

OLD RED BARN IN YATES AREA BURNED DOWN

SAN ANGELO, Feb. 22.—The old red barn in the famous Yates oil field is no more. The landmark which Ira Yates used for years as a place for storing feed, became the first boarding house in that area when oil was found, and later was converted into a hotel. A town grew up around the old place, despite the fact that the old corral fence was left around the structure, and a post-office, Red Barn, was established. But the barn burned this week, fire breaking out and razing the structure within a short time. No one knows how it caught. No estimate of the damage has been made. The big box frame building, painted red as its name indicates, sat on a high hill overlooking the Pecos river, with oil wells in all directions. Oil did not necessarily make the red barn a well known landmark. For years ranchmen in that section talked of the red barn. Droughts came along and feed was stored in it to feed the cattle on the Yates ranch. It is about five miles from the site to the Yates ranch headquarters.

More Planes For Texas Pro Agents

FORT WORTH, Feb. 22.—At least two more airplanes are to be sent to Texas for prohibition enforcement work, it was learned in Washington Tuesday. AUSTIN, Feb. 22.—After a long period of service as a legislator, Lee Satterwhite, former speaker of the house, has announced that he will retire to private life. Satterwhite represented Potter county in the legislature. He has been prominently mentioned as a candidate for the governorship but has abandoned that idea, he said recently. Satterwhite has acquired a ranch near Odessa and will devote his interests to ranching and stock raising, it was stated.

Texas Has Tenth of All U. S. Cattle

AUSTIN, Feb. 22.—One-tenth of the cattle in the United States are in Texas, according to a census of the federal statistical bureau, which shows 5,007,000 cattle in Texas. Iowa is second with 3,720,000, and Wisconsin third with 2,960,000. Missouri is no longer the "mule state." Texas leads in mules with 1,000,000. Georgia and Oklahoma are followers with about 350,000 head each. Texas also leads in the number of sheep. It was third in horses, milk cows and swine.

RAILWAYS MAY NEED AIRWAYS TO HELP THEM

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 22.—The belief that railroads will be forced within the next decade to establish airway branches of their service in order to meet the public demand for more rapid transportation was expressed by Captain Eddie V. Rickenbacker, ace flier of the World War while in the Twin Cities.

Not only in mail and passenger transportation does Captain Rickenbacker expect tremendous advancement, but also in the field of light freight hauling. Because of the rapidity in air transportation merchants are reducing the size of their stocks and are ordering more frequent shipments by air freight, Rickenbacker said.

Railroad companies by constructing decks over their tracks in railroad yards would have excellent landing field opportunities, he pointed out.

"Airplanes as 'angels of peace' in bringing about an intimacy of contact between nations are one of the greatest agencies for preventing war we have ever known," Captain Rickenbacker declared.

Automobiles and the construction of super highways between adjacent countries offer another means of creating international road will, according to the war ace. With an increase of automobile traffic and a breaking down of international boundaries, he said, closer harmony between nations will result.

"Ondamoussa" is a fine all-wool crepe which was first seen in the late autumn but is really more suitable for spring. It comes in soft tones of cherry, beige, beaver, fawn and a new bright blue which will be particularly popular this season.

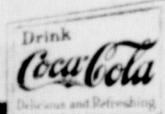
Another material which is having a second season is "georgeline," a fine woolen georgette. The spring range of colors in this varies little from the autumn ones. It has a delightful crispness.

AL SMITH MAY REMAIN AWAY FROM HOUSTON

ALBANY, Feb. 22.—Governor Al Smith's biggest trouble just now involves the question of whether he should attend the Democratic national convention next June in Houston. He wants to go, but feels that because he unquestionably will be one of the subjects of discussion it might be best for him to remain away. Smith hasn't missed a national convention in a long time. He derives great personal enjoyment out of them, regardless of political maneuvers. He likes to meet people, mix with them and talk with them, but he is afraid this year that he will not be able to do so. That is his chief regret, according to those who are closest to him. His second regret is that he will not be on the scene to direct personally the forces which may line up for his nomination for the presidency. Smith's friends and advisers are divided over the question of whether he should attend the convention, most of them urging him to remain away and at this time that is his own inclination. Smith feels there will be an added hardship for him in remaining away, too, for his daughter, Mrs. Emily Smith Warner, has been named by the Democratic organizations of the 28th congressional district as a delegate to the convention. He wanted to attend the affair with her.

TULSA, Okla., Feb. 22.—Daily average oil production in the Mid-Continent fields increased 7,522 barrels during the week ending February 18, the Oil and Gas Journal said today. Total daily production for the area for the week was 1,365,513 barrels, as against 1,357,991 barrels for the week ending February 11. The greatest gain was registered in the West Texas fields, where the daily production was hiked 10,799 barrels. The West Texas production for the week was 299,250 as against 288,451 for the previous week.

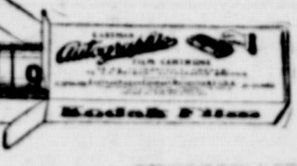

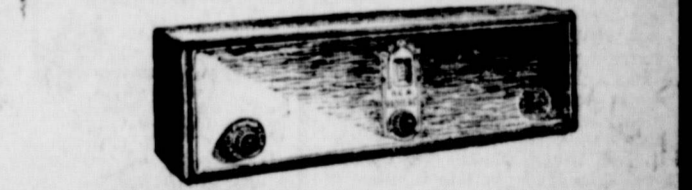
