## TEXAS

**FEWER TEXAS FAILURES.**—The bureau of business research of the University of Texas has compiled the data showing that there was a decrease in business failures in March 1928, as compared with the same month last year. This year the failures were 52 in number and in amounts aggregating \$909,000; in March there were 59 with liabilities totaling \$1,415,000. During February, this year, there were 52 failures totaling nearly a million and a half dollars. The "researchers" have discovered that "the smaller concern continues to have difficulty in making profits" and, "It has been pointed out by some market specialists that this tendency is likely to increase as chain stores are extended." Most of us had guessed as much some time ago.

**TOPPING STATE HIGHWAYS.**—Counties that are not taking the necessary steps to secure topping of state highways to secure the state largely to blame for not getting a part of the state highway funds for such purposes, though it must be admitted, some of them are so involved in bond issues that they can do nothing toward meeting the requirements of the highway commission. The fortunate counties that will have roads topped under contracts to be let April 24, are: Kerr and Kimble, 39 miles; Schleicher and Sutton, 47 miles; Coleman, 61 miles; Taylor 11 1/2 miles.

**WANTS CITY PHONE.**—Because the Southwest Bell Telephone company has gone into the courts to secure an order restraining the city from enforcing an ordinance which prohibits public utilities from changing their rates without consent of the city, Mayor Chambers of San Antonio, advocates a municipally-owned telephone system and would favor a bond issue to construct the plant. He characterizes the proposed new schedule of rates as "highway robbery."

**SELLING TEXAS GAS.**—Operating under a Delaware charter, the Western Gas company will build a complete system, to include approximately 235 miles of gas pipe lines, to serve 20 communities in Hardeman, Ford, Knox, Baylor, Haskell, Jones and Fisher counties, which have heretofore been without gas. The company will obtain its gas by purchase from the Northern Texas Utilities company.

**PRESIDIO NITRATE CLAIMS.**—More than 700 claims to the rights to develop deposits in Presidio county have been signed by Land Commissioner Robinson, which insures the working of a large acreage in that section. These claims are on school lands and were obtained for \$10 an acre and a perpetual 2 per cent royalty. Sodium nitrate is used as a farm fertilizer and but little is produced in this country, most of it being imported from Chile. While it has been known to exist in Presidio county, it has not been accessible to markets because of lack of roads.

**TEXAS COLLEGE STUDENTS.**—Figures compiled by the secretary of the Southern Baptist convention show that Texas, with 21,628 senior college and university students, leads all the Southern states in numbers, having nearly twice the number of North Carolina which comes second with 11,241. The total enrollment in the 13 Southern states was given as 122,065, which does not include the teachers' colleges. South Carolina leads all others in per capita enrollment, having one student for every 199 population. Virginia being next with one for every 246, and Texas coming third with one for every 247.

**TEXAS - OKLAHOMA BRIDGE TOLLS.**—Hearings are to be held before Texas and Oklahoma officials in regard to the bridge tolls being charged on four bridges across Red river between the two states. Assistant Attorney General Tilley of Texas, states that one bridge last year earned its capital stock from the tolls collected. The two states will endeavor to have the tolls reduced to a point where the tolls collected will produce for the owners only a prevailing interest rate.

**ENGAGING HOTEL ROOMS.**—It is reported that Al Smith and the Texas Anti-Saloon league have each engaged 40 hotel rooms at Houston for the National Democratic Convention, which would indicate that, financially at least, he wets and the dries have about an even pre-convention start.

**LIONS OR BLIND TIGERS?**—The sheriff of Wilbrey county has secured two full grown mountain lions which he took into Rayburn. He reports that such a "kick" out of the hat that he intends to see more he can take alive.

## Cream Route Begins Next Friday

### PAUL WEISER WILL OPERATE CREAM TRUCK

The first cream route, as a result of the recent dairy activities, sponsored by E. H. Varnell, agricultural vocationalist of the Cisco high school and J. C. Patterson, county agent, will be initiated April 20. Paul Weiser will be in charge of the cream truck. The cream route will cover about 51 miles, and will gather cream from 500 cows, ultimately. A recent cow census along the new route shows that there are now between 400 and 500 cows on the route, though the full number are not in milk. The survey shows that from 100 to 300 pounds of butter fat will be produced daily from the cows owned on the route. The cream gathered will be taken by the Cisco creamery. The prices will be 10 cents per butter fat pound above the prices quoted for sour cream in the daily papers. With the commencement of this cream route the Cisco Creamery will begin to manufacture only sweet cream butter, this sweet cream butter will be guaranteed absolutely fresh and pure and equal to, if not superior to the best butter sold on this market. The charge for operating the cream truck has been agreed at five cents per butter fat pound. Beginning April 20, Mr. Weiser will leave the O. P. Weiser farm on the Rising Star highway at 7:30 o'clock, going through the German community by the Lee Lieske farm, to Nimrod, out the Scranton road to Scranton, thence to Putnam, via Dothan to Cisco, serving all farmers on the route, arriving here about 11 o'clock in the morning. This truck will run every day, including Sundays.

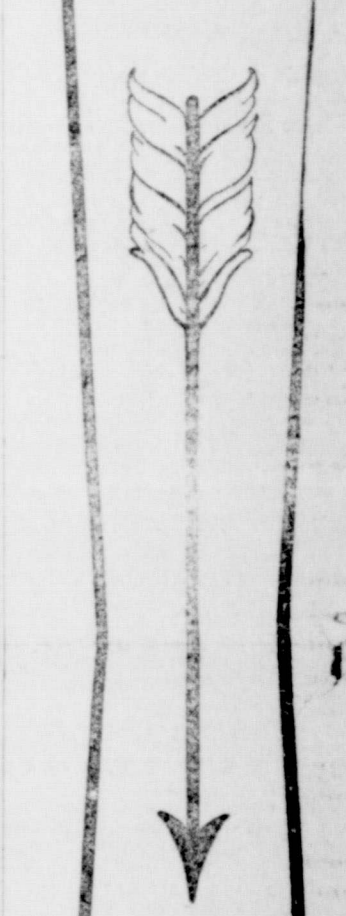

### HARRIS COUNTY LEADS IN AUTO REGISTRATIONS

AUSTIN, April 13.—Automobile registrations in Texas have reached close to the 950,000 mark for the first three months of the year, according to figures furnished by the state highway department. Registrations up to April 1 amounted to 941,523, as compared with 1,123,779 for all of 1927. Harris county, of which Houston is the county seat, is leading all counties of the state, having registered 61,946 automobiles during the first quarter. Dallas county is second, having registered 59,723 cars. Harris county was second in 1927, but judged by its present showing will move into first place this year. ### EGG STORAGE HAS STARTED BY BANKHEAD

Consumers of Bankhead eggs may now be assured of the very finest quality of eggs during hot weather when just ordinary eggs so often are found unfit for use.

### THREE BILLION CUBIC FEET GAS OIL BELT AREA

Probably few people of this section realize our enormous gas resources, one of the cheapest and most efficient fuels that can be used in industrial enterprises. 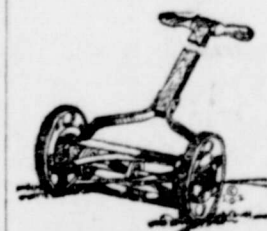

Over 15 Per Cent of American Exports Were Used by Orient Department of Commerce Says

WASHINGTON, April 13. — The Orient consumed over 15 per cent of America's total exports of exceeding \$4,000,000 in 1927, according to an analysis of these important markets prepared by Janet H. Nunn, of the Far East section of the commerce department. While there was a decline of 10 per cent in the trade with the Orient last year, bringing the total to \$744,962,000 it may be charged to temporary conditions and not to the development of any fundamental adverse trade currents, in the opinion of Miss Nunn. Exports to the far east have more than tripled in 18 years. The purchasing of American goods in that territory last year represented a large gain over the 1910-1914 average—350 per cent—and was 12 per cent in advance of the 1925 total. Shoes increase. While this increase is undoubtedly accounted for in considerable measure by readjustments following European industrial changes, as well as by higher postwar prices, its maintenance is firmly based upon the development of the natural resources and the economic progress

dies bought approximately ten times more American merchandise than the average for pre-war. Fully one-fifth of the total went for automobiles, not only to serve the tourist traffic but also to provide increased transportation facilities to promote the development of the country's resources.

**Cotton Trade**  
Raw cotton ranked highest among the commodities entering into the trade with India. Refined mineral oils and automobiles also were important in this trade. The expansion of more than 300 per cent in sales to Australia and New Zealand since the pre-war period is attributed mainly to increased demand for automobiles, gasoline, machinery and iron and steel.

Notwithstanding the long continued trade disruption in China the consumption of American products in that country in 1927 was 240 per cent in excess of the pre-war average. Most important increases occurred in the case of leaf tobacco, cigarettes, petroleum, raw cotton, machinery and iron and steel.

Last year raw cotton, petroleum, automobiles, machinery, iron and steel, tobacco and lumber accounted for 75 per cent of the American oriental trade.

United States bought approximately four times more from Japan last year than before the war. Purchases from the Netherlands East Indies and Malaya were eleven times greater.

FORT WORTH, April 13. —Fort Worth's deficit will be \$610,000 at the end of the fiscal year, September 30, it was said by City Manager Carr yesterday. Up to April 1 the city had spent \$1,161,000, Carr said.

## Smithsonian Explorer Returns From Land So Dry and Desolate Indians Refused to Live In It

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Buried three years in the nitrate deserts of Chile, in a country so lonesome that even Indians could not be hired to remain, H. B. Freeman, Smithsonian astrophysicist, has returned to Washington after scientific research in connection with measurements of the sun's heat.

The Smithsonian solar observatory near Calama, Chile, one of the three stations scattered over the globe where the institution is making daily computations of the sun's radiations. These observations are being taken over a long term of years with a view to collecting proof of variation and determining the amount so as to provide data from which to learn the influence of the variation on the earth's weather.

No Animals  
Freeman, who was accompanied by his wife, declared that the desert is too barren to support animal or plant life. During the three years but one wild animal—a fox—was seen and that was near Calama. "Our drinking and washing water was hauled by automobile from Calama, 12 miles away," Freeman said. "This was snow water piped down from the mountain by the railroad company."

Fresh food, excepting meat, was a rarity. Occasionally vegetables were sent in from a coast, 600 miles away. Fresh eggs sell for \$1.50 a dozen in the winter months.

In an effort to relieve the monotony of life at the observatory the Smithsonian equipped it with a radio, but static was so bad that the finest and clearest results sounded like a hail storm, according to Freeman.

Despite the desolate life on the desert, Freeman said that neither he nor his wife looked upon the hardships of their solar observatory life as "more than inconveniences," and considered them of no moment in view of the importance of getting solar measurements for a long period.

Continue Investigations  
Freeman, after a vacation in California, will be stationed in Washington to prosecute investigations in connection with solar radiation investigation under the direction of Dr. C. G. Abbott.

The studies, which have been in progress several years, have convinced Dr. Abbott that the variation in radiation of the sun has a pronounced effect on terrestrial weather. It has been observed that in periods of maximum radiation lower temperatures have existed generally over the earth. Such a period

is now present, the sun spots being at their maximum activity. This is possible due to the fact that maximum sun spot activity tends to large magnetic influences creating storm periods. Heavy cloud formations may cut off some of the sun's radiation from the earth and thus cause temperature decline.

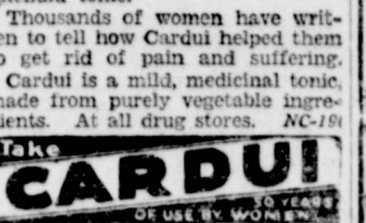
