# Rescue Crews Are Spurred on Toward COOLIDGE OFF Italia by Reports That Two on Huge TONIGHT FOR 3 Ship Were Seriously Injured in Falling

LONDON, June 11.-Spurred by radio reports from the Italia that, while General Umberto Noble and 17 members of his crew were still alive, two were seriously injured when the ship's gondola was hurled to the ground in a storm, relief workers today were accelerating their rescue plans. The crew of the Italia was separated into two groups when Nobile and seven companions fell with the gondola while the remainder drifted with the dirigible 30 kilometers further before grounding.

According to Captain Riiser-Larsen, Norwegian ace, the planes which he and Lieutenant Holm brought to Spitzbergen have not space enough to carry supplies sufficient for the 18 refugees. He and the lieutenant, however, making every effort to get into touch with the marooned men.

Captain Riiser-Larsen Sunday flew his plane from Spitzbergen and joined Lieutenant Holm on the sealer Hobby. But ice packed around that vessel prevented them from taking off for the spot in the Arctic Ocean where the Italia's crew is stranded.

He also recalled the ice break-Braganza to Kings Bay so that it might fit out as a base ship for the two Norwegian aviators, but ice conditions also have prevented that vessel from making


