CROSS PLAINS, Aug. 15. - Af ter drilling 11 feet into the first pay topped at 1668 feet, the outside test well of Hill and West on the Weller land in the new Cross Plains field, is flowing 20 barrels per hour nat

This well is an extension of or location from the Bradstreet well on the north and opens virgin territory in all other directions. It is the first well in the vicinity of the new field to find important production in the top pay, all previous wells having found only a small quantity of oil until after the second sand is reached. The logs of previous drilling have also shown only 7 to 9 feet of the top sand followed by a shale oreak of about 3 feet, leading to the possibility that the shale break may have pinched out at this point and this heavier flow may be coming from a stratum corresponding to the top of the

second sand.

The Bradstreet discovery drilled sand at 1805 feet, and with the total depth of the new well standing at 1679, indicates that an additional 25 feet of sand remains to be drilled with the prospect that the present rate of flow, that gauges at the rate of 400 barrels may be further increased by additional drilling.
