# 27 DIE, 33 MISSED IN FIRE

G. W. Bird, graduate of Texas A. & M. and an expert on poultry raising and dairying has become associated with the Bankhead Feed Mills in Cisco and will be available to the farmers of this section in assisting them in solving their problems. It was announced Thursday by D. J. Moss, manager of the Moss interests here, Mr. Bird has already arrived and can be reached at the Bankhead mill. Mr. Bird is not only well grounded in the theories of poultry and dairy interests but he has put them into practice, owning his own poultry ranch and operating it at a high stage of efficiency, it is said. He has had 8 or 10 years' experience along this line, and his experience has now been made available to the farmers of this section.

A. H. Giesecke, graduate of the school of landscape architecture of A. & M. college, has joined the staff of the Cisco Floral Nursery company for the present planting season and is already engaged in designing landscapes for Cisco homes. He comes here after being connected with the famous Griffin nursery of Beaumont and more recently in the southern part of West Texas and California. "It is my theory that West Texas homes can be made just as beautiful and attractive through landscaping as can homes in south and East Texas," he asserted. "It is purely a matter of selecting the right kinds of plants suitable for the climate, soil and altitude of the section. Most of the failures in the past have been made through purchase of shrubbery and trees which could not be expected to thrive in this section. Not only are there certain kinds of trees that will not grow well in West Texas, but there are certain varieties of trees that will do best here. For instance, while West Texas is an excellent place to grow pecans, there are certain strains of pecan trees that are indigenous to the moist climate of southwest Texas and will not grow here. So, the planter of trees and shrubbery should be careful and get expert advice on what trees to plant and what trees to leave alone. Personally, I have always paid more attention to design than to planting, but I have paid particular study to West Texas plants and believe I can select the right plants to thrive here. In my work, I expect to prove that West Texas can bloom even as a garden despite chains of many in the past that only maize and cotton can be grown here alongside of mesquite trees."

## State Officials To Let Supply Contract

AUSTIN, Dec. 14.—A conference was held with the state board of control by the state highway department in regard to purchase of between \$500,000 and \$600,000 worth of oil, gasoline and tires for the highway department to be paid out of the highway revenue, mainly derived from the gasoline tax. The equipment division of the department reported it would not recommend in every instance that the contract be allotted to the low bidder because of inferiority of product. Awards will be split up among several firms.

## Senators Probe Bribery Charges

### 4 ACCUSED DENY MEXICO PAID THEM

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The senate investigating committee today began a probe into the sensational charges made by the Hearst newspapers regarding Mexican activities, which revealed among other things that Mexican authorities appropriated more than a million dollars and sent it to representatives in the country for delivery to four U. S. senators. William Randolph Hearst told the senate investigating committee how the documents came into his possession and declared he did not believe any of the senators named ever received a penny of them. In fact, Hearst said he was inclined to the same opinion—President Coolidge had suggested that the appropriation went to enrich Mexican officials rather than to spread propaganda. Nevertheless, he said he was so convinced of the authenticity of the documents that he decided to publish them to give congress a chance to investigate. He turned over the signed documents to the committee. Three of the senators named therein, Heflin, democrat, Alabama; LaFollette, republican, Wisconsin; and Borah, republican, Idaho—were called to the witness stand as soon as Mr. Hearst left it and they denied vigorously that they had ever received money from the Mexican government. "The fourth named was Senator George W. Norris, republican of Nebraska, who is ill and was not present. "I think it is unnecessary to take Senator Norris' statement in this matter, but I think his denial should go out at the same time," said Senator Johnson of California. Johnson was appointed to take a stenographer and take Senator Norris' statement. All of the senators questioned denied stoutly they had received any money, but they protested warmly over their names being made public.

There was laughter when the documents were read, showing \$500,000 went to Senator Borah, \$250,000 to Senator Heflin, \$250,000 to Senator Norris and \$15,000 to Senator LaFollette.

Dudley Field Malone, former collector of the port of New York was named as the intermediary for the Mexican government in the affair. One of the documents was a letter from Arturo Elias, Mexican agent in New York to President Calles, in which it was stated Elias had turned over the money to Malone. Malone then took the stand and denied he had ever handled any money for the Mexican government.

The investigating committee, Senators Reed, republican of Pennsylvania; Johnson, republican, California; Jones, republican, Washington; Bruce, democrat, Maryland; and Robinson, democrat, Arkansas joined with each other in assuring their colleagues and the public they entertained no doubt of their innocence in the matter, and all expressed regret that their names had been made public.

Meanwhile the Mexican inquiry came before the senate when Senator Reed, republican of Pennsylvania, secured adoption of a resolution appropriating \$25,000 for the investigating committee.

All of the senators whose names appeared in the Mexican correspondence insisted that the committee should go to the bottom in its investigation concerning authenticity of the documents. After conclusion of the morning session, Senator Reed authorized issuance of a subpoena for John F. Maragon, former department of justice agent of New Orleans.

The choir numbers some of the best voices in the city, among them Mrs. H. V. House who, during the last year, has gained quite a niche in the hall of local musical fame. However, in addition to the choir, Charles Rousseau, noted baritone, will sing, making his last public appearance before leaving for California after being the guest of Mr. Reid since his recent concert at Randolph college.

### OKLAHOMA'S COURT HOLDS MEET ILLEGAL

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 15.—The supreme court of Oklahoma today denied a rehearing in the case brought by four Oklahoma legislators who led the secret session which Tuesday impeached Governor Henry S. Johnston and two other state officials. The court affirmed the decision that the amendment under which the legislature impeached Governor Johnston was unconstitutional.

Dr. A. R. Lewis of Oklahoma City, who invaded the senate court of impeachment wearing his hat, was fined \$100 for direct contempt this afternoon, paying the way for a new court to test the legality of the legislators' special session. Lewis, it is understood, will bring habeas corpus proceedings at once. Lewis placed himself in contempt of the legislature on request of Representative Fiddler of Oklahoma City. President Pro Tem Mae Q. Williamson today was elected presiding officer of the impeachment court after all the justices of the state supreme court had decided to decline, citing their opinion that the legislature is not in legal session.

### Administration Wins In Senate

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—With the insurgents all voting the straight party ballot, the republicans today completed organization of the senate by electing all the administration candidates. Senator George Moses of New Hampshire was elected president pro tem. The vote was on party lines, with several democrats stepping out of the chamber to support absent republicans. Col. Edward A. Haley of Virginia by a vote of 43 to 41.

David S. Barry of Rhode Island was re-elected sergeant-at-arms over Joe L. Dohell of Montana by a vote of 42 to 40. Barry was attacked as "detrimental to his duties" by Senator Reed, democrat of Missouri, but the democrats did not muster enough votes to oust him.

### CREAM SEPARATOR KIDS PETROLEUM WATER

PAULS VALLEY, Okla., Dec. 15.—Machines which separate cream from milk on farms remove water from petroleum in the oil fields near here.

Oil operators were perplexed with the problem of extracting water from petroleum until a former dairyman suggested the use of a cream separator. One company bought a separator and followed the dairyman's suggestion. The farm machine was a success in the oil business after it had been adjusted, and the company bought more separators. Now hundreds are being used, but oil men call them "purifiers," leaving the word "separator" for use on the farm. "Purifiers" are attached to the flow from the oil well. They are operated by electricity. They carry the water into a reservoir and take the oil into storage tanks.

### ROTARIAN DAY OBSERVED BY MEMBERS HERE

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 15.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, like Alexander the Great, today was looking for new worlds to conquer, after his non-stop flight from Washington Wednesday. The intrepid aviator today announced he intended next to fly from Mexico to Central America and possibly South America before returning to Washington. All five governments of Central America telegraphed Lindbergh official invitations today, and he was to let them know later when he would accept. The Mexican house of deputies today invited Col. Lindbergh to speak in the chamber, reading the message he is said to have brought from the American government.

### BANK ROBBERY HUNT LACKING DEVELOPMENTS

DETROIT, Dec. 15.—There is considerable police speculation as to why Detroiters are arming themselves with saved-off shotguns, large caliber pistols and other weapons. Police headquarters learned of the large number of firearms in the possession of reputable citizens when they checked over the registration of weapons required under a new state law.

Their first hint that Detroit is well armed came when the 10,000 registration blanks ordered printed to meet the law's requirements were exhausted the first day. Proponents of the law, which is aimed at disarming the criminal, had given statistics to show that only about 6 per cent of law-abiding citizens possessed arms, whereas thugs were 100 per cent armed.

With exhaustion of the first 10,000 blanks the police ordered 10,000 more printed, and these in turn were used between the rise and fall of a single sun. The surprised authorities then ordered 100,000 more blanks, but registration has continued briskly for several weeks. Already 43,000 citizens have received gun permits in Detroit proper, with no figures available from suburbs.

Police said the registration revealed that a large percentage of citizens possess arms. The most commonly used protective weapons listed are saved-off shotguns and large caliber pistols.

### NEW LOW PRICES IN GAS PRICE WAR IN KANSAS CITY

WICHITA, Kan., Dec. 15.—Prospects of a price battle that will send gasoline prices in Wichita to new low levels gladdens motorists here today. Considerable speculation arose when the Standard, Sinclair, Skelly, Marland and other large distributors cut the retail price to 10.8c per gallon and met the competition of small operators who cut their prices last week.

### CAPTURE DOG MOTHER WITH HALF-WOLF BLOOD

BRAINERD, Minn., Dec. 15.—The days of the Klondike, when native dogs were crossed by a strain of Wolf blood, seem to have been duplicated in Crow Wing county when Frank Peterson, examined his trap line and came upon a den in which a Shepherd dog was sucking a litter of halfbreed wolves.

## Nun and Children Perish in Flames As Orphan's Home Burns; Ruins May Yet Contain Many Bodies

QUEBEC, Canada, Dec. 15.—Twenty-six children and one nun are known to have perished and 33 other children are missing as the result of fire in the St. John's Children's Home here early today. The bodies of the nun and 25 children were recovered and the other 33 are missing. The floors of the building collapsed and the trapped victims fell into the ruins. Firemen were unable to enter the smoldering ruins this morning to recover the remaining bodies. Under direction of the nuns who remained calm in the emergency, many of the children marched out of the building in an orderly manner. Others were carried from the building. The fire started in the basement, gained headway on the second floor, and unobscured through the building.

## ODD RABBIT DISEASE IS DEATH CAUSE

DAYTON, O., Dec. 15.—Interest of the medical profession here is being directed to the strange and baffling disease known as "Rabbit Disease" (Tularaemia) which has claimed Fenton Williams as a victim.

The city health authorities report that they have record of two previous deaths caused by the same disease, and are taking immediate steps to find out how Williams acquired the disease. Samples of his blood have been obtained and are being sent to the government laboratories in Washington, D. C., for analysis.

Dr. A. O. Peters, city health officer said the illness cannot spread from man to man, but it can be acquired through the skin by handling of infected rabbits or squirrels or by the bite of a tick which has been on rodents which have tularaemia.

The fact that Williams died of "rabbit disease" was confirmed by Dr. Walter Simpson, pathologist at Miami Valley hospital, after physicians had sought in vain to determine the exact cause of death.

The disease was discovered in 1911 by McCoy and Chapin and is described as a plague like disease in various rodents. It is generally believed that it may be acquired by man in three ways. First, through the bite of a horsefly. Second, by the bite of a tick which has fed on infected rabbits or squirrels. Third, by contamination of hands or contact with internal organs and body fluids of infected rabbits.

There have been cases reported to date in the last 16 years in 22 states and the District of Columbia. Experiments with the disease germs are dangerous, at best, and no less than 18 laboratory experts have lost their lives while so engaged, it is said.

However, it is not always fatal, and to date the only treatment for it is absolute rest. The only way in which it could be avoided would be by not handling rabbits, doctors say. It is believed the germ causing the malady was likely brought in with some imported rabbits as experts believe that no rabbits in this vicinity have it.

## WEATHER DUE TO MODERATE ON FRIDAY

FORT WORTH, Dec. 15.—Slight moderation in temperature was indicated by the weather report issued today. West Texas: Fair, colder; cold wave in south portion this afternoon and tonight, with temperatures between 25 and 30; Friday fair and slowly rising temperatures in the north portion.

## 29 DEGREES HERE IS REGISTERED TODAY

The temperature in Cisco Thursday morning hovered around the 29-degree mark at daylight, according to the Cisco Daily News thermometer. A raw wind accompanied the cold wave, making overcast a necessity. Later in the day the skies were overcast with clouds.

## CHINA ORDERS ENVOY TO NEGOTIATE TRADE TREATY WITH SERBIA

PEKING, Dec. 15.—The Chinese Foreign office has instructed its minister in Paris to open negotiations with the Serbian minister for the drafting of a Sino-Serbian commercial treaty. It was announced here that the initial advances were made by Serbia through their diplomatic representative in the French capital, offering to conduct negotiations through him or else to send a mission to Peking, just as the Chinese government wished.

For various reasons this simple process of drafting new treaties with China is a long drawn-out affair. The government of Czechoslovakia has had its delegate in the Chinese capital for several years and still no treaty has been signed.

One of the stumbling points is the reluctance of either side to commit themselves at this moment when China is waging a fight against the so-called unequal treaties with the powerful foreign nations.

## VETERAN DISTANCE RUNNER, 48, IS DEAD

BOSTON, Dec. 15.—William Prouty, veteran distance runner, died suddenly at his home here. He was in his forty-eighth year but still was in training and had planned to take part in a cross-country race of 3,100 miles from Los Angeles to New York next spring. He took up running in 1906, finishing ninth that year in the Boston marathon. The next year he finished in sixteenth place. Turning professional then, he took part in a number of six-day races in Cleveland, Detroit and New York. His best distance in a race of that kind was 56 miles. Last summer he ran 70 miles on a quarter-mile track in the world's record time of 41 hours, 17 minutes, 32 seconds. He was a grandfather.

"PITTSBURGH PLUS"

Three years ago the Federal Trade Commission attacked the "Pittsburgh plus" system by which steel prices were gauged by distance from Pittsburgh rather than basic cost. Even when a steel company had a plant near place of purchase, and supplied the purchaser from that plant, it was the universal practice to add to the basic price the freight charges on such a consignment all the way from Pittsburgh. The United States Steel Corporation soon acquiesced in the commission's point of view and started adjusting prices for its products on the basis of freight charges from the factory nearest the consumer. The independents stood pat on the old custom. Now it is announced that the Bethlehem Steel company has followed suit. The rest of the independents will probably be obliged, in self-defense if for no other reason, to do likewise before long. This is a matter of justice to the various sections of the country on the part of a vital industry. It is also one way of granting farm relief. The "Pittsburgh plus" system is said to have cost the farmers of eleven middle-western states \$30,000,000 a year in freight charges that they should not have had to pay. They will no longer be penalized for their location. The new arrangement, too, should result in a wider distribution of the steel industry.

TO MAKE LAWS WORK

A principle can't be turned loose in a heedless world and expected to accomplish great things unaided. It has to be applied by one or more persons before it can even begin to get anywhere in proving itself sound and practicable. Thus, the manager plan of municipal government and civil service examinations to test fitness of public employes cannot bring in any political millennium without a little cooperation on the part of public and officials. An investigation recently made in Cleveland reveals many flaws in the working of civil service which make that system just about as bad as the old spoils system. It is worse, some critics say, because it pretends to honesty and efficiency where the spoils system pretended to be nothing but politics. Temporary appointees are put on pay rolls and allowed to remain indefinitely without ever taking any examination, it is asserted. Necessary examinations are not held. Other charter requirements are ignored. Americans have a child-like faith in words and forms. They expect laws to work of themselves and good ideas of government to become effective simply upon their formulation in laws or charters or ordinances. But there isn't any magic, black or white, that can make them effective. Informed, interested and determined citizens must recognize and accept that task themselves.

POISON GAS ON THE STREET

The health commissioner of New York City has been studying pollution of the air by motor cars. He finds more carbon monoxide gas in the free air of the streets than inside the motor buses. This is reassuring to bus riders and not so good for motorists and pedestrians. The latter have become accustomed to associating monoxide poisoning only with motors running in closed garages and gas stoves burning without flues. "Carbon monoxide in the air," he says, "is capable of affecting more or less seriously the health of persons who inhale such air. It may produce dizziness, headache, sense of weakness and nausea; and if people are exposed to it for any length of time, these symptoms may be accompanied by pronounced pallor." The peril in the garage is worse in winter than summer, because of doors closed against the outer cold. On the street it is worse in summer than winter, because there are more automobiles in use and the warm air carries off the fumes less effectively than the winter winds. This outdoor menace, however, is a growing one, which will soon have to be taken seriously. When streets are jammed with motor cars at the rush hour, or rural highways are crowded on a bright Sunday afternoon in summer, many suffer without knowing why. Traffic policemen suffer from the fumes they are forced to breathe at their posts of duty. And always the evil grows. Possibly some way can be found to make an engine consume its own gas.

PATRIOTISM HURTS BUSINESS

Mayor Thompson's anti-British war seems to be hurting Chicago more than it hurts King George. A

Chicago attorney, counsel for the exporters, tells the local city club that already Chicago has lost orders for \$1,500,000 worth of goods which would otherwise have been bought there. The orders consisted largely of radio equipment for Australia. The Australians and New Zealanders say they will not patronize a city that is so hostile to Great Britain. This feeling is said to be spreading throughout the British Empire. It is a natural result of the attitude to Chicago as a result of the mayor's superpatriotic zeal. Many Chicagoans doubtless consider the game worth what it costs. And so it would be, if there were any sense or sanity in it. No good American wants to reckon patriotism in terms of business profit. Business was sacrificed throughout the American colonies during the Revolution, and will be sacrificed again cheerfully enough by scores of millions, whenever good cause shall appear. But to most Americans, and possibly to the more calm and intelligent people of Chicago, it looks very much as if "Big Bill" Thompson is fighting windmills and making his city ridiculous in the eyes of the world. In that fact lies Chicago's most serious loss.

No wonder Prof. Meiklejohn of the University of Wisconsin is ranked among the "dangerous radicals." He thinks morons can be educated.

OUT OF THE GLOOM

According to Ray Standard Baker, Mrs. Woodrow Wilson once wrote a friend: "I have learned one thing. You try and try with all the strength that is in you to help a person, and you can't. Suddenly you find that you can help in your weakness as you can't in your strength. Woodrow had been so far from well, so discouraged and dependent. I had tried and tried to give no sign of weakness to be strong and help him. I seemed to have lost all the power. Then I was all weakness and that helped him as nothing else could have done. He has been wonderful. He has dropped everything and bent every energy to help me. And it has brought him up out of his own gloom. He seems really to have improved physically."

One of the best things that can happen to a person is for him to be obliged to get out of himself, to be obliged not to think about himself, to be prevented from analyzing his own feelings, physical and mental, and to have to think of what concerns others—the welfare of his employes, what is best for his wife and his children and his folks, what is good for his friends and his neighbors and the world. Children brought up to think about themselves are most unfortunate children. The unhappiest children are those who are accustomed to being amused and catered to. You have noticed such children. They snarl and whine and squall much of the time. The happiest child is the child taught to think of others and to do things for others and to forget about himself.

"You never are sad," one man said to another. "I don't have time to be sad," was the reply. "I am so busy looking after my home and my children and my husband that I never think about being sad."

"I would have been dead long ago," remarked one frail man "had I had time to sit down and think about my ailments, but I have been so busy. I have had so much to do, that I haven't had time to be ill, much less die."

"I was dying with yellow fever," said a physician, speaking of the epidemic of 1888. "I had had the black vomit which is the last stage; then my wife who was nursing me came down with the disease; I had to crawl out of bed to do something for her, and I forgot all about myself and got well."

The folks who think too much about themselves, the folks who are self-centered, are the most miserable. They grow to be unhealthy in mind and body. The human consciousness is a queer thing. It will feed on itself and eat itself up if it is not watched.

REMUS FAILS TO OUST JUROR IN HIS CASE

CINCINNATI, Dec. 15.—The Remus defense today moved to remove John Trautman, one of the jurors, alleging he would be biased if certain evidence were admitted. This came after three attorneys appointed to observe Remus had submitted an opinion to the court that Remus was sane October 6 last when he shot and killed his wife. Judge Chester Shoak ruled that Trautman could remain on the jury.

Trautman sent for Judge Shoak, after court adjourned yesterday and declared before the court had opportunity to warn him that he would not believe Charles W. Hoffman under oath. Judge Hoffman is a prominent Cincinnati jurist. He was to have presided in the Remus divorce case.

## NABORS BUILDS LAKE FOR IRRIGATION OF FARM

### Diversification Is Keynote On Place Being Developed by Cisco Man Who Farms for His Health

A. S. Nabors, who has turned to farming to regain his health, is a strong believer in irrigation. Mr. Nabors' farm is located 3 miles south of Cisco on the Rising Star highway. He has partly completed a small lake that will serve to irrigate about seven acres of land just below the lake, and to which the water will flow by gravity.

Mr. Nabors is planning to grow fruit and truck crops on most of the irrigated land. He has at the present time several varieties of berry vines bedded out, ready to be set out as soon as the soil is prepared. An orchard will be set out. Already about 300 native pecan trees are growing on the place. These will be thinned to a proper stand and top-worked to improve the varieties of pecans.

"I'll show you what purebred sires mean," Mr. Nabors said. He conducted the writer to his hog lot where two litters of pigs were being fed in the same pen. Half of these would weigh 10 pounds while the others were twice as large. The larger pigs were one week younger than the smaller ones, and the two litters have been fed alike. "These pigs were sired by a purebred male," Mr. Nabors said, pointing to the larger ones. There was really a very noticeable difference in the size of the two litters of pigs and will probably mean the difference between profit and loss to the grower.

"Here is my garage, built at a cost of \$18," was Mr. Nabors' next remark. The garage is built of native rock, of which there is an

abundance on the Nabors farm. Sand and gravel suitable for building purposes are also found there. Mr. Nabors plans to build his home largely of these materials.

In addition to the truck and orchard crops, a well rounded program of livestock farming will be carried on, this to include hogs, a few dairy and beef cattle, milking goats and some poultry. In this manner, Mr. Nabors plans to have something to sell at all times during the year.

### STOCK LAW FIGHT LOOMS AT EASTLAND

EASTLAND, Dec. 12.—The first action that stock owners have taken against the city commission took place Saturday afternoon when C. M. Pipkin, acting on behalf of the stock owners, circulated a petition in the business district of Eastland, asking that the city commission repeal the recently passed stock ordinance.

The ordinance which was recently approved by the commission makes it illegal for persons to have cows and horses within the city limits of Eastland, unless they are removed 200 feet from the nearest residence. City Manager Chestnut has announced that enforcement of the ordinance will start January 1 and that the fine for each violation is not over \$25 and that each day constitutes a separate offense.

There has been quite a bit of feeling worked up over the passing of the ordinance, especially so with those who are keeping stock within the city limits and whose lots do not conform with the 200-foot requirements. Although there has been some talk of passing a petition among the citizens of Eastland, the action Saturday was the first move that the leaders of the stock owners have made in an attempt to get the ordinance repealed. It has also been indicated that the stock owners will employ counsel if necessary in order to get the ordinance declared null and void.

### NEGRO TELLS OF ROBBERY OF MAN HERE

Confession that he was present and saw all details in the holdup and robbery of R. L. Bailey of DeLeon near the Cisco union railroad station Sunday night was made Monday afternoon by Douglas Smith, one of three negroes arrested in the case. Smith had been charged with taking part in the robbery but on the basis of his story, charges against him were dismissed and he was placed under \$500 bond to appear before the grand jury. The other two, Oscar Roggenore and Jimmie Lou Boyd, negroes, were refused bond and placed in jail at Eastland after a hearing before Justice of the Peace J. H. McDonald, attended by Assistant Attorney Sterling Holloway.

According to Smith's story, Roggenore and the negroes were together. He saw Bailey talking to Roggenore and Roggenore grabbed the white man's pocket-book, and ran. Bailey ran after the negro and caught him. The negro then joined in the scuffle. Smith said he left the vicinity and did not see the remainder of the struggle, in which Bailey came near losing his thumb when the negroes bit him.

### COLDEST PLACE IN WORLD 60 DEGREES BELOW

LONDON, Dec. 13.—Believed to be the coldest place in the world, an hitherto unknown big mountain range has been discovered in Northeast Siberia.

The discovery is made public by the explorer, Serge Obruchev, a member of the Russian Geological Survey, in the current "Geographical Journal."

The expedition discovered nine chains of mountains the existence of which was unsuspected. New maps of the world will have to take note of this great range, which is certainly over 600 and may be 1,000 miles long, and nearly 200 miles wide and covers an area greater than the chain of the Caucasus.

These snow-capped mountains reach a height of more than 10,000 feet, and are probably the last on the globe that remained to be discovered. They have been named the Cherski range in honor of the great Russian geologist who died in 1892 while attempting to explore this region.

In this wild country, which took nearly five months to traverse, the expedition came across a tribe of hunters, the Tungus, the remnants of the race. There were no more than about one for every 100 square miles. They also explored the head waters of the Indigirka, a river more than 1,000 miles long which flows into the Arctic Sea.

In November the temperature fell as low as 60 degrees Centigrade below zero.

### All Entering Mexico To Be Vaccinated

LAREDO, Dec. 13.—All persons entering Mexico must have either a certificate of vaccination or be vaccinated before crossing the border, according to Mexican immigration authorities here. This ruling was a part of the general health orders to be enforced by Mexico at all border ports of entry. A health officer has been stationed at each port to enforce the new regulations.

### IS TOWN'S BEST BRICK MASON AT AGE OF 81

RUSHVILLE, Ill., Dec. 13.—All unmindful of the displeasure he is causing the gentleman with the hour glass and scythe, Robert Rippe, a Civil War war veteran and veteran bricklayer as well, celebrated his 81st birthday by starting work with the rest of the boys on the addition being built to the Presbyterian church here. Sixty years of experience has given him unerring skill as a brick mason.

"I am not happy unless I keep at my work," he said. "Moreover, it doesn't look as though I could retire if I wished. There doesn't seem to be any young brick masons taking up the trade here, and the job must be done," he philosophized.

Six months after taking up brick laying, he responded to President Lincoln's call for volunteers and served with Troop B, 7th Missouri cavalry, for four years and 28 days. On his return he resumed his trade and is still at it. There were only two brick buildings in Rushville then and he claims to have worked on virtually all that have since been constructed. Rippe keeps a record of his daily work and is often called on to verify construction dates.

### NEW COMET TO LIGHT WORLD ON CHRISTMAS

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 12.—The brightest comet visible in the Northern Hemisphere in the past 15 years will appear in the early evening western sky during Christmas week, Dr. Harlow Shapley, director of the Harvard observatory, announced today. Clearly visible to the naked eye, the comet on Christmas day will be about 45 degrees between the sun and the North Pole.

It is Skjellerup's Comet, discovery of which at Melbourne, Australia, by F. J. Skjellerup, an amateur astronomer who formerly lived in South America, was made known December 4. It then was reported of third magnitude, but the observatory at La Plata, Argentina, two days later sent word of an observation of what was supposed to be the same comet and described it as of the second magnitude.

Today Dr. Shapley received word from the astronomical clearing house at Copenhagen that H. E. Wood, a South African astronomer, had computed the comet's orbit. This indicates that the comet, now in the constellation Scorpio, and south of the sun, is moving rapidly northward and will be in conjunction with the sun on December 15. It has very high inclination of 72 degrees.

At Berkeley, Cal., Miss Prescott and another astronomer have worked out further details of the comet's progress. After December 18 it should be easily visible to the naked eye just after sunset, in a position just north of the sun. Its northward speed is three or four degrees a day.

One of the famous passages from the reader is "if at first you don't succeed, try, try again." McGuffey societies, composed of men and women of the "old school" have been organized in all parts of the country, using that well-known saying as their motto.

### Motorists' Injury Insurance Higher

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Automobile owners, beginning tomorrow, will have to pay an increase of approximately 16 per cent for personal injury insurance, the National Bureau of Casualty and Safety Underwriters announced. The increase, it was explained, was caused by increasing frequency of claims, increasing power and speeding automobiles, a tendency of injured persons to claim and of juries to grant larger amounts of damages, and the increasing mileage of improved roads which has brought greater use of automobiles.

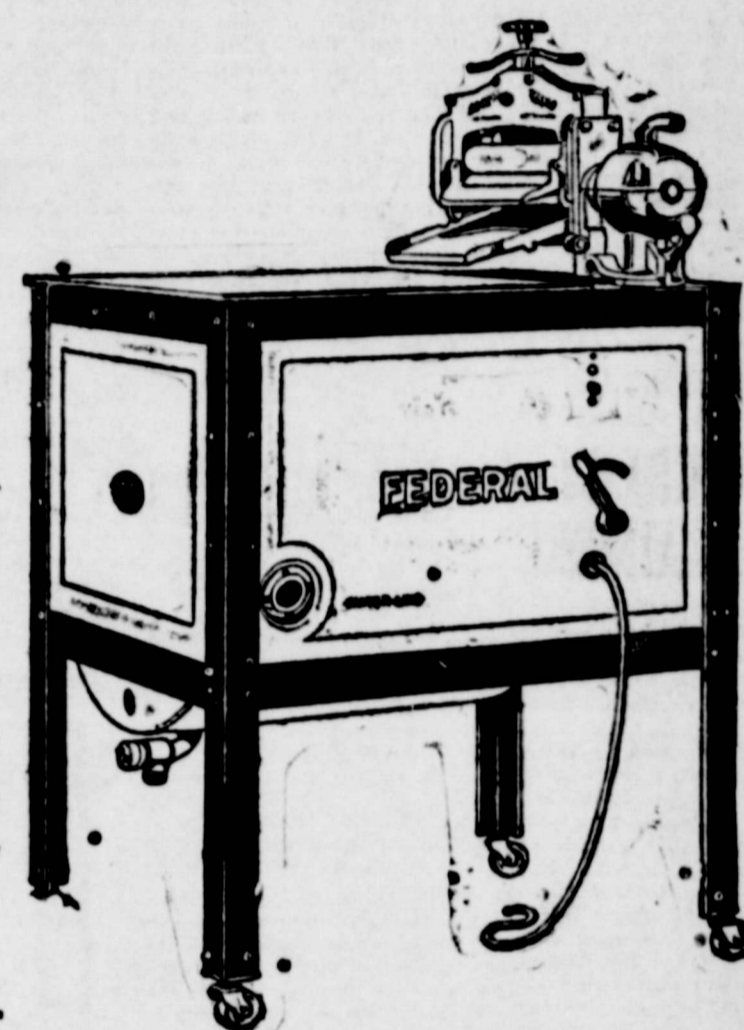

COTTON BAGS URGED TO AID STAPLE PRICE

STAMFORD, Dec. 14. — For seeing that an unjust burden will be imposed on West Texas cotton farmers with passage of the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill or passage of a similar bill by the 70th congress, R. M. Whitaker, exhibit-agricultural manager of the West Texas chamber of commerce, is advocating a plan to protect West Texas cotton interests.

The plan outlined would prove not only a safeguard for the territory which Whitaker represents, but would be a boon to the cotton industry, and to the producers of the entire state and nation as well, and involves passage of a law requiring increased consumption which would stabilize the American cotton market permanently.

Whitaker's plan is that congress pass an act requiring all gins to use cotton bagging. This would create a new and permanent demand for from 350,000 to 500,000 bales of cotton of that low grade that depresses the market most when a large carry-over is necessary, the West Texas official points out.

Figures show that the American cotton farmers have spent within the last three years some \$75,000,000 for a foreign grown commodity in which to wrap their cotton crop, while at the same time, the cheap grades of American cotton suitable for this use were dragging down the market for want of demand.

Besides stimulating a new demand for more cotton, the plan Whitaker advances would give added impetus to American cotton mills, and supply increased labor demands, it is said. And in addition to this, the required use of cotton bagging would give the producer more money, and would increase the price of cotton from \$10 to \$20 a bale.

### MUCH ROAD WORK STARTS JANUARY 1

AUSTIN, Dec. 14.—New road work in Texas will get under way at the beginning of the year with the letting of contracts by the highway commission Jan. 16 for road construction in eight counties. Several of the contracts will call for hard surfacing of roads while others will call for preparation of basis for surfacing to be done later. The work will involve the expenditure of more than half a million dollars.

Contracts to be awarded are:

Cottle county—Grading and drainage structures on 12 miles of highway 28 from the Motley county line to Paducah.

Webb county—Concrete paving on 17 miles of highway 12A from a point 11 miles east of Laredo, east.

Gonzales county—Surfacing on 5.1 miles of highway 81.

Wharton county—Grading and drainage structures on 2.1 miles of highway 12 from Wharton to Hungerford. Also grading and drainage work on 4 miles of highway 12 from Hungerford to the Fort Bend county line.

Austin county—Concrete paving on 9 miles of highway 36 from the Fort Bend county line north-west.

### YATES POOL TO SHUT DOWN ON JANUARY 1

FORT WORTH, Dec. 14.—Oil wells in the Yates pool in Pecos county, with a daily potential production of 24 hours of 600,000 barrels and pipe line facilities for about 47,000 barrels daily, are to be pinched in on present basis until January 1, at which time allocation of pipe line facilities on a proportionate share of the proven acreage is to be made, representatives of producers in that field agreed here Monday.

This decision is subject to ratification by producers before January 1.

Allocation of a proportionate share of the daily pipe line capacity to each producer is expected to enable all to pinch in their wells to the market capacity, leaving surplus oil in the pool and removing the necessity of bottling storage for the excess above what can be moved to market.

Attempts were to be made Tuesday to work out plans for restricting the flow of oil from University owned lands in Reagan, Crane and other counties at a meeting here of representatives of those counties and J. T. Robinson, Texas land commissioner.

The new plan is to continue until June 30, 1928.

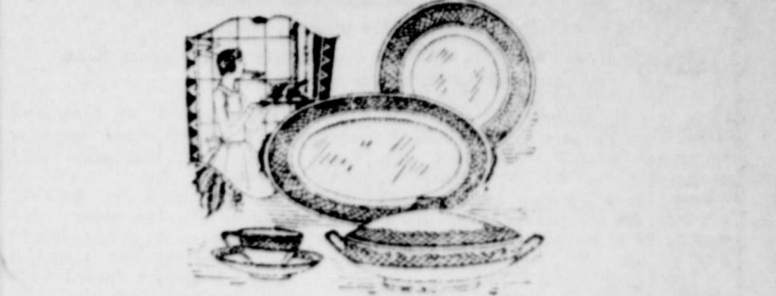

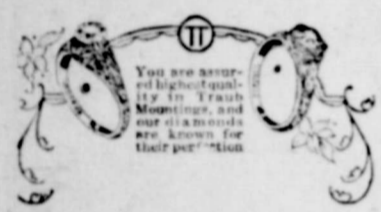

# Pass Case Developments Await Blood Test

## NOTE WARNED NIMROD MAN OF HIS PERIL

"Well, Pass, it is moving time for you. The sooner the better, for you have put the law on us and we aim to get you." This note, written in pencil on a sheet of tabular paper at the bottom of which was a curved line representing a rope and blood splashes on a road near Reich school house furnish the only clues as to the fate of Ellis Pass, young Nimrod farmer, who disappeared last Friday afternoon while on his way to Cisco, Pass took his wife to the home of a neighbor, Mr. Abbott, telling her he would come back by the school for the children before taking her home. He then left in a Ford car for Cisco, saying he wanted to see Will Reagan about leasing some land, and that was the last time he has been seen.

When the farmer failed to return to his home Friday night, a general alarm was sounded and Ciscoans joined neighbors from Seranton and Nimrod in hunting for Mr. Pass. Much of the night and Saturday was spent in the search and on Sunday, the fire whistle in Cisco was blown and about 100 volunteers were taken to the country between Cisco and Nimrod to search for the missing man. One pool of blood in the road near Reich school was found, with a second inside a field and a third farther in the field and around a hill. Samples of the blood were sent to a Fort Worth chemist for analysis to determine whether it was human blood, but it will be two weeks before his report can be secured.

Meanwhile, the posse searched the Fry farm where an automobile thought to have been Pass' was seen. Instead of finding the car, a moonshine still was located and destroyed. Pass had given county officers information regarding a suspicious group of men he had seen in a pasture near his home, and it was believed they were operating a still. The captured plant appeared to have been moved there from some other location and was being prepared for firing up when the posse came upon two men who ran away. Some officers have expressed the belief that moonshiners, angered because Pass had reported their activities, killed him and concealed his body in the rugged country between Cisco and Nimrod. Diligent search, however, has failed to reveal his body.

A court of inquiry was held by Justice of the Peace J. H. McDonald at Nimrod Sunday morning, seeking to find out the truth in regard to a statement said to have been made by a young lady friend of the Pass family, in which it was declared: "Ellis had better keep his nose out of that still or he will get his head full of lead." No information of value was obtained, however.

Developments in the case now await the analysis of the blood sent to Fort Worth. Should it prove to be human blood, then it is likely that a new search of the adjacent area will be made in an effort to find the remains.

## TREE FAMOUS IN HISTORY OF TEXAS DYING

LAGRANGE, Texas, Dec. 12.—A Texas landmark is fast dying here despite efforts to preserve it. It is the large liveoak tree on the northwest corner of the Lagrange square where Dawson's men were enrolled for the ill-fated Mier expedition into Mexico.

Captured there, the invaders were forced to draw beans for their lives. Those getting the black beans were executed. The tree has been treated by tree doctors. Much of the trunk has been filled with concrete. Ordinarily it had a spread of more than 100 feet. Now but a few short branches remain.

On the Colorado river bluff overlooking the city, the bones of the men killed in the expedition have been buried together in a large vault, having been brought back for that purpose.

## MAN ROBBED AND BOUND ON STAR HIGHWAY

A transient giving his name as Marion West paid dearly for a lift given him by three men in an automobile Tuesday afternoon when they attacked, gagged and robbed him and left him in the brush alongside of the Cisco-Rising Star road. They relieved him of \$20, a watch and a ring, he told officers at Rising Star after he regained consciousness. He was left lying in the road at 5 o'clock Tuesday afternoon but it was 5 o'clock before he could roll his way into the road and attract attention of passing motorists who picked him up and took him to Rising Star in an unconscious condition.

According to his story told officers at Rising Star, the man was making his way through the country and was offered a ride about five miles south of Cisco. When within two miles of Rising Star the men attacked him, took his money and valuables, and throw him into the brush. They sped on and since two hours elapsed before his plight was discovered, the bandits had ample time to escape detection.

## Brother of Cisco Constable Killed

Constable C. S. Looney Tuesday received word from Sacramento, Calif., that his brother, Clint Looney, former resident of Eastland county, had died there following injuries in a recent automobile accident. Mr. Looney was injured when his automobile was driven home over an embankment, killing a companion and badly injuring him.

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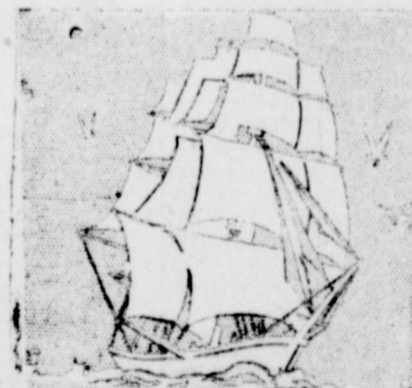
