GLOOM PROPHET OF JAPAN SEES NATION DOOMED

TOKIO, Oct. 12. - A "gloomy propilet' has arisen in Japan, to confound the western idealists who have found the Orient so much more attractive than the west since the time of Lafcadio Hearn. The prophet is Kayan Kazahara who devotes the entire space ha his monthly magazine "Introspection" to praising the west as compared with the Orient. Kazahara has a wide following in Japan especially fond of his brisk attacks on things Japanese. The editor sees little to praise in his native country, and much to criticize. He is most bitter in con demning those westerners who write books on Japan praising the country to the skies when they have spent two or three weeks

Attack on Religion "The Religion of Life" has just been published, Kazahara's latest book. The book is an attack or the "Religion of Death" which he declares is chiefly responsible for Japan's failings. The Japanese ike other Orientals, he says, spend their time in praise of death and neglect life. They are more cor cerned in how to die gracefully than in how to live fully.

The Japanese writer predicts the doom of the Japanese race. He sees no _____for them, in competition with the more lively races of the west. He calls the Japanes failures in government, industry, manners of life, and the daily ha bits of the common people.

Politics is a failure in Japan says Kazahara, because there is no blic opinion. The whole economic ystem of modern Japan is false, says, with the higher-ups in efficient because they get their positions through family connec tions, and the laborers inefficient because they have never been taught to be otherwise.

Wrong Rule of Life Japan has started from the false assumption that the present life is worth much, Kazahara says, and this fundamental belief rules the lives of all Japanese. In the west, on the other hand, self-interest is the chief consideration, and Kazahara believes this is correct The Japanese spend so much time on "manners" that they have little on "manners" that they have little sufferin' tripe!
