Airplane Forced Down Beside Dutch Steamer 900 Miles From European Shore, Messages Say

LE BOURGET FIELD, Oct. 13 .- Ruth Elder and George Haldean have failed in their attempt to fly across the ocean, but have en picked up on the high seas by the Dutch steamer Barenbrecht-A laconic and garbled message this morning from Miss Elder stating hey were safe was later supplemented by a wireless message from the Barenbrecht stating both were aboard the steamer on the high as. Miss Elder's message stated the plane was brought down be-Wednesday, Oct. 26t side the Barenbrecht and that both were safe. The message failed to state the exact location of the ship, but marine experts said the SHOW THATS DIFFEREN vessel was about 900 miles out at sea from Roterdam, bound for Galveston, Texas. It was still unknown whether the pair will remain aboard the vessel until they arrive in the U.S. or whether they will e transferred at sea. . The Dutch vessel will take three weeks to reach Texas, and it is expected the aviators will attempt to get a ransfer to some other ship. AUSTIN, Oct. 8 .- The government crop report released Saturday estimating the crop at 12,678,000 bales or a little less than the Sep-Moran Saturday morning and the tember report not only justifies a higher price, but prophesies 30-cent cotton, George B. Terrell, Texas agriculture commissioner, declared here today. "The farmers are entitled to this price and all who hold their cotton long enough will get it," he said. "Home consumption and estimates of American cotton for the year just closed amounted to more than 18,000,000 bales. At this rate of consumption we will fall far short of the demand. Admitting that one-half the carryover is spinnable, and that is doubtful, we will lack two million bales of satisfying the demands."
