FORMER CISCO COUPLE HELD UP, ROBBED

A former Cisco couple, Mr. and Mrs. S. O. Blount, son and daughter-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. S. G. Blount of 307 West Eleventh street, barely escaped serious injury in a hold up by a lone bandit in El Paso October 12, according to newspaper clippings received by the parents here. Mr. and Mrs. Blount are operating a grocery store in El Paso and as they left their store last Wednesday night, a lone bandit jumped on the side of their car, according to the newspaper story. The bandit covered Mr. Blount with a pistol. At this instant Mrs. Blount leaped from the car and received minor injuries, although she saved several hundred dollars worth of diamonds she was wearing. Mr. Blount, wearing a \$500 diamond at the time, saved it by putting it in his mouth and merely answering the bandit's questions with "Yes, Sir," "No Sir" and thank you, sir," the paper stated. The total loss in the hold up amounted to Mr. Blount's coat, watch, and a few personal items, \$2,000 worth of accounts, and several cash receipts from the day's business. Mr. Blount, in a statement in the El Paso paper, said he would trust to the honesty of his customers for collection of the accounts.

TAX REDUCTION PROGRAM HAS SMALLER CUT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The administration tax reduction program was outlined at the treasury today. It contemplates a total cut of 250 million dollars, about 100 million dollars less than advocated by some republican leaders. Chief features are a one per cent cut of the present 13.12 per cent corporation tax, a slight reduction of the maximum surtax rates, and elimination of practically all of the remaining war taxes. The plan will be submitted by the treasury to the house ways and means committee when it meets October 31 to draft tax legislation.

Private Detective With Ten Wives Put Under Arrest

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—Alfred Hebert, said to have 10 wives, today faced a charge of bigamy and larceny. Taken in custody by a police woman, Helen Bowden when he emerged from a building where he worked as a private detective, Hebert is said to have admitted he had been living with two wives here. His father, Frank Hebert, notified of his son's arrest, said, "Two wives, why I know of six."

FELLOWSHIP FOR WOMEN TO BE ADVOCATED

AUSTIN, Oct. 18.—Establishment of fellowships for women in the leading universities is one of the prime objects of the American Association of University Women, the Texas branch of which will meet here October 28 and 29. Membership is composed of those who have graduated from accredited colleges. Associate members are accepted from among those who have completed specified courses. Most of the fellowships now are established for men, the university women claim. They think women should have equal opportunities. The organization in its local branches also fosters movements for general education. In Austin the delegates will have an opportunity to inspect the public library which the local university women have established and which they are now tendering to the city.

Prosperity To Continue, Cal Asserts

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—President Coolidge believes the present general prosperity of the country will continue indefinitely, it was said at the white house today. The president based his prediction on data presented to him at the cabinet meeting by Secretary of Treasury Mellon, Commerce Jover and Labor Davis. The president submitted a number of reasons to substantiate his view. He said reports indicated the general agricultural condition is better, and that all crops except cotton are better than last year. Hog, cattle and sheep industries are declared sound. Cotton production was cut down by the boll weevil. The slight decrease in railroad receipts was caused by a falling off of passenger traffic, result of increased use of the automobile for long distance travel.

TEXAS VESSEL CATCHES FIRE WHILE AT SEA

KEY WEST, Fla., Oct. 18.—With both crew and passengers fighting a fire in the freight held, the Mallory line steamer San Jacinto arrived in port here from Galveston, Texas, today. The fire was discovered Sunday morning, 12 hours after the liner had cleared the Texas port. Working in shifts, the crew and passengers have since battled the flames. Bad weather encountered Sunday night and the heavy seas added to the plight of the ship. With heavy black smoke pouring from her forward hold where a shipment of cotton had been stored, there was no way today to ascertain what damage had been done.

32 MEXICAN REBELS SLAIN DURING FIGHT

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 18.—Federal troops have exterminated a band of rebels led by Benjamin Mendez and Marquerito Gomez at Sultepec. Thirty-two of the rebels were killed. Government spokesmen claim to have found evidence on the battlefield at Amoso, Puebla, indicating that the Gomez-Almuda faction under the leadership of Fernandez Lara had supported from religious adherents. Arrests of churchmen are anticipated. The whereabouts of Gen. Gomez are still unknown.

The games are the Eastland and Ranger game scheduled to be played Friday afternoon at Ranger, on the first day of the Ranger Jubilee and homecoming, and the Cisco-San Angelo game to be played here Saturday.

PRODUCTION OF OIL HAS FURTHER DROP

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 18.—Oil production in the United States fell off 9,910 barrels a day for the week ended October 15, so the Oil and Gas Journal estimates. The daily output according to this petroleum trade paper was 2,500,884 barrels for the week of October 8. A general decline of the light oil areas was almost wholly responsible for the steady decrease, the light oil production being computed at 2,000,265 barrels, and the heavy oil at 470,719 barrels. Oklahoma dropped 17,785 barrels a day to 790,785 barrels, and this loss was due to rigid enforcement of restrictions at Seminole and efforts in other areas. Kansas, however, made a small gain of 485 barrels, to 164,735 barrels, and Oxford was responsible for this. In Arkansas and North Louisiana had trivial gains, but the big increase was in West Texas, boomed as the oil industry's next big area, which average 209,282 barrels, a gain of 13,517 barrels a day within a week. Peas and Winkler counties accounted for this gain. The Gulf coast made a gain of 1,054 barrels, and the deep Spindletop pool was responsible. Otherwise, Texas was declining.

DOOMED TEXAN REFUSES ANY SANITY PROBE

AUSTIN, Oct. 18.—A. V. Millikin, recently snatched from the electric chair less than six hours before he was to have been electrocuted for the murder of Mrs. Virginia Petty, San Antonio real estate operator by action of the court of criminal appeals ordering him to be tried before Judge M. C. Jeffreys of Lockhart for insanity, refused to submit to a mental examination before three physicians here late yesterday. It became known today. The news was divulged by Gov. Moody today. The governor is of the opinion Millikin lessened his chances to be declared insane by refusing to be examined here. "It is the worst thing he could have done," the governor said.

Bootlegger King Asks Sanity Trial Delay

CINCINNATI, Oct. 18.—The insanity hearing of George Remus, erstwhile "king of the bootleggers" under indictment here for the first degree murder of his wife, was postponed one week from October 31 to November 7 by Judge Chester R. Shook, in common pleas court here today. The postponement was granted on motion of Remus' attorney, Charles Elston, who said additional time would be required to obtain necessary affidavits bearing upon Remus' mental condition.

SUCCESS WEEK FOR BAPTISTS STARTS SOON

DALLAS, Oct. 18.—Recent results of activities of Baptist workers in the state Conquest Campaign indicate that "success week" which begins Sunday, October 23, will be an outstanding success in the fall round-up of the campaign, according to Dr. F. While it is impossible at this early date to compile final figures on donations made to the campaign on October 12—"One Day for God"—the many reports and checks already received at Baptist headquarters have proven the day an unusual success financially. It is believed that donations for that day will exceed expectations by a generous margin.
