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MEXICAN POLITICS

Mexicans who take up the sword perish by the sword. Calles, by his handling of the Serrano revolt, showed himself a strong man—not the first evidence he has given of his strength. Such vigorous measures are probably necessary in a country where mutiny and revolution are still regarded by many as the normal way to conduct a political campaign. It seems likely now that next year's national election in Mexico will be carried out by constitutional methods, as the last one was. New candidates for the presidency probably think they have a certain amount of provocation for resorting to violence. The presidency seems to be sewed up by Calles and Obregon, with an understanding between those gentlemen to alternate the office between them. Obregon served his four years' term and then peacefully stepped out and turned the office over to Calles, after using his influence to insure the election of the latter by constitutional means. It was suspected at the time that there was an understanding between the two, which is now confirmed by the candidacy of Obregon again and the preparations made by Calles to return the favor shown him four years ago. Such a see-saw might last indefinitely. It is to be remembered, however, in judging such an arrangement, that it is not unconstitutional; the constitution merely forbids a president's re-election without an intervening term served by someone else. Mexico has made much progress politically when even the forms of constitutional government are observed. It is to be remembered also that Calles and Obregon have both shown themselves strong men as well as constitutional rulers, that Mexico needs strong men at the helm, and on the whole they are an immense improvement over the statesmen who preceded them. Obregon in particular, who seems fairly certain to be the next president, has been regarded by many Americans as not only faithful to Mexican interests but fair-minded to foreigners. But, the country is in a sad mess, anyway you look at it and it is likely the United States will be compelled to take a hand before the series of revolutions started in 1908 can be permanently wound up.

THE ESPERANTO TOWN

At last Esperanto, "the universal language," is going to be put over. An American town is taking it seriously and pushing it hard. The rest of the world may be amused on learning that this town is Lithopolis, Ohio, which can hardly be found on the map and is an isolated village of 300 souls. But never mind. An eastern friend of culture, whose parents were born there, has endowed a School of Esperanto for the benefit of Lithopolis and Bloom Township, and toddling boys and girls are learning the language along with the multiplication table, and teachers are taking up advanced work, and there are going to be high schools for adults, with correspondence courses later on. Lithopolis is to be a center from which the language will be spread and, for all anybody knows, eventually embrace the whole earth. "We believe that if everybody would learn to speak esperanto it would make for international understanding and international brotherhood," says the donor. Very likely it would. Ad it may be that the league of nations will yet move from Geneva, the modern Babel, to single-tongued Lithopolis.

A GOVERNMENT JOB

The chamber of commerce of the United States, through a special committee, last month made a survey of the Mississippi flood area. As a result it now urges that the federal government take over the entire burden of levee construction and other control measures. It found through conferences with business men, bankers and others in Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi, the three worst hit states, that the people of those states have about reached the end of their resources. Plenty of money and a plan as efficient as good engineering can make it are the first essentials. The national chamber feels strongly that congress should give this business a prominent place among its first tasks and keep it entirely disentangled from any other projects. In the meantime the Arkansas and White rivers have been rising again above flood stage and Red Cross officials on the scene expect a large area of replanted land to be flooded once more. These floods in the Mississippi valley are not like a brief disaster that does its damage and then ends. They have been recurrent in many places. They are of long duration, and even after they recede they leave behind them conditions which can be remedied only very slowly.

PRE-DIGESTED IMMIGRATION

Before the immigration bars were put up, an overwhelming majority of our immigrants spoke strange tongues, so that it was years before they could understand us or we could understand them. Now the situation is much better. In the last three years more than 45 per cent of the new-comers could speak our language. It would have been two-thirds, except for the Mexicans. This makes the American problem of assimilation much easier, even without considering the reduction in numbers. Ideals and traditions go largely with the language. The educational problem is enormously simplified. That is important economically as well as in other ways, for education is always our biggest item of public expense.

TWO GIRLS IN A CANOE

Two young women, graduates of the University of Iowa, have recently completed a five-week canoe trip from New York to Quebec. They traveled ap-

proximately 450 miles, or an average of 12 to 15 miles a day. Their only companion was a collie dog. This is a little reminiscent of Jerome's "Three Men in a Boat," not to mention Montmorency, the dog, who enjoyed a fairly hectic vacation on the Thames. Only, in the present case, the canoeists are real and not fiction characters. They made a journey ordinarily regarded as very difficult for unaided girls. Their adventures are not yet chronicled and perhaps never will be. The canoeists seem to have taken their journey for their own satisfaction rather than to become world champions, vaudeville actors or writers.

BODY BOUND

"These physical limitations drive me crazy!" raged an emotional young woman. "The handicap of the physical is absolutely maddening. When I want to go down town I must drag my clumsy body along with me, or put it into something that will carry it down. If I want to go from the Atlantic to the Pacific I must spend four or five days in dusty, wearisome travel. My thoughts can jump from Sandy Hook to Golden Gate in a flash; why can't I go as quickly? I could, but for my body. "The body is a clog, everything physical is a hindrance. If I come to a wall I must find an opening before I can pass. To get upstairs I must have steps or a ladder. To descend I must employ the same means or get hurt coming down. Why can't we be free of all these physical restrictions and move here and there as our minds direct, and not be held back by sordid, inanimate matter? "When? Isn't it startling the things these new-thinking women think about? Physical clogs! Material restrictions! Sordid inanimate matter! "Between you and me and the garage—I say garage instead of postbox because these days more folks have garages than postboxes—between you and me and the garage, it is a mighty good thing that we have these physical clogs, these material restrictions, the sordid inanimate matter, which that girl rails at. "How would you like to have all physical restrictions removed from the rest of the folks? How would you like it if people were able to go around without bodies and not be stopped by walls or doors and second stories without stairs or ladders? You would feel rather nervous, wouldn't you? You would have occasion to feel nervous. You could well be afraid to go to sleep. "People do enough deprivement even under physical limitations, even though confined in bodies that can travel only just so fast, and which are stopped by closed doors and barred gates. I believe—if anybody should ask you—that one reason we are fastened to our bodies and restrained by physical limitations is because we are not fit for greater liberty. We should abuse larger liberty if we had it. (We abuse the small liberty we have) we should be dangerous to a terrible degree if there were nothing to restrain us. "Perhaps when the time comes that we can be trusted to go around without anything to hamper us and hold us back like a piece of wood chained to a dog's collar to keep him from jumping the fence and getting at the sheep, we shall find ourselves in a sphere where we shall be free of restrictions. 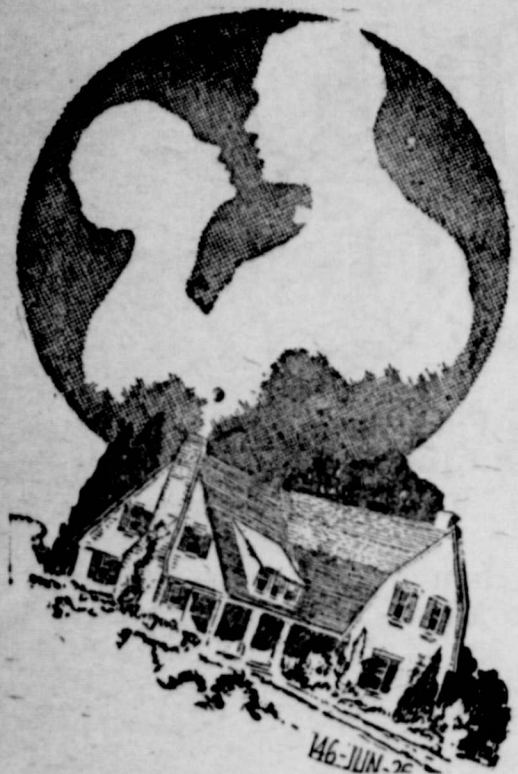

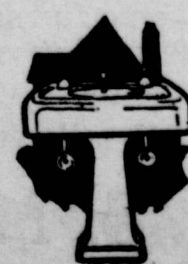
