





### What and Why of Redemption Theme of Pastor of Church of God for His Opening Sermon Pre-Easter Services

Pre-Easter meeting at the church of God is making splendid success. A large crowd heard the pastor deliver the opening sermon Sunday night. In speaking on the subject "The What and Why of Redemption" the speaker said in part:

"Redemption means to buy or bring back to a primitive place or condition. Grounds for redemption through Christ are found only in the fact that man is not now, spiritually, where he formerly was. Primitive man was of a very high type. The prevalent theory that man is gradually rising to a higher plane is proven false by the testimony of history of the race. Greece, Rome, Egypt, China all point back to a golden age in their history and look at them today. What has caused this fall? It has certainly not been ignorance but rather moral degradation. Moral conditions in our country, in our city, are appalling. Who dare prophesy our future unless we awaken to our responsibilities and duties toward God?"

God pronounced all His creation, including man as very good. What a contrast primitive man must have been to the depraved race of today. Primitive man was in the image and likeness of God. Physically, he was perfect; mentally, he reflected, finitely, many of the attributes of God; morally, he was created in righteousness and true holiness. Man was placed under a testing of duty and by transgression the result was that God cast him out of the garden and

man lost his spiritual life and communion with God. "By one man's sin death passed upon all." The whole human family became depraved. The Apostle Paul sums up the condition by saying, "All have sinned and come short of the glory of God." Now if there is redemption in Christ, as the writers of the New Testament affirm, then there is possibility, by His grace, of sinful man returning to that spiritual condition which man enjoyed before the fall. Nothing short of such a return is redemption. There is redemption, full and complete for all."

Monday evening the service was well attended. The pastor spoke on the subject, "The How of Redemption." He said that the law of Moses was and is a failure in redeeming man.

It was given to restrain sin until the redeemer should come and was never intended as a means of salvation. No one has ever been saved by merely keeping the law. "One thing thou lackest," Christ alone is able to redeem the world. "In whom we have redemption through His blood, even the forgiveness of sins." He was "delivered for our offences and raised again for our justification." "Wherefore Jesus also, that He might sanctify the people with His own blood, suffered without the gate." "I am come that they might have life." Herein is redemption.

### GAS FOR AUTOS FROM SOFT COAL NEXT IN LINE

PITTSBURGH, April 3. — Automobiles of the future may purr their ways over super-highways, propelled by artificial gasoline made from soft coal, when the predicted shortage of oil has become a reality.

Discussion of methods for achieving this goal will probably form one of the principal topics of discussion at the Second International Conference of Bituminous Coal, held November 19, under the auspices of the Carnegie Institute of Technology.

Fleets of transcontinental airplanes may sail over dead and forgotten oil fields and over factories operated with the new and smokeless fuel made from the black wealth in the hills of Western Pennsylvania and surrounding states.

Invited to Conference  
The entire modern world is interested in these changes which will have an incalculable effect upon the future of bituminous coal and nearly all foreign countries represented in Washington have been invited to send delegates to the coming conference.

Although more than 1700 delegates from thirteen different nations were present at the first conference held in 1923, officials of the school look forward to larger delegations and a more widespread representation this year.

In the Old World educational centers he is investigating new sources of scientific information and inviting the foremost fuel technologists to add their knowledge to the vast store which will be assembled at the coming proceedings.

It is reported that the institution that Dr. Baker has already received several acceptances from prominent European scientists.

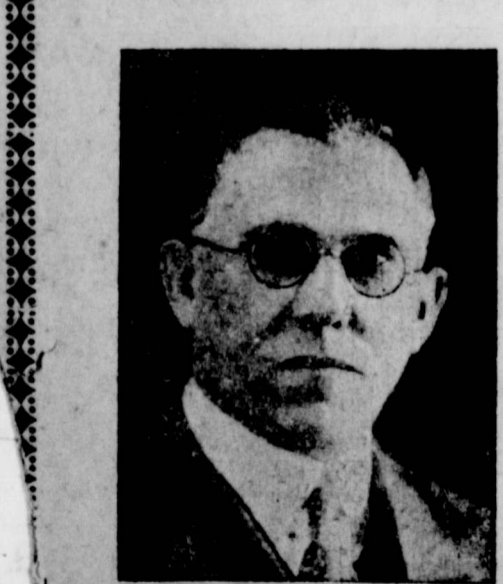

# Los Angeles Chemist Finds New Remedy for the Cancer; Attracts Great Attention

(Editor's Note—This is the first of two articles on a new remedy for cancer. It should be specifically noted that neither the discoverer nor the physicians who have administered it claim it is a cure.)

LOS ANGELES, April 3.—An obscure Los Angeles chemist has made a discovery which physicians have found beneficial in the treatment of cancer. The man is Professor Robert A. Armstrong, aged 50, a modest man who speaks sincerely without boasting and hopes his remedy will prove more than he claims for it. "I was educated at the Colorado School of Mines as a chemical metallurgical engineer," he explained when seen at his small home here. "Then I went to the Rolla Technical School in Missouri, and later took a course at International Scientific Schools."

**Studies Radium**  
"More than 20 years ago, as part of my work as a chemical metallurgist, I turned my attention to the study of radium and its rays. At that time, I was not interested in this research as a cure for human ills, but only as an adjunct to the study of metals and their composition. For 20 years I have devoted myself to laboratory research of radium."

Professor Armstrong paused and glanced at a long row of glass retorts and other appliances in the small laboratory at his home. Then, with a note of sadness, he continued:

"About five years ago, a dearly beloved member of my family became ill with a disease that baffled medical experts. When they had all given up the case as hopeless, I turned to my own knowledge and determined to learn whether radium offered a solution to the human problem. Since then I have worked unceasingly.

"I hit upon something which is at least a palliative for cancer.

"During my experiments I worked on the theory that cancer is a protein mass, and not caused by a germ. The human body itself is protein substance. It is 90 per cent water and the rest of its elements are carbon, hydrogen, nitrogen, sulphur and phosphorus. I arrived at the conclusion that cancer follows some disarrangement of the atomic structure of the chemical class—the human body. Perhaps it is the result of faulty food assimilation, or a diet or similar digestive disturbances.

"At any rate, I believed and still believe that radium holds the cure for cancer. Three rays emanate from radium, the Alpha, Beta and Gamma rays. The first of these is a constructive force which aids in the relief of some cancers. The second is destructive and tears down the tissues, healthy and unhealthy. The third may be described, generally speaking, as the result of explosion of the Beta ray particles.

### 1,000 RATTLES ARE SLAIN IN CAMPAIGN

BELTON, April 3. — The first organized campaign to rid Bell county of rattlesnakes, which began eight weeks ago, ended Saturday. County Agent J. M. Parks of this city, who directed the move, estimated that more than 1,000 rattles were killed and said the estimate was conservative.

Three cash prizes were awarded to the leading contestants, and \$100 was divided into \$50, \$35 and \$15 awards. The money was contributed by the chamber of commerce of Temple and by donations from business men in Belton and Killeen.

T. C. Wear of Salado won first prize by killing 120 rattlesnakes; Bill Barr of Killeen won second prize by killing 105, and W. H. Shroyer and F. L. Splawn of the Tennessee Valley community, near Belton, won third prize by killing 64.

Free dynamite was furnished by the county and the killing of the snakes was proven by stiving rattles, which were presented to parks.

PITTSBURGH, April 3. — Automobiles of the future may purr their ways over super-highways, propelled by artificial gasoline made from soft coal, when the predicted shortage of oil has become a reality.

Discussion of methods for achieving this goal will probably form one of the principal topics of discussion at the Second International Conference of Bituminous Coal, here November 19, under the auspices of the Carnegie Institute of Technology.

Fleets of transcontinental airplanes may sail over dead and forgotten oil fields and over factories operated with the new and smokeless fuel made from the black wealth in the hills of Western Pennsylvania and surrounding states.

Invited to Conference The entire modern world is interested in these changes which will have an incalculable effect upon the future of bituminous coal and nearly all foreign countries represented in Washington have been invited to send delegates to the coming conference.

Although more than 1700 delegates from thirteen different nations were present at the first conference held in 1925, officials of the school look forward to larger delegations and a more widespread representation this year.

In the Old World educational centers he is investigating new sources of scientific information and inviting the foremost fuel technologists to add their knowledge to the vast store which will be assembled at the coming proceedings. It is reported that the institution that Dr. Baker has already received several acceptances from prominent European scientists.

### Smokeless Fuel

In Nature's store of soft coal technologists expect to find the key to smokeless fuel, fertilizers, made from coal, low and high distillation processes for the production of useful products and gasification of coal.

All of these subjects and others equally important were discussed at the first conference and this year the scientists will come bringing news of further progress which has been made toward the various goals and new fields which have opened to their view.

In its constant press onward civilization has overcome all obstacles which the pessimists of the various ages believed would bring the down-

fall of civilization. The extinction of the whales would cut off the supply of oil, they said, and man bored in to the bowels of the earth for a new and greater supply of oil.

"The supply of natural gas will soon be gone," they mourned, "and we will be without good lights." Giant streams were harnessed and compelled to release their perpetual surge of power to light millions of lights better than those supplied by gas and give power which it had never possessed.

"So now while pessimists are predicting that the cars of the future must stand idle beside empty oil wells, science is preparing to open the way to a field of cheap fuel so plentiful that before the last of the great oil fields is drained, petroleum may be of no more commercial importance than whale oil.

### College Students Make Up Fund For Hot Check Fellows

SPARTANBURG, S. C., April 3.—By individual assessment the 500

students of Wofford college here have provided a sum of \$200 from which they have undertaken to pay all "bad checks" given to local merchants by the students.

The amount contributed by each student was less than 50 cents. Students declared the benefits accruing to the student body as a class in financial standing locally was worth more than the cost.

The treasurer of the fund pays the holder of the check, and reports the matter to the student council. The delinquent is then allowed to pay the amount of the check into the fund.

### RATS STEAL ONE HUNDRED POUNDS COFFEE

PALESTINE, April 3.—Workmen remodeling a store building under the Ecks' Hall Friday found 100 pounds of coffee there that had been stored away by rats and mice in a large crevice back of shelving that was being removed. The rodents also had made a large accumulation of other groceries.

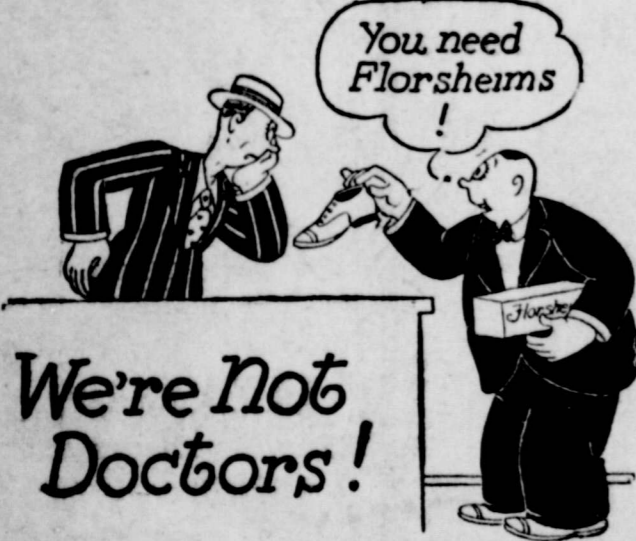

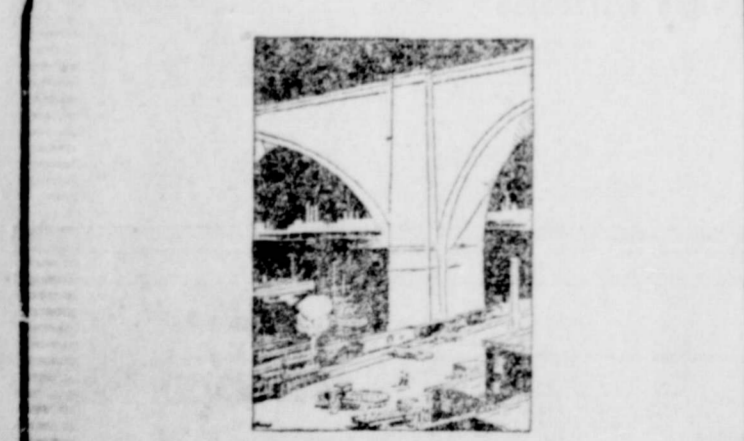
