Nobody seems to have thought of putting in a horned toad Perhaps the worshippers hadn't any—it was a northern church. If it wouldn't be impertinent, we'd like to see some group of corner-stone layers deposit an ordinary frog along with the other relics. Put him in not loose, but encased in clay, like the amphibian hibernating in the mud at the bottom of a pond. There are traditions of frogs being dug up in that form, still alive, from strata far below the surface, apparently millions of years old. The experiment might be tried, at least, in the corner-stone of a scientific library or natural history museum.
