TEXAS COTTON EXPORT SEASON GETTING UNDERWAY

Ship Sails From Corpus Christi for Bremen; Thousands of Bales Will Be Enroute to Far Ports in Few Weeks

CORPUS CHRISTI, July 28.—With the sailing of the S. S. Westmoreland, bound to Bremen, the cotton shipping season of 1928 officially opened in Texas, at the port of Corpus Christi. Within the next few weeks thousands of bales of South Texas cotton will be shipped from here to far ports of the world. The Westmoreland loaded approximately 2,400 bales of cotton. According to officials of the Corpus Christi Navigation commission, the coming season will establish a new record for the port of Corpus Christi in regard to the handling of bales by sea. It is expected that at least 60,000 bales will be shipped before the season closes. Due to recent improvements and additions to the port which include the transfer sheds, a great amount of additional tracks and wharfage facilities, outbound cotton can be handled much more rapidly than in the past. The American Cotton company and the American Cotton company have both practically doubled their facilities and will be in a position to handle twice the amount of last year's crop.

ARKANSAS LAUNDRY IS RAZED BY FIRE

ELDORADO, Ark., July 28.—Hundreds of Eldorado families were short on clothing as a result of a fire which gutted the Eldorado laundry about 3 o'clock Friday morning. Damage was estimated at \$100,000. Origin of the blaze is undetermined. With the exception of a small dry cleaning plant and the business office, which were protected by fire walls, the building was destroyed. George Lisk, Pine Bluff, Ark., president of the laundry, valued the building at \$155,000.

SWEDEN LEADS WORLD IN RADIO PROPORTION

STOCKHOLM, July 28.—Sweden now leads the world in the number of radio licenses issued in proportion to population, or 37.2 for every 1,000 inhabitants. Recently the Broadcasting Bureau of the Swedish Telegraph Board asked the registered radio listeners to suggest improvements in the broadcasting program. As a result 140,000 radio fans expressed their views, which are now being carefully sorted.

MEN EATING CANDY, SMOKING CIGARETTES; WOMEN SMOKE MORE

LONDON, July 28.—Men are eating more candy and smoking less. Women are smoking more and eating fewer candies. This marked change in the habits of men and women was revealed at the annual Chocolate and Confectionery exhibition here, when exhibitors bemoaned the fact that the boyish silhouette among women does not encourage the eating of sweets. "Women and girls are now eating fewer candies compared with the days before it became fashionable to be thin," said one exhibitor. "It is not that they do not like candy just as much, but they have an idea it will make them fat. The money they once spent on candy they now spend on cigarettes." "On the other hand, the candy habit acquired by many men during the world war has survived, and we find the male is a large purchaser of sweets nowadays. Consequently he is smoking less."

LOUISIANA SPEED LIMIT RAISED TO 45 MILES HOUR

BATON ROUGE, La., July 28.—After August 1 Louisiana takes a more liberal attitude toward speeding on country highways. On that date the speed limit will be increased to 45 miles an hour and the state highway commission is given authority to regulate the speed on main highways. The commission is expected to increase the 45-mile limit in main thoroughfares.

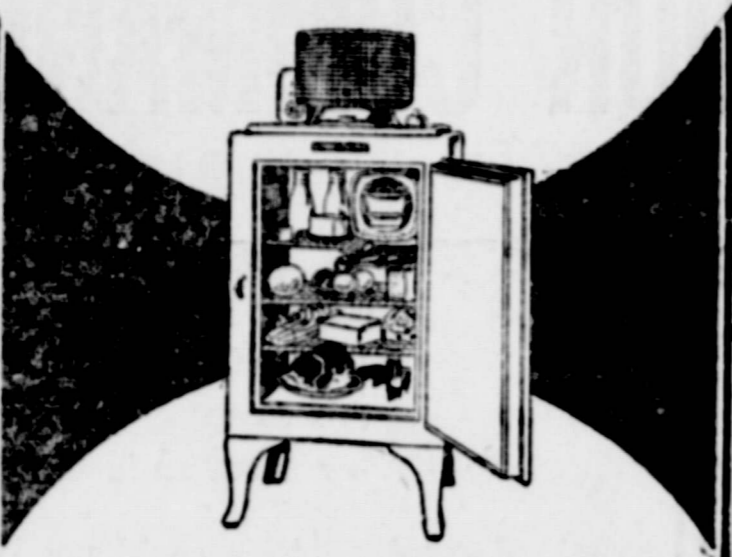

FIVE FOOT RISE IS REGISTERED AT LAKE CISCO

Lake Cisco registered a rise of five feet, one and one-half inches, Wednesday afternoon. The water level was 124.75 feet, more than has ever previously been under water, according to E. E. Scott, water superintendent, who stated that the actual high of the lake was now 78 feet. A report has been circulated that the maximum depth of the lake was 90 feet. I don't know if this report got started, but believe in giving out correct information on all matters that the public are interested in," Scott said. "We have a wonderful body of water, and 78 feet is some water, when we take into consideration the 25 miles of shore line of Lake Cisco. The water is now over the Davies field and out in the canyon on the Eolian road, while the Eolian ford is now four feet deep in water." Notwithstanding this large amount of water that has been stored in Lake Cisco the city is having no trouble with muddy water, as was the case after the previous rains. Mayor Williamson stated that he thought this trouble was now at an end, as the clarifying facilities of the water system was now taking care of all the needs of the city. 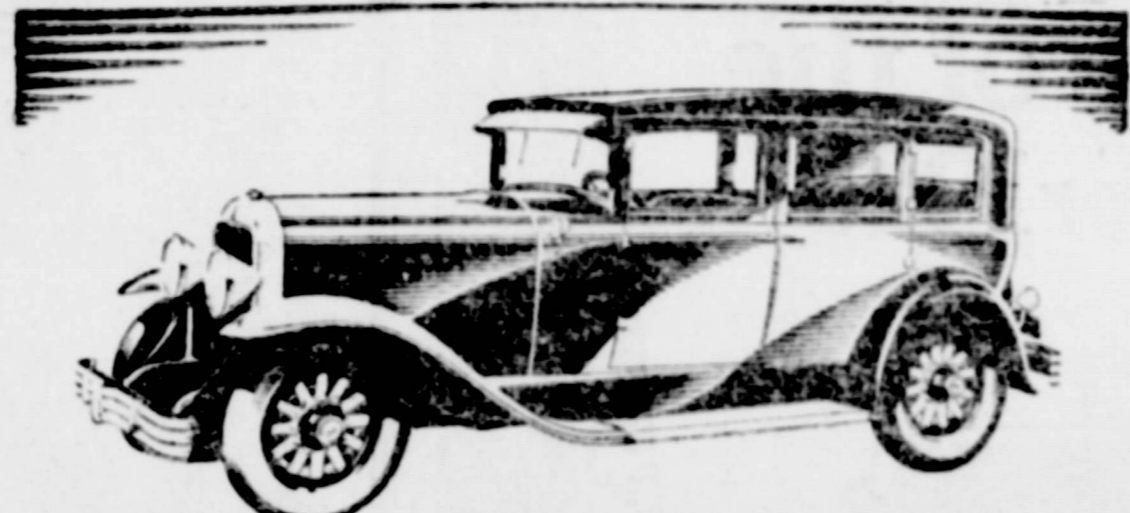

PROTEST DANCE HALL NEAR SOLDIER DEAD

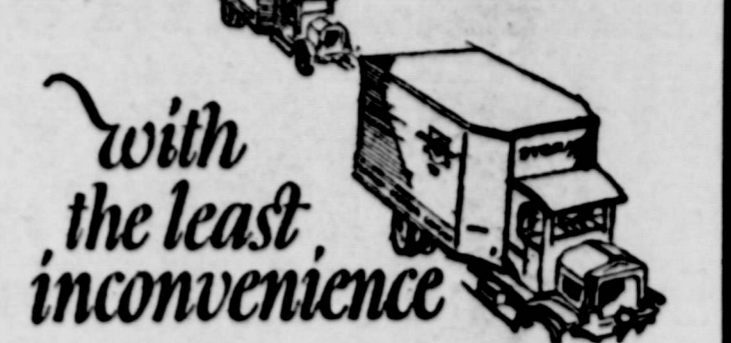

BEAT OLD MOON AROUND THE GLOBE

700 English Cotton Mills May Close As Result of Union Dispute and Loss of Business in Markets of Far East

MANCHESTER, Eng., July 28.—England's cotton industry already severely depressed, is threatened with a lockout closing some 700 mills and throwing a half a million men out of employment. This huge mass of idleness will be set in motion August 11, unless a settlement is reached between the directors of the Ramsey mill, near Oldham, refused to discharge a mill hand who was in dispute with his union.

In many quarters the announced case of the threatened lockout is considered only a partial one. It is pointed out that for months owners have sought a method of curtailing production until world markets could be built up to their pre-war strength.

The employees of the Ramsey mill went on a strike some time ago in an effort to force the owners to discharge one hand who having allowed his membership in the union to lapse, refused later to abide by union rules under which he could not be re-employed as a new member, losing many of the privileges of his original membership.

The Federation of Master Spinners felt they should not discharge a workman merely because of a failure to which they were not parties.

The course to be taken by the union in the face of the threatened lockout was not divulged.

The English cotton goods industry has never recovered from the effects of the shrinkage of English exports of cotton goods to about two-thirds of the pre-war level. The best manufacturing efforts of the mill owners, although they share the English genius for world trade, have been unable to make a dent in these sad facts.

For many months the owners have been trying to find means of curtailing production until world demand could be built up and allow the resumption of capacity milling. The difficulties of doing this have been increased because the two seasons of the industry could not agree. One portion is engaged in spinning American cotton, the other handles the Egyptian crop.

CORPUS BAY TO BE LINKED WITH GULF BY PASS

AUSTIN, July 28.—Plans for cutting a pass through Mustang Island to connect with the Gulf at Corpus Christi Bay and Laguna Madre, have been set in motion by W. J. Tucker, game, fish and oyster commissioner, who has sent S. O. Garrett, department engineer, to the coast to make preliminary arrangements.

Following the granting of a permit by the war department to make the excavations, Commissioner Tucker expects to hurry the opening of a fish pass to relieve the prostration of fisheries which followed the closing of the pass last December.

The Corpus Christi Pass, it was said, is the main entrance for fish from the Gulf to the bays in that section. Since it became closed last winter fish shortage has grown so acute that most of the nets have been hauled in. Lack of flow from the gulf has increased the stagnation of Laguna Madre to a point where fish life is impossible. Analysis of the water this week at Point Isabel showed almost no dissolved oxygen and 93,000 parts per million of salt, or over three times as salty

Courtesy Job, Palmed Off on New Senator, Brings Lot of Grief and Extra Work for Vacation Months

WASHINGTON, July 28.—Charles Waterman, junior, U. S. senator from Colorado, the furtive doubts about this much advertised "senatorial courtesy" he let it be known today.

Now the Colorado senator is finding out, and while he good-naturedly admits the joke is on him, his attitude suggests he will scrutinize future senatorial honors thrust his way most carefully before accepting them.

"The job may be an indication of senate confidence," Waterman said as he wearily outlined his program of recent weeks and his schedule for the next few months, "but I certainly wish it had been bestowed elsewhere."

Having put in many sweltering days in Philadelphia, hearing testimony of political corruption from about 300 Wilson witnesses, Waterman will go to Pittsburgh on Aug. 15 to continue this process.

Then, instead of being free to make a break for the "open spaces," he said he must come back here to start the lengthy process of hearing witnesses produced by Vare, who seeks to upset the testimony gathered by Wilson's cohorts.

Waterman hopes to have the senate subcommittee in charge of the contest return here in November so that a report can be prepared for submission to the senate early next session.

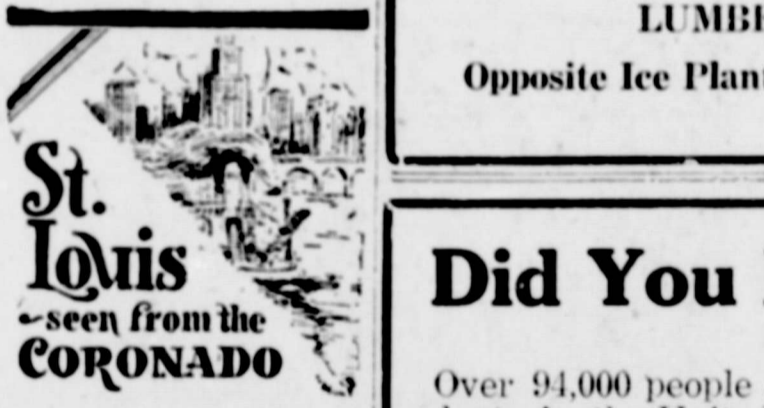
THREE DE LEON YOUTHS HELD FOR ASSAULT

RAIN IS GREAT FOR FARMERS, SAYS HAGAMAN. Frank Hagaman, who lives south of Cisco, says the rain has been great for the farmers.

Frank Hagaman, who lives south of Cisco, says the rain has been great for the farmers. "Of course," he says, "it would have been much better if we could have had it 14 days sooner, but late corn will fill out and all feed crops, such as cane, maize and peas, will revive and possibly make bumper crops."

Some crops of corn that looked like they were already turned up have begun to green up already. In a few days they will have recovered and will be none the worse for the damage. This is a characteristic of corn and maize. They will stand through drought and hot winds, looking almost brittle enough to crumble, and then will revive and produce abundant crops as a result of belated rains.

Cotton has been growing right on through the dry weather, which has been deadly to weevils and worms that may have been ready to breed. These rains will hasten the growth of this plant now and will cause squares to form rapidly where they have not already formed. The stalk will likewise branch out and be able to hold more fruit.

Altogether, Mr. Hagaman and other good farmers agree that prospects are bright for abundant crops. Early corn has been cut short but hays and other feeds will more than offset this shortage. The usually cool nights of August will aid young plants in their growth whether rains continue through the month or not.

SUGGESTIONS FOR LIFE-SAVING WEEK IN REGARD TO SWIMMING

As a part of the national observance of life-saving week, being conducted by the American Red Cross, the following suggestions in regard to swimming are contained on small posters being distributed in Cisco by J. J. Collins, sporting goods dealer.

Do not call for help for a joke. The joke may be on you when you need help.

Avoid all practical jokes and pranks that will endanger the lives of your friends and others.

Look before you dive. If some one precedes you wait for them to appear before you start to dive.

Avoid over estimating your endurance and ability as a swimmer. Give safety the benefit of the doubt.

The lower half of the pool is all deep water, and is only for experienced swimmers.

Learn to swim correctly if you are a non or weak swimmer. It may be worth it some day. It takes 6 to 10 hours to learn how to swim, and about the same number of seconds to drown.

Enter the water not earlier than 1 to 2 hours after eating.

Never swim alone. Use the "Buddy System." Each swimmer selects some one as their buddy with the understanding that each one will look after the safety of the other. This plan has saved thousands of lives.

The life guards are on duty for your protection and safety. Consider them accordingly and kindly report broken appliances and devices immediately to any one of the guards.

Do not spit or clear throat in the pool. This is for your protection as well as others.

When in need of first aid treatment, see life guard.

Could you save yourself from drowning?

This is the question being asked the people of Cisco this week by the Eastland County Red Cross chapter in connection with "Life-saving week" that is being observed under the direction of J. E. Spencer, chairman.

One of the most outstanding causes of drowning today is the lack of sufficient and scientific knowledge of methods used to save life in the water. This is one of the several findings of the American National Red Cross, an organization which has devoted part of its efforts during the past 14 years to the lowering of the drowning rate. Through a program of water safety promoted by the local Red Cross chapters through various community agencies such as the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Civic Clubs, Y. W. C. A's and Y. M. C. A.'s the number of drownings over the country has been reduced over 50 per cent.

Nearly 500,000 people have taken the standard life-saving tests conducted by the Red Cross through a corps of nearly 5,000 volunteer swimmers who donate their services to the teaching of these tests.

The life-saving classes have been organized and are now in progress at the Lake Cisco pool. The instruction is being given under the personal direction of Capt. J. S. Law, who is assisting the local chapter with the local life-saving program. This instruction is free.

A special program has been arranged for at Lake Cisco this afternoon at 4 o'clock when a demonstration of the various phases of life-saving will be given. How to save yourself, approaching a drowning person correctly, assisting a third swimmer and many other practical methods of saving will also be shown. Capt. Law will give one of his special demonstrations in life-saving which made him an authority in the field of water safety. He was assisted by a group of local swimmers who have qualified in the test.

The pool has been drained and thoroughly cleaned and refilled with the rains of the middle of last week. Preparatory for the opening of these classes, and to accommodate the crowds expected to see the bathing Sunday. "We are now taking water from the second gate," Law said, "and it is as clear as a mountain brook, and is free of that chocolate color that gave us considerable trouble after the previous heavy rains. In fact the last rains did muddy the big lake like those that fell in the late spring, as the result is all clear water after rains this week. But the Lake Amusement Co. has made arrangements to preclude the possibility of the water being muddy by securing the supply for the bathing pool from the second gate at the dam."
