### MAYO CLINIC TO EXAMINE "FOX'S" BODY

LOS ANGELES, March 9.—Trial of William Edward Hickman and Wesley Hunt for the murder of Ivy Thoms, Los Angeles druggist, was expected to reach the jury last night.

State and defense were scheduled to make closing arguments. Both rested late Wednesday.

Announcement that Hickman's body would be given to scientists for examination was taken as an indication that the youthful defense attorneys had abandoned hope of saving the youthful slayer from the gallows. Hickman is sentenced to hang April 27 for the murder of Math Parker.

Attorneys announced that Hickman's body, if he hangs, will be sent to the Mayo Clinic at Rochester, Minn., where they said it was hoped examination would prove Hickman was insane.

- 1. Traveling expenses.
- 2. Ballot fees. (This item not included in the amount of money limited by law for campaign purposes).
- 3. Hire of clerks and stenographers and stenographic and clerical help.
- 4. Telephone, telegraph, postage, express and freight charges.
- 5. Printing and stationery.
- 6. Procuring and formulating a list of voters.
- 7. Headquarters or office rent.
- 8. Newspaper and other advertising and publicity.
- 9. Rental of place of public meeting and advertising same.

The total amount that may be expended by candidate and their managers are as follows: United States senator or governor, \$10,000. Officers chosen by voters of entire state and district members of congress, \$2,500. Members of the court of civil appeals, \$1,500. District attorney or district judge, \$500. State senator, \$1,000. Member house of representatives, \$300. County officers, \$500. Any other position chosen in primary election, \$100. Four-fifths of the sums stipulated may be expended preceding the first primary and remainder preceding second primary.

Each candidate required to keep an accurate record of all funds received and disbursed for campaign purposes, which record shall be preserved for a period of twelve months and shall be open to inspection of all opposing candidates and qualified voters.

The election laws are strict for the purpose of securing purity of the ballot box. A violation of some of the provisions of the election laws will cause a candidate to forfeit the right to have his name placed upon the official ballot in the primary or general election.

### Eastland Schools Will Get \$48,843.96

EASTLAND, March 9.—Eastland county common schools are to receive \$48,843.96 local tax collected and paid into the county school depository for January, according to an announcement made this morning by Miss Beulah Speer, Eastland county school superintendent. This money is available for any purpose for which the trustees of the common schools see fit to use it in connection with the schools.

## BOULDER CANYON DAM SITE



Party of Government engineers inspecting Boulder Canyon dam site on the Colorado River where it is proposed to erect the world's largest flood control dam. The project is unique in that it is to be financed entirely from the water and hydro-electric power it will make available.

With the Colorado River threatening to break over its banks and permanently destroy a dozen towns, the homes of a hundred thousand people and a million acres of fertile farm land in Arizona and Southern California, the Department of the Interior is preparing to push forward the construction of Boulder Canyon flood control dam immediately upon the adoption of legislation now pending in both houses of Congress.

Boulder Canyon is situated 125 miles below the Grand Canyon and is in that section of the river that forms the boundary line between Arizona and Nevada. According to plans already prepared by Department of the Interior engineers, Boulder Dam will be 550 feet high and will create a reservoir 80 miles long and 30 miles wide, capable of holding 26,000,000 acre feet of water. It will be the world's largest dam and will be twice as high as the largest dam now in existence.

Acting on the recommendation of Dr. Hubert Work, Secretary of the Interior, authors of pending Boulder Dam legislation have written into the bill a provision which specifies that the government is not to expend a single dollar on the project until the Interior Department has received from private and public agencies in the Southwest sufficient contracts for the sale of water and hydro-electric power rights to guarantee the return of all money expended on the dam plus interest.

Construction of Boulder Dam will provide a site for the development of a million horsepower of hydro-electric energy, according to government engineers.

Legislation providing for Boulder Dam has been favorably passed upon by the house committee on reclamation and is scheduled to come on the floor of the House for action the latter part of March, it has been announced by Congressman Addison T. Smith, chairman of the committee.

### Ranger Man Held For Strawn Steal

RANGER, March 9.—One Ranger man has been arrested and placed in the Ranger city jail in connection with the burglary of the Strawn Mercantile company, January 31. Various articles of wearing apparel, including three dresses and a lumber jacket, found in possession of the man, were identified by representatives of the Strawn company. One dress was positively identified by all of the employees of the company because of the fact that it was brought back to the store the day of the robbery and was in a soiled condition. Palo Pinto county officers were in Ranger Thursday investigating the robbery but refused to state whether any charges had been filed against the suspect held. Chief of Police Jim Ingram and Constable Ted Hamilton made the arrest late Wednesday afternoon and recovered the goods. Ingram has been working on the case since the robbery. In all probability the man will be taken to Palo Pinto today for questioning.

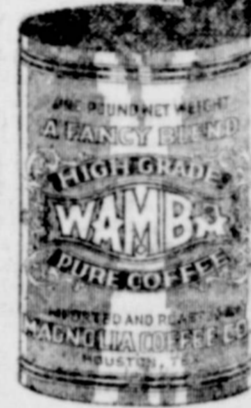

### BANK LOOTING TRIAL SET FOR MONDAY; ROBY

ABILENE, March 9.—Trial of Aubrey Ray for robbery with firearms in connection with looting of the McCaulley State bank March 1 will be started Monday morning at Roby in 104th district court before Judge W. R. Chapman, it was announced Tuesday night after indictments had been returned against Ray, Robert C. Peck and Burnie Burnett.

Five bills of indictment were returned. Ray and Peck were indicted in both the McCaulley and Sylvester robberies, while Burnett was named only in connection with the McCaulley job.

Ray now stands charged with robbery of at least five banks and is believed to have been connected with several other holdups.

The wives of Ray and Burnett have been released from custody.

### FILM MESSAGE CARRIES PEACE TO THE WORLD

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., March 9.—The motion picture as a messenger of peace and good will to every land was exemplified when the first American-made pro-German film settled down for a "run" in one of the important theaters.

It was "Four Sons," which Hollywood has been hearing for some time was written around Madame Ernestine Schumann-Heink and her four sons, three of whom fought on the German side and one with the American forces.

**Story In Film**  
In the film story the mother is a Bavarian woman, a house wife, no attempt being made to make her appear to be a concert singer.

The picture had its premier performance before a cosmopolitan audience representing Los Angeles and Hollywood. There were tears and cheers and no disapproval in the Carthy Circle theater when the invited guests rose to go home.

The theme of the story was expressed by an American "doughboy" on the battle front who spoke a title:

"I guess those Heinies have mothers, too."

In the cast was Ferdinand Schumann-Heink, son of the famous singer.

**World-Wide Scope**  
The international scope of the production was remarked by the audience. It was sponsored by William Fox, of Hungarian descent; written as a novel by I. A. R. Wylie, an English woman and adapted for the screen by Phillip Klein, son of the late playwright Charles Klein, of German descent. The director, John Ford, is Irish; Margaret Mann, who enacted the role of the mother is Scotch.

The only other film production which has approached the pro-German angle was "Barbed Wire" in which a German soldier fell in love with a French girl.

### FIRST PHYSICIAN REGISTERED IN 1875

EASTLAND, March 9.—Dr. H. B. Tanner, retired physician of Eastland county, has a hobby of collecting interesting and valuable data and in his investigations of records in Eastland county learned that the first physician to register in Eastland county did so on January 9, 1875, and that since that time

310 physicians have registered up to January 1, 1928, a period of 53 years. On January 9, 1875, three physicians, J. M. Giggins, Jackson Evans and J. M. Smith met at the Eastland county seat, examined each other and granted each other licenses to practice medicine, and these Dr. Tanner says the record discloses, were the first doctors to register in the county.

### ARGENTINE RIDER IN AUSTIN THURSDAY

AUSTIN, March 9.—Aimee Felix Tschiffely, Argentine, who is making the world's longest horseback ride, for two hours Thursday told Governor Moody of his trip from Buenos Aires to Austin, and of his plans for finishing his pony cruise in New York next October. Tschiffely will mount his Pampan steed Friday. He plans to spend Friday night at Pflugerville and reach Taylor Saturday, proceeding north daily thereafter.

EL PASO, March 9.—Harry F. Sinclair, oil magnate, greeted his friend and codefendant in the Teapot Dome oil lease trial, Albert B. Fall, former Secretary of the Interior, at the latter's home here Thursday afternoon. 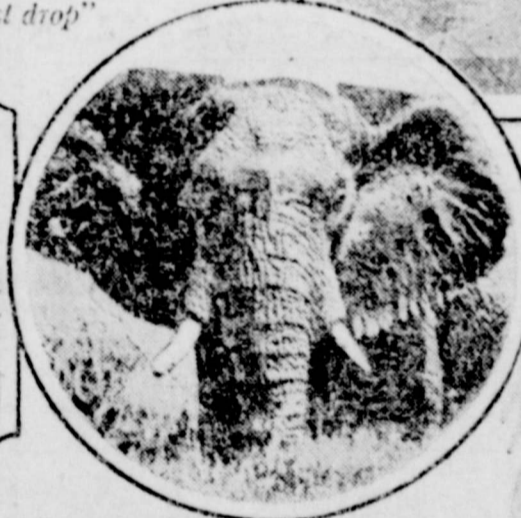

### STYLE HINTS

PARIS, March 9.—Sleeves are invariably long on the new day frocks, although there are any number of variations at them, sleeves are not attracting the great attention they did a season or two ago.

Many of the sleeves are tight, with the fullness above the cuff, either in Henry IV style, or flat on top with the fullness coming below. A new sleeve shown in a coat is cut in one piece with the collar and is attached underneath to give the effect of a set-in sleeve.

Cardoline is making a black coat with a white fur collar which has most accommodating sleeves that can be unbuttoned to form two loose panels at the sides while the wearer draws her arms inside, thus making the coat into a cape. The cape can be reversed and worn with the wide satin lining inside, in which case the sleeves are not visible at all.

Muff sleeves strike an original note in Charlotte's collection. In most cases, the lower sleeve hangs full below the elbow and wrist. On a frock in flowered muslin it is tight and then puffed just above a fine embroidered linen cuff; another muslin dress has tiny sleeves puffed just below the shoulder.

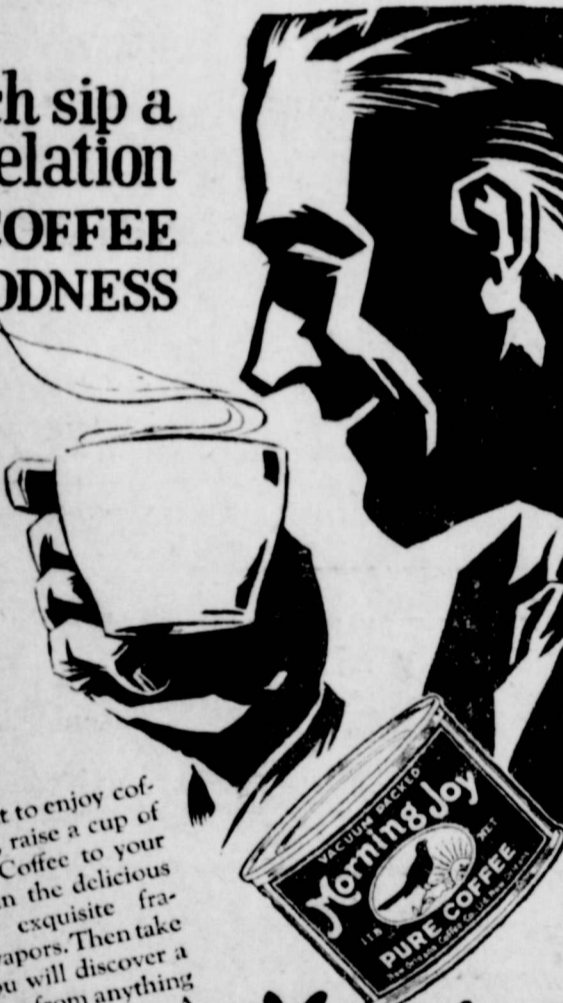
Those on a satin afternoon frock are tight to the wrist with flared over-sleeves from the elbow. The full muff-sleeves on an afternoon coat are enriched with fur from the elbow in quaint designs.

Three-quarter sleeves are a feature of a number of blouses and frocks. Nearly all evening gowns are sleeveless except those on all-over lace frocks which have long, tight-fitting ones.

### TEXAS' HIGH MOUNTAIN IS EL CAPITAN; 8,700

AUSTIN, March 9.—El Capitan, Culberson county, is the highest peak in Texas with an altitude of 8,700 feet. The United States geographical survey has determined. Measurements recently made by Samuel S. Gannett in the field add eight feet to previous reports on El Capitan. The new figures have been received by Dr. A. A. Stiles here.

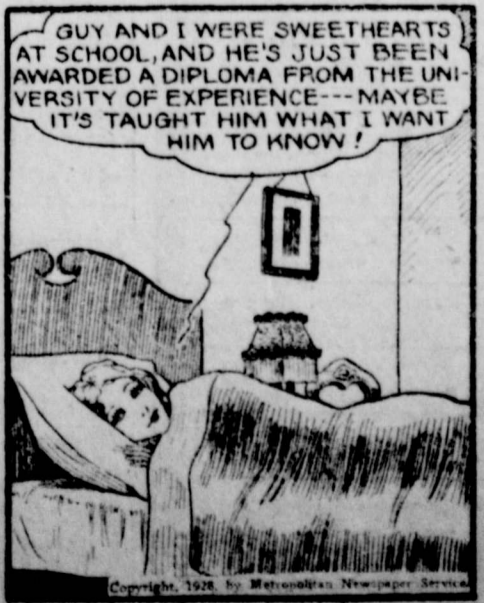

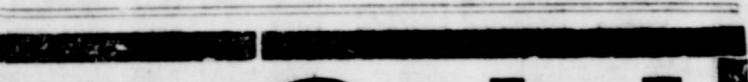
