CATTLE RAISERS POOL.—Members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' association in future will ship their cattle to market on a cooperative marketing basis. The stock will be pooled and marketed through a Chicago association with which arrangements have been made. The pooling agreement followed a committee investigation of live stock sales in Texas, which resulted in a recommendation for co-operative marketing.

RESTRICTS OIL OUTPUT.—To keep down over-production in the Winkler county oil fields, the Texas railroad commission will restrict the output to 150,000 barrels daily, which will be prorated among the producers. The rule is to become effective May 5. The production has been running close around 253,000 barrels daily. Drilling will be restricted to one well for every ten acres in a field. Litigation is threatened and is expected. The action of the commission was for the protection of the oil industry of the county and the state, the producers having been unable to agree among themselves. Should the action of the railroad commission be sustained by the courts, it is fairly probable that in time restricted production of oil and gas may be enforced throughout the state as an economic conservation policy.

EAST TEXAS CONVENTION.—Fifty thousand visitors are expected to attend the second annual convention of the East Texas chamber of commerce at Greenville, May 6-8, and that city is making arrangements to entertain that number. Every town within the East Texas territory will be represented, and large delegations of business men are expected from cities outside the state. Twenty bands have already entered the band contest and many more are expected. A feature will be a thousand-piece band in concert. The Greenville convention will demonstrate to the satisfaction of every one that the East Texas chamber of commerce is filling a needed place in the development of a vast section of Texas that has awakened to a realization of the fact that organized effort is the first essential to the best development of any territory, however attractive and resourceful it may be.

CITY PLANNING NEEDED.—Editor Stein of the Brownsville Herald is urging every Valley city to send at least one representative to the National City Planning conference at Dallas, May 7-10. He wants these to go "prepared to assimilate all knowledge possible on city planning and the provisions the average city should make for future growth and development. This columnist would extend Editor Stein's suggestion to every city and village in Texas, and would recommend that each place send as many representatives as possible. One small head can't assimilate a great part of what will be presented at that conference. City planning is a matter that needs cooperative headwork and united action.

PANHANDLE EGG MARKET.—That man Frank Eaton, county agent at Lubbock, is never satisfied to rest even a short while after putting over a big thing. He has recently made a huge success in the way of creating interest in a large section around Lubbock, and now he is starting an organization of poultry raisers, in eight neighboring counties, for co-operative marketing. It is a safe guess that Eaton will put it over in just the right way and that the poultry raisers will be the gainers.

DEMOCRATIC DIFFERENCES.—Cullen F. Thomas, political sage of Dallas, says that there are no great differences between those in Texas who call themselves Constitutional Democrats and those who call themselves Texas Democrats, that "the uproar is a typhoon in a teapot over non-essentials," and that really there is nothing to fight about. If Mr. Thomas had ever been in the newspaper business he would see that there is much to fight over and that the main struggle has been on the part of certain political leaders and would-be leaders to get and hold front-page positions in the newspapers. Simply that, and little more.

DRY ICE REFRIGERATION.—Now we are to have dry ice. A \$2,000,000 company has been organized, with headquarters at Dallas, to build ten plants to manufacture carbon dioxide ice with a temperature of 114 degrees below zero with about 30 times the quantities of ordinary ice. The product is a great boon to handshippers, and markets hitherto any Texas pro-

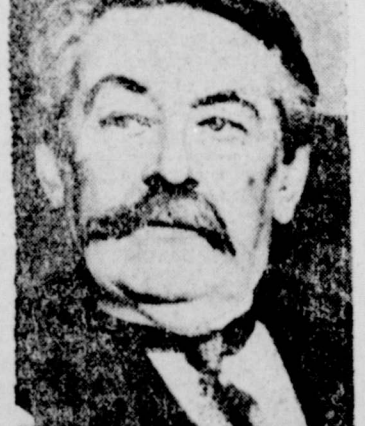
SURVEY CREWS WILL PREPARE RIGHT OF WAY

Cisco and Eastland counties are the chairman of the West coast precinct, and A. B. O'Flaherty, chairman of the East Cisco precinct. The two precincts will elect 15 delegates—Eleven from West Cisco and four from Cisco.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 28.—The house unanimously adopted a resolution today authorizing President Coolidge to confer the Distinguished Flying Cross on the crew of the trans-Atlantic plane, Von Huenfeld, Koehl and Fitzmaurice.

POLISH FLIERS BELIEVED OFF FOR AZORES

PARIS, April 28.—Major Louis Isikowsky and Major Casimir Kapula, Polish aviators, hopped off from the Le Bourget airfield at 5 o'clock this morning ostensibly on a test flight preparatory to a contemplated trans-Atlantic attempt. It was rumored after they had started, that they were started on their first trans-Atlantic hop. It was believed they had headed for the Azores islands.

TWO HIJACKERS ROB MAN NEAR WEATHERFORD

FORT WORTH, April 28.—C. E. Lewis, produce distributor, was hijacked of \$100 near Weatherford this morning when returning from a West Texas business trip. Two men are said to be involved in the attack. They are being sought. Descriptions of the pair have been broadcast.

F. P. PIERCE SLIGHTLY HURT; STRUCK BY CAR

F. P. Pierce, proprietor of the paint and paper store on D avenue, was slightly injured when struck by a car at the intersection of E avenue and Seventh street, about the noon hour Saturday. Pierce was in the street at the time with his attention directed elsewhere, and failed to see the approaching car until run down. He stated his injuries were not serious, though he was badly bruised on the right thigh, where the fender of the car struck him. He also received a bruise on his nose that is proving rather painful. Mr. Pierce stated the car was driven by a young girl, apparently about 15 years of age, but he did not know the girl.

SPEED DEMON MET HIS DEATH



Frank Lockhart, speed auto racer, met his death at Daytona Beach, Fla., when the Stutz Blackhawk, which he was tuning up for a record try, somersaulted. Mrs. Lockhart was at the trials and the fatal car dove nearly to where her auto was parked before stopping. Light construction in the front end of the Stutz is thought to have allowed the car to get out of control.

Texas and Pacific Railroad Needs Big Water Supply From Lake Cisco For Use at Baird, Abilene, is Claimed

"The Texas & Pacific wants Cisco Lake water," said C. P. Cole, station agent for the company in Cisco. "J. W. Knightlinger, of Fort Worth superintendent for the western division of the Texas & Pacific, was in Cisco Friday conferring with Mayor Williamson and the city commissioners when arrangements were perfected for taking a total of 30 tank cars of water daily for the railroad uses at Baird and Abilene. This will necessitate running a special water train every day out of Cisco for Baird and Abilene. The Texas & Pacific will load out about 510,000 gallons of water daily from Lake Cisco. Each of the cars has a capacity of about 19,000 gallons.

"The arrangements for this extra water will in no wise affect the local water service as there is plenty of water in Lake Cisco to meet this additional demand. The loading schedule is so arranged that it will be at a minimum. In case of local fires the loading racks are to be immediately cut off and remain closed till notified by the fire chief that the blaze has been extinguished. Loading out this water will in no way operate detrimentally to the fire department.

"The dry conditions that continue to prevail in West Texas, coupled with the fact that the road is doing the largest volume of business in its history, creates such an emergency on the Rio Grande division that this extra water supply is made necessary," Agent Cole said.

Speaking of the water already loaded out of Cisco for uses on the western division, Mr. Cole said that since the road first began taking Lake Cisco water, about the middle of January, 986 tank cars, of 10,200 gallons capacity, have been loaded out. Reduce to gallons this equals about ten and one-half million gallons of water that Cisco has furnished the road. Up to midnight Thursday there had gone out 105 cars in April; 366 cars in March; 210 in February, and 105 in January after the fifteenth of that month.

99-YEAR TERM GIVEN RATLIFF BRINGS SMILE

Marshall Ratliff, the Sant Claus bandit of the First National bank robbery, staged in Cisco December 23, drew a sentence of 99 years on conviction by a jury in the 104th district court at Anson late Friday afternoon for murder in connection with the death of George W. Carmichael, Cisco police officer, who was mortally wounded during the bank raid.

Reports from Anson stated that Ratliff greeted the verdict with a smile, the first emotion he had displayed during the trial of the case. The jury reached a decision after nearly 22 hours deliberation having been given the case last Thursday night, and the verdict was returned at 5:20 Friday afternoon. Twenty-one ballots were required before the verdict was reached, the first ballot standing five for the death penalty and seven for life sentence. Already under a 99 year sentence after conviction in Eastland county for robbery with firearms, and a sentence of death at Abilene for the murder of G. E. (Bit) Bedford by a jury in the 104th district court, this sentence makes one of the most drastic ever pronounced on a defendant in West Texas.

FROG STORY IS FAKE DECLARES HERPATOLOGIST

ST. LOUIS, April 28.—Declaring that the famed Texas horned toad is a young specimen, not more than two or three years old, Dr. Forre H. Staley, president of the St. Louis Herpetology society, brands the story of it being entombed 31 years as false.

The toad is on exhibition at Forest Park here. "Life cannot go on without food and water," Dr. Staley said. "The specimen probably would not live more than a few hours sealed up in a concrete slab."

George E. Dieckman, president of the zoological society which had the toad brought here, is convinced of the claims of its owner, William M. Wood, that the toad had been sealed for more than 30 years in the corner store of the Eastland, Texas, court house.

A HEROIC FEAT

The flight of Wilkins and Eielson over the Arctic Ocean is one of the greatest flying feats yet accomplished. Done without any blare of trumpets, it tirs the imagination of those who possess that divine acuity, as not half a dozen flights in the whole history of aviation have done. These men, starting from laska for Spitzbergen, over the frozen wastes while inter still prevailed in that vast dead space, hardly expected to reach their goal. They knew that the lightest mishap meant death. They were reconciled to that fate, and sought no help, no rescue, in case of failure. They seemed to have had little or no consideration for glory or profit. Theirs was the lure of science and high adventure. They made good. They made very good. It may be long before civilization has an opportunity to look at them and learn their experience at first hand, and show them the honor due. They may miss their actual deserts. And they probably will not care. Flying honors fly thick nowadays. It was a strange coincidence that this polar flight should occur almost the same moment as the westward Atlantic flight, and the two should turn out so nearly alike. In such a case the nearer, more accessible heroes get the lion's share of welcome and praise. The Atlantic flyers, no doubt, deserve their meed of glory. But imagination flits up to the icy, storm-tossed seas that Wilkins and Eielson crossed, in the boldest of all Arctic flights, and judgment may pronounce their flight superior in science and navigation, if not in courage, to the Irish-Newfoundland flight that focuses the world's attention.

POLITICS AND BUSINESS

People were worried for a while about this being a "presidential year," and so presumably a bad business year, though records show little basis for such pessimistic tradition. Happily the sentiment is changing. The bull movement in stocks shows how great the change is. Securities would not be run up as they have been doing unless the buyers expect good times. It is evident that the public expects prosperity after election, if not before. And this expectation, be it noted, preceded even the presidential primaries. People don't know who's going to be elected—not even who's going to be nominated. But apparently it doesn't make a great deal of difference to them. They're satisfied that whoever is destined to be the next president, he won't hurt American prosperity.

BRECKENRIDGE PROPOSES TAX FOR MUNICIPAL BAND

BRECKENRIDGE, April 28. A petition signed by more than 200 Breckenridge citizens has been presented to the city commission asking that an election to vote a tax not exceeding one mill for the support of the high school band be called for the near future. Only a half mill tax would be necessary to take care of the finances of the band, however, it was stated, such a tax supplying \$3,000 annually. The Breckenridge high school is one of the few schools in the state which has a school supported band. The school board this year has announced that the school would not be able to bear the cost of maintaining the band on the present basis. The Buckaroo band will compete in the West Texas chamber of commerce convention contests again this year. The convention takes place in Fort Worth.

NEGRO RAILWAY CLERK IS HELD FOR MAIL ROBBERY

TEXARKANA, April 28.—Isaac J. Hughes, negro railway mail clerk for the Louisiana and Arkansas railway, operating between Vidalia, La. and Hope, Ark., was ordered held for the Federal grand jury today, being charged with robbing the mails. He was jailed in default of \$2,000 bonds. Hughes was caught through decoy letters.

AGED ALICE MAN KILLED WHILE RIDING IN BOX CAR

VICTORIA, April 28. — G. R. Craft, sixty years old, of Alice was killed at Vanderbilt today when a box car door slammed shut, crushing his head. Craft was riding on a freight car of the Missouri Pacific railroad. His body was shipped to Alice late this afternoon.

AIRPORT IS AID TO CITIES, SAYS NOTED EXPERT

PITTSBURGH, April 28.—The time is not far off when a city without an excellent airport will be as badly handicapped as a present-day town with no railroad connections.

That was the prediction made by Anthony H. G. Fokker, internationally known designer of aircraft, air pilot and prophet of progress, while visiting this city to testify in a case involving aircraft patents.

"Air transportation is developing so rapidly that many cities will be entirely out of the picture as far as having a part in national aviation lines if immediate steps are not taken to start something in the right direction," he asserted.

It is no dim and misty future, Fokker referred to, it is a condition which he foresees for the immediate future. Already aviation would be in much more general use if suitable landing places were provided, he believes.

Cities Must Get Busy

In another two years the major aviation lines from north to south and east to west will be established so fast has aviation moved forward," he said.

"The city that does not busy itself and provide terminal and landing facilities will find itself left off of these main routes and will have committed a blunder which will prove an increasing handicap as the years go by."

Mail and passengers will make up by far the greatest bulk of the cargoes for the air liners of the future, but here again, he asserted, the first steps must be taken by the cities.

Government and private aviation enterprises are continually being extended but must have adequate terminal facilities. These must be provided by the cities before they can expect to find themselves placed on proposed routes.

Picking the Port

"The selection of an airport does not hinge so greatly on the distance the port is from the destination point but on the length of time necessary to reach the port," Fokker explains.

"If there is a fast mail or speed-boat service that will permit the lead to be reached in 10 to 15 minutes, that is all that is required."

Cities with the foresight to provide landing fields aviation terminals which appear ridiculous in the light of present air requirements, need never fear that there will be a surplus of such facilities, he said.

The time is coming when all that are available will be used and when air field space will be at a greater premium than auto parking space in the metropolitan districts of cities today.

The money is to be used to build a high school building. L. L. Blackburn, president of the school board, informs a reporter of The Star that there were a number of bidders for the bonds.

FARMERS IN KANSAS SEEK RABBIT TRADE

SPIVEY, Kansas, April 28.—So great is the eastern demand for rabbit meat, and for the fur of the small animals, that farmers in this section of the country have developed something more than a hobby of catching and killing them. In their wholesale slaughter, a twofold purpose is gained; a huge demand is supplied, and much crop damage eliminated, for the "cotton tails" are a constant menace to many varieties of plant life.

John Johnson, a farmer near here, began several years ago shipping rabbit meat to market. Shot traps were used to kill them at first, but that method proved entirely too expensive. Then a small net was employed for catching the animals. The net grew in size until now Johnson owns a net large enough to circle an eight acre tract.

Estimated cost of the net is \$2,500. The obstacle is made of heavy cord and reaches three feet from the ground, with steel stakes every few feet to hold it up.

After the trap is set, a half dozen men on horses ride through the fields dragging a long chain which scares the rabbits into the net. Sometimes the bunnies hurt themselves into the tight cords with such force as to break their necks. The rabbits are prepared on the ground and placed in crates ready for shipment.

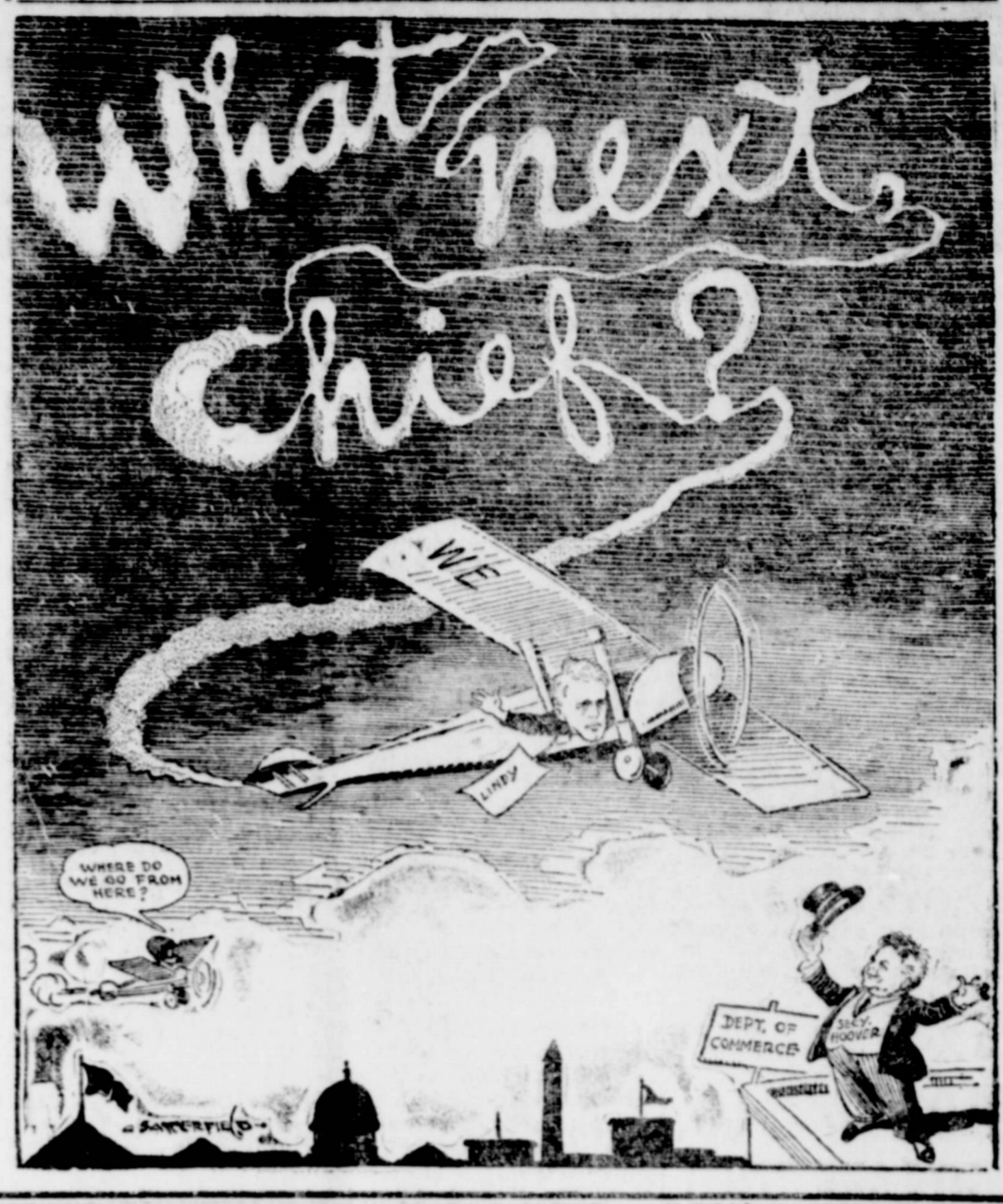
Farmers, generally, are glad to have the animals exterminated for when they are plentiful they often do as much damage to crops as all insect life put together.

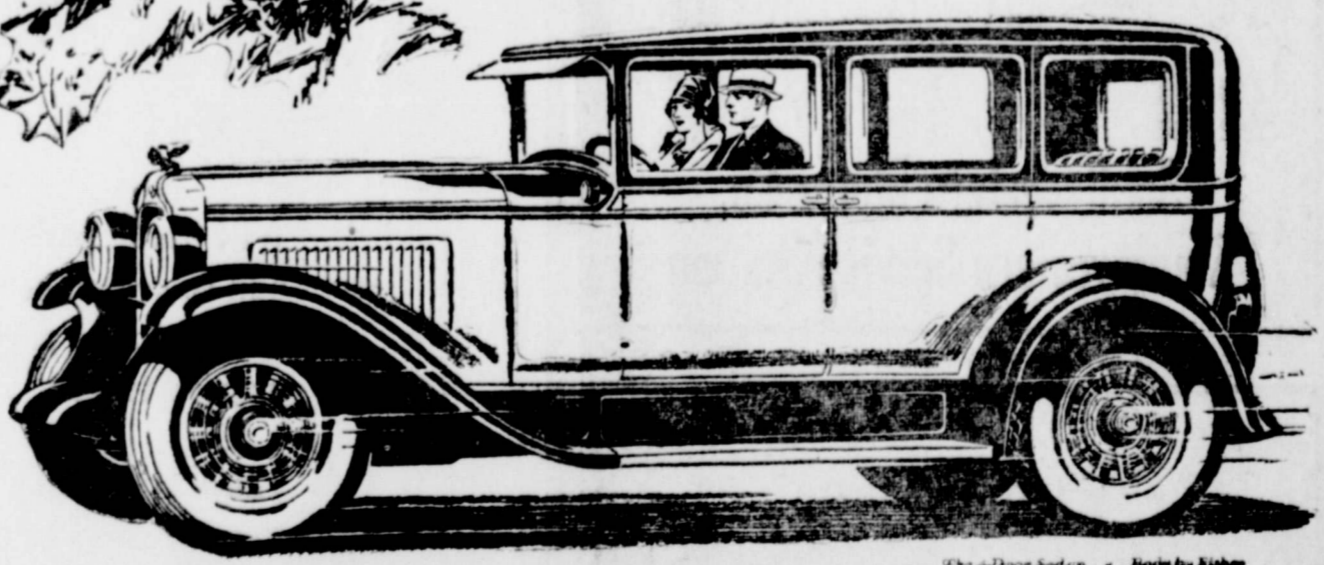

BRITAIN SEEKS SOLUTION FOR MINE TROUBLES

(Editor's Note—This is the second of a series of three articles on the British coal mining situation.)

By CHARLES A. SMITH

LONDON, April 28. — Scores of theories are being advanced by experts for the reasons for the present parlous state of the British coal fields.

Many of them undoubtedly are unsound, although there is little doubt that the majority of the reasons propounded are contributing factors to a situation which many agree is approaching catastrophic dimensions.

On the one hand it is declared that mismanagement of the mines, indifferent and archaic selling methods, and fierce foreign competition, are the main reasons for the situation as it exists today. On the other, there are many who profess to see in the present condition of affairs the natural result of years of intensive working of the mines.

Mines Worked Out
It is pointed out that some of the principal mines are nearly 200 years old, and practically worked out, and that coal is found so far from the pit head that getting it to the surface is an uneconomical proposition.

In the view of another school of thought, principally the Socialists, it is the present system of affairs, whereby the mines are owned by individual persons, that is wrong. Nationalism, according to this group, with pooling of resources and a central selling system would materially contribute to the putting of the industry upon its feet again.

It is realized on every hand that the prosperity of the British mining industry depends, in the main, on its export trade. This trade has been lost by the British coal owners through several causes; the world war, frequent stoppages caused by strikes and lockouts, increased coal production in foreign countries, and the increased use of oil and electricity.

With a view to getting this trade back again, the government has been approached by several influential deputations from the mining areas in recent weeks. These deputations have urged the lowering of freight and distributing costs and government subsidies in the hope of meeting the cheaper priced foreign coal.

Remedies Offered
Other schemes for rejuvenating the industry include the regulation of output, the fixing of minimum prices for different classes of coal, and the closing of unprofitable collieries. All of these schemes have their adherents and opponents.

On the whole, it would seem that the only hope for the industry is through central organization and control. Production last winter only just exceeded 5,000,000 tons a week. No improvement either in the home or foreign trade has been perceptible, and with the usual summer and fall consumption the total output for the year is likely to be several million tons less than last years, which was an entirely disastrous one for the industry.

Recent Shackelford Producers of Interest to Cisco Oil Men; Gilman & McMurray Get Gasser

Developments of prominence of special interest to Cisco oil men is the big gasser recently brought in on the Matthews ranch, in Shackelford county, by the Petroleum Producers corporation, designated as the Matthews No. 2. This well is an offset of the Matthews No. 1, completed earlier in the week for 620 barrels of oil and 2,500,000 cubic feet of wet gas. Max Elser, Cisco oil man, owns one-half interest in the royalty of this production, which adds to an already neat income from wells drilled in the Matthews pool.

Reports from the field state that the Matthews No. 2 drilled by the E. M. Treat Oil & Gas Co., has just touched the sand and produced 100 barrels in 10 hours. This is another well in which Elser is interested, and in the revenue of which he will participate.

The Davis No. 1, completed by Gilman & McMurray, of Cisco, in the Shackelford field, is making 900,000 cubic feet of gas and some oil. Following is the scout report for Shackelford county:

CISCO MUSICAL CLUB PREPARES FOR CONCERT

A musical program is being outlined and prepared for presentation here Sunday afternoon, May 6, by the Cisco Music Study club at the Presbyterian church in observance of the first day of national music week which is to start on that day. The program will be comprised of old and familiar hymns which have been written by American composers. The program will be directed by the Rev. B. C. Boney, Dr. G. C. Morris will be at the organ.

More than a doubling of the extent of the National Music Week in the four years of its existence is shown by figures just made public by the National Music Week committee. These indicate that 1,614 cities and towns participated in the observance last May. This is contrasted with the first national celebration, in which 780 towns participated. The celebration is now carried out not only in all our states, but in our territorial dependencies such as Hawaii, the Philippines, Alaska and the Virgin Islands. The movement has also been adopted in Canada and South Africa.

The above extract from a report of the National Music Week committee gives the reader some idea of the extent of the movement for more music throughout the country. Cisco has been asked to do her share to put Texas in the list of those states having the most towns observing music week.

PRODUCTION BROWN WELL HOLDING UP

EASTLAND, April 28.—Actually placing 830 barrels of oil into the pipe line in 24 hours, the Williamson No. 1, nine miles east of Eastland, is continuing today to flow steadily and is regarded as one of the finest wells completed in the county in many months. This is the well that was on the verge of being abandoned when a dry hole was drilled nearby, but the two drillers and the two tool dressers offered to complete the well for a sixteenth interest each. One of the workmen is said to have offered to sell his interest only a few days ago, for \$250. The interest is now worth perhaps twenty times that amount.

The well is owned by the Operators Oil & Gas company, composed of W. W. Brown, of Cisco, and associates with the exception of course of the interest that is held by the four members of the crew. The producer is on a lease of 100 acres. It extended the Sibley pool a quarter of a mile west. Extensive publicity has been accorded the gusher.

MEN INJURED AT RANGER IN BAD CONDITION

RANGER, April 28.—W. F. Murray, Ranger who was severely burned Wednesday when an explosion occurred inside a tank he was painting at the Burton-Lingo Lumber company yards, was reported to be in a serious condition this morning. He passed a very good night, however, the nurse attendant reported.

The condition of T. M. Timmons of Roby, who was injured when the automobile in which he was riding collided with one driven by Mrs. Boyd Davenport of Ranger, yesterday morning, was reported to be serious. Timmons is suffering from a crushed chest and three broken ribs. He is suffering severely and passed a restless night, according to announcement by officials of the West Texas Clinic and Hospital.

PREVENT POLLUTION OF STREAMS IN STEPHENS CO.

BRECKENRIDGE, April 28.—The state game, fish and oyster commission has located an office permanently at Breckenridge. Inspector Thrasher, connected with the pollution department of the commission is now here and in charge of this office. According to Mr. Thrasher the commission has determined, due to the large numbers of complaints received from this district, to rigidly follow up these complaints and to enforce regulations which have been made for keeping streams and bodies of water free from filth and other matter deleterious to game life. Salt water and waste oil have been complained of, Mr. Thrasher said. Heavy penalty may be inflicted for violation of the regulations.

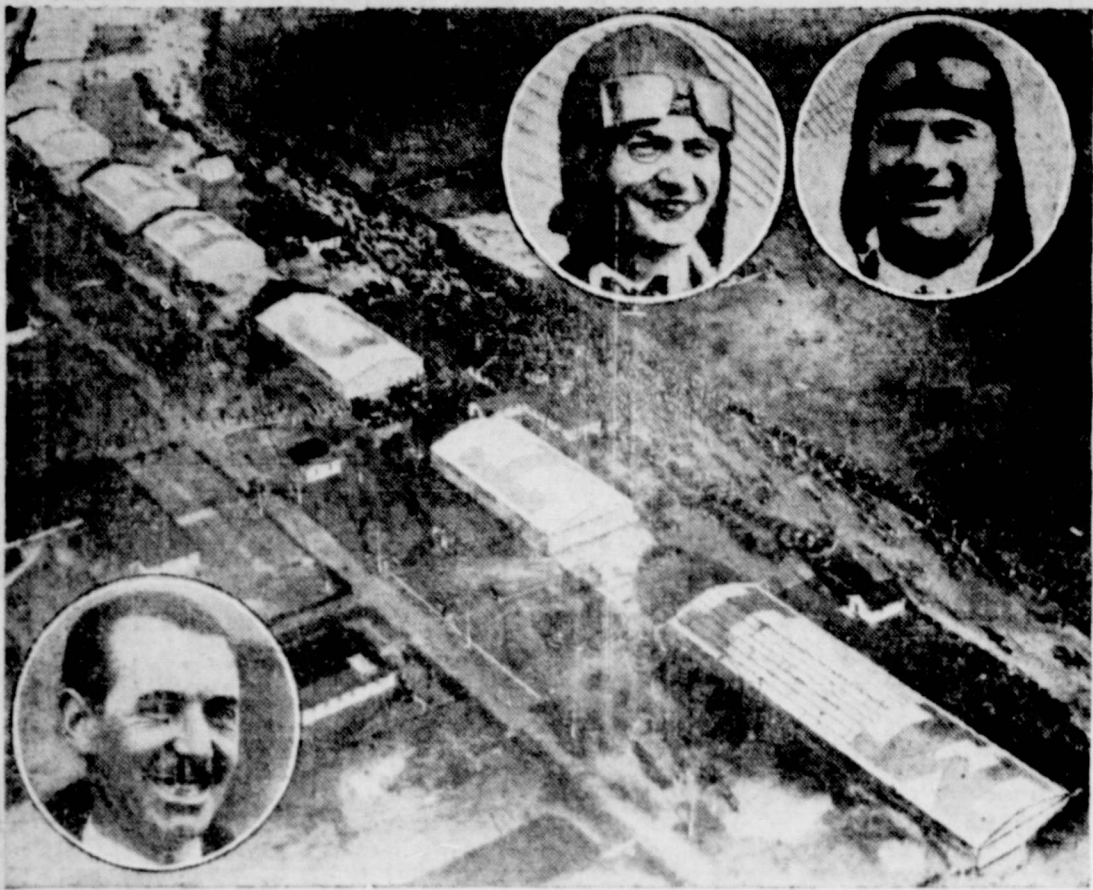

Throckmorton Prepares Celebration For Railroad Service Inauguration; Cisco Will Send Large Delegation

THROCKMORTON, April 28.—Unusual scenes will be presented in Throckmorton next Friday when the first train arrives in the town over the new extension of the Cisco and Northeastern railway. Grown people who have never seen or ridden on a train will see their first steam locomotive. Comanche Indians who once lived in Throckmorton county when the country was a Comanche reservation will return to view the iron horse as it enters their old time hunting ground. The first mayor of Throckmorton, Robert Brittain, who now lives in California, will return to the old town and will ride the cow-catcher of the train into the yards. A barrier of ribbons will be stretched across the right of way, and as the engine bursts through the streamers, an Indian warrior mounted on a pinto pony will lead so the smokestack of the engine as did one of his ancestors when the first Union Pacific locomotive ran across the boundless prairies of the great West. One Throckmorton citizen, now 78 years of age, will for the first time in his life become a resident of a railroad town.

Noted personages of the state and nation, and high railroad officials, including President J. L. Lancaster of the Texas-Pacific, the entire Texas railroad commission, and Col. R. Q. Lee, who conceived the idea for the new road, will be present to see the newest railroad line of West Texas begin its operations.

Fifteen thousand people are expected to throng the streets of Throckmorton for the day. Several cities, neighbors to the town, will close up shop for the day, while a score of towns and cities of West Texas will be represented by special trains, special cars, and automobile delegations. Breckenridge is running an eight-coach train to the fest; Cisco will bring four or five hundred people; Fort Worth is sending a special train; Albany is sending several cars attached to the Breckenridge train, while Seymour, Abilene, Haskell, Graham, Wichita Falls, Stamford, Olney, Munday, and Anson will all have big delegations on hand. Five bands will make music for the occasion; all candidates for the United States senate, a candidate for governor, the lieutenant governor of Texas, the head of the West Texas chamber of commerce, and other dignitaries will speak. A loud speaker has been provided to insure that all will hear the talks. With few exceptions, all speakers will be limited to five minutes.

DALLAS-LOS ANGELES BUS PERMIT IS TURNED DOWN

AUSTIN, April 28.—Application of the Hi-Ball Transit company, running between Los Angeles and Dallas, for motor bus operation permit covering the Texas portion of its route has been denied by the state railroad commission which the company attempted to enjoin in federal courts to grant a permit. Commissioner Terrell said that the commission does not consider the company's facilities and operation to be of the standard required for this operation under the new state law.

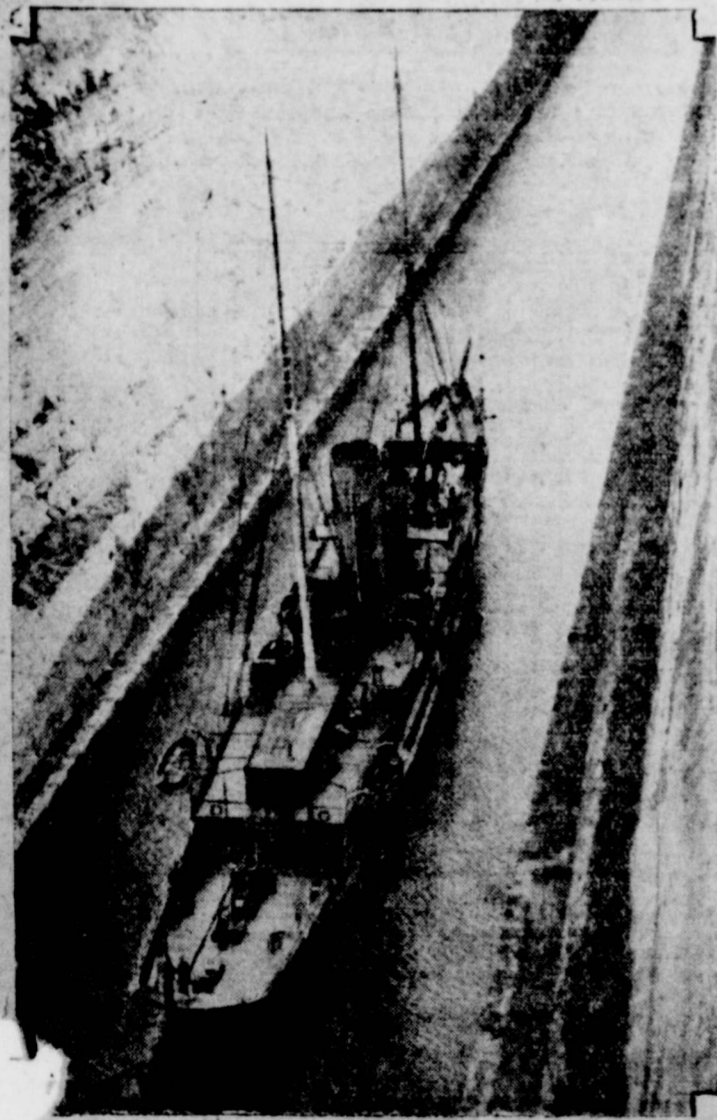

The Broadway of America convention adopted U. S. Highway No. 80, which runs through Cisco, as a part of its chosen route from the Pacific to the Atlantic, says Judge Eugene Lankford, who has returned from Memphis, Tenn., where the convention was held.

"The North Loop was not recognized by the convention, but the directors agreed, I think, to let the north loop appear on the map as it does now with the regular route running through Cisco," Judge Lankford said. "In the Cisco party with the motorcade were L. A. White, J. T. Elliott, C. R. West, J. E. Spencer, J. E. T. Peters and myself.

"There were about 150 automobiles in the motorcade when it reached Cisco from California, New Mexico, Arizona and West Texas. Like a rolling snowball, we increased rapidly as we rolled eastward, about 450 autos being in the line

when we reached Memphis. Mineral Wells we were royally entertained at the Crazy hotel. Dallas met us at the county line and escorted us through the city. They entertained us at lunch on the roset garden of the Jefferson hotel. Sulphur Springs the city set a new record for southern hospitality. They gave us a barbecue in the evening, provided entertainment and a crowd of about 6,000 people greeted us. The city provided rooms in hotels and in homes for everyone and gave us a delicious breakfast next morning, refusing to accept money.

"At Hot Springs, Ark., after gathering force through southeast Arkansas, we swarmed into the famous Arlington hotel and were entertained as only Hot Springs can entertain. The procession halted awhile in Little Rock. We also stopped at De Walle, my former home town, where we had a fish dinner. One of the Arizona members of the

motorcade said it was the first real fish dinner he ever ate. After crossing the White river, the motorcade was confronted with a problem. The Mississippi had overrun its banks and had inundated the highway. We attempted to make a detour and made an awful mess of it. We are trying to forget that part of our trip.

The convention was held in the ball room of the Peabody hotel, said to be the finest hotel in the south. California sent musicians along with 20,000 oranges and advertising matter to be distributed at Memphis. Colorado, Texas, furnished its famed "Gold Medal Band." We had plenty of entertainment and music and fun mixed in with business. The Cisco delegation made friends with the California delegates as we traveled.

Breckenridge had printed and circulated among the western delegates even before they reached Abilene, a very misleading map. It indicated that the road by Cisco, Eastland and Ranger and on, was

unpaved, crooked and dangerous, while the road by Breckenridge and Albany was paved and fine. We fought this out in a Texas caucus at Hot Springs. The Breckenridge delegates said articles in some of the papers caused them to do that, so after much talking peace was declared.

Mr. Peters and Mr. West and myself were on a number of programs along the route. We spoke of Cisco and distributed literature and advertising pertaining to Cisco.

The roads were good all the way except a short distance in Arkansas where the creek was out of its banks. Good detours existed, except when the motorcade got on the wrong road.

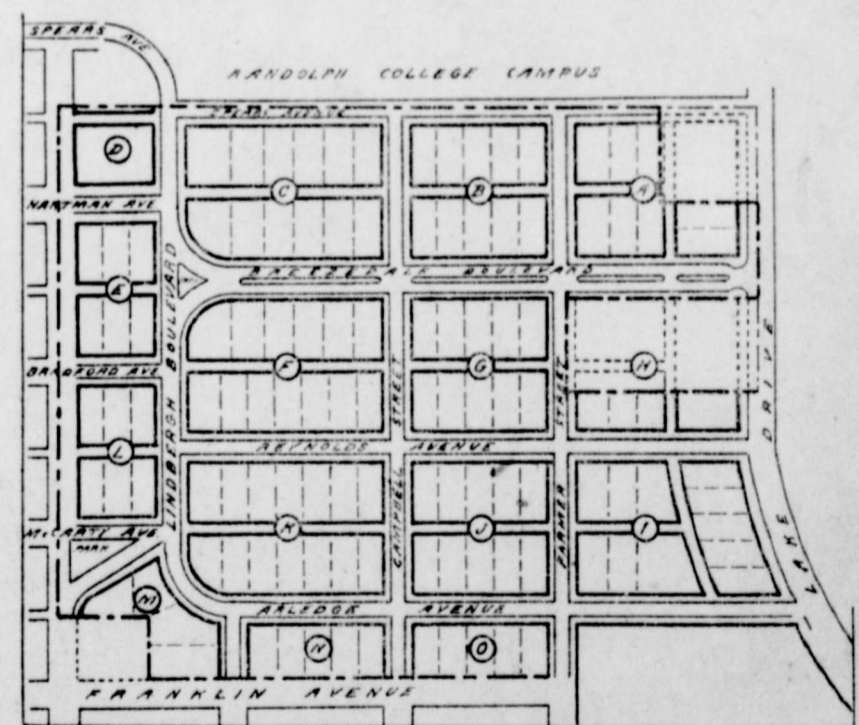
