JURORS AND EXPERTS

"I challenge anyone to sit down and work out a system better fitted for miscarriage of justice than our present one of trial by jury." So says Dr. Harry Elmer Barnes, professor of sociology at Smith College, making articulate what a good many other Americans may have thought but lacked the nerve to say. What substitute, then, shall there be for the jury? We cannot abolish such a fundamental institution without establishing another in its place. "An accused person," says Dr. Barnes, "should be brought before a board composed of physicians to determine his physical state, psychologists to gauge his mental capacity, psychiatrists to seek mental diseases, and social workers to learn the environments that have molded his development. If they find the accused is a menace to society, they should be able to confine him, even though it be proved he is innocent of the particular charge on which he was arrested." This would be submitting science for sympathy, scholarly judgment for popular will. It will hardly be welcomed in a country where the jury, as a symbol of democracy, is still a powerful fetich. Yet there has really been a beginning in that direction, in some of our recent murder cases. We may come to it in time.

A double tragedy was enacted in Cisco Sunday afternoon at 5 o'clock when Gordon H. Trees, formerly of Cisco, but living at Dallas at the time, together with his wife, Essie Trees, were shot to death in the woman's room at Mrs. Nora

Bishop's, 205 West Twelfth street. News of the tragedy reached the city hall when the police were called by Mrs. Bishop, who stated that she had just heard three shots fired in one of the front rooms at her house, but the door was locked from the inside and she could not ascertain the cause. Arriving at the house police forced the door and found Mrs. Essie Trees lying on the floor between the bed and wall, mortally wounded, and H. Gordon (Shorty) Trees, the woman's husband, lying partially on his wife's body and partially on the bed, dead. Both were clothed except Mrs. Trees had removed her shoes. The woman died about 30 minutes after the officers arrived. Dr. John H. Brice and Green's ambulance were summoned, and the bodies removed to the Green Undertaking Home where an examination was made of the wounds and the bodies prepared for burial. A .25 caliber Colts automatic pistol was found on the floor by the bed.

The woman was shot twice near the left ear, one bullet emerging just above the left eye, but the second bullet remained in her head. Trees was shot in the right temple, inflicting a long, ugly gash extend-

ng to just above his right eye. Mrs. Minnie B. Ground and husband, living at 1814 Ramsey street, Dallas, mother and stepfather of Gordon H. Trees, arrived early this morning and conveyed the body of their son to Dallas for burial. Mrs. Trees was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Free, living in the southern limits of Cisco, but funeral arrangements have not yet been announced, as the family is awaiting word from relatives living in Shawnee. Okla. In the meantime the remains of Mrs. Tree are being held at the chapel of the Green Funeral







The preacher used the custom of im-pression, practiced by Roman oldiers who compelled subjects long their way to assist them rom place to place, as the basis for the message, and said, "Even s there was no escape from imession in Roman days, so today mpression faces us all along life's If we resist we become as sulky slaves, but if we adopt the admonition of Jesus when he said. If a man impress you to go mile with him, go two,' we get above the drudgery of compulsion nto the realm of the volunteer."


