Vase Of Flowers Good Barometer, Says Engineer In Health Study

Denver, Colo., June 21-"If fresh flowers do not keep well in your home it is a direct indication that tain enough moisture for proper breathing," says Dan J. McQuaid, an engineer who recently made a study of proper health conditions

In other words, a vase of flower a fine barometer.

"Statistics show that one-third of all deaths in the United States can be traced directly to diseases espiratory organs, such as tuber olosis, pneumonia and influenza," ir. McQuaid said. "When dry air breathed into the body, its tendency is to dry the surface of the membranes it passes on its way to the lungs, and in this manner to the lungs, and in this manner to hotbed for germs.

The amount of moisture the air will hold depends on the temper-ature. A cubic foot of air at 100 degrees temperature (Fahrenheit) will hold about 20 grains of mois ture; at 70 degrees about eight grains and at zero about one-half

LAST DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION IN SOUTH HISTORIC ASC

Session at charleston in 1860 Saw arty Split Wide Open over Slavery; Forerunner to Secession, Civil War

In the early times of political conventions, Baltimore was a favorite. It was then something of a half-way locality for the majority of the country's population. The old city, with its distinctly Southern atmosphere, entertained one Democratic national convention after another, until other ambitious cities entered the field. The last one after a long space of years was in 1912 and saw the memorable contest between the forces of Champ Clark of Missouri and of Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey, resulting in the nomination of the latter on the sixty-fourth ballot. which was something of a dufation record until Madison Square Garden four years ago.

The last Democratic convention held in the so-called Solid South, was an epoch-making event, and appears to have develpped conditions which broke democracy's long record of success, Charleston convention also nost pronounced convention bolt America's political There have been convention bolts usually of a few individuals leavthe convention hall, but at Charleston state delegations-one them having been Texas-walked out the hall and had nothing more to do with that convention. Not original convention tried it again, and more states walked out.

Issue Was Slavery. The large and, practically, only issue to rend the national democracy apart that year was the slavery question. The cleavage between the North and South was fairly getting under way, and received its greatest impetus through the Charleston bolt, and later overflowed into the great Civil War James Buchanan of Pennsylvania, man of large experience in pub president until Grover Cleveland n 1885, was a conservative and regarded as a sort of guarantor o iomestic peace. John C. Fremont. the first Republican nominee for president, was of flery character on the looming question.

The Democratic platform upon which Buchanan was elected no only denounced religious intoler ance but warned the country that continued interference by congres of the slavery question and armed resistance to law as to fugitive slaves would end in civil war and lisur on. The platform declared for the state to delared for freedom of the seas and for American ascendancy in the Gulf of Mexico, adhering at the same time to the Monroe doctrine.

Mr. Buchanan entered upon his term of office with the declaration that he would exert his administration in such a way as to give hope of no slavery agitation, and, as a beginning, appointed his cabnet evenly between Northern and Southern states.
