COOLIDGE DRAFT MOVE LIKELY

41 Candidates Go on State Ticket

Time for Entering Race Ends; Seven Would Be Senator, Five Congressman and Four Governor

When Democratic voters of the 17th congressional district go to the polls July 28 they will have the names of 41 candidates for various state offices, United States senate and congress from which to make their selections. This will be exclusive of candidates for district offices, such as the court of civil appeals.

The time for filing for office closed at midnight Monday. All candidates except those for congress were filed with D. W. Wilcox at Georgetown, chairman of the state Democratic executive committee. It is expected that there may be one or two late entrants as the state law provides that filing by registered

letter before the closing hour must be accepted even though it reaches the chairman after that hour.

On such filing is expected by Wilcox today to be D. Parnell, Wichita Falls, who is to oppose Attorney General Claude Pollard. The greatest interest in this section of West Texas centers around the contests for governor, senator and congressman. Eastland county has two candidates for the seat being vacated by Congressman Thomas L. Blanton, who is seeking the senatorial nomination. They are R. Q. Lee, Cisco, and R. N. Grisham, Eastland. The other three congressional candidates are Oscar Calloway, Comanche, former congressman, T. P. Perkins, Mineral Wells, and Homer Shanks, Clyde.

WEST TEXAS TOUR STARTED BY WARDLAW

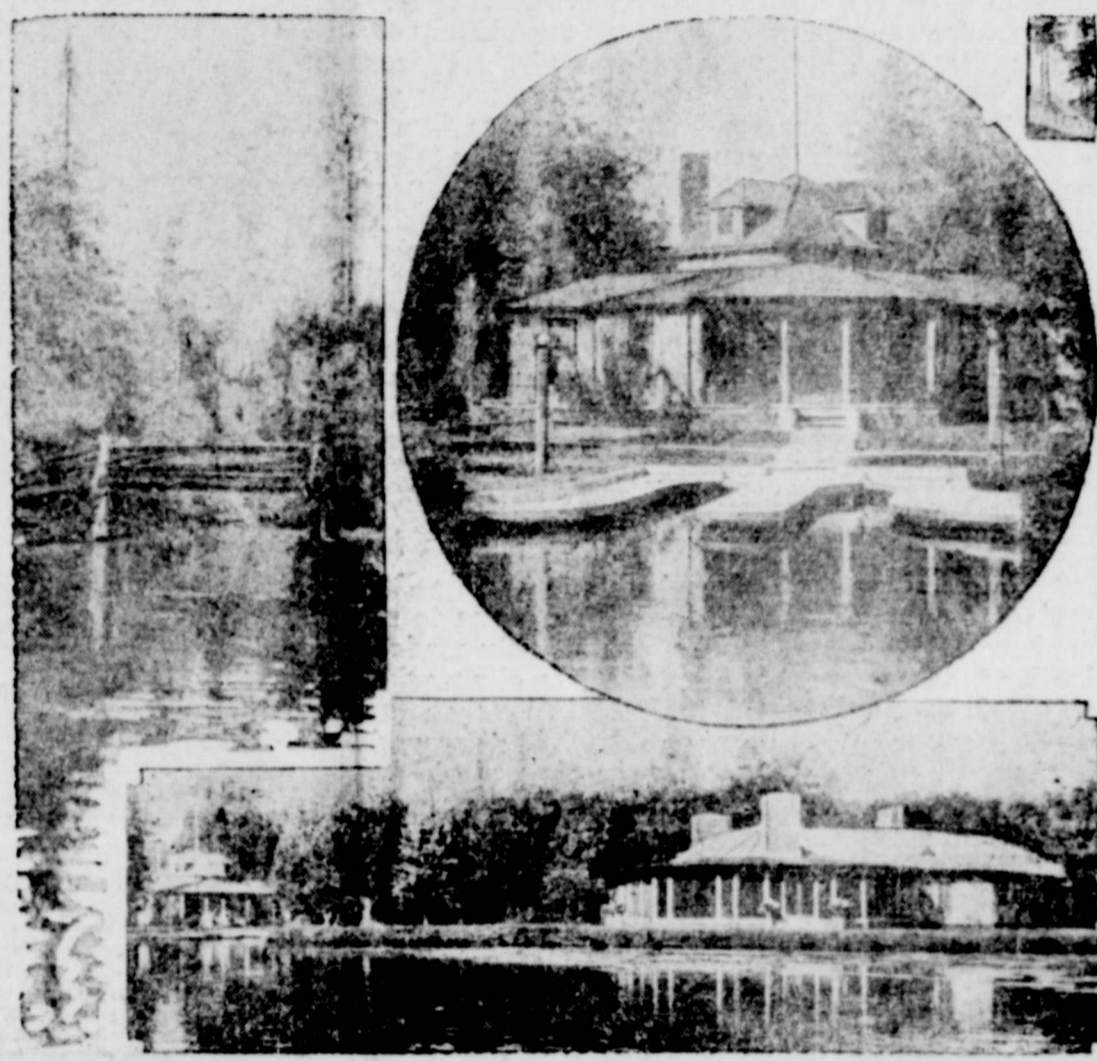

Anti-Hoover Forces Pin Hopes on Stampede to President; Commerce Secretary's Fate Is Up to Mellon

KANSAS CITY, June 5.—The name of Calvin Coolidge quite probably will be presented to the Republican national convention here next week and voted upon—unless and until the president, by some positive definite action, forbids it.

The "draft Coolidge" whether or no movement reached Kansas City in the person of Charles D. Hillis, the New York national committee man, who has been the chief rallying post for the anti-Hoover forces of the east. Like a sentinel pine Hillis has stood against the gale-like winds that have blown many of the other leaders into the Hoover camp. He may have swayed at times, but he has never fallen.

Who will present the magic name of Coolidge, if it is to be formally presented to the convention; who will lead the fight in the open and behind the scenes, Hillis did not say. But he appeared quite confident that when the balloting begins there will be a lot of votes to be added in the column that carries at its head the name of Calvin Coolidge.

Coolidge Must Be Definite. The only way in which this can be prevented, in the opinion of Hillis, and incidentally some others, will be for the president to finally put his foot down. Hillis doesn't pretend to know whether that will be done or not; nor do any of the other leaders here pretend to know, and in this latter group are the somewhat apprehensive managers of Herbert Hoover.

There are reports persistent enough, but not confirmable, that Coolidge already has prepared for such a contingency as his name being presented to the convention. There are reports that he has written a letter which has been entrusted to a "spokesman" and which is to be read when and if his name is presented. Almost everyone in Kansas City has heard of such a letter, but no one has seen it and, in fact, no one can be found who has heard of anyone who has heard of anyone that has seen it.

Letter's Existence Doubted. Friends of William M. Butler, chairman of the national committee, a letter which has been entrusted to a "spokesman" in such a matter, deny emphatically that Butler has any such missive. Others whose names have been linked in the gossip are equally emphatic in their denials. Hence, the conclusion reached by the drafters is that no such letter is in existence, at least, yet. And in that situation they are going ahead with their plans.

They can, in fact, do little else but go ahead. To haul down their flag now, at this stage of the proceedings would be tantamount to admitting the impossibility of "stopping Hoover." Half the New York delegation of 90 votes, a dozen votes in Illinois, nearly all of Pennsylvania, a whole flock in New England, and a lot in the south are being held outside the Hoover column on the "Draft Coolidge" plea. The anti-Hoover leaders can't let go.

Mellon Has Balance of Power. In the end, it probably comes down to the diminutive figure of secretary of the treasury, Andrew W. Mellon. The 79 votes that he will control for Pennsylvania likely

will prove the bell-wether of the balloting. The question of how Pennsylvania will go on the first ballot has become, for the time being at least, the most interesting and significant question of the convention.

If Pennsylvania goes to Hoover on the first ballot, the chances are that it will be quickly over with the nomination of Hoover assured. The cabinet candidate can count between 450 and 500 votes outside the keystone state, unless instructions and pledges are violated. Furthermore, Pennsylvania going for Hoover would be accepted as the "tip-off" that Mellon knew that President Coolidge would not consent to the draft.

If on the other hand, Pennsylvania's votes go to Coolidge it will galvanize the anti-Hoover forces into electric energy. Or should Pennsylvania's votes be held, for example, for Mellon himself, the fact will be interpreted as indicating that the sphinx like little man from Pittsburgh is willing to lend the tremendous weight of his influence to the task of stopping his colleague in the cabinet.

GEORGIA G.O.P. FOES MAKE UP, HOOVER AIDED

KANSAS CITY, June 5.—Herbert Hoover's candidacy for the Republican nomination coasted along more easily today. Georgia's quarrelling Republicans got together this morning and settled their differences without resorting to the national committee. Their action insured Hoover of the state's 16 votes.

F. A. Blankenbecker, delegate to the Republican national convention which opens in Kansas City next Monday, left at noon today for the convention city. Blankenbecker's departure was hastened by a telegram from leaders of the Texas Republicans requesting him to come to Kansas City at once to be in attendance at the contest committee meetings. Texas has two contesting delegations at the convention, and Blankenbecker is an important witness.

44 Countries to Be Represented at Rotary Convention

900 Communities in Every Part of World to Send Delegates; Movement Originated in 1905 Finds Real Favor

MINNEAPOLIS, June 5. — A world-wide exchange of views on the national and international conditions, problems and opportunities for fellowship and service is being together a group of 10,000 delegates to the Rotary International convention here June 18-22. Delegates from 44 countries and many smaller bands of visitors from overseas are now on their way to meet with their Rotary brethren from around the world.

As spokesmen for the five continents in which Rotary clubs have been organized in the last year, Dr. Wilhelm Cuno, former chancellor of the German Republic and steersman of the world, will respond to the address of welcome to these new delegates by Arthur H. Sapp, of Washington, Indiana, U. S. A., the president of Rotary International.

Reflecting the best thought of modern civilization in public life from 44 countries of the world, a series of brief talks by Sir Donald Maclean, former deputy chairman of the British house of commons, Dr. Edward Willem, noted Belgian educator; Dr. Eduardo Moore of Santiago, Chile; Dr. R. G. McGeachon, Australia, physician, and many others features the morning sessions of the convention.

The days' discussion of the aims and objects of Rotary and the obligations of Rotary clubs in community work, will be accompanied by an elaborate program of typically American entertainment arranged by the Minneapolis host committee.

Nearly 2,900 communities throughout the world will be represented in the Minneapolis auditorium. Many special assemblies, for the discussion of development of social and civic opportunities for service will bring to the coming year's program of activity to be carried into every corner of the globe where Rotary fosters better living conditions, higher standards of ethics in business life, and civic service to human mutual understanding and unadvised concord.

Nearly Doubled in 5 Years
In the past five years the institution of Rotary has nearly doubled, growing from 1,493 clubs to nearly 3,000 clubs. Seventeen more countries have been added and now Rotary is deeply rooted in 44 countries throughout the world.

Such has been the spread of the movement suggested by Paul Harris, a Chicago lawyer, in February, 1905, forming an organization which would have single representation in each business, trade and professional community. Thus the one Rotarian of each community would rotate among the clubs with the inspiration of the representative council of the community.

Such contact, rather than conflict with other civic organizations, attracted a personnel strong enough to make a leading interest in any activity of the community so that the assistance of any paid organization was not needed.

Limiting the membership of each Rotary club to but one man in each distinct line of business, profession in the community, the result is that each business and profession shall have one worthy active exponent in the Rotary club, and that the Rotary club, through its members, may have one representative and responsible agent in each line of business and profession in the community.

Germany Added to Roll
One of the latest countries to be added to the roll of Rotary International is the German Republic. It will be represented at the convention by Dr. Cuno, leader of the German delegation. Bolivia, Ecuador, Salvador, Costa Rica and Uruguay are the others into which Rotary has gone since June, 1927.

It was to be expected that all English speaking countries would have such a common ground of fellowship and understanding, but the spread of the Rotary idea in countries with languages other than English has been of striking significance.

The Spanish and Portuguese speaking dinner at the annual convention will be nearly equal in size to the annual British Empire dinner which brings together the Rotarians from their ladies from all the countries where Englishmen have settled and declared allegiance to their country.

That there is a definite group of Rotarians is shown by the similarity of the work carried on by the many clubs in Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia and Central and South America, for the benefit of the social and community life of their countries.

Boys' Work First Service
Boys' work was probably the first in community service undertaken by early Rotary clubs. Lured children work is now a prominent feature. There are 2,100 boys' work committees in 144 clubs doing crippled children

Rotary club of San Antonio, Camp Farewell, New York, on Fire Island, out in the harbor, is maintained for crippled boys by the New York Rotary club where the idea of a nationwide, and later a world-wide, Boys' Work originated some years ago. The summer camp of 1927 cared for 127 boys representing 13 nationalities. Free medical treatment for 16 boys from nearly as many countries was provided by the Rotary club of Michigan.

The Rotary club of Auckland, New Zealand, presented prizes in a ceremony of public recognition to the boys who, at the risk of their lives, went into a collapsed mine and rescued miners and pit boys overcome with dangerous gases. The Tampa, Florida, Rotary club found that as a result of its work among delinquent boys, the judge of the juvenile court reported not a single boy arraigned before him for delinquency for the past year.

Promote Business Ethics
The improvement of trade relations and encouraging and adoption of business ethics is becoming more and more a part of the program of every Rotary club. The fostering of honorable and friendly relations among employers and employees, among competitors in business, both in national and international trade is having its effect in improved international understanding and friendship.

One hundred twenty-six codes of correct business practices have been adopted directly as a result of the efforts of Rotarian members of various trade associations. The Rotary code of ethics, subscribed to by every Rotarian, has encouraged them to bring a similar code to their professional, trade and business associations.

MOTHEP'S HAND MUST BE SMARTLY GLOVED

There are many "fancy" gloves which are, in reality, very simple, suitable for wear with a particular costume or on dress occasions. Some are of plain kid, one-button length and slightly flared for an inch with their edges finished with a cord of silver, gold or vivid color. Gloves with small turned-back cuffs trimmed with Beauvais embroidery are also attractive and serve to give a touch of color to a dark costume.

Alexandrine is showing a new greenish grey glove in ideal tone for the new colors known as "pale tones" with a golden cast or the faintest trace of rose.

STATE MAKING CHECK OF ITS REAL ESTATE

AUSTIN, June 5.—The exact extent of the state's real estate holdings is being determined in a survey that the state board of control is making.

Buildings and land throughout the state, including the eleemosynary institutions, prison farms, penitentiary, schools and other holdings, are being valued.

At present there are no available figures that are reliable regarding the value of state-owned property.

In Austin, besides the capitol and state office building there are the state hospital for the insane, the school for the feeble minded, the deaf institute, and the blind institute, the Confederate home and the Confederate women's home and the University of Texas.

Millions of dollars have been spent for buildings over the state in the past five years. All of these additions will be shown in the survey.

The figures to be secured will also be useful in determining the basis for legislative appropriations for maintenance and building.

AUTO LICENSE TAGS MAY BE OF ALUMINUM

If tests now being made prove satisfactory more than a million dollars may be saved in postage by the various state governments through supplying automobile license tags made of aluminum instead of steel.

This possible economy was first called to the attention of state highway commissioners through the adoption of aluminum for that purpose by Brazil and Japan.

Aluminum weighs just one-third as much as steel, and the material is plenty strong, as is attested by its use for automobile crank cases, pistons and bodies. It is also rust-proof, and on the new type of license plates the background could be left in its natural state, with only the figures and letters colored. This does away with a background enamel, effecting still further economies.

The experiments are being watched with much interest, not only by state budgeteers, but by automobile clubs who offer delivery service to their members in those commonwealths that have adopted the "come and get it" method of delivering license plates.

COL. GORDON TO DRILL REAGAN TO RANGER PAY

RANGER, June 5.—Discovery of free oil at the top of the Caddo lime by the Reagan No. 1 of Col. Robert D. Gordon, Ranger operator, has created the belief that the well, northeast of Cisco, in the Ramsower field can be made into a producer in that pay. Depth of the well today was 3272 feet.

Old men declare that originally that section was a "Caddo Country" and that when free oil was found there, a well was considered as strongly favorable for production.

However, Gordon will drill on to the Ranger pay where the bigger production in the last year and a half has been struck in the pool that he opened up in October, 1926. If the Ranger pay does not come up to expectations, the well will be plugged back to the Caddo and shot with excellent hope of proving a producer.

Drilling of this well has been impeded by the big gas production that was struck at a shallow depth. Ten million cubic feet of gas a day was hit and this gas has broken in numerous times and has slowed the progress of the well.

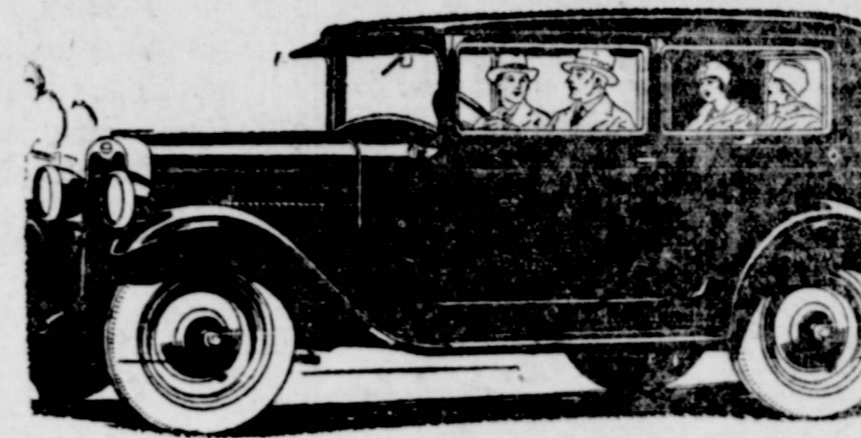

OIL PRORATION IN YATES POOL IS PETITIONED

AUSTIN, June 5.—Pinching down from a potential production estimated at 1,000,000 barrels a day to 51,500 barrels, is the object of proration rules proposed by the railroad commission to govern the Yates pool in a notice for a hearing in Austin on June 11. The action was in response to a petition of a committee representing the operators in the Yates pool, the largest known oil field in Texas. The output of 31,300 barrels was arrived at by adopting the daily maximum pipe line output.

The operators in the Yates pool have been prorating the production through an agreement adopted from time to time, but which expired June 1 without apparent chance of re-adoption. It is because of this that an appeal was made to the commission to take over supervision of production.

The rules proposed are largely the same as those promulgated by the commission for the Winkler county fields, with some modifications. The 51,500-barrel maximum daily output is to be based on acreage and average potential production. The acreage is to be computed as 25 per cent of the total allowance and the average of the wells at 75 per cent thereof.

Administration of the rules

the same as in the Winkler field, being left to an umpire and an advisory committee of seven operators. They will be named later.

Under the proposed rules the units will be 100 acres, instead of forty acres as in the Winkler field. The same prohibitions are in the shooting wells.

There are 190 producing wells in the Yates pool with an estimated potential production nearly 1,000,000 barrels, all of which will be brought out in testimony to be adduced in the hearing.

Producers in the Yates field are the Mid-Kansas, Transcontinental, Gulf, California, Summa, McMan Savoy, Mazda, Red Bank, Roxani, Marland, Kirby, Phillips, Humbl Oil Operators' Trust, Skelly, Grayburg and Osage. Royalty owners are Yates Ranch Royalty Owners, Fort Worth; I. G. Yates, San Angelo; M. A. Smith, Marta, J. H. Tippet, Rankin, and Marland, Employers' Royalty company, Ponca City, Ok.

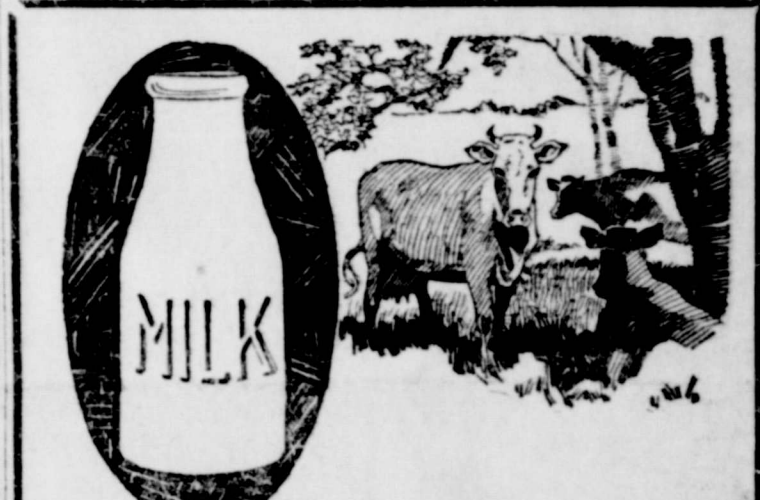

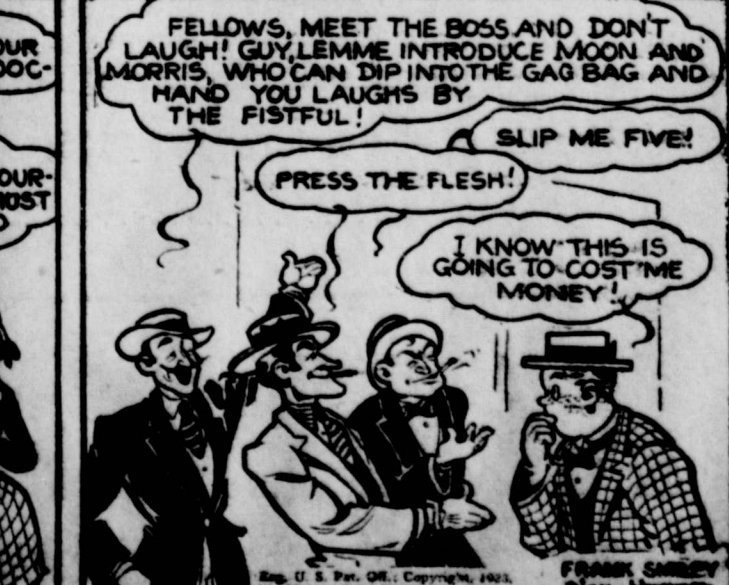
