Cisco Shippers Get \$3,374 for Livestock

5 CATTLE, 59 HOGS ARE SOLD AT FT. WORTH

Another check for \$3,374.90 was received by the First National bank of Cisco and is being distributed to the shippers of livestock from Cisco to the Fort Worth market Tuesday, through the Cisco Cooperative Livestock association. This association sends out shipment monthly, usually from one to four cars. Three cars were shipped out Tuesday, two of cattle and one of hogs. There were five cattle in the shipment and 59 hogs. Anti-Smithers Pledge \$5,000 to Start Campaign; South Carolina Delegates Refuse G.O.P. Lineup

ASHEVILLE, N. C., July 19.—The conferences of southern dry Democrats here to perfect plans for a revolt against the Democratic national ticket, today settled down to business of perfecting their organization in every state south of the Mason-Dixon line. There were 285 delegates registered today. The only discord came when E. O. Watson, Columbia, S. C., and Dr. J. J. Gentry, Spartanburg, S. C., walked out of the conference when their demand for the organization of a third party was turned down. They explained that in South Carolina voting for the Republican presidential ticket meant voting for the entire state ticket of that party. Enthusiastic delegates pledged \$5,000 from the floor to fight Smith. It was learned from a reliable source at the conclusion of a secret session. The fund is expected to reach hundreds of thousands of dollars when the campaign is started. The delegates adopted the name of "The Conference of Anti-Smith Democrats" and selected an executive committee composed of two members from each of the 13 southern states and the Philippines to cooperate with the policy committee.

PLANS FOR COUNTY FAIR NEXT FALL

Are in Making; Officers Named for Cheaney and Alameda Exhibitions

Plans are being matured under the direction of County Agent J. C. Patterson for a county fair to be held in Eastland on a day in September to be decided; for a Poland China hog show to be held in Carbon in late August or early September and for community fairs in Rising Star, Alameda, Cheney, Scranton, Colony and other points in Eastland county. Plans are also being developed for a dairy show to be held in Cisco and a poultry show in Ranger, both sometime during the winter. The spirit of co-operation that prevails in Eastland county is certain to lead to great development in farming, dairying, hog raising and poultry raising and all industry that bears any relation at all to agriculture," said Mr. Patterson. "The community fairs will display products that will be brought to the county fair, and the choice exhibits at the county fair will be taken to the State Fair in Dallas. The exhibits at the dairy show in Cisco and the poultry show in Ranger will be the basis for an Eastland county exhibit of dairy products and poultry to be sent to the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth in the spring. FARMERS PLANT TOO MANY TREES TO ACRE, SAYS STEPHENVILLE MAN WHO FINDS FRUIT IS PAYING CROP

Farmers of this section of West Texas are passing up a good bet in not paying more attention to fruit trees, in the opinion of J. E. Fitzgerald, Stephenville farmer, in a letter to the editor of The American. One fault of the farmers who do plant trees is that they plant them too close together with the result that they do not have room to grow properly, Fitzgerald says. Another shortcoming is that fruit trees are brought in from the north that do not pollenate here. Fitzgerald's letter follows: I have read with great interest what the various fruit and truck growers have to say in the American. Of course we out here in West Texas will always have the hot winds and droughts and floods at times and various other calamities. But these things or something like them come all over the world and people manage to live. It might interest your readers to know that a neighbor of mine sold \$121.50 worth of Early Wheeler peaches from 20 trees this season. These were along a terrace and were like picking the money up and was a great deal easier gotten than the cotton money will be because the other man came and gathered the Wheeler. Another man came very near selling \$100 worth of peaches from a dozen trees. The Wheeler peach only seems to do well west of Fort Worth on to the Clyde territory. East it rots. Some urge that peaches do not bear enough, but really that adds value to them. If cotton failed a little more often it would be worth more money. The trouble with us western peach and apple growers is we try to set too many trees to the acre. To make the trees more sure to bear we need them from 30 to 40 feet apart. A drouth through the sum-

Recent Constitutional Amendment to Be Invoked So That Calles May Remain President Two Years More

MEXICO CITY, July 19.—Determined that the policies of the late President-elect, Alvaro Obregon shall govern Mexico under the powerful guidance of President Calles, members of the Obregonist faction in the Mexican congress will meet today for the purpose of drawing up a resolution which they claim will legally permit Calles to remain in office for two years more. The Obregonists intend to use the constitutional amendment passed last year giving future presidents a six year term instead of four years. As the amendment now stands it fails to mention the date when it shall become effective. The Obregonists intend to rush through congress a transitory article to the amendment inserting the date as November 30, 1928. Calles' term expires December 1. This would give him an additional two years in office.

BLAIR CHERRY, RANGER COACH, TO FT. WORTH

FORT WORTH, July 19.—Blair Cherry, one of the outstanding high school coaches of the state, has been named football mentor at North Side high school. Cherry, graduate of Texas Christian university, has been coach at Ranger high school for the past three years. During his three years at Ranger Cherry sent one team into the semifinals for the state championship of the Texas Interscholastic league. It was in 1925. The Ranger Bulldogs were eliminated in the semifinals by Oak Cliff high school of Dallas, led by the pile driving Roy Lumpkin, one of the greatest high school football players produced by the state. After defeating Ranger, Oak Cliff went into the finals against Waco, where they met defeat. Cherry finished his four years as a Horned Frog in 1924 and immediately took up duties as coach at Ranger high. It was in his second year that he produced the team that went far in the race. Cherry's teams have never finished lower than third in the Oil Belt district, considered the strongest section in the State Interscholastic league. Cherry has produced some outstanding players in high school football circles. Most noteworthy was Buster Mills, who is now a student at the University of Oklahoma. Mills was a quarterback and a triple threat man. Cherry was a three-letter man while at Texas Christian university. He won the "T" in football, baseball and track and was one of the most popular athletes at the institution. The North Side high coach played end. He captained the Horned Frogs in 1923. Cherry succeeds Robert Records, who has been head coach at North Side high school for the past two years. Cherry will be greeted by a green and inexperienced squad when he assumes his duties as Steer mentor this fall. Only two letter men of the past year are returning and he will be forced to develop a new team.

THE LITTLE WHITE CROSSES.

Recently the writer was talking with the mayor of a flourishing city regarding those little white crosses that are being put up to mark the spots where fatal auto accidents have occurred.

Those little white crosses do look gruesome. Every time one sees one of them one is reminded that due to somebody's lack of thought a life has been snuffed out; for it must be admitted that most motor car accidents are the result of somebody's heedlessness or carelessness.

But because the little white crosses are gruesome, should they be removed? Should they be put up at all? But to abolish the little white crosses wouldn't abolish the condition and the little white crosses stand for the unmindfulness and indifference of automobile drivers and pedestrians, for both are guilty.

The quickest way to dispose of a bad condition is to give it publicity, call attention to it, make folks think about it; for at heart most folks mean to do right, most folks mean to behave themselves, to deport themselves in ways that are seemly.

The little white crosses provoke thought; gruesome thought, to be sure, as the mayor declared; but they provoke thought; and anything that provokes thought about the automobile casualties which take off twenty-six thousands persons in a year and maim seven hundred and twenty-five thousand others is worth while.

Perhaps the time will come when the drivers in cars and the public on foot will get to where they think without reminders; then there will no longer be need for the little white crosses.

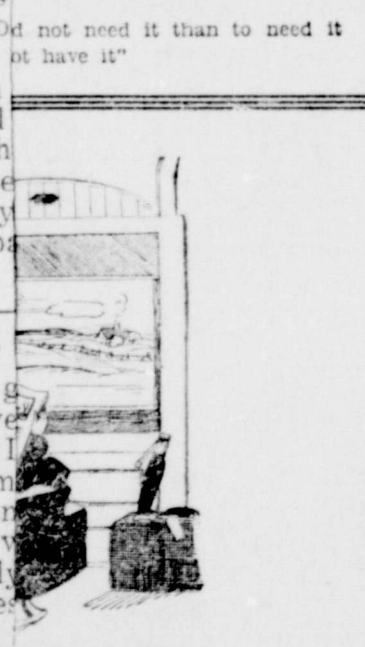

VALUE OF TERRACING IS PROVED BY DRY WEATHER

W. L. Parmer Holding Up While That of Neighbors Without Terraces Is Suffering for Rain

The continued dry weather is having a disastrous effect on the crop of the Cisco Country, according to W. L. Parmer, who owns a splendid farm and ranch about 15 miles west of Cisco.

Practically all the corn in my community is burned up," Parmer says. "However, my corn crop is looking well, and has a good yield. I attribute this to the fact that my corn remaining green while others have dried up to the point that my lands have been terraced and held the moisture better. Our last rainfall was about 1/2 inch, which fell in about 30 days. Most of this water ran off and was not conserved. Lands were terraced, and the rows left in accordance with the slope of the terraces, held the water and allowed it to soak into the ground, thus conserving this water that is now badly needed, sustaining the crops on lands were terraced.

Most of the maize and other crops are looking well, and will be a good yield if the rains do delay too long. Cotton is doing little cotton. In fact I plant no more to have any planted. My son has seven acres that he is cultivating for his own spending, just to encourage him to be the money that he spends. I want him to learn how his money goes and to encourage him in his own money.

"I have been living on this farm for 39 years, and in all that time I have only paid out for feed. One year, when the grasshoppers consumed the crops I had to buy \$90 worth of feed for my stock. I have never made a crop failure, and we have had some very

dry years. But I generally break my land deep and cultivate constantly. Of recent years I have broken all my land with a tractor and disc plow, and have found it has paid me to do so.

"We have made very little grain this year. If I did not have my own harvesting machinery it would not have paid me to harvest my crop. Oats yielded about 15 bushels and wheat about five bushels to the acre. I had 39 acres in oats and 19 acres in wheat."

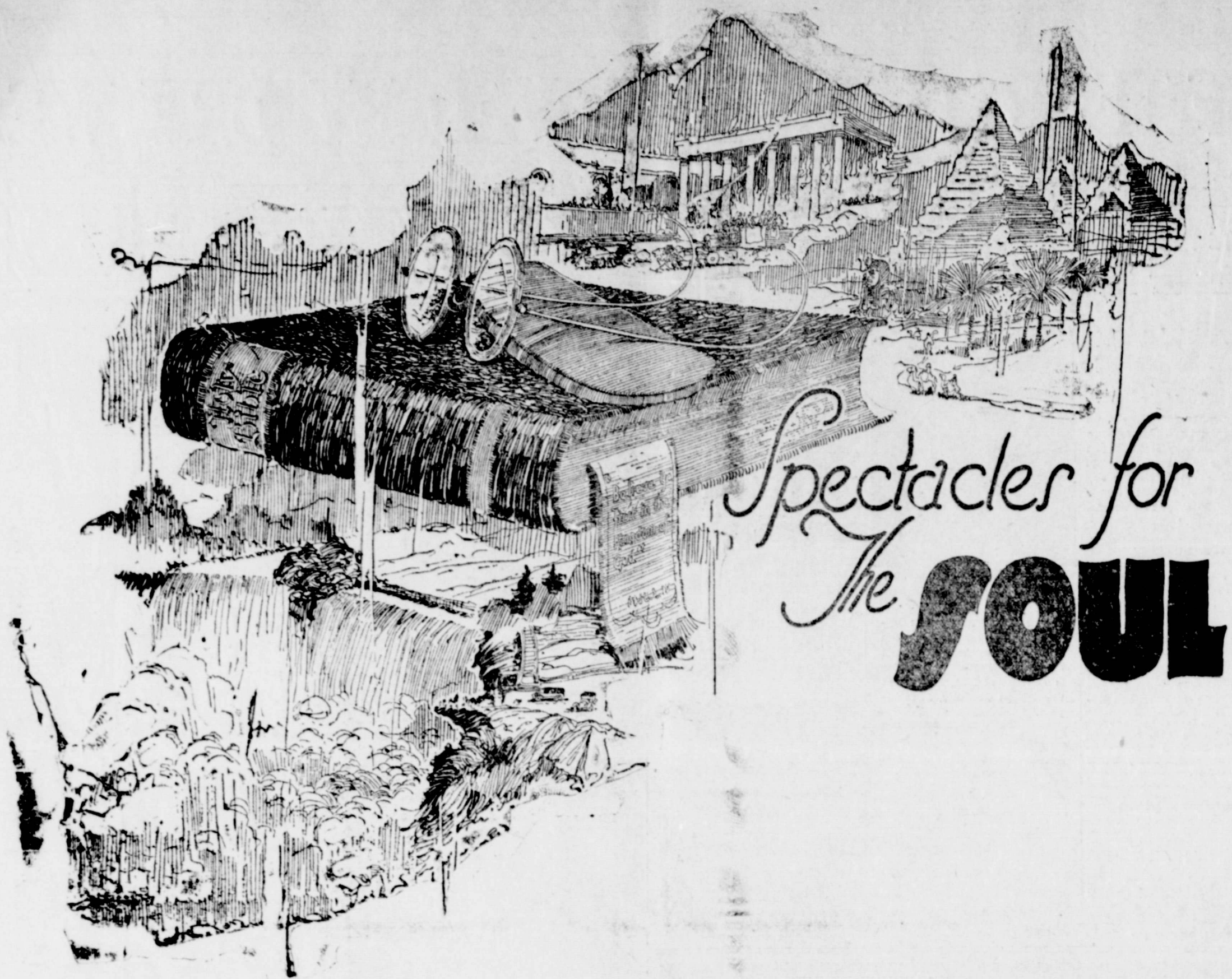

TULSA, Okla., July 19.—Estimated daily production of crude oil in the United States increased 4,016 barrels during the week ending July 14, the Oil and Gas Journal will say in its current issue.

The biggest gains were in the Gulf Coast and Rocky Mountain areas, where production in each section increased about 4,000 barrels. The Hendricks area of West Texas increased more than 6,000 barrels, but this was more than offset by a decrease of 11,000 barrels in the Yates field. Thus for the first time in several weeks the West Texas area production declined.

Oklahoma production remained fairly steady although slight gains in some areas failed to overcome

the decline of about 2,000 barrels in the Seminole fields.

Production in California decreased 2,000 barrels.

Total production in the United States during the week was 2,386,295 barrels against 2,382,189 for the week ending July 7.
