## Fall Threatens to "Explain All" on Stand

### OWN LAWYERS WANT HIM NOT TO TESTIFY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior, standing trial with Harry F. Sinclair for criminal conspiracy, unexpectedly took the defense in his own hand for a few minutes today. Tired of several hours of wrangling over technicalities, the white-haired defendant arose and expressed his own views to the court. Assistant Secretary of the Interior Finney was being questioned by George Hoover, defense attorney. Hoover was trying to get Finney to interpret two acts of congress which permitted leasing of the naval reserves. The defense wanted to get into the record the interior department's attitude on leasing before the Teapot Dome lease. Government attorneys objected and during the argument which followed, Fall arose and asked permission to make a statement. "I wish to make no speech to the jury," he said, "but I want to point out that Judge Finney has qualified on the stand as an expert witness. He should be permitted to answer these questions, and if the honorable court sustains these objections, it may be making a ruling which it might regret." The defendant spoke in a low tone at first and his words were indistinguishable to those in the press box. As he talked, however, his voice grew stronger and he pounded the table. The court then made an extended talk in which he referred to "Lawyer" Fall.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—The Fall-Sinclair defense got its first licks today in an effort to clear Albert B. Fall and Harry F. Sinclair of fraud. The attempt was made through cross examination of E. C. Finney, assistant secretary of the interior. Finney had testified that he knew nothing of the lease until after it had been executed by Fall, and that Fall gave orders that no information on the lease should be given out. He was turned over to George E. Hoover, Sinclair's defense attorney, after examination by Owen J. Roberts of the government staff.

Before today's session Fall declared he had not decided whether he would take the stand in his own defense. He said yesterday he would go on the stand and explain "a lot of things that haven't been explained." He did not testify in the Doherty trial and his lawyers do not want him to take the stand here.

Finney began his testimony with general information regarding leases and the jury became restless. They paid but scant attention to Hoover and Finney and seemed more intent in watching the two defendants. Fall, smiling, engaged for some time in an animated conversation with his lawyers. He appeared in better spirits than at any time since the trial started. Sinclair followed the proceedings closely. The feeling between Roberts and Hoover, which has already resulted in so many heated rows, was not abated during the night, and they again clashed over testimony Hoover sought to worm out of Finney.

### French Flyers Complete Trip

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 20.—Dieudonne Coste and Joseph LeBrix who set out from LeBourget, France, to fly to this city in relay flights, arrived over the outskirts of this city this afternoon. A flotilla of naval planes went out to meet him, and he landed at 12:20. The flyers were welcomed by the French ambassador and officials of the Argentine government.

### STEPHENS CO. COURTHOUSE HAS DEFECTS

BRECKENRIDGE, Oct. 20.—The Stephens county grand jury, reporting to Judge C. O. Hamilton, recommended that a thorough investigation be made by a competent architect to determine the extent of alleged defects in the new Stephens county courthouse. According to the grand jury report, many defects have been discovered in the half-million dollar building and in the materials used. The grand jury urged that the original plans and specifications be checked with the completed building to see, as far as possible, wherein the building is deficient.

### LANCASTER IS BIG BOOSTER FOR DAIRYING

DALLAS, Oct. 20.—"Farm dairying with blooded stock will do more to bring about a prosperous condition in Texas rural communities than any one thing," J. L. Lancaster, president of the Texas & Pacific railroad, said at a luncheon of the Dallas Agricultural club Monday night at the Baker hotel.

Mr. Lancaster, who beside being the president of the road is vice president of the State fair of Texas, chairman of the agricultural department of the fair and a director of the City National bank, was the principal speaker at this meeting, which was devoted to the question of dairying in Texas.

"While cotton is and should be the principal crop in Texas," he said, "there should be a certain amount of diversification on the farms, and that dairying is probably the most remunerative and stable of other industries aside from the raising of cotton."

The Texas & Pacific, he pointed out, is tremendously interested in the development of the live stock business in the territory his line serves. It will mean more prosperity to the farmers, increase the population, and in turn will bring more money to the railroads which have spent so much money in developing the sections through which they run.

The T. & P., he said, has spent about \$42,000,000 in improvements and to get a return on this immense sum, there will have to be better farming conditions along the route, and he thinks dairying will help in a big way to solve the problem.

### Boiler Explosion Cause of Wreck

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 20.—The explosion of a boiler and not dynamite was responsible for the wreck of the Laredo-Mexico City passenger train near San Luis Potosi, it was announced today by Gen. Navarez, chief of President Calles' military staff. Six persons were killed and a number of others severely injured in the explosion. The presidential office here has received no official report of the number of dead and injured, all of whom were placed in hospitals at San Luis Potosi.

### Cisco Daily News and Thursday American and Roundup Announce Increase in Advertising Rates

Beginning November 1, the Cisco Daily News and Thursday American and Roundup will make a slight increase in its advertising rates in keeping with the continued growth of these newspapers within the last two years. Since the present rates were established, the circulation of both the daily and weekly newspaper has more than doubled, and the advertisers have enjoyed the advantages of this large increase in readers without additional cost. Installation of a new high speed Duplex printing press will make it possible for the two newspapers to reach an even wider field than in the past, thus further enhancing the value of the advertising columns.

However, a most important improvement coming from installation of the new press at a cost of many thousand of dollars will be an increase in the size of the two papers. In the past, most of the daily issues have been four pages, with eight pages on Thursdays and Sundays. When the new press is put into operation, it is planned that the daily issues will be not less than six pages, while the Thursday and Sunday editions will be ten or twelve pages regularly. This will increase the value of the advertising columns in several ways. First, a larger paper will carry more prestige than a smaller one. Second, more room will thus be provided for news and interesting features, insuring that the paper will be more interesting to the subscribers and more thoroughly read. And third, in developing the sections through which it will carry more advertisements better positions without too much crowding. Thus, in addition to the

increased number of subscribers, the advertiser will find his announcements will be more effective in reaching those readers.

The new rates will be as follows:

Daily, per inch, 20 cents.  
Sunday, per inch, 35 cents.  
Thursday American and Roundup, per inch, 35 cents.

Foreign advertising, 42 cents.

It should be borne in mind, however, that existing contract rates will not be disturbed by the increase in open rates, the Daily News and Thursday American believing that those regular advertisers who make it possible for a paper to be gotten out every day and available to those who desire to advertise only occasionally, should be given the most preferential rates.

The new schedule of rates for the Cisco newspapers is still below the open rate of other cities in this section. The Eastland Tribune open rate is 40 cents an inch. The Breckenridge American charges 40 cents an inch. The Ranger Times rate is 49 cents for the Ranger edition or 56 cents for the Ranger Times and Eastland Telegram combined. The Abilene Reporter rate is 60 cents an inch or 90 cents for both the Abilene Reporter and the Morning News. Thus, it is seen that the Cisco advertising rate is still the lowest in the Oil Belt for any daily newspaper.

### WENDE GIVES HEARTY BOOST TO BANKHEAD

Many poultry raisers, who are not now members of the Bankhead Poultry Raisers' association, would become members of the organization if they were better informed of its purposes, according to Charlie Wendt, farmer and poultryman of near Cisco. Mr. Wendt was in Eastland Monday on business, and said that he would like to know more about the organization and that he was not adverse to joining and cooperating with the members of the association.

Mr. Wendt suggested that the officials of the Bankhead association should have more meetings over the county in order that the poultry raisers might have an opportunity to attend and get more information regarding the purposes, plans and policies of the organization.

J. C. Patterson, Eastland county agent, in discussing the Bankhead association, pointed out that additional members were needed in order that the association might do its best work. ### Taking of Evidence Begins This Afternoon at Anson In Killing of Fisher Co. Sheriff

ANSON, Oct. 20.—Selection of the jury to try Lloyd Conatser for slaying of Sheriff Bob Smith of Fisher county, was completed this morning with taking of evidence scheduled to begin at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Conatser is charged with taking part in the killing with Joyce Shepard, alias Bill Smith, after the latter had been arrested last August for theft of a bale of cotton. Jake Owens, deputy sheriff, was also slain at the same time, and Conatser is yet to face trial at Abilene in this case. The trial here will be of particular interest since Shepard is expected to take the stand as a state's witness against Conatser. Conatser claims he had nothing to do with the shooting and places the entire blame on Shepard. He asserts he merely was accompanying the officers and Shepard to town after the arrest and that he was unarmed. He says Shepard shot both the men Shepard, on the other hand, alleges Conatser participated in the actual shooting and fled with him as far as Mississippi after the crime. The two men and their wives were occupying the same house at the time of the tragedy.

Postponement was granted because Mrs. Julia Brecher murder trial has not yet been concluded. Conner's attorneys are estimated to be arguing for a continuance because of illness of the defendant.

### TAX REDUCTION PROGRAM HAS SMALLER CUT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The administration tax reduction program was outlined at the treasury today. It contemplates a total cut of 250 million dollars, about 100 million dollars less than advocated by senate republican leaders. Chief features are a one per cent cut of the present 13 1/2 per cent corporation tax, a slight reduction of the maximum surtax rates, and elimination of practically all of the remaining war taxes. The plan will be submitted by the treasury to the house ways and means committee when it meets October 31 to draft tax legislation.

### S. P. TRACKS SOON TO REACH BROWNSVILLE

BROWNSVILLE, Oct. 18.—The tracks of the southern Pacific railroad will reach Brownsville the first week in November, making this the southernmost terminus of the railroad. Final opening of passenger and freight service over the line will be November 14 and 15, according to announcement of H. M. Lull, executive vice president. A celebration of the event will be held in conjunction with the convention of the South Texas chamber of commerce.

Lull announced that arrangements were being made to bring several special trains bearing rail officials and prominent persons from various parts of the United States to participate in the celebration. Several of the latest types of locomotives and other types of railroad equipment will be brought here for the occasion.

### Fine Billy Goats On Cisco Farms

A half dozen registered billy goats of the Angora breed were being shown on Main street Monday afternoon by Edward Lee of the Lee farm. The goats were selected last week by R. Q. Lee who made a trip to Dublin to see them. Five of the goats were bought by Riddle Bros., famous Texas goat breeders, in Oregon, while the sixth was raised on the Riddle ranch from original Oregon stock. This last goat is marked by exceedingly long mohair which is more than a foot long and reaches to the ground. It was estimated that the mohair from this goat would weigh 15 pounds when clipped, which would have an estimated value of \$7.50. Three of the goats will be placed on the Lee farm where 104 grade sheep were recently placed, while the other three will go to the Walter Ray farm.

### R. Q. Lee Attends Big Dairy Show

Mr. and Mrs. R. Q. Lee left Monday for Memphis, Tenn., where they will attend a meeting of the National Dairy association. 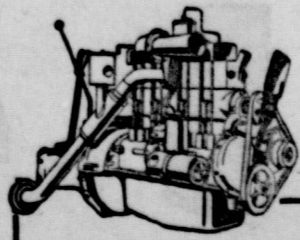

#### AGGIE-S. M. U. GAME TO DRAW HUGE CROWD

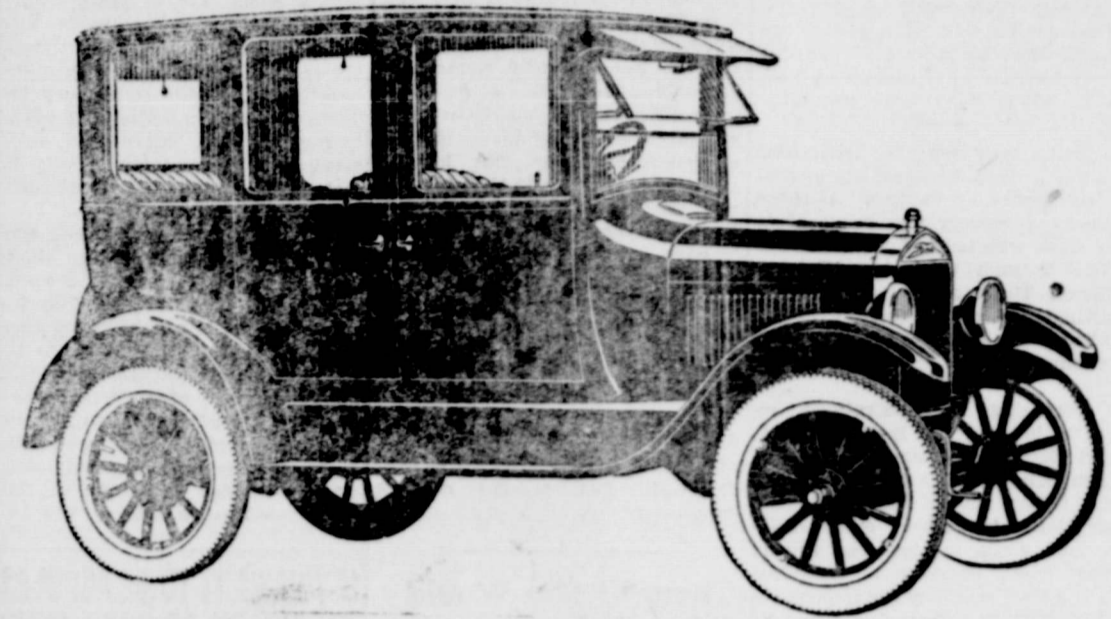

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—The severe storm in the Atlantic from Maine to Florida has taken a heavy toll of coastwise ships. Eleven schooners have been wrecked in the last 12 hours. The shipping board liner President Adams this morning rescued the captain and ten men of the schooner Burnham which was wrecked and burning off New York. All available coast ships have been ordered out to aid stricken vessels.

### \$325.00 COW SHOWS INCOME OF \$4,072

TULLA, Oct. 20.—I thought I was taking chances when I paid \$325 for my first registered Jersey cow," asserts Bob Nicholl, Tulla dairyman and well known Jersey breeder, whose books show that the cow, Prince's Alberta May No. 253248 has netted him \$3,827 from milk alone, above her expense during the past six years. She has also raised six calves that have sold for \$725 and now has a heifer calf for which he refused an offer of \$100 at birth. This cow has totaled \$4,702 during the past six years. She is a very high producer and comes direct from the best that Jersey Island could produce. When mated with his foundation bull, Gumbo's Fox's King No. 201085, for which he once refused \$1,000, this cow's calves have all been sold at one day old with the exception of one.

The daughters have all made good producing records and every one has entered the show ring in some part of the state.

Gumbo's Oklands Fox was exhibited at the Tri-State exposition. She now belongs to Prof. G. P. Trout, who is using her for demonstration purposes for the Pathandale chamber of commerce. Another is a member of the Dr. Underwood show herd of Hale Center. Sep Arnold, professional breeder of Turkey, has one for show purposes. Another daughter is being used for demonstration at Texas Tech, Lubbock.

The only bull calf among the six is a leading member of the famous Taft Brothers' show herd of Taft.

"That first cow would have been a bargain at \$1,000," Nicholl said. The owner believes that price is no consideration when he finds the right stock. He owns a good herd of 30 registered cows, among them the leading producers of West Texas.

## Agriculture

Edited by: E. H. VARNELL, Department Vocational Agriculture, Chamber of Commerce and High School

We are making an effort to get a good collection of both native and thin shelled pecans grown around Cisco. If you have an unusually good native tree or one or more of the improved varieties, we should like very much to get a sample of some 8 or 10 nuts of each kind. These nuts, with the name of the donor, will be placed in a permanent exhibit case and displayed in the local chamber of commerce. The Government pecan tree sold for a thousand dollars, the Mayland for five thousand, you might discover one equally as good. It is said that there are fifty million bearing seedling pecan trees in Texas. We are propagating only about twenty-five or thirty of that number; there must be more good ones somewhere. Good quality thin shell pecans are worth 50 cents per pound and up. Cisco has produces of fine pecan land. Why not produce more pecans?

Dairy meetings are being held in the various communities around Cisco from time to time. At these meetings reports are being given by those who made the recent dairy trip through Central and South Texas. These meetings are interesting. Do not forget to attend when a meeting is held in your community.

Terracing demonstrations recently held in the Bedford, Word and Scranton communities have been fairly well attended. Plans are being made to have demonstrations in other communities around Cisco in the near future. The Cisco chamber of commerce has added considerable interest to this work by offering to pay half the purchase of a terracing machine or a farm level for any community in Cisco's trade territory. This is a very generous offer and we believe that a number of communities around Cisco ought to take advantage of it.

Terracing is receiving greater attention each year, as people are able to see more of the results of terraces built a number of years ago. It is very noticeable that men who have terraced that were well constructed and are now several years old are the farmers who are building more terraces. They are individuals who can best judge

the value of terracing. As an illustration of this fact, five farmers out of ten who visited O. P. Webster's demonstration held Friday of last week, were landowners who have part or all of their farms terraced. They came to get more knowledge of terracing, to get new ideas.

The United States department of Agriculture estimates that soil erosion, or washing away of the soil, costs the farmers of the United States \$100,000,000 every year. The average field around Cisco, we are told, will remain productive about 10 or 20 years if it is not terraced. In that length of time the soil is largely washed away and a profit can not be made from crops grown on it. The farm owner who has his land terraced is not taking the chance of having a worn out soil from which to make a living in his older days. He has an insurance policy for his old age and his family in that his soil will remain productive indefinitely. The federal land bank recently gave a great stimulus to terracing when it made it a policy of not loaning money on unterraced land. Terracing is made one of the requirements before a loan is granted. The bank has found that much of the land it had been lending money on for a period of some 25 years will be worn out and abandoned long before it is paid for, which justifies the recently adopted policy.

### RIISING STAR FARMER MAKES CASH ON GOATS

Further evidence that goats can be raised profitably in Eastland county is given by Jim Lee, farmer near Rising Star, in the southwestern portion of the county. Lee has a herd of 40 goats, which he runs on his farm and from which he has just marketed the clip of mohair that netted him \$72. In addition to the mohair Lee received a net profit of \$60 for mutton, which shows a net earning of \$132, or slightly more than \$3 per goat. Mr. Lee is well pleased with the returns from his herd and believes that it would pay every Eastland county farmer to keep as many goats as he can conveniently run on his farm.

R. H. Bush, former Eastland county agent, spent much time gathering data on goats in this and immediate sections, and it was his opinion, based on the information he had secured from many reliable sources, that Eastland county farmers and landowners were overlooking a great opportunity if they did not go into the goat business extensively.

As pointed out by Mr. Bush and other enthusiasts, there are thousands of acres of land in the county suitable for goats, that, in its present state, is worthless for anything else. If such land is to be cleared for agricultural purposes an expenditure of several dollars per acre is necessary to remove the underbrush, which would be destroyed by the goats if they were permitted to run on it. Not only would goats destroy the un-

Of course where goats are to be run on land it must first be properly fenced, but the land is to be fenced anyway and it would not cost a great deal more to fence it for goats.

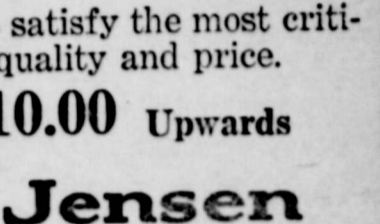

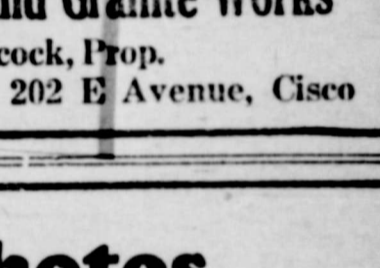

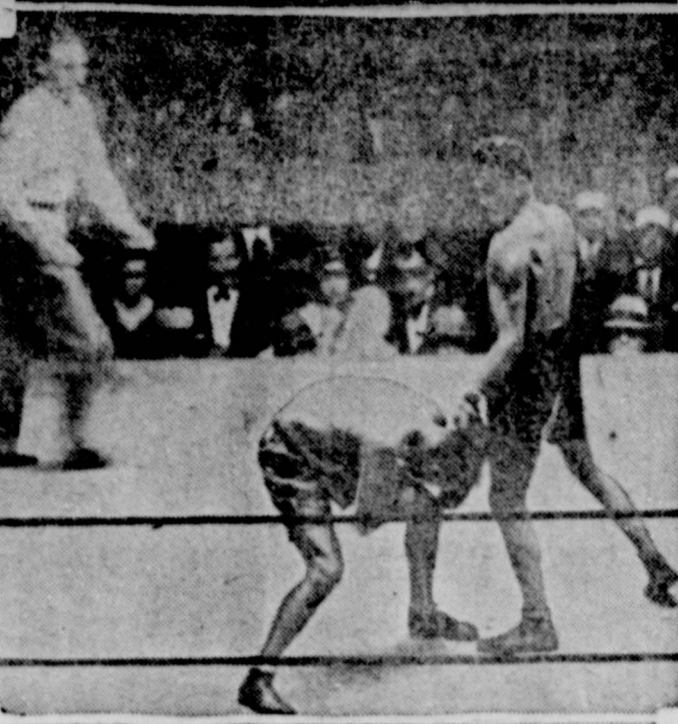
