### MILLIONS IN SCHOOL BONDS FACE CRISIS

AFSPIN, Oct. 26.—Several million dollars worth of school bonds owned by the permanent school fund are seriously affected by failure to pay the interest due. It has been announced, and action may be taken by the attorney general's department in the matter.

The state board of education has certified to the attorney general for action a list of the bonds issued by counties and school districts on which the interest is past due. The amount of interest past due totals about \$200,000.

"The statute authorizes the state board of education to declare the entire issue of bonds due if default is made in the payment of interest," said D. L. Whitehurst, assistant attorney general, "and the board contemplates declaring all issues of bonds due and payable where the interest is not paid up."

### U. S. Rubber Co Trees Set Record

C. B. Seger, president of the United States Rubber company, authorizes the following statement: "Apropos of reports in the newspapers that bud grafting applied to rubber cultivation will greatly increase the yield, we estimate that the ultimate yield on the latest planted areas (planted with budded stock) in our plantations in Sumatra and Mayla, will be 1,000 pounds per acre, per annum, as compared with 350 pounds per acre, which is the average yield of rubber plantations the world over. Our own plantations yielded 441 pounds per acre in 1926. The large yield on our plantations is due to the application of fertilizers, seed selection and other scientific methods we have followed since we started operations in the Far East in 1910. It is to these that we look to increase the yield of our acreage to the 1,000 pound mark."

### ELLIS COUNTY MAY LEAD ALL IN GINNINGS

WAXAHACHE, Oct. 27.—Ellis county is expected to overtake Nueces and Williamson counties in cotton ginnings before the season ends. Crop observers here look for a 100,000 bale crop in this county.

Nueces, far to the south, where the season is practically over, last reported 96,621 bales. Williamson was at that time second with 71,961 bales. Other leading counties were Ellis, 66,191 bales; San Patricio, 53,640 bales; McLennan, 50,897 bales; Hill, 45,716 bales; Navarro, 45,664 bales; Falls, 43,924 bales; Fort Bend, 41,286 bales; Milam, 41,217 bales.

Agriculturists here point out that Ellis county is well to the north in Texas, making the crop later, and expects this county to exceed in ginnings the production of Nueces and Williamson counties, present high rankers.

### Abernathy Feed Crop Triples Last Year's

ABERNATHY, Oct. 27.—The feed crop of the Abernathy section is estimated as being three times as large as that of last year, and large shipments of grain are being made from local elevators. Sudan is especially good this season, and, although the price is somewhat lower than in former years, the hay is bringing considerable money to Abernathy farmers.

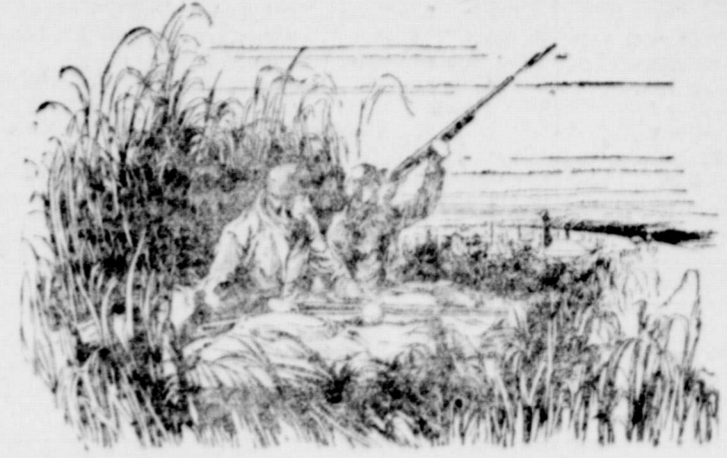
