CONVENTION ENTHUSIASM.—It only some way could be devised to get Texans as enthusiastic over industrial development as they are over politics, this state would become the garden spot of the world within a few years. Men and women by the thousands will pay hundreds of dollars for the privilege of shouting themselves hoarse over something they know nothing about, provided they are told it has political significance. Ask them to spend a dime or devote an hour of their time to any cause for the improvement of their community and they will excuse themselves on the ground that they can't afford it.

HOUSTON'S BIG CARNIVAL.—Most visitors to the Houston convention have been more impressed with the carnival spirit of the big show than with its real bearing upon the serious affairs of the country. Very few of them have had any share in the convention proceedings beyond the privilege of shouting their endorsement of the program for the party as formulated by the various committees in advance. It is the way of all politics, though, and makes one wonder after all if this is a real democracy in which we live. As a big top circus the Houston convention has been a show worth going miles to see, if one likes to see such things, and as a spectacular event it has exceeded that given by the Republican party in Kansas City.

CLOWNS IN POLITICS.—Political clowns have been much in evidence at the Houston convention, though many of them have taken themselves seriously. The clown always affords relief after the strain of the big acts of a circus, and the Houston convention clowns have been no exception. They have made themselves heard under the big dome and have given out semi-humorous interviews to the press. Truth is both the Kansas City and the Houston convention would have made mighty dull newspaper reading but for the humorous antics of some of the would-be great and the fun that some of the newspaper correspondents have thrown into their report. The American public likes humorous entertainment even from a political convention.

WET CONVENTION JOKES.—The big rain broke through the temporary roof of the Houston convention hall just before the "keynote" speech proved a godsend to newspaper correspondents and jokesters at the convention, giving them a new turn to their "this-is-a-wet-convention" joke. Before that the joke in its various forms centered around Houston perspiration. With the leaky roof it could be changed to "there is not a dry plank in the platform" and "this is certainly a wet convention, both outside and inside." Another great piece of convention humor centered around the name of Bowers, the keynote speaker in convention with his fiery and denunciatory speech. It took the form of "from the way he slings ugly words he must be from the Bowers."

POWER COMPANY CONTROVERSY.—Austin and one of the public utility companies are having an interesting spat. For some time the utility company has sought to furnish Austin with power and light. Its lowest bid was rejected by the Austin city council as too high and unsatisfactory. The company has no franchise to operate in the city of Austin, but some time ago built its lines to the edge of the city. Austin has been supplying part of the electrical service to one of the state institutions. The utility company made a bid to furnish this institution, which is in the city limits of Austin, with electrical service at about half the lowest price it had quoted the city of Austin for its entire electrical requirements. To reach the institution with its lines the company had to cross an Austin street, over which it has no franchise. The city has ordered the lines removed. The situation is at least interesting and complicating.

WIRE WALKING RATS.—Eagle Pass reporters tell an interesting rat story. To get from house to house and block to block, and at the same time avoid the cats, rats in large numbers have taken to the use of the overhead cables and light wires, and every night may be seen running along the wires and staging picnics in treetops through which the wires extend. The unusual story is vouched for by the superintendent of the Eagle Pass schools. The newspapers will now page Eastland.

COTTON CROP REPORTS.—Heavy rains in many parts of the cotton section and the appearance of plant pests and blight in sections heretofore uninfested are giving growers the "cotton blues" and, temporarily at least, sending up the price of cotton.

WRECKAGE AT CROSSING HERE IS CLEARED UP

The Texas & Pacific wreck at the intersection of D avenue, in which nine cars were struck when an extra freight backed into an open switch Thursday afternoon, has been cleared up. The wrecker came out and picked up the bad order cars in a short while.

"Miss Cisco" has been chosen to represent this city at the water carnival and celebration at Brownwood, beginning with a street program at 8:30 o'clock Monday night, but her identity is yet a mystery, according to Secretary Peters, of the Cisco chamber of commerce, which selected her as Cisco's representative.

"This young lady is one of the outstanding beauties of this city," Peters said, "and she was selected by the chamber of commerce for her pulchritude of face and form, as well as on account of the prominent position she occupies in local society."

Considerable speculation has already been made as to the identity of this young lady, but she will be introduced to the public Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock at Lake Cisco, when a number of events in her honor will be staged at the formal presentation," said J. S. Law, in charge of the water program. "Miss Cisco" will be accompanied by an imposing escort. The water carnival in her honor will consist of several races, demonstrations in swimming, life saving and a pantomime water act. Immediately after the presentation Sunday afternoon there will be a swimming party in honor of "Miss Cisco," to which many prominent Ciscoans have special invitations. After the swim she will be the honor guest of friends at a dinner at the Country club.

Brownwood is celebrating the opening of that city's white way, commencing Monday evening at 8:30 with a street program, and a bathing revue and other events Tuesday and Wednesday. Cisco people have been extended a cordial invitation to join Brownwood and help make this one of the biggest events in the history of West Texas. Secretary Peters stated that it is desired that a large delegation accompany "Miss Cisco" to Brownwood on this occasion, and it will be remembered that Cisco was given the heartiest cooperation from Brownwood on the occasion of the Lake Cisco bathing revue last year, when the Old Gray Mare band and a number of citizens of that city accompanied their entrant and contributed much to our own celebration.

WELL BROUGHT IN IN NEW PART OF THIS COUNTY

The bringing in of a well in a territory that has recently drawn but little attention has aroused interest in the Gorman-Desdemona district in the southeastern part of Eastland county. Estimated as good for 100 barrels a day, the well is producing in the Desdemona pay around 2,700 feet. It is the No. 1 Linley of Jarvis and associates. The well is several miles northeast of Gorman and is regarded as an extension of the field. It will result in several wells being drilled in that region.

This is the third pool in the past two weeks in Eastland county on which attention has been focused. The Rhodes gusher in the Sibley pool is the center of 14 wells now drilling. Two shallow wells in that territory have caused added interest. The Gordon pool, where the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company hit a deeper sand at almost 4,000 feet and where Col. Robert D. Gordon should have a 150-barrel well in the black lime when he cleans out the No. 1 Reagan, is the other area that is enjoying a good play.

With their victory of last night, however, Smith managers were securely in command this morning and affairs clicked with smoothness and dispatch. Nominating oratory was cut short and confined to essentials and when the word was passed "it's to be Robinson," the delegates fell into line like well behaved Republicans. At 1:20 the chairman announced the official results of the only ballot for the vice presidency, as follows: General Allen, 21; Mrs. Ross 2; Barkley, 9; Fletcher, 7; Woolen 2; Moody, 9 1-3; Berry 11 1-2; Robinson 1,032 1-6.

The addition of the Arkansas senator to the ticket insures a "fighting team" to represent the party. There are few more vigorous campaigners than Governor Smith, and Robinson will make a militant partner. It is a coincidence without parallel in party history that both Republicans and Democrats went to the United States senate this year for vice presidential candidates. The Republicans nominated Curtis, senate majority leader, and Democrats Robinson minority leader.

DEMONSTRATION GIVEN IN CHICKEN CULLING
J. C. Patterson, county agent, was here today and went out to the C. T. Murray farm, near the Myrick dairy, where he gave a demonstration in chicken culling. He stated one of the great poultry pests at the present time is blue bugs, but these pests are easily eradicated, he said. for the child worker. All of these subjects will be dealt with in relation to the adolescent worker's job. It would be better if boys and girls did not have to go to work at gainful employment before their physical development is assured and their schooling completed. As long as they do, however, it is important that their health should be safeguarded as much as possible and that they themselves should be taught to keep well and fit.

CASH VALUE OF GOOD WILL.

Do "good will flights pay? Evidently they do, in hard cash as well as less material ways. In the first three months of last year, before Lindbergh's flight to France, our aircraft exports to that country amounted to \$234,000. In the first three months of this year they amounted to \$815,000, a growth of 250 per cent, and are still rapidly increasing. The American aircraft industry today is enjoying a great boom, in which Lindbergh's exploits have been the biggest factor. While he was "selling America" to other lands, he was unintentionally selling them airplanes and accessories. It always works that way.
