Brundige, reporter for the St. Louis Star.

Brundige said he paid an employe \$25 for the document which was printed on company stationery. It follows: "The United States Senate investigating committee is now visiting the Pittsburgh district. Clean up all unsightly conditions. Keep our police in the background. Avoid all arrests. Instruct our men to keep out of trouble. If the committee desires to question any of our employes see to it that you present men you can trust and who can be depended upon to give the right kind of answers."

NEVADA BANK LOOT MISSING FROM CACHE

VIRGINIA CITY, Nevada, March 17.—Who got the \$30,000 loot taken in the sensational robbery of the Virginia City bank and buried it in a remote spot in Six-Mile Canyon?

This question baffles officials here.

The men who buried it, now serving men to twenty years in the Nevada state penitentiary at Carson, don't know. The bank and surety company officials don't know. County officials don't know. No one knows—apparently.

Robbery of the Virginia City bank last October supplied a sensation. A second sensation came with the conviction of Charles Fitzsimmons and George Moore, accused of the robbery.

W. O. Heinrich, consulting criminologist of Berkeley, contributed to their conviction by proving in court that hairs found on certain articles correspond with theirs—one of the articles being a cap found near the bank's abandoned automobile in Six-Mile Canyon.

Facing 20 years in prison, Fitzsimmons and Moore decided that to reveal the hiding place of the bank loot would mean a shortening of the sentence. So they drew a map showing the exact whereabouts of the cache and asked that the money be dug up and returned to the rightful owners.

The searchers, including five prominent citizens and a surety company representative found the cache.

They found the tin can in which the money had reposed.

But they did not find the \$30,000.

Mystery was added to the strange disappearance of the money because the cache was in a spot which defied detection. One might range the hills for months, walk over the very hiding place, and never see it, investigators declared.

SAVING CLUBS TO HELP MEN ATTEND MEET

SAN ANTONIO, March 17.—American Legion savings clubs to save up funds for attending the national convention of the World War veterans' organization to be held here October 8 to 12 are being organized throughout the United States. Phillip B. Strapp, national convention director, announced here today.

The clubs are being formed in cooperation with the Save-to-Travel association of New York City, which is composed of railroad, banks, hotels and steamship lines. Mr. Strapp said. The plan, it is believed on the basis of the experience of last year, will increase the San Antonio convention attendance very materially. Mr. Strapp said. The above quotation is so completely the motto of the writer of this column that it is reprinted in the hope that it may be adopted by many others who are now living in an atmosphere to make either them, or those with whom they come in contact, happy. Happiness is the rightful heritage of every man and woman, but it is not always that we can find the bright lining of the many dark clouds that hover over and about us from day to day. Yet that bright lining is there, and 'tis said that the darker the cloud, the brighter the lining. Pollyanna's policy that there is always something to be thankful for is tried and true. Let's be happy.

As might have been expected, the cold snap Friday brought in its wake a new batch of fresh meat for Cisco epicurians. W. B. Starr was in town early before the average Cisco housewife had cleared away the breakfast dishes, with choice spareribs, backbones, sausage and small hams and other choice cuts of fresh pork. Mr. Starr said he slaughtered ten head Friday for the Cisco trade, which makes 45 hogs he has slaughtered and sold in Cisco since January 1. "I have found ready buyers for all the fresh pork I have brought to Cisco," Mr. Starr said. "Those who complain about putting the market must not select the right time to sell. I kill hogs when the weather is cold, and at a time when I believe they will sell, and not just when I feel like it. I admit, had I followed my natural inclinations, I would have preferred remaining by my fireside all day Friday, reading some interesting story on farm activities, but the hogs were ready for the slaughter, the weather was right to kill and Cisco folk were hungry for pork, so myself and boys braved the cold north and dressed the pork which was soon distributed in many Cisco homes," he continued.

"The Big City" Scores Heavily

Time was when the police detective was a bottle-browed individual with a derby hat and flat feet, and the gangster a villainous looking thug in a sweater. But those days are gone forever, as Lou Chaney demonstrates in his newest picture, "The Big City," now playing at the Palace theater. The detective looks like a salesman or insurance agent, and the gangster is a tailored person who looks like a lawyer or doctor.

"The Big City" is an ultra modern romance of gangster life in New York—none the less thrilling because it is based on fact, and the conventional characters of the underworld are conspicuous by their absence. It portrays the gangster, played by Chaney, as a modern crook with a cabinet as a cloak for his activities and insurance against being "ragged" on suspicion, and the detectives and policemen are all modern New York type—far from the usual screen conception. This is one reason, perhaps, why the story rings so true. Chaney, as the masterful but sinister "Chuck" Collins, has a role that he plays in

a unique combination of makeup and histrionic disguise, and Marceline Day as the little shop girl, innocently caught in the mazes of one of his plots, is appealingly sweet. James Murray, as the young gangster who attains regeneration through the influence of the girl, plays a difficult role with a well balanced sense of artistry, while Betty Compton, as the hard boiled "moll" of the gangster leader, has one of the best acting roles in which she has appeared for a long time. In a way it suggests her role in "The Miracle Man," in which she and Chaney won fame together, which is odd, for this is the first time they have played together since.
