## Friona Student Plans Visit With Missionary Parents

Charles Whitney McKenzie, 16-year-old junior student in Friona High School will leave May 30 for the island of Jamaica in the British West Indies. McKenzie will join his parents there and spend the summer with them. He plans to return to Friona next fall and complete his high school education.

At the present time, he is living with the Rev. L. A. Sartain, Pastor of the First Baptist Church in Friona. McKenzie was born Oct. 27, 1942 in Golden Springs, Jamaica, British West Indies. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Austin L. McKenzie, who have been missionaries on the island for the past 19 years. Charles spent 10 of his 16 years on the island. His parents, both high school teachers before going to Jamaica, taught him school subjects until he was seven years of age.

At that time, they sent him to Clinton, Mass., where he attended the first and second grades. He then returned to Jamaica and was taught by his parents until he finished the sixth grade. He returned to America for the seventh grade, then back to Jamaica for the eighth grade with his parents. McKenzie says that all American schools he has attended have accepted his credits obtained at the missionary school on Jamaica.

Three years ago this summer, the Reverend L. A. Sartain visited Jamaica on a speaking tour. During this tour, he became acquainted with the McKenzies and graciously invited Charles to come to the States with him and attend a credited high school. Charles has lived with the Sartains for those three years, and has returned to Jamaica once, this trip being taken last summer.

In the 19 years the McKenzies have been associated with Jamaica, there have been no revolutions against the government. The English have kept a rather tight rein on all affairs. However, McKenzie says the Communist Party is on the island and is rather strong. But the English have known of its being and keep a close watch on all its activities, McKenzie feels that if the Red Party ever got too far

out of line, the English would be able to cope with it.

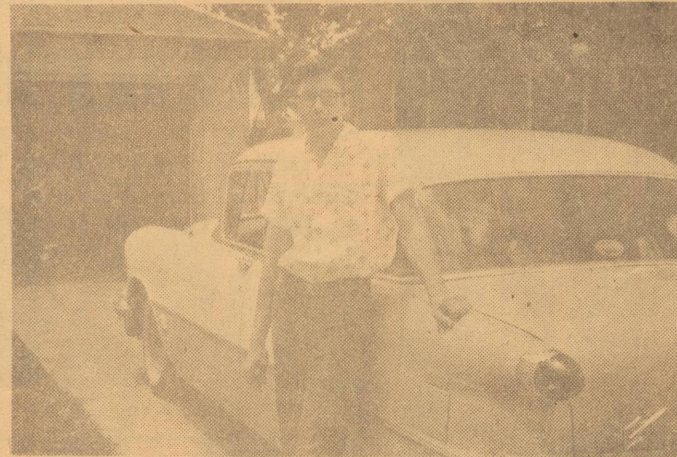
In recalling some of his early years on the island, McKenzie remembers some of the odd rituals the natives of Jamaica perform. One that has remained in his memory above all is the so-called death ritual. Exactly nine days after a person has died, as many people that want to come gather at the deceased's home. There, for the entire night, they beat on cans, rattle chains, stomp the floors and do just about anything to make as much noise as possible. They also turn the deceased's bed completely around. All this is to drive away any evil spirits that may be lingering around the dead person's home. Why it is always exactly nine days after the death that this ritual is performed, McKenzie can't say. He explains there are so many odd rituals there that there is no explanation for a lot of the things the natives do.

The congregation of the church is mostly Negroes, but there is a mixture of Chinese, Portu-

guese, Dutch and many more. There is no salary for the missionaries and they subsist from the collection alone. This of course varies, but as McKenzie says, "It can get pretty hard at times."

McKenzie stated that his parents have often voiced a desire to return to the States, but as this has been going on for years, he felt as though they would remain in Jamaica. McKenzie himself feels that definitely there is a tremendous need for missionary work on the island, as it is rather pagan and lawless as a whole.

However, there is always a bright spot on a dark surface. As long as there are people like Mr. and Mrs. McKenzie, who can devote 19 years of their life to teaching Christianity, and their son Charles, who can understand this dedication, then the rest of the world can rest easily with the thought that our Christian beliefs are being carried and taught to less fortunate people throughout the world.

School is out! Graduation exercises will complete this school year. It is going to seem strange next year without this year's seniors, but we wish them the best of luck.

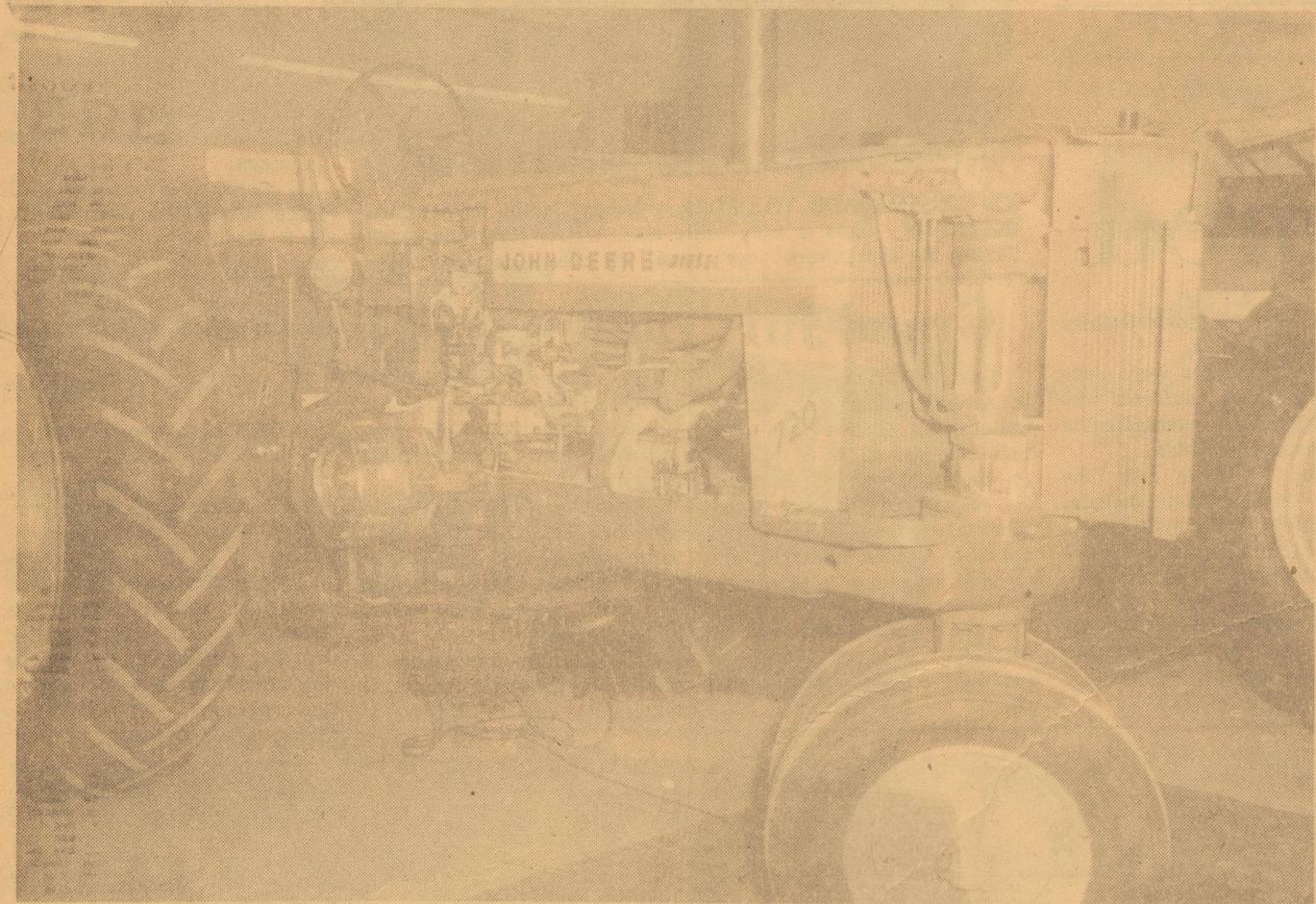

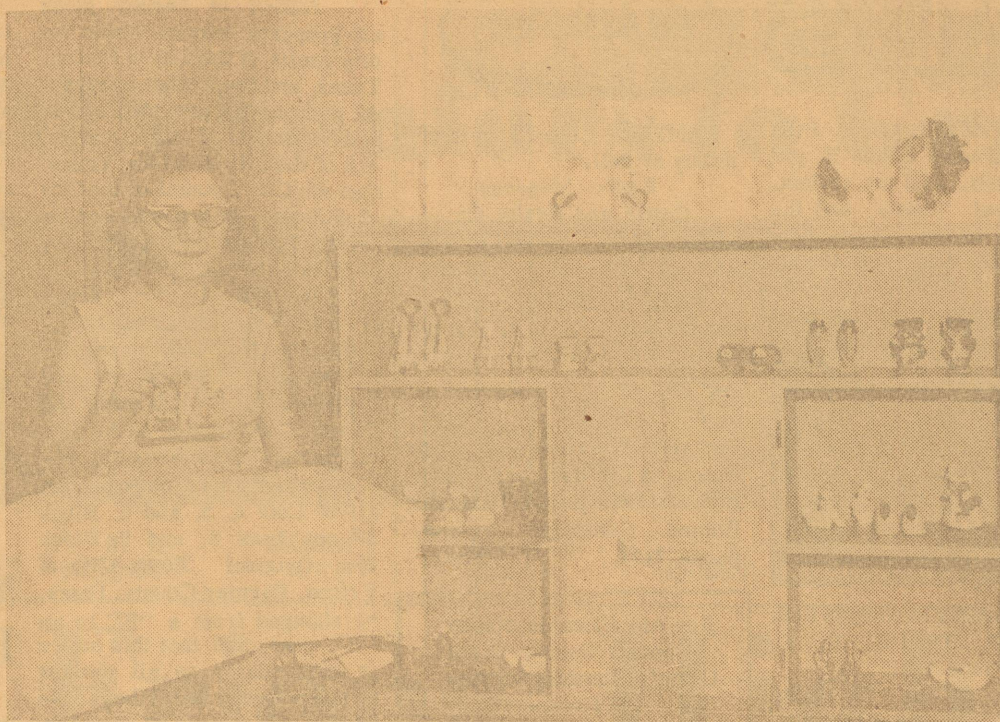
### Friona Teachers Turn Down Social Security

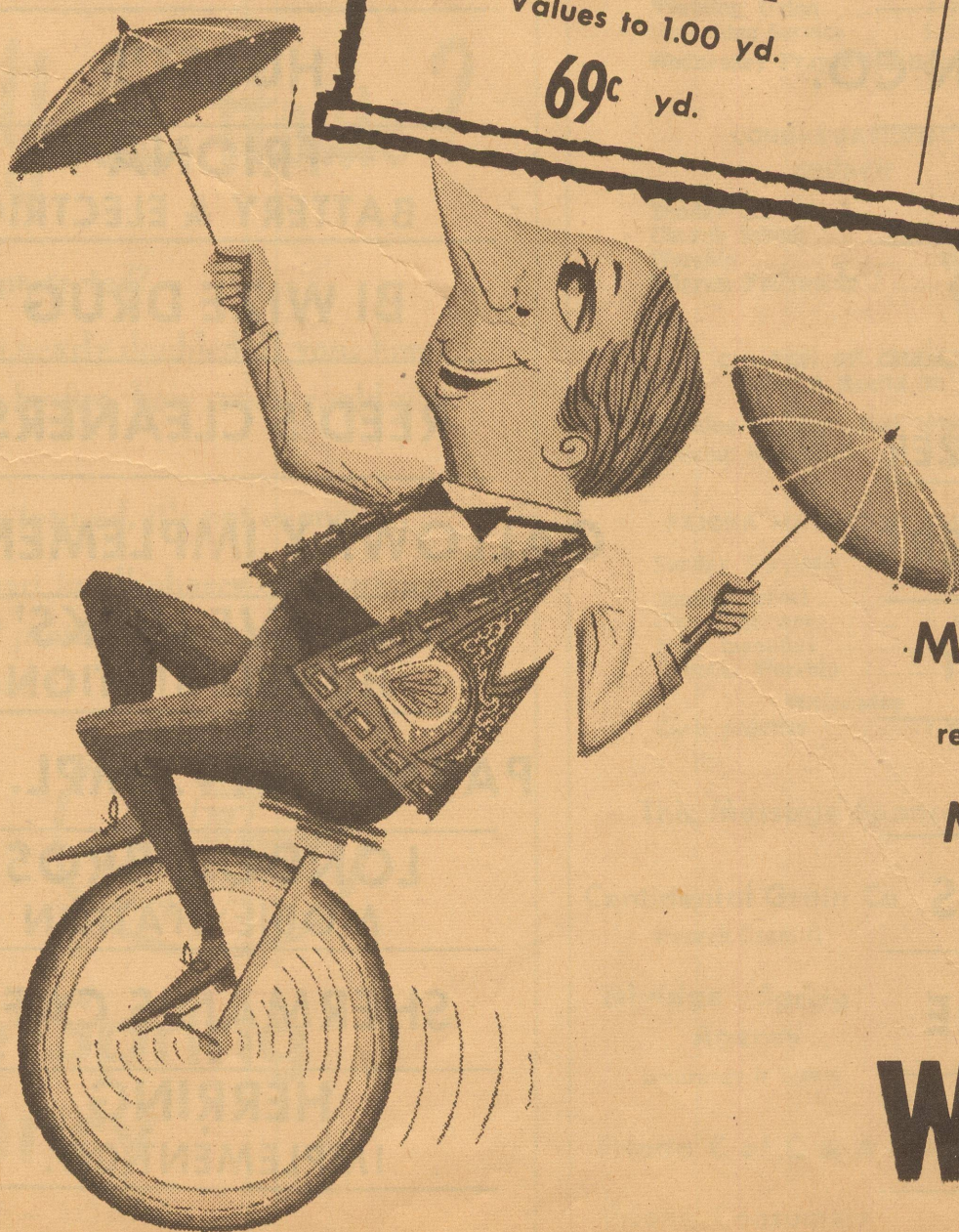

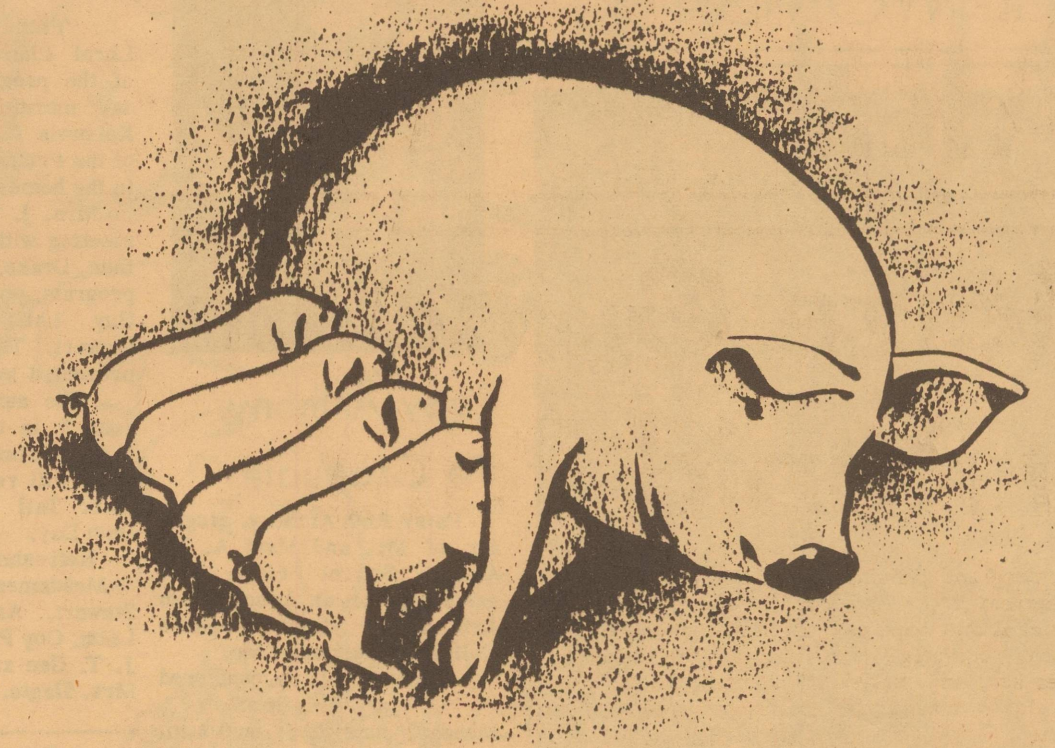

# THE HIGH PLAINS FARM AND HOME

## Maize Going In At Rapid Rate

Grain sorghum planting started in earnest in the Parmer County area this week, as farmers took advantage of clearing weather, and moved into their fields with hundreds of planting rigs.

Some maize had already been planted (which is customary) in the earlier part of the month, but this is the first week that the farmers really got serious about sowing grain sorghums.

From now through the early part of June, the biggest part of the 1959 maize crop will be planted. Variance may depend on weather conditions, but the mood is on farmers to get the job done, and most of them will unless the elements prevent it.

As a general rule, seed beds are in good shape this year—perhaps the best ever. This condition is a result of a very intensive program of land breaking and preparatory work carried on through the winter months. Farmers had a good, clean "open" winter to work, and although moisture was practically negligible, they have managed to pre-water their fields and are now in almost ideal condition to plant.

The tendency in the past two years has been to discourage

early planting of grain sorghum, and to concentrate on planting the crop on, all factors considered, what seems to be the "optimum" dates. These optimum dates have not been agreed upon across the board, but research indicates that they are later than most farmers would believe. Middle and later June plantings have been front-runners in Experiment Station testing recently.

Varieties common to the area mature in from 90 to 120 days, and June seedings are usually good for the varieties that are the most popular. Still, it appears this week that the bulk of the planting—perhaps almost all of it—will be completed by the middle of June.

The two main things to be said for late planting are: (1) It conserves water, and possibly eliminates the need for one irrigation (depending on the weather, naturally), and (2) It lets the crop "get off quicker" in warmer weather, outdistancing most weed competitors.

Pulling against these positive points is the natural desire on the part of the farmer to "get on with the work." He's been preparing to grow a crop

for weeks, perhaps even months, and he's anxious to get some seed in the ground. Also, the farmer isn't so sure but what planting a couple of weeks early might help him get his crop off just a little bit sooner, and he can remember years in which this was a very important consideration. In fact, 1957, when winds blew the crop flat after harvest had been about half completed, is a year that sticks in his mind.

One more factor which figures in this tendency to plant early is the definite plan on the part of some operators to stagger their planting dates so as to take advantage of a growth pattern in their crops that will result in more advantageous use of irrigation water.

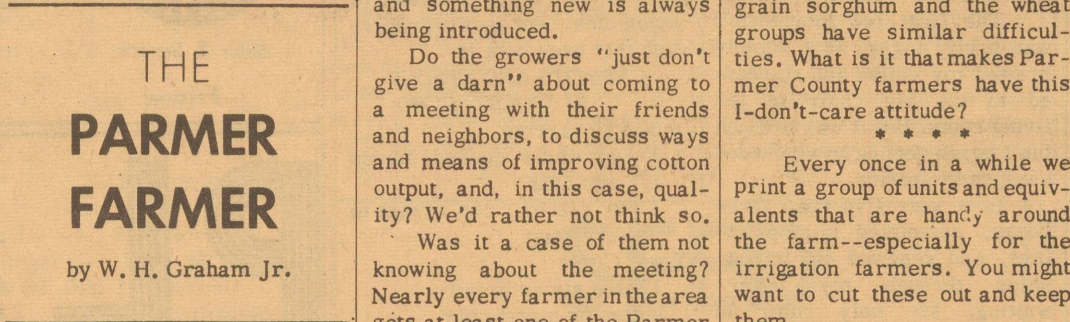
A crop planted May 20, for instance, won't likely be at a critical stage for water on the same days that a crop planted June 15 will be. In the case of large acreages of maize, and especially where water may be limited at peak use, this is important.

Farmers are talking about grain sorghum prospects, market-wise, and are concerned with the drastically lowered price supports, but the emphasis at the moment seems to be maximum output.

All kinds of gadgetry is being employed to increase yields. Narrow-row seeding is now common. Some farmers are even sowing broadcast, figuring they'll take their chances with the weeds in a crop they can't cultivate.

Naturally, fertilizer will figure

### THE PARMER FARMER

by W. H. Graham Jr.

We are proud of the Parmer County area in so many ways, but we wonder occasionally about some of our shortcomings. Why is it, for example, that when a program on cotton production such as was prepared and presented at the Hub last week, isn't better attended?

Do farmers feel they know all there is to know about growing, harvesting, and marketing cotton? Surely not. Do they think that they have already heard what the specialists in the various fields have to say? This could not be the case, either, for agricultural research is a dynamic subject,

and something new is always being introduced.

Do the growers "just don't give a darn" about coming to a meeting with their friends and neighbors, to discuss ways and means of improving cotton output, and, in this case, quality? We'd rather not think so.

Was it a case of them not knowing about the meeting? Nearly every farmer in the area gets at least one of the Parmer County newspapers. We didn't run any streamer headlines announcing the meeting, but we did use type this size:

### Cotton

... and it was two columns wide and two lines deep. Isn't that enough display to attract attention?

County Agent Joe Jones, who arranged for the meeting, was out of the county (in Italy, as a matter of fact), but his absence didn't prevent the speakers from bringing a really up-to-date program. That shouldn't have accounted for the apparent lack of interest.

The weather wasn't a factor. There weren't any more competing programs that night than is customary. Hub is centrally located. We are puzzled by things like this. Just what is the reason?

When we talk with farmers as to why they don't take advantage of a program such as this, we usually get an answer that goes this way: "Aw, I don't know, I just didn't get around to it."

What accounts for this disinterest—this lethargy? We really can't figure it out. As we look at other counties on the Plains where cotton is grown, we don't see a parallel to our own situation. Ordinarily whenever a meeting is held, and is one as well planned as this one was, a large group turns out.

## Big Rains Pelt Parts

Heavy rains, in a few cases measuring up to four inches, fell suddenly in isolated parts of the Parmer County area over the past week. The biggest spot reporting crop-damaging amounts was in the Lazbuddie area north of Muleshoe and up through Clay's Corner.

There, plantings were completely washed out and fields were cut through with run-off water when the skies unloaded in less than an hour's time. Some hail accompanied the storm, but it was mostly a case of washing from the rain.

This was Friday evening. Virtually all parts of the big Parmer farm territory got moisture either Thursday, Friday, or Saturday. A few got some Sunday rain. Hail at this time of the year is always a hazard, but so far it has not been wholesale.

Re-planting of some cotton has been in order for some farmers, but many are leaving the stands they have alone, hoping that the cotton will "pull out of it" and what they have left beats trying to re-plant at a late date.

Where from a quarter to three-quarters inch of rain fell, most farmers are happy. It didn't hurt—even helped—cotton prospects for many, and any rain at all is still good for the wheat.

About two-thirds of the area was in that quarter to three-quarters category.

**HAM LOAF**  
1 1/2 lbs. ground ham  
1 lb. ground beef  
2 eggs  
1 1/2 cups tomato juice or milk

1 cup fine cracker crumbs  
1 teaspoon onion salt  
1/8 teaspoon pepper  
1/8 teaspoon cloves  
2 teaspoon prepared mustard  
2 tablespoons honey  
1 tablespoon ketchup  
1 teaspoon lemon juice  
Combine ground ham and beef. Beat eggs with fork; add tomato juice, crumbs and seasonings. Add ground meats; mix thoroughly. Pack into a 9 1/2 by 5 1/4 greased loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) 30 minutes. Invert in shallow baking pan.

Mix honey, ketchup and lemon juice. Spoon over loaf. Bake 30 minutes more.

For a company meal you might like to serve with hot cherry sauce. To make the sauce, heat one (1 lb. 8 oz.) jar of cherry pie filling and serve hot over ham loaf slices.

Since both carrots and onions grow in Parmer County, we should add recipes to our collections that feature these two vegetables. One easy to prepare dish that uses both is

**CARROTS AND ONIONS IN TOAST CUPS**  
6 to 10 carrots  
1 cup whole cooked onions  
1/3 cup milk  
1 (10 1/2 oz.) can cream of celery soup

**Toast Cups:**  
12 thin slices bread  
butter or margarine  
Scrape carrots and cut in thin slices. Cook in 1" boiling water which has been salted about 15 minutes. Add cooked onions; heat. Drain. Add milk and soup. Stir carefully; bring to boiling point. Season.

Trim crust from bread slices; butter one side. Press 2 slices, buttered side up, into bottom of a six ounce custard cup, overlapping slices in bottom of cup. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) 15 minutes or until crisp and golden.

Heap carrots and onions in toast cups. Makes 6 servings.

## SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Outstanding soil and water conservation efforts by James Mabry, a cooperater in the Parmer County Soil Conservation District have resulted in his being named one of the 15 state winners in the third annual Conservation Picture Awards program co-sponsored by the Association of Texas

Soil Conservation Districts and the Great Southwest Life Insurance Company of Dallas. In choosing 15 state winners a statewide committee of judges considered his conservation achievements along with those of other farmers and ranchers who had received similar honors from many of Texas' 174 soil conservation districts.

The award, which will be presented to James next year is an 18 x 24 inch colored and framed aerial photograph of his farm. In coming months the photograph will be displayed along with those of the other winners at many state and regional agricultural events

including the Texas State Fair and the annual convention of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts.

**RUSSIAN COTTON**  
Russia increased its cotton yield last year as the result of better planting and harvesting methods, according to a Soviet announcement. Production last year was placed at 4,335,000 metric tons

compared with 4,210,000 metric tons in 1957. A metric ton is 2,204.6 pounds. Planting was largely by the "square cluster sowing method," and much of the crop was mechanically harvested.

### H. D. AGENT'S CORNER

Jimmie Lou Wainscott

The latest method for canning vegetables is a one-step cold-pack method, according to extension foods and nutrition specialists.

Directions are simple. . . As an example, take snap beans. Begin by washing all pint or quart jars in hot soapy water and rinse well. It is not necessary to sterilize jars since the pressure canner must be used in canning all non-acid vegetables.

Use only fresh, young, tender beans. The bean should just be beginning to form in the pod. Wash thoroughly, trim ends and cut into 1-inch pieces.

Thus far there is nothing different from the old method of canning snap beans. Now you will note that the fill is different. Pick raw beans tightly into clean jars to 1/2 inch of top. Cover with boiling water, again leaving 1/2 inch space at the top of the jar. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt to pints and 1 teaspoon to quarts.

Close jars with two-piece lid and place it in the pressure canner. Exhaust canner for 10 minutes, close petcock and process at 10 pounds pressure--pint jars 20 minutes, quart jars 25 minutes. Remove canner from heat, let pressure return

to zero and remove the jars. This new one-step method can also be used for canning fresh lima beans, carrots, cream style corn, whole kernel corn, black-eye peas and summer squash.

For further information check with your local home demonstration agent. You may also wish to ask for a copy of B-194, "Home Canning--Fruits and Vegetables."

Dripping is essential for smooth drying of cotton and rayons with a minimum-care finish, according to extension clothing specialists. For best results, lift the clothes from the rinse water after laundering. Hang smoothly on a hanger. Don't wring, twist or squeeze to remove water.

As the water drips off, it smooths out creases or wrinkles left from laundering. A final touch-up with the iron may be needed to make hems, seams and edges as smooth as new.

Some of the synthetic fibers, as dacron, also have this drip-dry quality. Clothes made of these synthetics will be wrinkle-free when dry only if lifted from the rinse water and hung with the least possible handling. The more they drip, the smoother they dry.

#### RHU/BARB CRUMBLE PUDDING

- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup butter or margarine

4 cups cut rhubarb  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 cup sugar  
1/8 teaspoon salt  
Sift together first 4 ingredients; cut or rub in butter or margarine until mixture is crumbly. Sprinkle half of flour mixture evenly over bottom of 8-inch square pan. Press down firmly. Cut rhubarb in 1-inch pieces, measure and mix with lemon juice, sugar and salt. Spread evenly over flour mixture in pan. Sprinkle remaining flour mixture evenly over rhubarb. Bake in 375 F. oven 45 to 50 minutes. Serve warm with cream. Serves 6.

### Household And Fashion Hints

Designed especially for a child's room is a small hooked rug with alphabet and toy motifs in bright red and blue. Next to the bed, the rug of sturdy cotton will keep small feet cozy and warm while a child is searching for his slippers.

On the first warm spring day, air your cotton inner-spring mattresses. Place them close to an open window or outside in the sunshine to restore freshness.

Bring out the luster of glazed cotton chintz by pressing it on the right side.

Chlorine type bleaches are safe for white wash-and-wear cottons unless the garment tag says otherwise. Bleach is never needed for colored fabrics.

If you leave your ironing board standing in the laundry room, make a gay printed cotton cover for it. Quilt the cover on top and trim it with a gathered 17-inch flounce. At the wide end of the board, add a pocket where you can store small items that need ironing.

Cotton ticking, in blue and white, red and white, or other color combinations, is becoming increasingly popular as a home decorating fabric. Interior designers find the cotton fabric easy to work with, inexpensive, and extremely decorative.

Perk up a winter-weary room with new cotton slipcovers for chairs and sofas. The covers will look fresh and springlike, and they're much cooler than regular heavy upholstery. The average sofa with the cushions requires about 22 yards of 36-inch material or 15 yards of 48 to 50-inch material. It's always a good idea to measure carefully the piece of furniture to be covered.

### Corner on Cotton BY BOB COLLINS

What does "competitive price" mean when we talk about cotton? . . . it doesn't necessarily mean a low price . . . but it does mean that cotton must be priced at a level where some other fiber can't be profitable used to displace it. . . and competitive price doesn't mean lower profits for the farmer, either . . . in fact, nearly everybody we talk to in the industry wants to see the farmer make more money so he'll stay interested in growing cotton . . . think what a blow

it would be to ginners, merchants, oil millers, warehousemen, spinners and weavers if all the cotton farmers switched to another crop . . . all these people are interested in seeing the farmer prosper, but nobody associated with cotton is going to prosper unless there is a growing consumption of raw cotton . . . there isn't going to be one unless cotton can do a job as good as any other fiber and as CHEAPLY.

#### COTTON VS. COTTON

Now what about U. S. growths competing with foreign cotton? . . . other items also enter the picture . . . there is certainty of supply and good shipments . . . both of these favor the U. S., but the subsidy that gets U. S. cotton down price-wise to meet foreign growths is subject to change . . . this may not favor American cotton . . . since we have announce

ced that our cotton will compete price-wise with foreign cotton and since we say that we will increase the subsidy whenever necessary, foreign buyers are wary . . . perhaps by holding off their buying of the U. S. cotton they can cause an increase in the subsidy and thus get the fiber cheaper . . . or they think, "what if I buy U. S. cotton at one price and the subsidy is increased? . . . I'll be stuck with a higher priced cotton than if I had waited

. . ." the trade feels that we should have a subsidy that gets our cotton into the competitive market, but also it should be a firm subsidy, not subject to increase during the season . . . while the subsidy CAN be increased, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has just said that it hopes improved textile conditions and world prices will allow a decrease . . . also, the subsidy has never been increased during a cotton season . . .

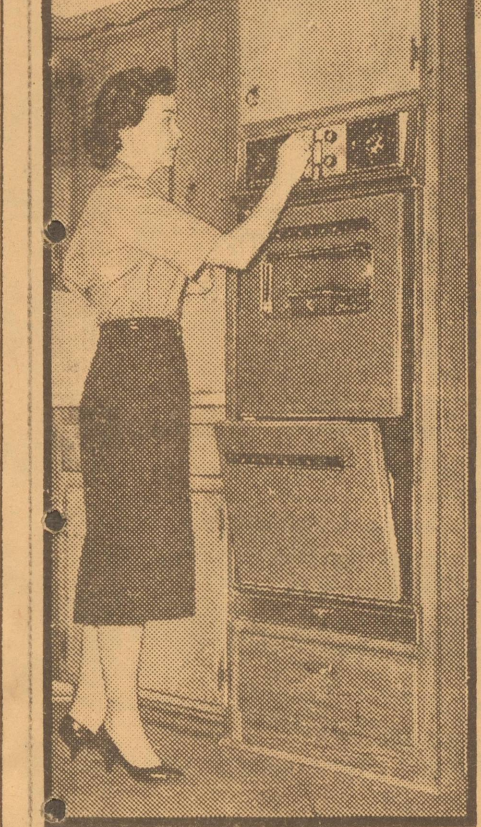
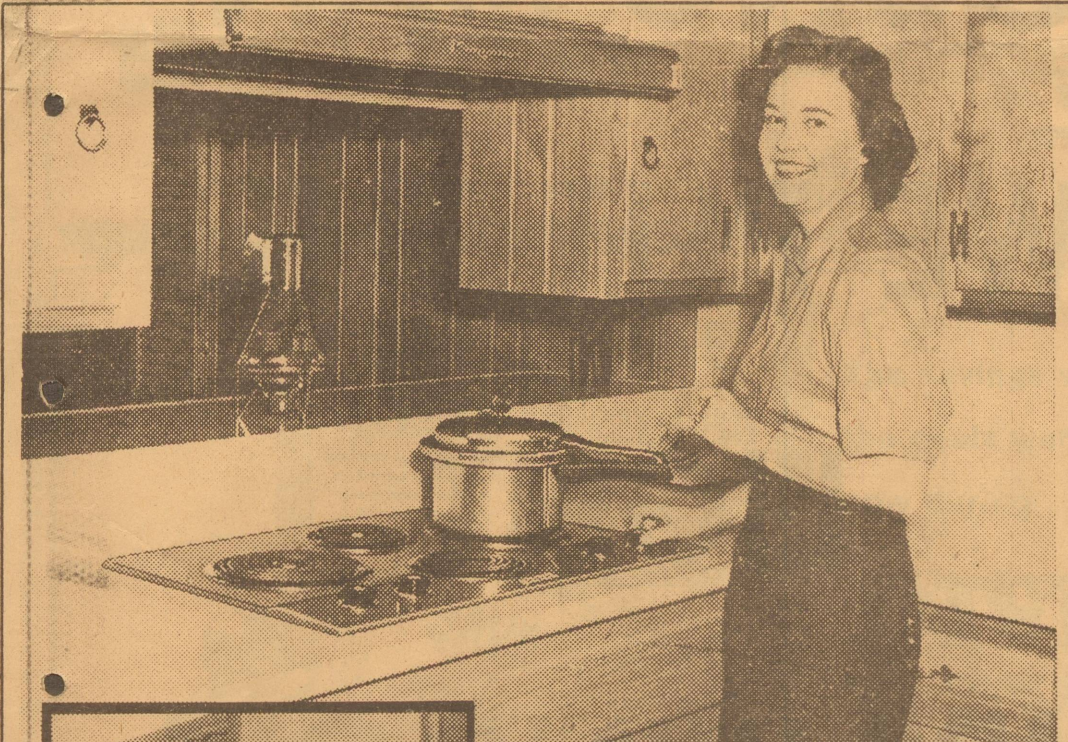

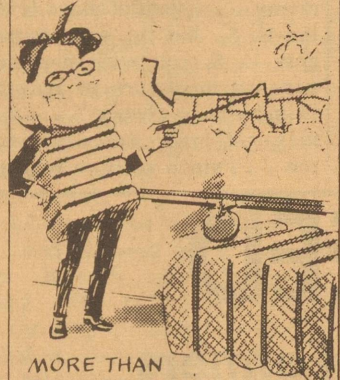
### Plans Made For 4-H Leadership Camp

### NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU

BY RAYMOND EULER

**FARM LABOR REGULATIONS:** The Department of Labor has announced in a letter that the tentative date for a hearing with regard to the proposed labor regulations as set for June 1, 1959, has been postponed and no new date has been fixed at this time. The letter further indicates that no regulations will be promulgated until after the public hearing. We believe this indicates there will be no new regulations effecting this year's farming operations, at least, Labor Secretary Mitchell was stymied, it appears, when opposition was as widespread as it was, to his proposal to put farmers under the same wage and hour laws as industry is under. Local, state and American Farm Bureau led the storm of protest with the cooperation of many retailers and others whose future depended on stopping the move.

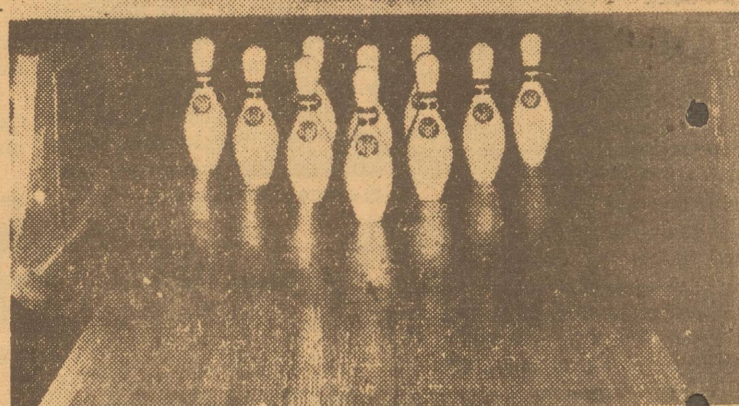
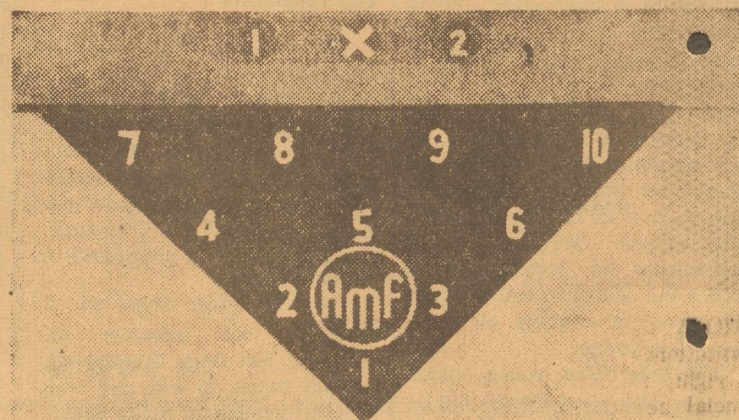

Cotton fertilizer tests in Arkansas showed highest yields occurred where nitrogen was applied at the rate of 60 pounds an acre on coarse and medium textured soils. Phosphorous and potassium, in combination with nitrogen, gave higher yields than nitrogen alone. Tests were conducted in Craighead, Crittenden, Lincoln, St. Francis, and Woodruff counties.

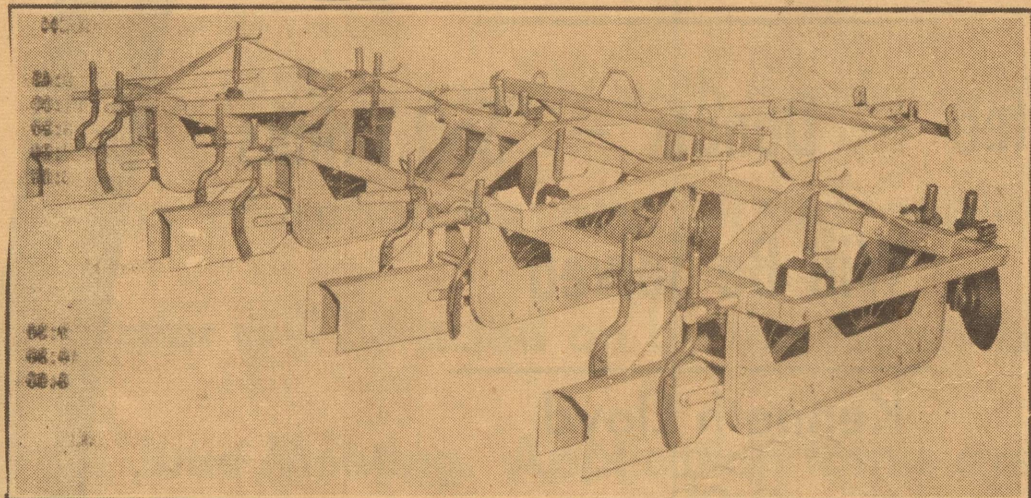

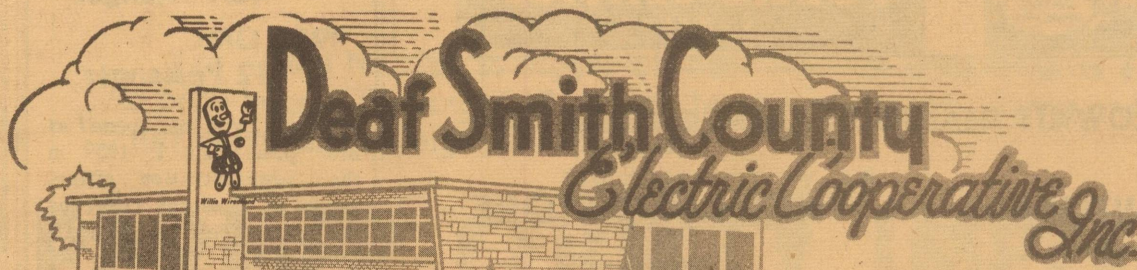

## 12 Parmer Licenses Suspended In 1959

The Department of Public Safety says 38,323 persons were listed as suspended in Texas during the year 1958.

Of the suspensions, 15,139 were suspended because of a conviction in court, of an offense making the suspension of their drivers license mandatory, such as; driving while intoxicated, driving while under the influence of drugs, aggravated assault with a motor vehicle, negligent homicide with a motor vehicle, murder with a motor vehicle, malice with a motor vehicle,

and driving while license suspended.

Another 23,184 were suspended because they had been involved in a motor vehicle accident in which \$100 or more property damage was sustained by any one person or in which someone had been injured or killed and the drivers and/or owners were not covered by liability insurance or had not filed proof of financial responsibility with the Department of Public Safety as required by law.

During 1958, there were 12 suspensions placed in effect on residents of Parmer County. Of these, one was for conviction in court requiring suspensions of drivers licenses and 11 were for failure to show proof of financial responsibility after being involved in an accident reportable under Safety Responsibility Law.

The suspensions do not include persons convicted in court or those involved in accidents, who filed acceptable proof of financial responsibility during the year.

There are three methods of showing proof of financial responsibility for suspensions resulting from convictions; they are:

1. A certificate of motor vehicle liability insurance (Form SR-22).
2. A bond in the amount of \$15,000 signed by two persons owning real estate equal in value to at least twice the amount of such bond.
3. A certificate of deposit of money or securities with the State Treasurer in the amount of \$15,000.

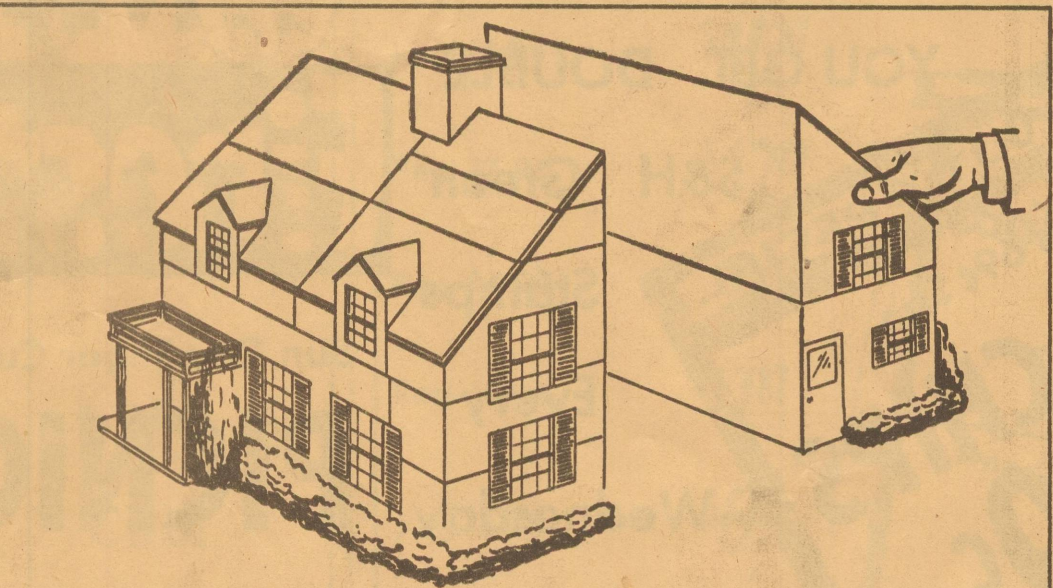
