Helms Surrendered Quietly, But Hill Ran and Started to Draw Pistol as Officers Closed In

One week to the day after four bandits held up and robbed the First National Bank of Cisco and then shot their way to libertyleaving eight Ciscoans and one of their own number lying wounded, one fatally—the last two of the quartet were captured early Friday morning and placed in jail to await, with the third living member of the party, the demands of justice.

The two remaining bandits were caught at Graham at 8 o'clock Friday morning after four shots had been fired by members of the posse. They were expected to be brought back to Eastland some time during Friday, Sheriff John S. Hart and Deputy Payne having gone to Graham for that purpose.

The two bandits were Henry Helms and a man known to his confederates as Robert Hill, although he gave his name as Bobby

Those in the party who captured the two bandits Friday were Elmer H. Little, deputy sheriff of Comanche county; E. Gentry Williamson, deputy sheriff of Young county; J. W. Davis, city marhal at Graham, and Walter Sikes of Amarillo, son-in-law of Mayor J. M. Williamson of Cisco. W. M. 
