MONOPOLIES

Now that the price of crude rubber has gone down to about half the cost of production, East India growers who rejoiced in a government-backed monopoly find their monopolistic profits wiped out. The loss is not merely transient. They find also vast rubber plantations being developed in Africa, Brazil and the Philippines, which in the future will hold down the profits they might have enjoyed without any monopoly if they had not forced this defensive competition. It is coming to be an old story, so quickly is the lesson learned in one industry. Will other industries take this lesson to heart? Will Brazil drop its export restrictions on coffee, and Cuba its artificial control of sugar production? If they do not, sooner or later the monopolistic coffee and sugar planters will find themselves in the plight of the rubber planters. Backed by American millions looking for profitable investment, the law of supply and demand still operates.

FUNNY FRENCH

An American actor, once famous as a humorous film actor, recently in vaudeville, returns from a foreign tour with an interesting story. His vaudeville act was a failure in Paris. He started in studying the French language. He studied day and night until he mastered a vocabulary of 1,000 French words. Then, having the words to express his jokes, he achieved a "whirlwind success." It sounds grand, and the moral lesson will not be lost upon a generation that worships success. However, if we know actors and audiences, it wasn't the jokes but the French that made the hit. Complete ignorance of a language isn't funny. Half-knowledge or quarter-knowledge is. So childlike is the normal grown up that there's nothing funnier to him than to hear his language solemnly misspoken by an alien.

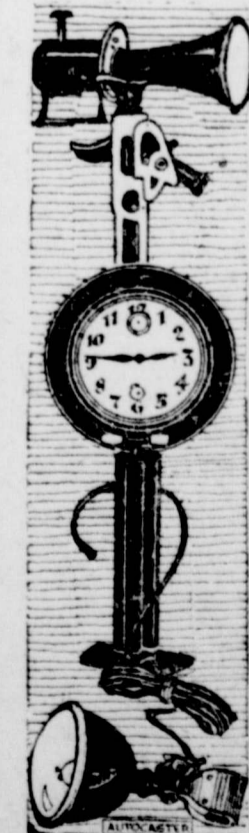

Figures in Famous Crime Cases Take Prison Punishment Calmly As They Do Their Daily Duties

CANON CITY, Colo., April 24.—Once riding on the pomp and power of social and financial attainment, numerous inmates of the Colorado penitentiary now make their solitary way among the eleven hundred or more comrades ever saying to themselves, "If I had only gone straight." Like gray, living ghosts they pass from one hall to another on their daily, simple round of duty, either in the canning factory, the garden, or some other department of the prison. Ninety per cent of the prisoners work.

As Warden F. E. Crawford walked through the "big house" here, with a group of visitors on a tour of the penal institution, he saw Don Hogan, once the prince of Denver's automobile dealers. Hogan now serves as a night watchman, ever on the lookout for fire, the very thing that caused him to be sent to prison. He was convicted of arson for setting fire to his garage and saleroom in "automobile row," in Denver.

Is Coming Back
The gleam that shines from the center of the gray ring around his eyes seems to say, "I'm coming back some day" for he is a model prisoner, ever willing to bear his share of prison duty burden.

"He serves a lifetime every day," said the warden as the visiting party passed by Harold Henwood. Henwood is serving a lifetime sentence for spreading terror in the ballroom of a fashionable Denver hotel with a six gun. "Wine, women and son were his downfall."

"Hello, Mike," said Warden Crawford as he walked into the prison curio shop. Who should

be addressing but Mike Rossi, the hale and hearty fellow who is serving a life of hell for shooting his wife, Caroline, to death in a Denver lawyer's office. Mike was one of the leaders of a Denver-Chicago rum ring, and who owned a road house near Denver that had a long history of police raids and liquor brawls. He is now in charge of the sales slips in the curio shop.

"Mike is in charge of the sales slips made out by the prisoners because all the men here know he is honest," said the Warden. "Mike can be trusted."

The Robin Hood of the prison is "Slippery Dell" Hanlon, doing life after a sensational career of breaking jail doors. He is listed as a waiter, and carries a tray in the prison eating house. Dell looks warmly into the distance in sheer hope that a magpie someone will get him a parole before death comes. His mouth is sunken and his eyes are dark, testimony of the mental suffering he is enduring, but his spirits are always high.

Juggling Trays
Louis Seiner, a recent arrival at the pen for taking his Denver friends out of a sizeable fortune through a lunco game, now juggles a tray between the kitchen and the dining room at the prison. As a crony to Seiner in the prison waiter business in Adolph Nordloh, "sent up" for shooting his hired man during a quarrel over a 75 cent piece of lumber. These two men are taking their imprisonment more to heart than

any others in the place, with the exception of Henwood.

Walter V. Eeber, former Denver banker, now checks bills of lading in the prison cannery shipping department. D. Morton Roll spends most of his time dodging blows from his fellow prisoners, said the warden. Roll formerly taught a Sunday school class, but was convicted of victimizing women. He and his fellow mates do not agree on any subject.

Quite apart from this picture, was the one in the prison insane asylum, Genkvo Mitsunaga a Japanese, has spent most of his time since his imprisonment in 1910, saying over and over "Me no do it, me no do it." He was convicted of murder.

KING VIDAR'S "THE CROWD" IMMORTALIZES THE WEST

King Vidar has immortalized the vast middle class, their hopes, triumphs, joy and tears in "The Crowd," showing at the Palace theater today, and which has been Vidar's pet idea for a motion picture ever since the filming of his "The Big Parade." Critics who have seen "The Crowd" pronounce it to be as great in its way as the war picture. It is a slice out of everyday life great in its realism and its truth. There isn't a character in it any bigger than a petty official in a large business firm, yet the scenes teem with drama, heart throbs and human interest. A large cast was required to film it, including a mob of extras larger than any ever before used for any but a war picture. Scenes were built on a lavish scale, one of them being a reproduction of famous Coney Island. Other scenes, including one using Niagara Falls, were taken on the original locations. Easner Boardman and James Murray head a noteworthy cast. The story was written by Dictator Vidar and took more than a year in making.

GOOD WEATHER INDICATED FOR G.O.P. POW WOW

KANSAS CITY, April 24.—If weather records for the past twenty years may be taken as a fair indication, delegates to the Republican national convention, opening here June 12, need have little fear of an uncomfortable season. According to P. Connor, local government weather observer, the average temperature for the week of June 12 for the last two decades in Kansas City, has been 74 degrees. The average maximum position of the mercury for the period was 84 degrees and the minimum 65. Rainfall, on the other hand, according to records of the observer's office, has been quite plentiful during the week, it having descended on five days between June 12 and 19 last year. Only four times, however, during the last decade, has a single rainfall amounted to as much as one inch, Mr. Connor said. There will be no moonlight nights during the convention. The moon becomes full June 3, and the last

quarter ends June 11. The next new moon is June 17.

Scientist Sees World Machinery-Driven Modern Utopia

Mechanical Engineering Professor of Oxford Predicts Day Will Come When Man Will Triumph Over Work

LONDON, April 24. — Visions of the time when the world will be a modern Utopia driven by machinery were unfolded by Professor F. W. Burstall, professor of mechanical engineering in the students' meeting at Oxford.

Professor Burstall predicted the day will come when man will triumph over work, when manual workers will toil only five hours a day, and when domestic service will be a thing of the past.

"Man is always greater than the machine," he said. "Mankind will never in any circumstances allow itself to be mastered by mere blind mechanism, as some modern schools of thought have prophesied.

Laziness is Reason
"Laziness is the reason for all the remarkable mechanical developments. The human frame is quite incapable of any serious labor. Humanity has been struggling to provide other means of doing the work which it wants to do, and that is the bottom of the idea of the mechanical worker or robot. The human worker is not really a working agent at all; it really is a directing mechanism.

"Domestic service is going to be non-existent in the future. I look forward to seeing a comparatively simple form of dwelling, warmed and lighted as they are today, provided probably with clear, purified air, and with such simplicity that it will only be a matter of a few moments to remove the dirt and other substances which we bring in during the day.

"Science is going to cut down the hours of labor. I venture to think that within a generation hard manual labor will be reduced to five or six hours daily. This is sure to come.

Heaven on Earth

"Science is going to put into our hands the possibility of a heaven upon earth. There are no limits to what we can do, but I venture to think that unless the human makes up its mind which way it wants to go, then instead of being pleasant this will be a curse."

In Professor Burstall's opinion, once labor has been cut down to the minimum, there will be more time for amusement, with the result that a definite and systematic instruction in amusement and leisure will have to be prepared.

In this modern Utopia of his, the roads will be built so that automobile traffic will be able to proceed at speeds of 70 to 80 miles an hour, and the pedestrian will have his own road so that he can walk about without fear of being knocked down.

ARMORED RUM SHIPS IN CANADA

OTTAWA, Canada, April 24. — The statement was made in parliament yesterday that armored rum running vessels are prepared to enter the illicit trade off the United States coast. Miss Agnes MacPhail asked the government if its attention had been drawn to the report of five steel, armored rum running ships which were prepared to set out from Port Dover for the United States. W. D. Euler, minister of national revenue, replied that since the undertaking was an American one, he saw no effort in it to violate Canadian laws.

SECRETARIES MEET CALLED EARLY IN MAY

BROWNWOOD, April 24.—The next quarterly meeting of the Heart of Texas chamber of commerce secretaries association will be held in Brownwood May 3, and the principal matter for consideration will be the question of arranging for a special "Heart of Texas" day, on which the towns included in this district may attend the West Texas chamber of commerce convention in a body, according to a statement by the executive committee of the organization after a meeting held here Thursday afternoon.

The executive committee met for the purpose of selecting the date and place and arranging the program for the next quarterly session. Members present were: J. D. Morley, Ballinger; S. O'Neal, Coleman; Carl Blasig, Brady; and H. Burks, Brownwood. Ballinger and Coleman had both asked for the honor of entertaining the association at its next meeting, but owing to the importance of the meeting and the question to be acted upon, the committee decided that it should be held in Brownwood, as most accessible to the representatives of all the seventeen counties in the district. as sure as the growing of a seed to its full fruition. The master makes this known through the parables which form the basis of this paper. Through them he shows us the manner of the establishment of the Kingdom, the obstacles of its growth, and assures us of the certainty of the harvest.

"First, we will consider the manner of the establishment of the kingdom. In these brief words he implies three things, first, the seed, second, the place and third, the manner of sowing.

"Jesus tells us the Word is the seed of the Kingdom. In other places it is called the gospel of the Kingdom, the work of God or simply the gospel. We ought to have faith in it, and believe it has power resident within itself to produce the fruit of its kind. Every good seed is a germ of life. Now if we examine this seed of the Kingdom the word of God, we will find at its very heart the power to produce life. We have but to preach it and teach it and live it in order that it produce life of its kind. The only defense it needs is the proclamation of its truth.

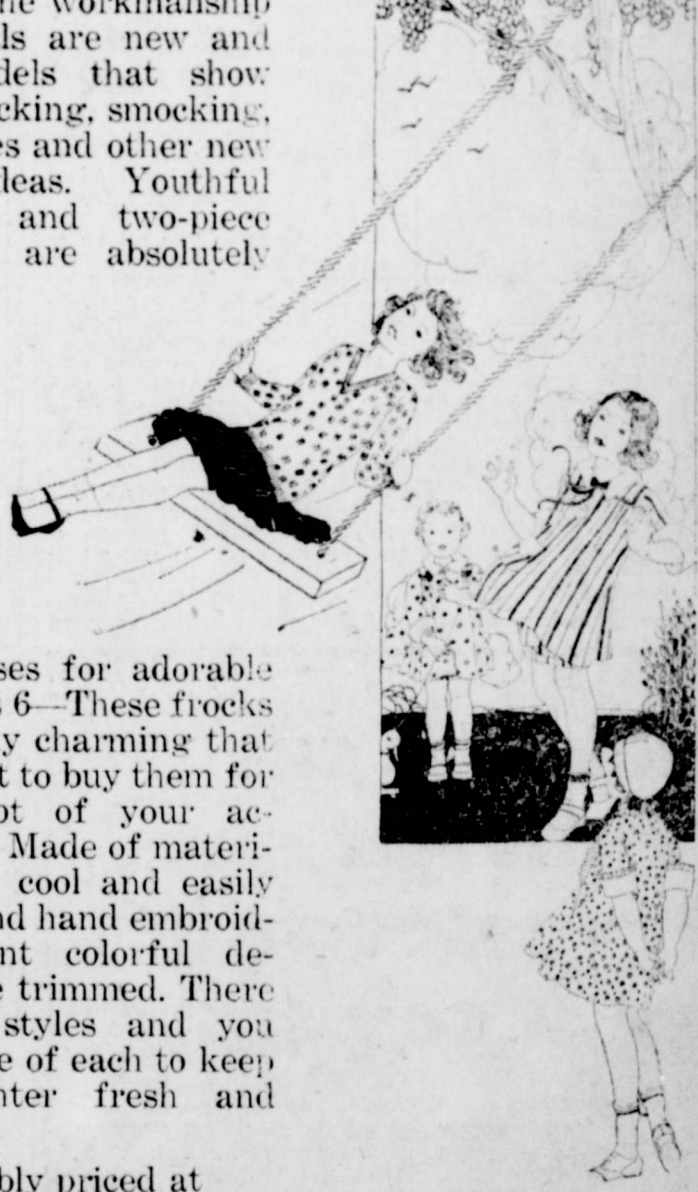
