Esperanto may yet become an essential part of an aviators training and of education in general. Nowadays no community, however remote from the centers of population, can be sure that it won't play host to a lot of flyers from various countries.

OLD STATE DEBTS

There is renewed agitation in England for debts said to be due English bond holders from eight of our southern states. Those debts amounted originally to \$75,000,000 and are now estimated, with interest to date, at over a quarter of a billion. They are said to represent money lent not to finance the Civil War, but money borrowed under the states' guarantee for railroads, banks and other enterprises after the war. They were repudiated when the ventures failed. Representatives of the British government, when asked to bring the matter to the notice of the United States government, refused on the ground that it would not be courteous. So officially nothing will be done about it. Privately, however, the question is destined to be brought up over and over, as long as the British are repaying their war and post-war indebtedness to the United States. It may be that the states concerned will find it good policy, sooner or later, to disregard technicalities and assume these old obligations in some degree. They might adopt the principle on which our government is now collecting its foreign loans—that of paying "according to their ability," over a long period.

WANTED: LOG CABIN

The Ohio State Museum, at Columbus, wants a log cabin for a permanent exhibit, and is now trying to find one somewhere around the state. The idea is to place such a pioneer building in one of its big display halls, complete with its old-fashioned walls, clapboard roof, fireplace, chimney and everything, so that the new generation may see for itself just how its ancestors lived in the wilderness. States less remote from the log-cabin age may find amusement in this plan. But they needn't. Better grab and preserve a good specimen while it's possible. Log cabins are artistic, as well as antique, and if nature is allowed to take her course they may soon be extinct. Prairie states likewise would do well to preserve good specimens of sod houses. Gazing at a log cabin exhibit, by the way, none of our flat-dwellers need feel so blamed superior. There wasn't so much pioneer hardship in those little old houses as an artificial generation may imagine. They were as snug and warm as any homes ever built. True, they lacked running water and open plumbing and electric lights and gas and heating furnaces, and a few other modern doodads. But their homely virtues made up for the lack, and the wood chopping and other chores they called for were good for the kids. And what wouldn't a modern suburbanite give for one of those old fireplaces? Many an old-timer, and some folks not old-timers, are tickled to death to find a genuine log cabin to sleep in, when touring in the mountains or up north. It's great for the tired business man on a hunting or fishing trip. In fact, there is said to be a new vogue for such cabins, in regions where it is still possible to get the logs for them without paying a fortune.

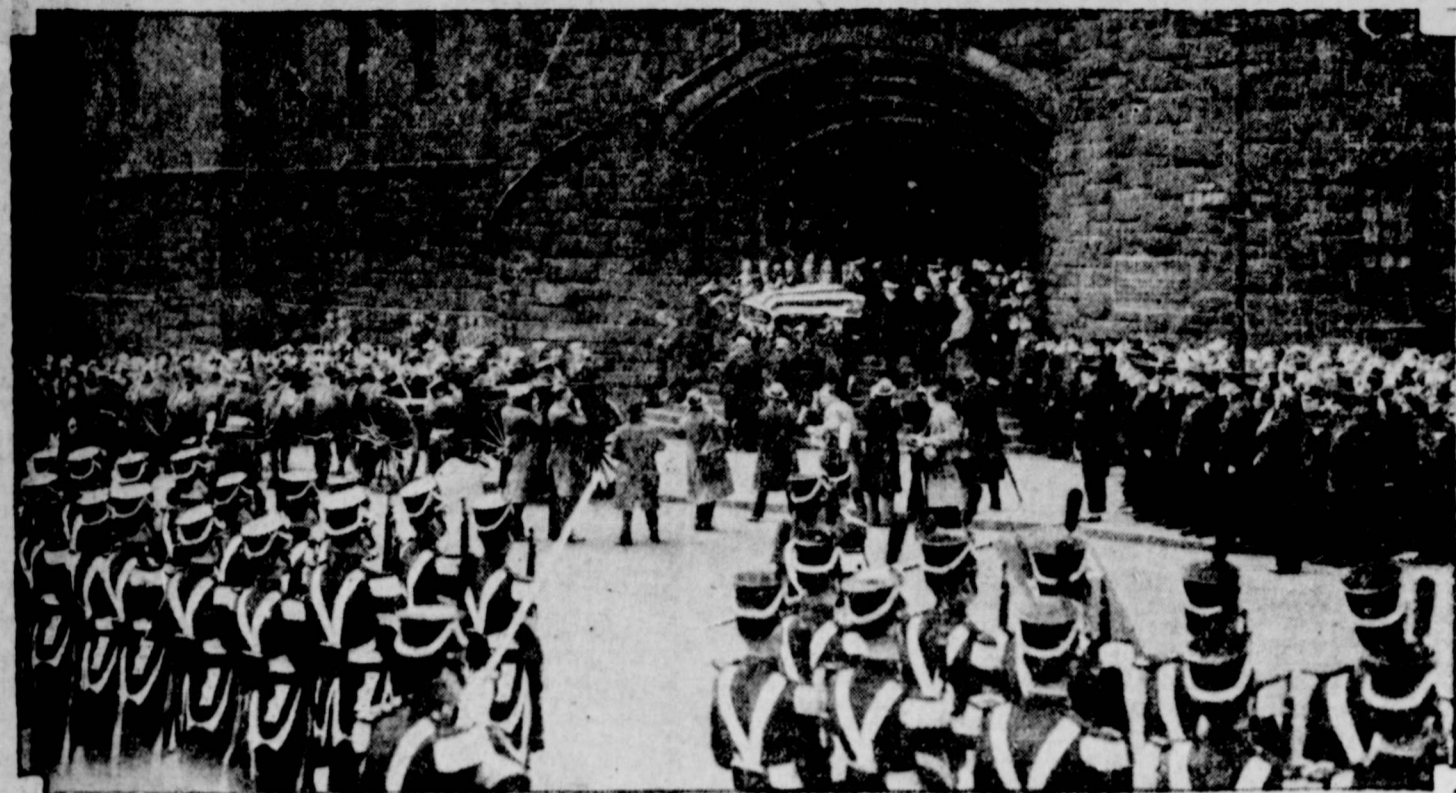

228 Prison Years Ahead of Aubrey Ray -- More Due

Thrice Convicted Bandit Will Go to Trial in Dalhart May 21; May Have Robbed 15 Banks in All

The longevity record of one Mchuchah will be threatened by Aubrey Ray if he should serve out all the prison sentences already imposed on him and sentences which may be imposed on him for bank robberies of which law officers accuse him and others which he says he committed.

He now has 228 years in prison ahead of him if he can cheat the grim reaper. All are the result of convictions of bank robbing. On May 21 he will go to trial in Dalhart on a charge of robbing the Wilfordo State bank last January. A change of venue to Dallas county was taken when he was arraigned a few days ago in Oldham county.

Eight banks have been robbed by Ray, according to officers. He says he has robbed seven others for which he has not been charged, and in view of the efforts of prosecutors to send him to the electric chair, he will not give the details now. He has indicated that he might write a complete history of his career as a bandit.

Seek Death Penalty

District Attorney E. M. Richards of the Dalhart county district court will ask for the death penalty for the lad who has been tried three times for bank robbery and who is under a total of 228 years in prison sentences—two for 99 years and one for 30 years.

When he escaped from the penitentiary last year "by outrunning the dogs," as he says, he had served but a few months of a 30-year sentence assessed for a bank robbery at Ovalo, Taylor county. In March he was captured in Oklahoma City and brought to Fisher county, where two life sentences were assessed for the McCauley and Sylvester bank robberies.

STRAWBERRIES FROM BLITCH'S D AVE. GARDEN

The Daily News acknowledges the receipt of two nice baskets of luscious strawberries, compliments of J. B. Blitch, grown in his experimental gardens at 2404 South D avenue. The berries are far superior to those shipped in from the semi-tropical sections, and are supplied, hand-picked, at 50 cents per quart, but when picked as they come only 40 cents per quart is charged.

Mr. Blitch only has 2,000 plants, and says it depends largely on weather conditions as to how these plants will yield, but he estimates that his plants will produce at the rate of \$1,900 per acre. "I am just conducting a small experimental garden," Mr. Blitch said "trying to demonstrate the variety best adapted to this section. I have six different varieties now growing in my garden, and most of them are thriving and producing fine. I have only six lots at my home which I am utilizing as an experimental garden."

OBSERVE LAW IS WARNING OF GAME WARDEN

Now that the open fishing season for 1928 has arrived and the opening of the squirrel season, which has been closed for two months, A. W. Hubbard, game warden, calls to the attention of sportsmen some of the rules and regulations laid down in the game laws of the state, which the warden announces must be observed if the penalties are to be avoided.

The warden emphasizes the fact that fishermen must obtain licenses before using artificial lures in Texas streams. These licenses may be procured at local hardware stores or from city officials in Cisco. Any person caught using artificial bait without a license will be subject to a fine of not less than \$1 nor more than \$10.

It is unlawful to use a seine smaller than a three inch mesh, which must not be more than 20 feet in length and must be used for catching bait only. Anyone found guilty of violation of the seine law, will be subject to a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$100.

Hubbard said that it was not necessary for fishermen to have a license to fish outside their home county. It is necessary however, for hunters to secure out of county hunter's license.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Patriotic organizations throughout the country are being urged to back a movement launched in congress to erect a monument to the man who gave the world the sobriquet "Uncle Sam."

To speed the movement, Representative David Hogg, Republican, of Indiana has introduced a bill appropriating \$25,000 for the monument.

The monument would be erected at Merrian, Indiana, where the original "Uncle Sam," who was Samuel Wilson, is buried.

The story of Samuel Wilson and the nickname is one which should be preserved for posterity, in the opinion of the Indiana congressman, Samuel Wilson, he declares, was a typical American and the sobriquet first applied to the United States in ridicule has been adopted by the people all over the country who use the name with pride.



Skies Black with Planes Within 25 Years Is Rickenbacker Vision; War in Future to Mean Devastation

ATLANTA, Ga., May 2.—Visioning airplanes compared to which the Levianth would be but a toy in size, and the sky black with airplanes, Captain Eddie Rickenbacker, America's ace in the world war, declared that upon the present generation depends the future of the world.

These monsters of the air would not stop, Captain Rickenbacker said but merely slow down to 50 miles an hour while the smaller ships were landing on them. In time, the huge passenger and freight ships would circle the globe without a single stop, he declared.

When aviation is developed to a higher degree, which will be within the next 25 years, a war would mean devastation for the world, he said, with each home being forced to take part in the proceedings.

The ace pictured a giant air liner taking to sea loaded with an army of small airplanes, high-powered explosives and deadly gases. He then drew a picture of these tiny swarms of destruction leaving the air liner at a designated spot, sweeping onward on their missions of devastation and then returning to their ship, their base of operations, to refuel and await commands to attack another point.

Aviation To Stay "People haven't yet awakened to the fact that aviation is firmly established," Captain Rickenbacker said. "They keep talking about what it developed. Flying is already developed. A network of air lines now covers this country and the countries of Europe. Hundreds of tons of mail go by air every week. Big business men facing the vital necessity of saving time are its passengers every day.

"Aviation is already here. It's here to stay, and will grow by tremendous strides. Business competition will give its development fresh impetus every day. "Today we have 24,000,000 motor cars in the United States. I'm confident that by 1950 we'll have 50,000,000 for aviation won't hurt the automobile. It will help it. But I believe that in 25 years the aviation industry will be larger than the automobile industry. It will be the biggest industry in the world, the largest the world has ever known.

"Folks talk about the marvelous inventions of the past quarter century. The next 25 years will be ten times as productive, ten times as progressive, ten times as marvelous in every sense of the word. Just at the present the United States is actually using about one-third of its soil; the other two-thirds are idle. Aviation is going to people these idle lands and put them to work. It is going to bring the most remote and inaccessible place in just a few hours' ride of some greater center of population.

Ten Year Ahead "Let me draw you a picture of conditions as they will be ten years from now. At that time giant dirigibles bigger than any ocean liner that ever sailed the seas will ply on regular routes in every direction across this and other continents. They will be the freight haulers of the day. "Taking Atlanta as a typical city, let us say that 10 years from now Atlanta will be the base for small dirigibles, maybe no larger than what we now consider to be the monster Los Angeles. These small dirigibles from Atlanta will fly to meet the gigantic freight dirigibles a hundred miles north of the city. So vast will be these freight haulers that the little dirigibles will light on their decks, discharge freight to other points and take on a cargo consigned to Atlanta. Then the little dirigibles will hop off the deck of the big dirigibles and fly back to Atlanta."

Dual Government in Hebrides by French and English May End with Trade to Involve Sudan

By ROBERT THORNBURGH

WASHINGTON, May 2.—A remarkable experiment in government—an island country ruled by both Great Britain and France—probably will end within a short time if the unofficial Paris proposal to trade some Sudan acres for full control of the New Hebrides Islands in the South Seas meets with English approval. The story of this strange government, known as "condominium," and termed by some of the New Hebrides colonists "pandemonium," has been issued by the national geographic society of Washington.

Two languages, French and English, have official recognition. Military forces of the two nations police the New Hebrides and their natives guard them. Both French and British steamship lines serve the islands whose citizens honor with equal respect the Tricolor and the Union Jack.

King As Judge According to the geographic society justice on the New Hebrides has still more complications to the joint court of one Frenchman and one Englishman the King of Spain has been empowered to add a member. The Spaniard insures a deciding vote at all times.

BOTH DIVORCES AND MARRIAGE DROP IN PARIS

PARIS, May 2.—Latest statistics published by the minister of labor in Paris show that divorces were on the decrease in France during the year of 1927, 18,487 were pronounced in the entire country, as against 20,006 during the previous year of 1926. A very considerable improvement was shown over the year 1927 during which there were 32,547 divorces, undoubtedly the consequence of the abnormal life during the war.

The number of marriages during 1927 and 1926 were 337,864 and 346,126 respectively. The department of the Seine counts hundreds of thousands of foreigners. Divorces here numbered 247 in 1924, 359 in 1925 and 569 in 1926. The increase was due to a large number of American citizens seeking divorce on foreign soil.



GREEK YOUTHS LEAVE U. S. TO SEEK BRIDES

ATHENS, May 2.—Six hundred young Americans of Greek parentage, dressed in blue tunics, white trousers and the Greek red fez, landed at the Piraeus with the object of marrying Greek girls.

A sentimental journey on such a wholesale scale is unprecedented in history. The visitors are members of a Graeco-American educational organization which numbers more than 16,000 members in the United States. They are not tourists, but bachelors who wish to see the Greek girls with whom they have been in correspondence, and whom they know only from photographs and letters.

"We could not get on too the American girls, who are two exacting, coquettish, and frivolous for our taste," said one lad. "I grew up with the dream of marrying a nice, quiet, sensible girl who would be modest in her dress, not use lipstick, and would have long hair. "For about a year I have been corresponding with a Greek girl who realizes my dream. She sent me her photograph and I found her so lovely that I was strongly drawn to her, and I have crossed the ocean to find her. I hope to return to America with her as my wife."

IRISH FLIER'S COUSINS WANT HERO TO CALL

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 2.—Major James Fitzmaurice, famous Irish flier, who with two German companions was first to accomplish the hitherto fatal westward crossing of the Atlantic Ocean by air, has been invited to visit Kansas City, where he would find an American family of first cousins, although he would be a complete stranger to them. The invitation has been extended all three of the famous Bremen crew, and foreign ministers of the Irish Free State and of Germany, have been asked to assist.

Both Timothy Smiddy, of Ireland and Baron Von Pritwitz, German ambassador, have promised to help Kansas City in accomplishing its desire to entertain the three aces. Edmond Fitzmaurice, city passenger agent for the Kansas City Southern railroad, learned recently from a brother, William Fitzmaurice, of St. Louis, that Major Fitzmaurice was his first cousin. Before receiving information from his brother, the railroad man believed the famous flier who successfully crossed the Atlantic to land on barren Greeney Island, to be another brother, of the same name as the major, who likewise gained much recognition as a flier during the world war. Edmond Fitzmaurice spent many boyhood days with the trans-Atlantic flier.

RETURN OF THE HEROES



World Fair Planned by Chicago to Offset Stigma Placed on Its Name by Gang Wars, Gunmen and Bombs

CHICAGO, May 2.—Its civic name, blenched by gang fighting, bombings, murders and crime in general, Chicago has conceived a plan to renovate its reputation through the World Fair here in 1933. Each of the 900,000 families that go to make up the city will be asked to contribute \$5 to establish a fund financing the fair without aid from state or federal governments, so that every citizen may have an opportunity to aid in the reputation cleaning plan. With this fund, the World Fair committee plans to build impressive buildings and invent exhibits and entertainments which will bring thousands of persons from all parts of the country and world. When those thousands arrive here for the fair, the committee believes they will discover that Chicago, after all, is a rather nice place, and the greater majority of the citizens law abiding. Name Brught Chills Long ago when Chicago first broke into national print as something to be shuddered at; when the name of Chicago on a news story first began to evoke righteous chills down the spines of readers, leading citizens broke into a cold sweat. A wonderful city they said, was losing millions of dollars in manufacturing and trade because its reputation kept people away. Why don't people come here and find out how bad the city was? they inquired. But people preferred, in the main and especially if they were timid, to read the papers recounting the exploits of the Genna brothers, and "Scar Face" Capone, and to believe everything they heard. Among those who geared Chicago's evil name were industrial leaders, Samuel Insull, utility magnate, and others cast about for a way to bring people here to see the beauties of the city. Those leaders conceived the idea of making the World Fair of 1933 the turning point in Chicago's reputation. Views of Leaders Rufus G. Dawes, brother of the vice president, is president of the fair association. Insull is chairman of the finance committee. These two men, with the aid of a large group of other civic leaders, are laying plans to beguile fair visitors into becoming familiar with the city and its advantages as a residing place. Perhaps, it is admitted, no more people will be added to the city's population which already totals more than 4,000,000, but visitors are expected to return to all parts of the country to their homes, and say: "This Chicago isn't such a bad place. Now, they have beautiful boulevards, marvelous buildings, wonderful beaches, and so on. Meanwhile, prominent citizens will exert their influence to see that the city is completely "cleaned up" long before the World Fair.
