FALLS-SINCLAIR CASE STARTS

Defense Fails to Fight for Delay As Expected and Selection of Jury Begins; Only Few Can Hear Evidence

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Ninety-six persons were assembled in the tiny courtroom of Justice Suddens today as the Fall-Sinclair conspiracy trial got under way. Outside, marshals kept a long line of hopeful spectators quiet and orderly. Lucky ones included 40 newspapermen, 30 spectators, including the families of the two defendants, and the first panel of jurors. After routine preliminaries, the first 12 veniremen were placed in the jury box and examination began. The defense did not make an expected motion for postponement on grounds that the recent supreme court decision revoking the Teapot Dome oil lease was so recent it would prejudice the jury. Peyton Gordon explained the nature of the case. George Hoover of the Sinclair counsel then took up the examination.

Patsy is Dead But She Apologized For Taking the Poison

HOUSTON, Oct. 17.—Patsy is dead. The frail girl with wistful brown eyes and curly black hair died at a local hospital today from poison she swallowed in a Sunday school room several days ago. Records show she was Miss Patricia Hamilton, 20, bride of three weeks. For several days after she took the poison she refused to give her identity. "Just call me Patsy," she said. "I don't want my mother to know this; I just want to die alone. But she didn't die alone. Her mother came from Dallas and was present at her death. Just before she died, she called Rev. Knowles, pastor of the First Christian church here, and apologized for having selected his Sunday school room for her suicide."

GORMAN MAN PREACHES AT CHURCH HERE

Rev. H. P. Watkins, pastor of the First Methodist church of Gorman, preached at the First Methodist church Sunday night. He chose as his text "I am come that ye might have life and that ye might have it more abundantly." He said in part: "Life is more than eating three meals a day, wearing clothes and living in a house. Life is an investment. The investment that really is worth while is in Christian service. Moses, Abraham, Paul and others were examples of lives invested in worthwhile things. 'Life is an abundant investment. Neither public opinion nor even duty should be the compelling motive for investment of life, but love. Life is an abundant investment in Christian stewardship.' The pastor preached at the morning hour on "The Supreme Brotherhood." "The Christian brotherhood is the outstanding brotherhood because Christ is its creator and central figure," he said. The dean then informed his wife he was going to his office to write some letters. Mrs. Walker began an investigation after he failed to return home. Walker left a note in which he said he had been a failure and that she would get along better with him dead. In a letter to Chancellor E. H. Lindley of the University of Kansas, Walker expressed the hope that the chancellor would not think him a coward and that he would not be grieved over the action. Another letter had been written to his father who lives in Maine. He asked forgiveness.

"Friend" Gets Parole Of Girl Canceled

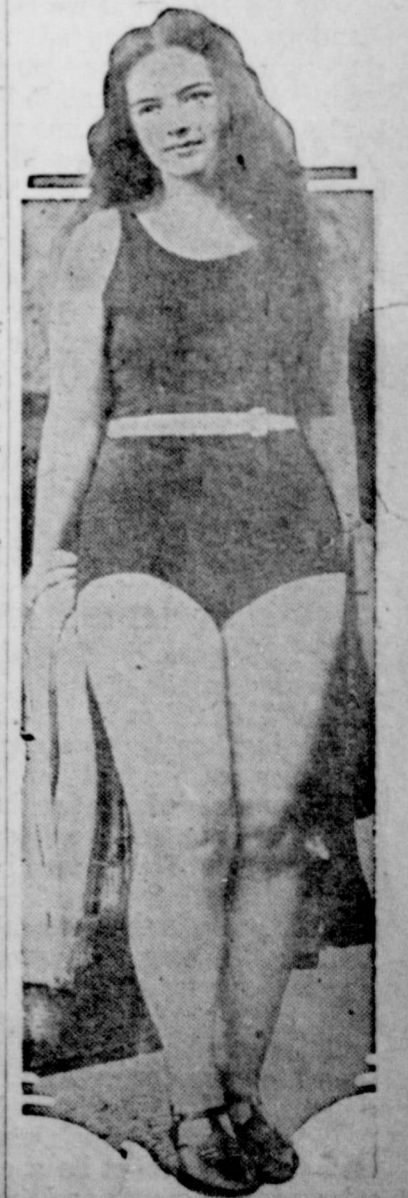
AUSTIN, Oct. 17.—Another claimant to the title "meanest person in the world," has been found. Last week Governor Moody revoked a parole granted by Governor Ferguson to Lily Mae Fite, sent up for seven years from Cook county in 1924 for burglary. This action was taken by Moody after he received a letter purported to be written by the former woman convict asking that her parole be revoked and she be returned to prison. Investigation now shows the letter was written by a former "friend" of the girl. Moody today signed a proclamation restoring the parole.

He Thriftles Woman Who Left Husband

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—The machinery of the law today moved swiftly to indict Henry Gilmore, who admitted to police he choked to death the woman who left her husband for him. He declared Mrs. Helen Brandon, 26, mother of an 8-year-old boy, had made him "love slave." Gilmore confessed he had strangled her when she flourished a knife in his face.

MACHINE GUN BANDITS HOLD UP ROADHOUSE

Joseph "Red" Goodman, professional football player, was the man killed. Goodman surprised the men as he came around the roadhouse. Eighty men and women were held up by two machine guns.

Seeing the blaze, patrolmen approached the car which turned and sped away at great speed. On opening the basket, the officers found the baby nearly burned up.
