong flight will be christened "Spirit of Dallas." The plane is of the Swallow type and is equipped with a single Wright whirlwind motor similar to that used by Lindbergh. Erwin will discard his radio and carry a rubber boat for emergency use instead. Erwin's itinerary includes stops at San Francisco, Honolulu and Hong Kong. If successful he will continue flying around the world, arriving here during the state fair.

#### Sutton County To Go After Railroad

SONORA, Aug. 3.—Sutton county citizens meeting in the office of L. W. Elliott, county judge, here Saturday afternoon appointed a committee of six to confer with representatives from Kerr, Kimble and Schleicher counties here at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. It was the sentiment that Sonorans and Sutton county residents are willing to put up a substantial bonus for the securing of a railway line. The meeting will be held to determine a course of action of the counties in an effort to get the projected San Angelo-San Antonio line routed through the counties whose representatives will be here Sunday.

#### LINDY OFF TO PITTSBURGH

CLEVELAND, Aug. 3.—Continuing his tour of the country in the Spirit of St. Louis, Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, first New York to Paris non-stop flyer, took off from Brook Park airport today for Pittsburgh.

#### SHERIFF NABS MANY AFTER INDICTMENTS

Sheriff John Hart was in Cisco Wednesday morning, and reported having made a number of arrests following return of 90 felony indictments by the grand jury Saturday. Most of the arrests have been placed under bond.

Among those indicted were: Charlie Cameron and Jim Sheridan, the latter of south Cisco, operating a still and other felonies; Jeff Morgan, Gorman, in connection with a shooting affray; Jake Lamey, Ranger; a Cisco Mexican charged with concealing stolen property; McDermott of Rising Star, accused in a cutting affray; a negro named Johnson, accused of selling liquor; and a negro, also charged with bootlegging.

#### CISCO RURAL ROUTES GET EXTENSIONS

Cisco rural mail routes have been extended considerably in the last few days following permission received from higher postal officials. Route No. 1 has been extended four miles to include the Humble company camp near Putnam. The route now uses the highway all the way, and will serve 25 additional families.

Route 2 was extended two miles recently by reason of better roads provided, while Route 3 has been given a five-mile extension to serve 15 additional families. Other changes are in prospect so as to provide better service to rural patrons in every direction from Cisco.

DESSAU, Germany, Aug. 3.—Air Pilots Von Koehl and Loewe Ristich and Etzard hopped off at 5:10 a. m. and 5:50 a. m., respectively today in two Junker all metal 320-horsepower monoplanes on an endurance trial between Dessau and Leipzig. These airplanes are intended for a flight to the United States.

#### WON'T BE LONG NOW, SAYS ANDY OF NEW FORD

The new Ford will soon be on display, according to A. D. Anderson, manager of the Elmore Motor Co., and the high tension which has been gripping the public interest as no new car has ever held the public interest before, will relax. "For weeks, the public has withheld its endorsement of new models of other cars, feeling sure that Henry Ford would soon put on the market an entirely new car that would be a 'knockout' and they have not been willing to put their money on a new car until they had at least seen the new creation of Mr. Ford," Mr. Anderson declared. "And so we are about to receive a showing of what has been intimated as the world's greatest car for any price like the price."

BARTLESVILLE, Okla., Aug. 3.—Torrential rains today caused definite postponement of the Griffith-Henly non-stop flight to San Francisco.

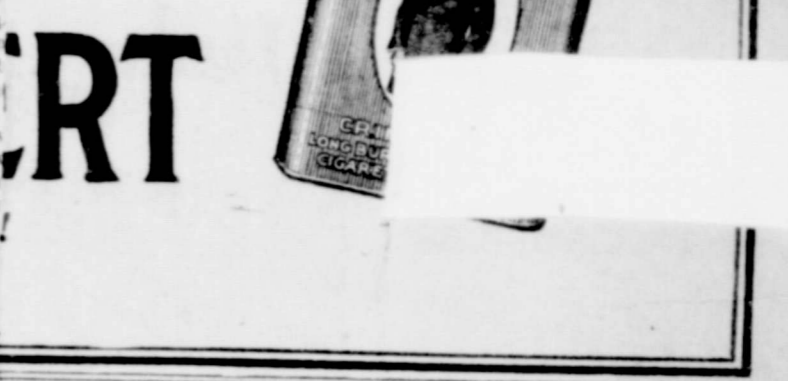
#### Injunction Stops Courthouse Change

AUSTIN, Aug. 3.—Injunction orders were issued today by the supreme court restraining the county commissioners and county judge of Hansford county from moving the county seat from Hansford to Spearman. An election is to be held in Hansford county next Saturday on the question of moving the county seat.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—A sharp decline in leading speculative stocks was Wall Street's answer to President Coolidge's withdrawal from the presidential race. The markets today had the first opportunity to analyze the president's statement in declaring he did not "choose" to run in 1928, since his announcement Tuesday was held up until after the exchange had closed. A heavy accumulation of selling orders for high priced stocks was massed overnight, and coupled with the usual nervousness of margin traders, forced prices down precipitately. The New York cotton market had its most exciting opening in months and initial losses of \$2.50 a bale were recorded in some of the active futures. Announcement of President Coolidge's withdrawal had immediate reflection in the Liverpool market which broke 18 to 23 pence. Heavy selling of cotton was reported from southern commission houses, as well as opening of stop loss orders.

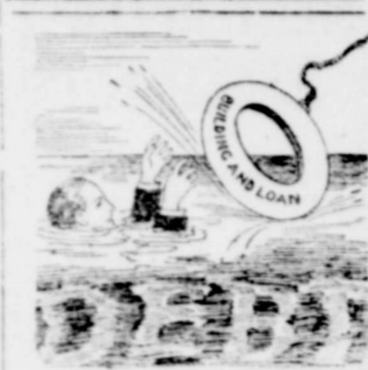

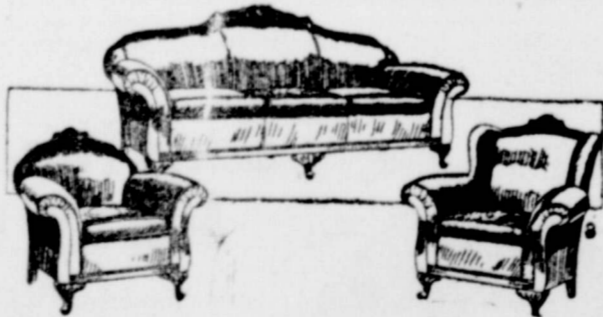

### Game Commissioner Tucker and J. G. Burr Have Close Call From Death On Salt Flat On Island

AUSTIN, Aug. 3.—The four days' trip through Laguna Madre featured part of the way by hunger, thirst, the burning heat of salt flats and physical exhaustion, was an achievement of Will J. Tucker, game, fish and oyster commissioner, and J. G. Burr of the division of research, who arrived in Austin Tuesday.

Tucker, in the interest of definite information as to salinity and general conditions, traveled over 1,000 miles of bay in small motor boats. Forced by shallows to use small craft, heavy waves kept the crew drenched and stopped the motor in Baffin's Bay Thursday afternoon, where at sundown they floated to the shore and slept on the sands.

Crossing Baffin's bay the next morning in the face of a twenty-mile gale and a choppy sea, and with great vigilance to avoid the hidden rocks, they were again forced to land and the boatmen were told to return to Corpus Christi as soon as the wind lay.

**Walk Down Sandy Beach.**

Thoroughly drenched by the waves, Tucker and Burr started on foot against the setting wind down the beach, where a relay boat was waiting beyond the salt flats, which, according to their information, were five miles across. The small amount of food and water was left with the boatmen who had to return sixty miles to Corpus Christi. Tucker and Burr estimated that they could easily pass the flats in two hours and reach the boat and supplies beyond the flats. But these flats proved to be nearly twenty-five miles across. Hours of travel brought no signs of relief from burning thirst and the scorching sun. Fatigue and thirst became perilous as the sun dropped westward. Cactus fruit served to moisten the lips, but strength was going rapidly.

But their luck turned, when late in the afternoon, Tucker climbed to an elevation and discovered a windmill which was barely visible. Tucker was able to reach the ranch house. When power of speech returned, after a few swallows of water, Tucker directed one of the comboys to bring Burr, who was nursing the spark of life four miles away in the flats.

**Spend Night on Ranch.**

A night's rest at the home of Luciano Fernandez, keeper of the Kenedy ranch, and a thirty-mile drive the next morning again connected the voyagers with civilization, and the last leg of the Laguna trip.

"Nature is hostile to human life in these parts," they said, "not a shade tree anywhere, and rattlesnakes in great numbers. Tucker stepped over one before seeing it and another struck at his knee, barely missing. He shot them with a pistol.

"With a view to a better understanding of the Laguna we made the trip. We gathered much valuable information bearing on the matter of salinity and general conditions affecting fish life."

If possible something should be done to reduce the salinity of these waters, and we are given the project serious study.

### MOODY MAKES STATEMENT ON AMENDMENTS

AUSTIN, Aug. 3.—Governor Dan Moody made a post-election statement Tuesday, in which he said the road to justice is long and tedious, but that the people ultimately travel it. He said nothing about a special session. With the amendments defeated, it is not certain now that a special session will be called this fall. It may come later in the winter, as advocated by a number of members. Moody's statement follows:

"The result of the election could be foreseen some days ago. Public lethargy contributed largely toward the defeat of the amendments. The organized opposition of corporate interests was sufficient to defeat the tax amendment in the absence of any campaign of education in its behalf, and the opposition to it was damaging to the judicial amendment. These were the two impor-

tant amendments, and both were for the benefit of the masses of the people.

"The road to justice is still long, tedious and expensive. The congested dockets of the courts make the administration of justice very slow, and in many instances the cost of a lawsuit is beyond the reach of the average man. The judicial amendment was intended to improve our judicial system and contribute toward bringing justice more nearly within the reach of rich and poor alike. It was a measure for public economy in a necessary function of government, the administration of law.

"The tax amendment was intended to lighten the burdens that our unequal system of taxation imposes upon the farmer and the home owner. Wasteful and unequal system of taxation which penalizes agriculture and home ownership is an obstacle to the development of the country. The imperfections that work this injustice remains the problem of the people of Texas."

AUSTIN, Aug. 3.—Senator Earle B. Mayfield will leave Austin Thursday to fill three speaking engagements in North and West Texas in his campaign for re-election. He will speak at Sulphur Springs Thursday night; Alvarado, Friday night; and Hico, Saturday night.
