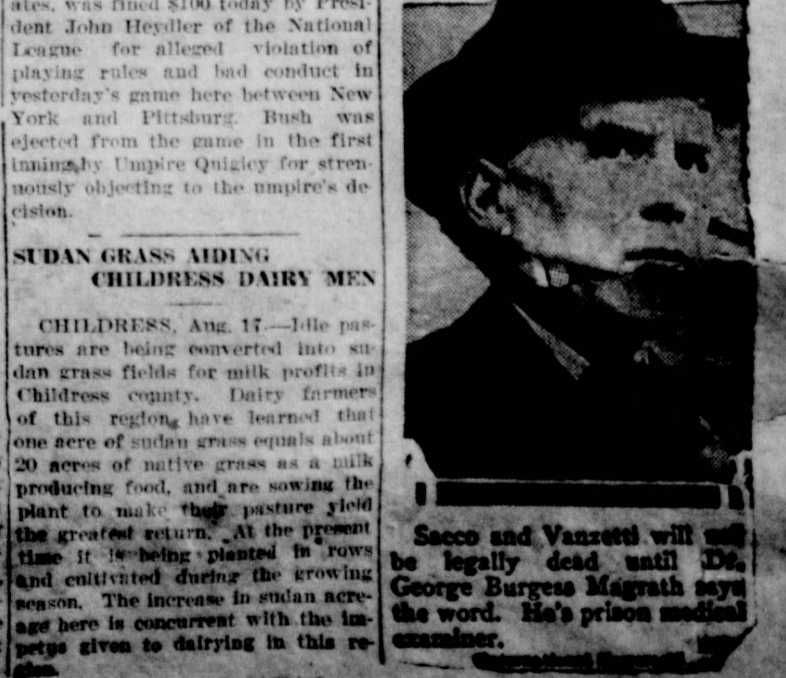
REV. STUCKEY GETS DIVORCE AT AMARILLO

### BIG CROWD EXPECTED AT WATER MEET

ABILENE, Aug. 17.—Scores of West Texas business men, farmers and other interested leaders in its commercial and industrial life, as well as representatives from many different sections of Texas and prominent state officials, will flock to Abilene Thursday to attend the All-Texas conference called jointly by the Texas Conservation and the West Texas chamber of commerce to discuss water rights of West Texas, according to indications received and according to press reports over the entire territory where great concern is being manifested.

A special train has already been ordered to bring the Brownwood delegation. Other cities will send delegations by motor caravans. The water rights meeting will be held in the Fair Park auditorium, Abilene, Texas, August 18, beginning at 10:30 a. m. An organized program will initiate the formalities, after which an open forum discussion will be in order. Governor Dan Moody, Attorney General Pollard, members of the Board of Water Engineers, and Dr. T. U. Taylor, dean of Engineering at Texas university, as well as many other notables will speak.

The big conference, the theme of which may be stated in the words, "Whose Water?" is attracting perhaps as widespread attention as any other monumental issue taken up by the West Texas chamber of commerce during its nine years of existence, being only equalled in the momentous fight waged by that organization for the establishment of Texas Tech in the west. The West Texas chamber laid down its principle that West Texas farmers have the right to use their own water and that agricultural interests of the west are paramount and prior to power development at the historic session of the board of water engineers where intervention was made in favor of Brownwood and San Sabá irrigation projects under consideration, opposed by power companies.

The question has passed beyond the bounds of a regional controversy and has taken on the aspect of a general issue in which the people must determine whether or not they will allow power companies to usurp agricultural rights. The West Texas chamber of commerce is presenting the voice of a united west in its attitude, and has announced that it will take such action as is deemed justified and necessary when the Abilene conference closes.

### HIGHWAY BODY TO KEEP FUND DETAILS

AUSTIN, Aug. 17.—"Every dime" spent by the State Highway department after Sept. 1 will be accounted for and listed separately, charged to its proper fund, Commissioner Cone Johnson said today. He said the new system of auditing, which includes eight high speed tabulating machines capable of subtraction, addition, multiplication, division, listing and sorting, will eliminate all "leaks" and will keep a minute record, available at all times on a minute's notice of every phase of highway expenditure.

The department, Johnson added, has a balance of about \$5,000,000 despite its numerous heavy expenditures and at all times will keep a "good balance."

### GORMAN BOY FOUND SHOT; DEATH HOVERS
