CALLES' TRAIN DYNAMITED

Six Members of President's Family Escape Death When Railroad Tracks Blown Up

EL PASO, Oct. 19.—Six persons were killed, several others were seriously injured and six members of the family of President Calles had a narrow escape from death when a band of 60 rebels dynamited a train between Villa Reyes and Jural Delberrio south of San Luis Potosi yesterday, according to reports received at Juarez today. The identity of the members of the Calles family was not disclosed but they are said to have been in a special car attached to the train which was bound from Laredo to Mexico City. According to reports the dynamite exploded beneath a second class coach and the engine was derailed. The injured were taken to Mexico City. Federal troops were sent in pursuit of the dynamiters.

BLAME PLACED ON ABSENTEE IN OIL TRIAL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—The ownership of the Continental Trading company out of which ex-Secretary of Interior Albert B. Fall is alleged to have received \$230,500 was placed upon H. M. Blackmer, former chairman of the board of the Midwest Refining company by defense attorney Martin W. Littleton as the Fall-Sinclair criminal conspiracy trial warmed up. Blackmer has been in Europe for four years avoiding appearance in the oil trials, and since this case began has sent an attorney into court to defy government right to subpoena him. Harry F. Sinclair, Littleton told the jury, had no part in forming the Continental Trading company which he inferred consisted only of Blackmer.

Rural Electrification Discussed At West Texas Utilities Women's Meeting Here; Would Aid Farm Home

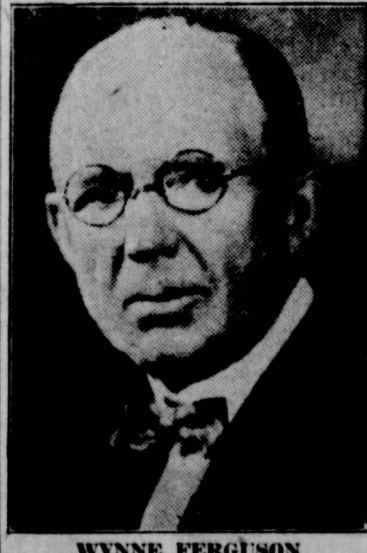

Cisco Banks to Make Service Charge On Small Accounts Beginning Jan. 1; All Banks in County Join in Move

Cisco banks will place a service charge of 50 cents a month on accounts which do not maintain an average balance of \$50 during the month, it was announced Wednesday by Guy Dalbey, vice-president of the Cisco Banking company, following a recent meeting of the Eastland County Bankers' association. The charges will be made on the twentieth of each month following a check up on accounts for the previous month, it was said. No charge will be made on church or other benevolent accounts. In a letter prepared for forwarding to each depositor, it is stated: "In the average bank about one-half of the accounts are so intensely active and the balance so small that the clerical work incident on the bank in handling them entails expense which we feel should be partly borne by the customer. It is our intention to make money out of this charge not to penalize the small depositor. If such were the case the charge would be much larger. But it is added to equalize the burden. The service charge is in force in many cities and towns, and it is only a question of time until it will be universally adopted, because it is just and equitable. The average man or woman does not want something for nothing, but rather prefers to be fair in all things. During the last few years the expense of operating a bank has gradually increased while the interest rates have remained the same, and in some instances been lowered. You can thus see the equity of this, and we think, will admit its fairness. Based upon sound, conservative banking methods, we are here to serve you. It will be a pleasure to co-operate with the small depositor, in helping them to build their accounts, to manage a little better, and save a little more, and avoid the service charge. Realizing the advantages of a checking account, we feel sure that you will at least, with these facts before you, want to bear your part of this burden and maintain a balance that will be its own compensation, or, failing to do this, you will agree that we should not be called upon to render a service which means a loss to us month after month. This letter is to be signed by eight of the Eastland county banks."

A race for collegiate flivvers from here to Grinnell, a distance of about fifty miles, is to be staged Oct. 22, when Drake's football team meets the Grinnell college Pioneers. With attractive prizes being offered for the winners of various phases of the unique race, Drake owners of broken down "pleasure chariots" are busy these days tuning up their antiquated models and making them ship-shape for the fifty mile sprint. First prize will go to the driver crossing the finish line at Grinnell under his own power. Another prize is offered for the flivver making the distance with the greatest number of passengers, while a third prize will be awarded the first car to cross the finish line on the other end of a tow rope. The first car that breaks down under the strain also will win a prize for its owner, while awards similar to lap prizes will be given for the cars first reaching the various towns along the route.

Joseph LeBrix, French aviators, making a flight from LeBourget, France to Buenos Aires, were sighted over Itajahy at 12:30 p. m. today. Heavy storms were reported from the southern coast. Itajahy is in the state of Catharina, 800 miles northeast of Buenos Aires.

HERO OF GETTYSBURG IS GIVEN HONORS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—America's treatment of its war veterans has ever been the most generous, President Coolidge today said in accepting a monument of George Gordon Beade, hero of Gettysburg. Ascribing the belated recognition of the hero to a change in public opinion, Mr. Coolidge said: "There are great compensations for the delay in the beauty of the monument."

BADGERS WILL MEET RANGER ON THURSDAY

Coach Monroe Sweeney has his Randolph college Badgers primed for a hard game when they go up against the Ranger Junior College team at Ranger Thursday afternoon in a pre-judice football game. Coach Tricky Ward of the Ranger college is said to have a powerful eleven, drawn principally from the intelligibles of the Ranger Bulldogs as well as from last year's football teams in surrounding towns. The Badgers, on the other hand, are reported in good condition. They showed great form in defeating the Texas Military college fighting cadets here last week with general team work and interference vastly improved over the earlier games. Sweeney has a battling backfield which has both speed and power, while the line is one of the most powerful seen in this section in years. A large crowd of Ciscoans will likely make the trip to Ranger to see the game. The Badger girls' pep squad is planning to go to the game to back the team, and leaders have asked that Ciscoans who go to the game and have room in their automobiles for pep squad girls should call by the chamber of commerce where the girls will be waiting for rides from noon up till the time of the game.

OCEAN STORM TAKES HEAVY TOLL IN SHIPS

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—The severe storm in the Atlantic from Maine to Florida has taken a heavy toll of coastwise ships. Eleven schooners have been wrecked in the last 12 hours. The shipping board liner President Adams this morning rescued the captain and ten men of the Schooner Burnham which is wrecked and burning off New York. All available coast ships have been ordered out to aid stricken vessels.

BORAH WANTS CANDIDATES' PROHIBITION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—The demand of Senator William E. Borah, seconded by Nicholas Murray Butler that both major parties and all presidential candidates go on record as regards prohibition, apparently failed today to create much impression on leaders of either party. The only endorsement came from wet leaders who have been urging prohibition as an issue ever since they were elected on wet platforms. Otherwise there appeared to be an inclination in both parties to write general law enforcement planks into their platforms and then forget the subject. The New Yorker called upon candidates to declare themselves on farm relief, world peace movements, elimination of lame duck sessions of congress, and government for the masses as against government for special interests. The city forester reminds us that the time for planting trees is almost upon us. EASTLAND CO. OIL FIELDS INSPIRE ART

"The oil fields of Texas offer fascinating opportunities to the landscape painter," says Prof. Samuel P. Ziegler, head of the department. "The colorful formations of the volcanic rock, the jet black pools of waste oil, reflecting a myriad of rainbow colors in iridescent tumbles, the tapering towers of the symmetrical derricks, present hundreds of pictures to the seeing eye."

Prof. Ziegler, during the past summer, painted several pictures in the fields of Eastland county which forcefully pictures his enthusiasm over the artistic possibilities of the oil wells. One of them, a panorama of Colonel Gordon's Ramsower field shows 20 or more derricks in the background, while in the foreground is a wide pool of waste oil on whose shimmering surface the gorgeous colors of a summer sunset are reflected.

Another picture is a closeup of Colonel Gordon's Ramsower No. 4. Mr. Ziegler featured in it the long piles of bluish tender shale and rock which had been panned from the halter. While Mr. Ziegler was painting this picture one of the drillers ran frantically to him and warned him to move his canvas as they were preparing to shoot the well and Mr. Ziegler was in danger of being the recipient of an oily shower bath.

Two large lithographs of the Eastland field stand in the art studio at T. C. U. and on his next trip Mr. Ziegler hopes to make some etchings of the wells. "The ideal way to paint the fields is to take a flyover and a tent," he said. "Then one can stop and paint as the mood seizes him. Thus no scene that offers inspiration need be missed."

"In the past," says Mr. Ziegler, "paintings of Texas landscapes have been confined mostly to blue bonnets, cattle ranges and cotton fields, which are beautiful and representative, but in years to come the oil wells may be only a memory and pictures of the fields should hang in every Texas museum for the benefit of posterity."
