WOMEN'S FEDERATED CLUBS

The outstanding Texas news feature this week is the national convention of the Women's Federated Clubs in session at San Antonio. Unfortunately club politics is more in evidence even than constructive club activities, and the women are saying ugly things about each other. There have been broad insinuations that the organization has either been imposed upon by parties seeking commercial advertising through the national "home survey," made by the clubs, or that somebody has used official position to "feather her nest." Mrs. John D. Sherman, president of the General Federation, characterizes the insinuations as "part of a broad attack being made against every decent, honorable element in our public life." At a meeting of the state presidents, Mrs. Speel, of Washington, the chairman, urged the accredited delegates to "give the lie to all criticisms being made against the president and the federation." Doubtless the differences will all be ironed out before the sessions end and everybody except the defeated candidates and their closest friends will be satisfied.

WOMEN'S CLUB ACTIVITIES

There are many men and some women who know but little about what is being done by this great federation of club women. Some still cling to the thought that it is a sort of dress parade affair to keep alive memories of the ancient and mediaeval poets. Naturally there is some attention to dress when 5,000 women get together and some effort to lend an impression of intimate acquaintance with the poets and other artists, but this group of women is also busy with many practical things. A mere statement of the departmental activities is enough to show this. There are eight of these: American citizenship, the American home, education, fine arts, international relations, legislation, public welfare, and press and publicity—a diversification sufficient to employ almost all kinds of talents. The Federated clubs are doing a great work and will continue to do so despite the internal strife of a kind almost certain to arise occasionally in a large organization that is engaged in big constructive activities.

POWER COMPANY WINS

In a long drawn out contest between the Central Power & Light company and the river valley farmers who contested the application of the Light company has won and has been given a permit to erect a 300-foot power dam on the Guadalupe river 12 miles south of Cuero. The farmers protested on the ground that such a dam would divert water that might be used for irrigation, would jeopardize their riparian rights and damage their lands through overflow. The dam will be 300 feet long and will develop 3,000 horse power. It is the third dam to be constructed by the same company on the Guadalupe river, dams developing 1,500 horse power each being located at Cuero and Gonzales.

The announcement that a contract has been let to build the last short link in the paved highway between Eagle Pass and San Antonio, via Carrizo Springs, shows the extent to which highway construction is going on in Southwest Texas.

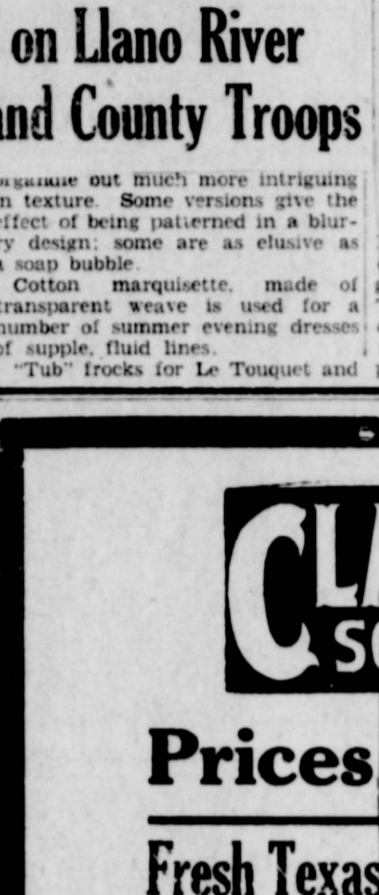
6 TO 9 DROWN WHEN RAMMED SHIP IS SUNK

It would set an example in partitioning China, something that European powers are eager to do for the rich morsels they might get out of it themselves. The only real obstacle to any such alienation of Chinese territory is the United States, which has long stood for Chinese integrity.

TROLLEY-PLANE SERVICE

Interurban trolley lines refuse to lag behind the railroads with their train-plane service. Such a system in northern Ohio sets an example for similar transportation lines wherever there are airplane routes to hook up with. This "rail and air" service was scheduled for inauguration May 28. The trolley line brings passengers from ten Ohio cities and their rural communities directly to the Cleveland airport, which is one terminal of the Detroit-Cleveland air line. Because it took advantage of an air route already well established, this hook-up was merely a matter of agreement between the two companies, and involving only a slight change in trolley schedules and a little special advertising. It cuts down the travel time between Detroit and the growing industrial cities by one to four hours. Commercial aviation is developing so rapidly that the casual newspaper reader can't keep track of all the new air enterprises. Private ownership and operation of airplanes will go a little more slowly, as it should.

CHAIN COMPETITION

"It should not be assumed," says Roger Babson, "that the chain store is free from competition. In fact, competition between chains in the same city is becoming so severe that the average margin of profit on each store is woefully small. This is particularly true in some of the large eastern grocery chains." There is comfort in this statement for the individual store. As long as chain competes with chain, the individual store should be able to hold its own, if it realizes the full possibilities in the smaller institution for rendering personal service in ways the chain store cannot expect to do. It is only when chain stores stop competing among themselves, by trade agreements or super-chain monopolies, that business democracy can be in real peril.

COTTON COMES BACK FOR SUMMER DRESSES

PARIS, June 1.—Cotton has some back this season to make some delightful diaphanous dresses which make one hope for a warm, sunny summer.

Rodier's famous voiles are made to run a new gamut of patterns. One of the newest has a wavy stripe of silk thread that stands up in relief from the voile texture. Hair-line checks of silk in the voile are over-printed in a manner that shows the pattern on the silk only in some cases, and in others on the voile alone, leaving the silk stripes white in other patterns. The effect is extremely delicate. Voiles with coincident patterns are also over printed, leaving the background untouched, but breaking the dot in unusual ways.

A new weave of cotton and silk crepe, called "eclat," is as supple as crepe de chine and has a pebbly texture which is appealing in the sunshine. Another new weave is of thin cotton, puckering across to give almost a shirred effect. Often this is patterned with little broche flowers and is being used by some of the dressmakers to make light summer coats.

A delicate cotton novelty is a rainbow thread weave as thin as organdy but much more intriguing in texture. Some versions give the effect of being patterned in a blurry design; some are as elusive as a soap bubble.

Cotton marquisette, made of transparent weave is used for a number of summer evening dresses of supple, fluid lines.

WARDLAW FOR AUTO LICENSE TAX CUT TO \$3

VERNON, June 1.—Although the federal government has afforded some relief to automobile owners in lowering the manufacturers' tax, the state government must afford further relief, Louis J. Wardlaw, candidate for governor, declared in an address here Thursday.

"The automobile license tax should be reduced to only a nominal sum, say \$3, just enough to pay the expense of maintaining the registration," he declared.

"It is my opinion the highway commission would then have as much money each year at its disposal as it can intelligently spend. Right now all over Texas there are automobiles sitting in garages because the owners can't pay the present high tax. The farmer or laborer who saves his money to purchase a car finds himself deprived of its use. If I am elected governor I will use every power at my disposal to bring relief to the people along this line."

Wardlaw was introduced here by Judge O. T. Warlick, who stressed the fact that the candidate is a business man of wide experience.

Television Soon Will Become as Common as Radio, Says Pioneer; Two to Be Used in Conjunction

(Editor's Note: This is the second of two articles on the development of television.)

PARIS, June 1.—Plans of the Baird Television company, pioneers in the new field of pictorial transmission by wireless, to establish a chain of broadcasting stations throughout the United States and England, were revealed to International News Service by Captain O. M. Hutchinson, manager of the company, in an interview.

The first of these broadcasting stations is under construction at Jamaica, Long Island, and according to Captain Hutchinson, others will follow in quick succession. A powerful station of this type, which can be used either for trans-Atlantic or local broadcasting, has already been installed in the company's office here.

Common As Radio
"Television," Captain Hutchinson said, "will soon be as common as the radio. Before many months will have passed, the average listener in will only have to manipulate a supplementary switch on his radio, to receive on a specially constructed screen the images of persons appearing before the television broadcast many miles away. Experiments have shown that a television receiving apparatus can be constructed at a cost of less than \$250, and the manufacture of them on a large scale for the use of amateurs will begin shortly.

"These can be used in conjunction with the ordinary radio, and as our plans progress, we will combine television with ordinary broadcasting, so that the amateur may see and hear his entertainment at the same time.

"Our apparatus has reached such a high degree of perfection," Captain Hutchinson continued, "that the results will amaze the world when they are first seen publicly.

"The two way television apparatus which will be in operation within a few months between London and New York, will be used for experimental purposes until we have cleared away the final obstacles to the perfection of our machine. Then we will throw it open to the public, and simultaneously our broadcasting stations in England and in America will begin to operate.

"The scale of our operations naturally remains problematical, for television is a new and revolutionary thing, and the public will have to be "educated" up to it before it is commonly used. But we believe that before a year has passed, regular television broadcasts will be in swing, and those with foresight enough to have purchased or constructed a receiving set will experience the thrill of their life.

To Aid Students
"The New York organization plans to begin shortly the dissemination of instructions to amateur wireless students, in order that they may equip their sets for the reception of television. The same

will be done here, and if the response that we expect follows the innovation, it will not be long before there is a television broadcast station in every state of the United States."

Trans-Atlantic broadcasting, Captain Hutchinson said, was merely one phase of the Baird Company's prospects.

"I hope that it will prove a profitable scheme, and I am sure it will," he declared. "Will not American tourists in London jump at the chance of putting themselves in front of a machine, and waving 'hello' to the folks back home?"

"But our ultimate plans are the establishment of a chain of broadcast stations, so that radio hearers can see as well as hear what is going on. The possibilities of this invention are enormous, staggering, and so satisfactory have been our experiments thus far that I have not the slightest doubt that the end of this year will see its potentialities known, seen and appreciated by the public."

Bradstreet and Mahlstedt Well in Eubank Pool Is Expected to Touch Sand Early Part of Week

CROSS PLAINS, June 1.—Although no completions were made in the Eubank pool the past week, four wells are drilling, a fifth is preparing to spud, and several new locations have been staked. Rigs have been moved in and work has been started on three wildcat wells within a couple of miles of this pool.

Probably the next well to reach the sand will be that belonging to Bradstreet and Mahlstedt which should touch the sand in the early part of the week. It is the farthest west test that is being made to date and is watched with interest because it offsets their No. 1 producer which extended the field one-half mile to the northwest and came in for an initial production of more than 600 barrels daily. It is located 3100 feet from the west and 1170 feet from the north line of the J. B. Eubank tract, Robert Mitchell survey No. 141.

Work is progressing nicely on the No. 3 O. L. Keller test being made by Cranfill & Reynolds and a completion should soon be made. Other locations have been made offsetting this well but are being held up until its fate is known.

Cranfill & Reynolds are drilling near 700 feet on their No. 3-A J. B. Eubank located 150 feet south and 150 feet east of their No. 2-A which has been flowing better than 300 barrels daily since being drilled the past week.

The same company have moved a machine up on the hill and are preparing to spud on their No. 4-A one location south.

Since the obtaining of a 700 barrel well the past week by the Sinclair Oil company, a second machine has been moved in and is drilling near 400 feet one location west.

An extension to the Eubank pool is being sought one-half mile east on the J. W. Newton tract. The test is being made by Shaw & Parks.

In a southeastern direction from this test Tom Anderson & Culbertson Bros. are drilling in the north-west corner of their 136 acre lease on the M. J. Suttle land in the little Robert Mitchell survey No. 140.

One mile southeast of the Anderson-Culbertson Bros' test, Beddingfield et al are seeking pay in the Cross Cut sand.

Dakota Governor to Lead Protesting Farmers

Demands for Agricultural Relief to Be Laid Before Convention by Huge Pilgrimage from Middle West

BISMARCK, N. D., June 1.—Governor A. G. Sorlie will head a delegation of North Dakota farmers on the pilgrimage to the Republican national convention as a protest of President Coolidge's action in vetoing the McNary-Haugen bill, he announced Thursday.

A. D. Talbot, state president of the Farmers' Union, declared that the pilgrimage of North Dakota farmers would amount to an exodus from some districts, but he declined to estimate the number. Some counties are already organizing for the trip, he said.

Talbot, in an open letter to political managers in the state today, asked that all campaign activities be suspended during the week from June 10 to 17, to permit farmers, candidates and others interested to attend the national Republican convention.

Tentative plans, he said, call for the North Dakota group to combine with those from Minnesota, South Dakota, Nebraska and Iowa and proceed to Kansas City under the leadership of Governor Adam McMullen of Nebraska, who originated the idea.

Hoover Manager Skeptical KANSAS CITY, June 1.—The national convention here, James W. Good, Hoover-for-President, will have no effect on the convention, he said, "but not a word of planks, but not a word of planks."
