The bureau of business research of the University of Texas has compiled the data showing that there was a decrease in business failures in March 1928, as compared with the same month last year. This year the failures were 52 in number and in amounts aggregating \$909,000; in March there were 59 with liabilities totaling \$1,415,000. During February, this year, there were 52 failures totaling nearly a million and a half dollars. 



GREAT AUTHORS AND BOOKS

Two rather amusing lists are found in a volume called "The Best Books of Our Time." They show the current tendency to grade books and writers and the hopelessness of such a task. One of these lists purports to name the ten greatest modern authors in the exact order of their greatness. Here they are: John Galsworthy, H. G. Wells, Arnold Bennett, G. Bernard Shaw, Edith Wharton, Joseph Conrad, Booth Tarkington, Rudyard Kipling, W. H. Hudson and Joseph Hergesheimer. Without pausing to quarrel about that list—and there may be many readers who would complain both about some of the names on the list and some left out-one may rush eagerly on to the list of best books in the exact order of their "bestness." Here they are: The Old Wives' Tale. The Forsyte Saga, Narrative Poems of John Masefield, Joan Christophe, Java Head, Spoon River Anthology, Penrod, Ethan Frome. Apparently the greatness of an author has nothing to do with the quality of his books. It will quickly be seen that there are some great authors who do not succeed in landing a single book in the best book list, and some best books whose authors couldn't break into the greatest author list. And even such authors as are represented on both lists do not get themselves and their books rated in the same order. The only important thing about such compilations is to be found not in what they reveal about writers and literature, but about readers and list makers. Apparently there are still plenty of people in the world who don't know much about literature, but know what they like.




