COTTON PICKING PROBLEMS
The Lower Rio Grande Valley, where cotton picking will soon be under way, is making plans to assure an adequate supply of cotton pickers and prevent the shortage that has been experienced during the past few years. The United States Department of Labor will place a man at Edinburg to co-operate with the farmers in the best distribution possible of cotton pickers during the season they will be needed there, and then to aid in moving such as these as may wish to go on north the next concentration point probably being Robstown. Much trouble is experienced throughout Texas from the operation of parties who go into the cotton sections where labor is busy and attempt to take them away by truck loads in the promise of better wages and better working conditions. Efforts will be made to stop this practice.

TRANSPORTATION RULING
Dallas lawyer writes me that he noticed a paragraph in this column in the Cisco News in which the question is asked whether a traveling man who owns a car may haul a passenger with him on a trip, the passenger agreeing to pay for the gas and oil consumed as his part of the expense, without getting a permit. Stating that he is interested in the question, he finds that other lawyers with whom he has discussed it are agreed in the opinion that "individuals owning cars used for ordinary commercial business may haul a passenger and collect a fare, if the transaction is an incidental one." Whether the law may be, that sounds like common sense, and unusually so in the common sense interpretation of a statute.

SHOWERING WITH ROSES
Victoria, known throughout Texas as "The City of Roses," will attract attention to itself at the National Democratic convention by showering the delegates with thousands of roses to which will be attached ribbons bearing the word, "Victoria, Texas, the City of Roses." For a time at least this novel Battle of Flowers will draw attention-attracting than the battle of words that is sure to characterize the convention proceedings.

TURKEY CROP PROMISING
From those sections of the state where interest has centered in the past few years in turkey growing the report comes that while the crop of turkeys may not be as large as last year, young turkeys that survive the spring rains and cold are in splendid condition and will likely bring Texas as much money this year as in years past.

EAST TEXAS HONEY—Uvalde and other West Texas points that have been priding themselves as the great honey producing sections of the state are notified that East Texas is going extensively into honey production. Many East Texas farms now have small apiaries and in a few places there is honey production on a large scale. Honey as "fine as grapes" is being marketed in Palestine and other East Texas cities by the truck load.

PRIMARY EXPENSES—Methods should be found to lower the expense of holding primary elections. It is estimated that approximately \$200,000 will have to be assessed against county and district candidates in Dallas county and in other counties the cost of getting one's name on the ticket makes running for office too much of a gamble to encourage candidates to offer for positions. If this were all the expense it would not be so bad, but every step of the campaigning comes high, and the candidate is the victim of all sorts of schemes for getting money from the church festival up or down, whichever it may be. This is not an inappropriate place to suggest that June 16 is the final date for county and precinct candidates to file their names to have them appear on the ticket.

BILLIE SMITH WITHDRAWS
Hon. W. A. Smith, editor of the San Saba News, has announced that he will not continue in the race for lieutenant-governor. He doesn't state why he is withdrawing, but this columnist has an idea that "Billie" became disgusted with the whole game of politics as soon as he got a good look behind the curtain and decided he did not think the honor worth the sacrifice he would have to make. Practically all the editors of Texas who knew him were for him and unhesitatingly said that many of them warned him that one of his type of mind and character would find newspaper work more to his liking.

Her Fate in Balance



If Mrs. Eva Dugan is hanged in the Arizona penitentiary at Florence for the alleged murder of A. J. Mathis, ranchman, she will be the first woman to pay the supreme penalty in the state's history. Her case is now being reviewed by the board of pardons following a stay granted by the chief executive.

Attention was called to the necessity of making selections of bundle wheat and oats at this time, owing to possible damage in the shock. Eastland county now stands sixth in this contest and the premium money for sixth place is \$500, but \$1,000 for fifth place and Eastland county workers are determined to get into the \$1,000 money with the 1928 exhibit. The expense of the county exhibit at Dallas is borne equally by the various cities.

Rescue Crews Are Spurred on Toward Italia by Reports That Two on Huge Ship Were Seriously Injured in Falling

LONDON, June 11.—Spurred by radio reports from the Italia that, while General Umberto Noble and 17 members of his crew were still alive, two were seriously injured when the ship's gondola was hurled to the ground in a storm, relief workers today were accelerating their rescue plans. The crew of the Italia was separated into two groups when Noble and seven companions fell with the gondola while the remainder drifted with the dirigible 30 kilometers further before grounding.

According to Captain Risler-Larsen, Norwegian ace, the planes which he and Lieutenant Holm brought to Spitzbergen have not sufficient to carry supplies for the 18 refugees. He and the lieutenant, however, are making every effort to get into touch with the marooned men. Captain Risler-Larsen Sunday flew his plane from Spitzbergen and joined Lieutenant Holm on the sealer Hoboy. But ice packed in around that vessel prevented them from taking off for the spot in the Arctic Ocean where the Italia's crew is stranded. He also recalled the ice breaker Braganza to Kings Bay so that it might fit out as a base ship for the two Norwegian aviators, but ice conditions also have prevented that vessel from making headway.

Trial of Lee Smith on Murder Charge Begun at Baird

Killing of Two Mexicans in Front of Stanton Bank Alleged Frameup; Grand Jury Returns 16 True Bills

BAIRD, June 11.—With the trial of Lee Smith set for today the Callahan county district court entered the second week of the term. Smith is on trial for murder in connection with the fatal shooting of two Mexicans in front of a bank at Stanton, on the night of December 23, 1927. It was an alleged frameup to collect a \$5,000 reward. A special venire of 80 talesmen has been summoned from which to select the jury.

Smith was brought to Baird by Sheriff Everett Hughes and Sheriff J. H. Barr of Abilene a few days ago, the case being transferred on change of venue from Taylor county where the jury failed to reach a decision at the recent term of court. Some 80 or 100 witnesses are expected here for the trial. C. C. Baise, charged with murder in connection with the shooting, is a fugitive from justice.

Four jurors had been secured at Stanton Monday, according to E. F. Russell, county attorney of Callahan county. The four were chosen within one hour after the examination began. It is anticipated that the jury panel will be complete when court adjourns late today. The four accepted were: R. L. Young, barber, Cross Plains; G. L. Harper, farmer, Putnam; J. H. Primes, stockman, Baird; H. E. Butler, farmer, Putnam.

A motion by the defense counsel for a continuance on account of absent witnesses was overruled by the court.

The court was organized with Judge M. S. Long presiding and all officers present. The following jury bailiffs were appointed: Jerry Bradford, door bailiff; J. J. Price, house bailiff; W. S. Melton, W. L. Whitch, walking bailiffs; Jim McMillan and Bob Tollett, riding bailiffs.

Sixteen true bills of indictment all felonies, had been found up to the time the grand jury made its first report, which was signed by B. L. Russell, Jr., foreman and R. B. McGowan, secretary, and is as follows:

We, your grand jury for the June term, submit the following report for your consideration, to-wit: We have examined 39 witnesses and after careful investigation have found 16 felonies, no misdemeanors. We have inspected the county jail and found same in clean and sanitary condition, and all prisoners therein well cared for. We wish to recommend to the court and to the citizens of Callahan county the urgent need of a new court house, as we have found the present one in a crowded and seemingly unsafe condition, for the safe keeping of our county records. We wish to commend the county and district officers for their efficient and business-like way of performing their duties, and find after our investigations, there has been very little crime committed in our county.

BRECKENRIDGE INSTALLS NEW WATER UNIT

BRECKENRIDGE, June 11.—During the last week the work of installing an emergency unit at the Breckenridge water pump station was completed. This new unit, which has a pumping capacity of 1,000 gallons of water a minute, was installed at a cost of \$2,500. It is operated by electricity.

This emergency unit gives the city fire protection. If the oil pumps now in use become incapacitated the operators can switch to the new electric unit in a moment's time. Not only is the city now protected by the double pumping units, but two separate lines run from the station to the city's network of mains. If one blows up the water can be turned instantly to the other.

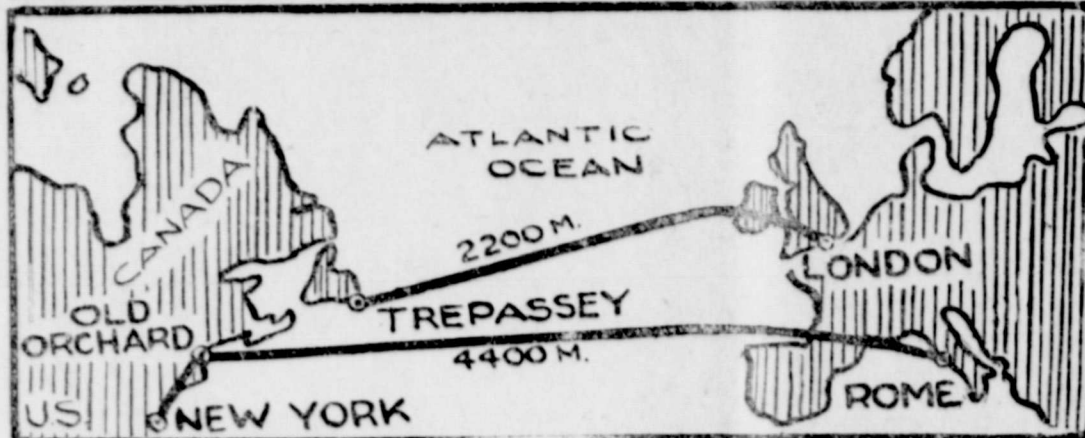

"This is a day when men and women will sell out," Rev. P. T. Stanford, Methodist minister, said Sunday night. There is a clear cut distinction between the Christian and the sinner and that distinction ought to be in evidence at least occasionally, he said.
