GAUDY BEACHES.

People who think American bathing beaches are gay and daring would have their eyes opened by a A. D. 1928 tour of European water resorts. It isn't so much the scantiness of costume as the color and style. Men as well as women share in the innovations. TIME TO BEFRIEND CHINA.

Dispatches of July 23 told of renewed fighting in China between Japanese and Chinese troops at Shantung. The explanation from Tokio was that the Chinese troops had penetrated the zone declared neutral by the Japanese who then proceeded to drive them out. Furthermore, it is explained that the Japanese government is afraid that German military skill is being used to train and reorganize China's Nationalist army. The report from Berlin is that no German military men are so engaged in China, but that a Chinese commission has gone to Germany to study demobilization, road building, aviation, wireless communication, agriculture, police methods and other branches which might be helpful in reconstruction work in China. A Washington dispatch dated July 24, told of an order issued by President Coolidge providing for the withdrawal of 1,350 marines from China. This was regarded as a first step toward early recognition of the Nationalist government. A second step appeared in the news on July 26, when it was an-

nounced that Secretary of State Kellogg had sent a note to the Nationalist foreign minister, initiating negotiations which look toward liberation of China from tariff restrictions and also toward recognition. FLIERS AND CLIMBERS.

Aviation is credited with an Alpine rescue, Two amateur mountain climbers fell in ascending Mont Maudit, near Mont Blanc, and one of them was seriously hurt. A French aviator flying over the mountains saw their signal-a shirt tied to an alpenstock-and flew back to the airdome to telephone directions for their rescue, then circled over them again with the message that help was coming. A rescue party brought them in safely. When aviation is a little further developed, aviators should be able to drop and ick up such victims, even though there were no landing place. When that time comes, though, mountain explorers may be using airplanes themselves, instead of toiling afoot.






