LIFESAVING PROGRAM IS COMPLETE

Funeral Home Injunction Is Continued

Representative of Red Conduct Classes, Demos and Tests Here Friday

First Tilt Won by Opponents of Undertaking Establishment; Final Hearing Is Set for September

Judge George L. Davenport this morning overruled the motion of the defendants to dissolve the temporary injunction, wherein the court had restrained Gregory & London from operating an undertaking establishment at 509 West Sixth street, on the petition of the plaintiffs, W. P. Lee, William H. Rogers, S. H. Huey and Miss Alice Johnson. The proceedings were for the purpose of passing on the motion to dissolve the temporary restraining order, and not on the merits of the case, as was reported last week. The case will come up for final hearing at the September term of the district court. Judge D. K. Witt, of the firm of Scott & O'Connell, attorneys for the defendants, filed this morning that there should be no appeal from Judge Davenport's ruling as the appeal will not function earlier than the convening of the next term of the district court. Then the injunction will be dissolved or perpetuated.

They did his bidding, though some resented the openness with which he gave them orders. He considered appointments of prohibition officials, strongly opposed Andrew Mellon's appointment as secretary of treasury, and boasted that President Harding had taken a "dry" pledge under the threat of Wheeler's withdrawing league support.

Stewart says that Wheeler, a Republican, took credit for blocking Governor Alfred E. Smith's nomination at the 1924 Democratic convention. He controlled many dry delegates, largely in the Middle West, and refused to release them to either Smith or Oscar Underwood, whom he termed "wet."

Other league officials objected to Wheeler's political tactics, according to Stewart. The general confidence began to wane in the last year of his life, and he was rebuffed publicly by league heads for suggesting that southern dry Democrats vote for an independent if Smith were nominated in 1928.

Stewart concludes that "it would be difficult to tabulate exactly the good accomplished and the harm done by the prohibition cause by Wheeler."

Many of Wheeler's influences in elections was useful to prohibition. On the other hand, some of his political intrigues alienated the support of very ardent friends of prohibition, he says.

8 WEST TEXAS COUNTIES GET ROAD AID NEXT

AUSTIN, July 31. — Eight West Texas counties are scheduled for highway improvement contracts out of a list of 36 counties that will receive state and federal aid when the highway commission holds its August session here Wednesday and Thursday. Contracts to be awarded will call for expenditure of \$2,647,000 and the share of the eight West Texas counties is estimated at \$1,124,000, the biggest job going to Shackelford county, a construction improvement that will cost \$342,000. Maintenance contracts for treating nearly 80 miles of road in various parts of the state also will be let.

With the July gasoline tax receipts it is expected that the highway department will have available \$14,000,000 cash on hand to work for several weeks, says a statement by W. Gregory Hatcher, state treasurer, placed the fund at nearly \$12,600,000 and since then June receipts have swelled the account by \$2,600,000, current expenses leaving a large amount of it still in the treasury.

The largest contract to be let this week will be for work in Anderson county, East Texas, a project there to require \$400,000, for concrete paving of 10 miles on Highway 19 from Palestine to Elkhart, and for grading and drainage structures on Highway 43 from Palestine through Tucker, for a distance of eight miles.

West Texas projects line up as follows: Potter County—Applying asphalt surface on Highways 13 and 33 for 28 miles, a maintenance contract that will run between \$150,000 and \$175,000.

Jones—Calling for concrete paving on Highway 39 from Stamford to a point 4 1/2 miles north of Amek for a distance of nearly 10 miles and costing \$240,000.

Shackelford—Putting down bituminous concrete surface on caliche-brick base on Highway 1-A for a distance of 12 1/2 miles. Two

hundred working days allotted. Cost of job \$37,000.

Baylor — Grading and drainage structures on Highway 24 from Seymour to the Archer county line, for a distance of 20 miles, at an estimated cost of \$120,000.

Kent — Construction of bridge on Highway 84, costing \$6,500.

Taylor — Concrete pavement and concrete base course on Highway 1 for a distance of 10 miles, from Abilene westward. Estimated cost \$200,000.

Hale — Grading and drainage structures on Highway 7 from Lubbock county line to Swisher county line, for a distance of 37 miles at an expense of \$85,000.

McCulloch — Reinforced concrete girder bridge over Brady Creek on Highway 9 at a cost of \$34,000.

Chrysler and Dodge Merger Plan Is Ratified When 90 Percent of Stock of Latter Is Ready for Exchange

BALTIMORE, July 31.—Merger of the Chrysler Corporation and Dodge Brothers, Inc., to form one of the big motor combinations of the country was assured Monday with a vote at a special meeting of Dodge stockholders ratifying the merger plan.

Necessity of getting 90 per cent of each class of the Dodge stock deposited for exchange for Chrysler shares, had loomed through several adjournments of the meeting as a condition which might be impossible to fulfill, and danger that the requirement would not be met before the July 31 time limit set in the proposed agreement between the two companies gave an air of anxiety to the stockholders' session which began last Saturday.

Then and when the stockholders met in an adjourned session Monday they were told that the required 90 per cent had not been attained in the preference shares or Class A common stock, but that the necessary quota of Class B stock was on deposit and that in the other

classes the mark was being approached. With a series of short adjournments, the meeting marked time Monday awaiting reports from depositaries and late in the day counsel for the merger plan announced that assurance had been received from New York that at least 90 per cent assented to the merger plan. With this assurance, the meeting proceeded to adopt resolutions approving the merger plan. The exact amount of stock deposited was not given.

Under the agreement Dodge stockholders will receive Chrysler shares on the basis of one share for each share of preference stock, one share for each five shares of Class A Dodge common stock, and one Chrysler Corporation, the properties and good will of the Dodge organization and the right to use Dodge Brothers name.

During the session it was announced by the Baltimore Dodge dealer that the dealers' organization would remain intact after the merger, and his declaration that lead-

ers approved the merger on the ground that it would add the Chrysler merchandising flair to the Dodge production and distribution organization was credited by some at the meeting with aiding to bring in the necessary shares to complete the merger.

Chrysler Becomes Dodge Head
NEW YORK, July 30.—Walter P. Chrysler, chairman of the Chrysler Corporation, announced Monday that he would assume the position of president of the Dodge Brothers Corporation, the board of directors of which at a special meeting in Baltimore voted approval of the merger of Dodge Brothers with the Chrysler company.

Chrysler Corporation will continue to manufacture the present line of Dodge cars in the newly acquired properties, Chrysler said, and Dodge cars will be sold by Dodge Brothers Corporation, a division of the Chrysler Corporation.

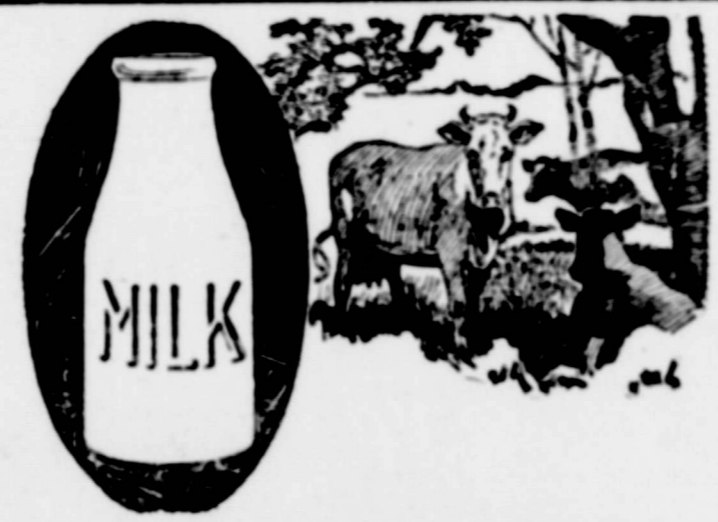

BEFORE THE SANDMAN COMES



Do you remember years ago when you were very small how you used to feel when you were put in bed, the lights were turned out and you were left alone there in the darkness? Perhaps then you turned to some warm friend for comfort, a cuddly Mammy doll or a sociable puss who met the occasion gallantly! Here is a trio of just such friends who can be counted on to stay by one until the sandman's inevitable arrival. They are not much on looks perhaps, but their loyalty at such times can be depended on and they can stand a terrific amount of abuse without a whimper. Now these three enterprising animals are really changelings, having been in a former existence nothing more than lowly flour bags bought from a local baker's shop. They were ripped and washed and their ink stampings were removed by covering them with lard or kerosene for a few hours and then washing out in lukewarm water. The cat and the dog are made out of two pieces of the material—a back and a front. The rabbit, however, can boast arms and even a removable jacket of red gingham. It does not require a pattern to make these animals if one has the slightest skill in drawing. The features are worked in black outline stitch. The nose is red, the eyes brown. It is best not to have shoe button eyes unless you are sure they are sewed on very firmly. The rabbit's ears might be lined with bits of pink flannel; his coat is made from any small piece of cotton goods. After the outlining has been done, sew the back and front together leaving an opening for putting in the stuffing. Bran or sawdust may be used but even better are small snips of clean old rags and underwear. These do away with any danger of leaking. When the doll becomes at all soiled, remove the stuffing and launder.
