

The great difference between constructive problems today and the construction projects of the ancients is in time. Modern machinery has reduced years to months and months to days in the completion of engineering projects." There is another important difference. This job, naturally, calls for the work of fewer men than the pyramids of Cheops. But there is no comparison at all in the living conditions of the men who slaved in Egypt and those tending the great machines of America. Also, the pyramid, when built, served no economic need of the men who worked on it, while every great engineering project of today, when finished and at work, serves to raise by a little the living conditions of everyone in this country or other countries who come into contact, however remotely, with the things it does. Some man in Egypt, whose ancestors built the pyramid, will some day have better and cheaper food because of the Wilson Dam.
