Defense Fails to Fight for Delay As Expected and Selection of Jury Begins; Only Few Can Hear Evidence

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 .- Ninety-six persons were assembled in the tiny courtroom of Justice Siddons today as the Fall-Sinelair conspiracy trial got under way. Outside, marshals kept a long line of hopeful spectators quiet and orderly. Lucky ones included 40 newspapermen, 30 spectators, including the families of the two defendants, and the first panel of jurors. After routine preliminaries, the first 12 veniremen were placed in the jury box and examination began. The defense did not make an expected motion for postponement on grounds that the recent supreme court decision revoking the Teapot Dome oil lease was so recent it would prejudice the jury.

Peyton Gordon explained the nature of the case, George Hoover of the Sinclair counsel then took up the examination.

Patsy is Dead But Taking the Poison

HOUSTON, Oct. 17 .- Patsy is dead. The frail girl with wistful brown eyes and curly black hair died at a local hospital today from poison she swallowed in a Sunday school room several days ago. Records show she was Miss Patricia Hamilton, 20, bride of three weeks. For several days after she took the poison she refused to give her identity. "Just call me Patsy," she said. "I don't want my mother to know this; I just want to die alone. But she didn't die alone. Her mother came from Dallas and was present at her death. Just before she died, she called Rev. Knowles, paster of the First Christian church here, and apologized for having selected his Sunday school room for her suicide.

WILL AND WILLIAM

If it's true what we read in the papers, William Randolph Hearst has taken up the bet against Will Rogers about Coolidge running. Will started out by asking Arthur Brisbane to bet with him, \$5,000 even, that Coolidge would not run for president in 1926. That is, Will bet he would run and asked Arthur to back with money his editorial statements that he wouldn't. But Will was canny. He knew whatever remarks Arthur may casually drop about his estates in California or whatnot, editorial writers seldom have any real and ready cash. So he asked Arthur to get William to endorse the check. Will comes back and bets \$10,000 to Will's \$5,000 that Coolidge will not run because he said he wouldn't choose, and Coolidge is an honorable man. Will takes that, and bets William five to one that if Coolidge does run, he will be elected. Because, says Will, democrats always split. Now that the betting has opened so auspiciously, the campaign may be said to be on.

SWIMMING AND SPUNK

The 24-year.old English typist, who has just succeeded in her eighth attempt to swim the English Channel, deserves a little attention even if channelswimming has become something of an old story. The glory of her feat lies not in being a pioneer Others preceded her in this accomplishment. Her victory seems to have been chiefly a personal one. She tried and failed once in 1922, twice in 1925, and twice earlier this year. The eighth time she won. It meant overcoming the mental hazard or repeated failures. It meant bringing herself up to a state of physical fitness sufficient to withstand the cold and endure the hard work. It meant improving her skill and technique as a swimmer. All these things she seems to have done. And now she has conquered the dangerous English Channel late in the season. It is easy to sit back and ask what is the use in such stunts, and yet there must be a certain respect for anyone who has the spunk and will to attempt them and succeed.
