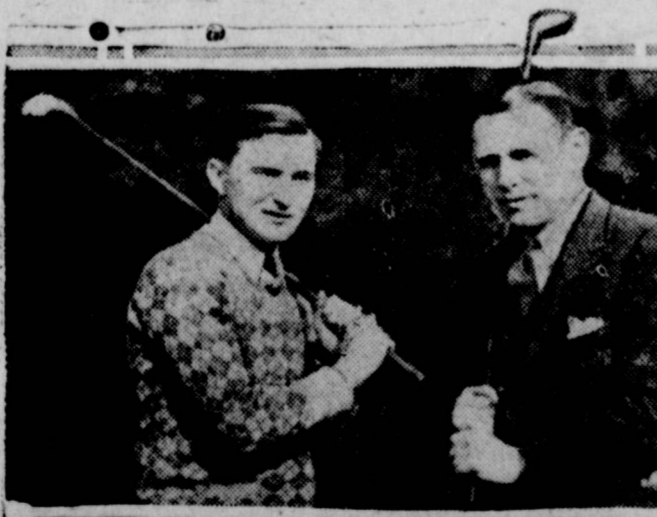

Stephens County Injunction Case Transferred to Eastland County; Judge Hamlin Disqualifies Self

BRECKENRIDGE, Feb. 15.—Hearing on the application of 13 oil companies owning property in Stephens county to make permanent temporary injunctions restraining Stephens county from collection from these companies taxes aggregating 75 cents on the \$100 valuation and appropriated among three series of bonds issued by Stephens county for the construction of roads and a court house and jail, due to come up sometime district court at Eastland, Judge C. DISCOVERY OF OIL REJOICES VALERA FOLKS

COLEMAN, Feb. 15.—The magic effect of oil spread over the little village of Valera in western Coleman county last week as Roth & Faurot drilled into a sand in the No. 2 Sealy & Smith which had long been thought capable of only gas.

Land owners gathering at the well went up a shout of rejoicing as the well flowed nearly over the top of theerrick as the oil saver was opened to allow the tools to pass through the control head. After making two heads, the well settled down to a steady spraying putting more than 100 barrels daily into flow tanks although still daily partially drilled into the sand.

A feature of the territory just two miles north of Valera is the fact that it is highly wildcat area in respect to oil production for the Nos. 1 and 2 Sealy-Smith were thought to be gassers in every sense of the word, but now with the oil found when deepened oil men and land owners alike are more encouraged over the prospects for oil in large quantities. Still the region is only barely touched and when the No. 2 Sealy-Smith is completed Roth & Faurot will move to the No. 1 and deepen into sand there which is topped at 2,488 feet. Again further east the same company has made the location for the No. 3 Sealy & Smith 528 feet east and 200 feet south of the No. 1, preparing to thoroughly explore territory.

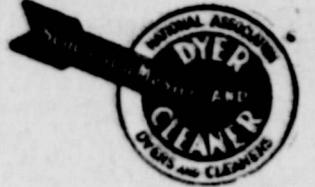
COUNTY CHAIRMAN OF STEPHENS COUNTY NAMED

ABBEY IN HONOR OF FAMED SONS OF SOUTHLAND

FLETCHER, N. C., Feb. 15.—Bronze tablets commemorating four famous Southerners will be unveiled in the ivy-covered, time-worn "Westminster Abbey of the South" this summer.

The so-called Southern Westminster Abbey is at the Calvary Episcopal Church near here. Rev. Clarence Stuart McClelland, Jr., descendant of Gen. George B. McClellan, Yankee soldier, is rector.

Great southerners from General Robert E. Lee to Edgar Allan Poe will be commemorated in the little chapel, according to Rev. McClelland, who conceived the idea of a shrine dedicated to the poets, artists, musicians and statesmen of the South.

To Unveil Tablets The forthcoming summer will see the unveiling of tablets to Zebulon Baird Vance, the famous North Carolina Governor and statesman; Francis Scott Key, the Maryland soldier who composed "The Star Spangled Banner" during the bombardment of Fort Mifflin; Sidney Lanier, the Georgia poet, and Francis Fisher Terman, woman novelist who wrote under the pseudonym of "Christian Reid."

The Vance tablet is the gift of the Jewish people of Asheville, N. C., while Herbert L. Satterlee, of New York, is the donor of the tablet to Francis Scott Key. The people of Macon, Ga., Lanier's birthplace, have donated the tablet that will be erected to him. Arthur Griffing, of Asheville, N. C., gave the tablet to the North Carolina novelist, Christian Reid.

To Set Dates The exact dates for the unveilings have not been decided upon, but Rev. McClelland said that the exercises would be held sometime during the summer months.

In 1929 memorials will be unveiled to Edgar Allan Poe, Henry "Barned" Francis O. Tignor, and Father Ryan. Other monuments of the future will be to Thomas Nelson Page, Joel Chandler Harris, John Esten Cook and others.

When Rev. McClelland came to the aristocratic old church here four years ago to become interested in southern history and the idea occurred to him that there were monuments enough to the South's war heroes, but that many of its statesmen, artists and musicians were unsung.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 15.—Dr. Charles A. McMillan, middle aged physician, went to trial here Tuesday, accused of the murder of Mrs. Amelia Appleby, whose body was found by the roadside near here Christmas day, lashed to a canvas bag.

At the close of the first day of the trial there were eight women and four men in the jury box. The state and defense passed the jury for cause. The state demanded the right to reopen the challenges.

Dr. McMillan sat throughout the day in a calm manner looking at times at his wife, Mrs. Catherine McMillan, who at the morning session appeared as a spectator in the court room.

A mild sensation was caused when one of the prospective women jurors, who was later excused for cause, admitted under questioning she had talked about the case to Mrs. Marie West, Sebring, Fla., a sister of Mrs. Appleby.

DEATH PROBE ON; DOWNING TRIAL START

ABILENE, Feb. 15.—State's testimony against Jim Downing, formerly an attendant in the Abilene State Hospital for Epileptics, on trial for murder in connection with the death of Joe Marze, aged patient at the hospital, consumed the Tuesday session of court.

The jury was completed late Monday after 44 members of a special venire of 100 men had been questioned. Counsel for both sides questioned talesmen in detail as to their opinions on circumstantial evidence.

Galaway Calhoun, Assistant Attorney General of Texas, detailed by request of the State Board of Control to join in prosecution of the case, arrived Monday night from Austin with Dr. H. H. Harrington, chairman of the board of control, who is a state witness.

Dr. T. B. Bass, who has been superintendent of the hospital for 25 years was the first witness. He testified as to findings in an autopsy of Marze's body, which he conducted with Dr. Gray Shytle and other physicians. Marze died, the witness said from hemorrhages in the abdominal cavity caused by external blows.

Three of Marze's ribs were broken and the abdominal cavity was filled with blood, he said.

On cross-examination, Dr. Bass said the patients at the institution frequently have epileptic fits, often faint among themselves and that some are vicious.

He said Marze came to the hospital in 1904 from an insane asylum.

Elmer Conway, Harvey Nations and William M. Gibson, all patients of the hospital were the other witnesses.

Conway said he saw the attendant, Downing, take Marze out of the dining room into another room, but that he was not in the room when Downing is alleged to have beaten Marze. On cross-examination he said he was in the room.

Gibson, who said in his younger life he was a preacher and a teacher, testified he roomed with Marze, and that he heard a commotion in the room where Marze was allegedly beaten. About 20 minutes later Marze came to their room saying to Gibson that he was hurt so badly he would not get over it, the witness said.

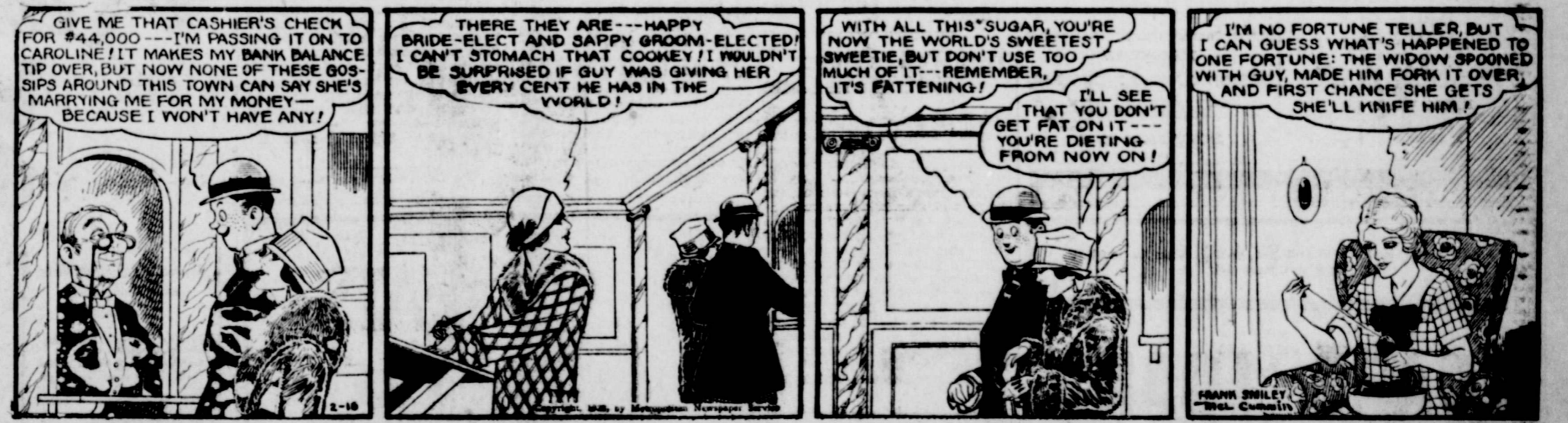
