## **OLD RED BARN IN YATES AREA BURNED DOWN**

BAN ANGELO, Feb. 22.- The old red barn in the famous Yates oil field is no more. The landmark which Ira Yates used for years as a place for storing feed. became the first boarding house in that area when oil was found, and later was converted into a hotel. A town grew up around the old place, despite the fact that the old carral fence was left around the structure, and a postoffice, Red Barn, was established. But the barn burned this week, fire breaking out and razing the structure within a short time. No one know how it caught. No estimate of the damage has been made. The big box frame building, painted red as its name indicates, sat on a high hill overlooking the Pecos river, with oil wells in all directions. Oil did not necessarily make the red barn a well known landmark. For years ranchmen in that section talked of the red barn.
