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G.O.P. FARM LEADER TO SUPPORT GOVERNOR SMITH

Hoover Has Proved Himself Foe of Agriculture Throughout, Says Peek, Chairman of Midwest Conference

STATEMENT OF GOV. SMITH

Subsequent to his conference with Mr. George N. Peek, of Melroe, Ill., the leader of the farm movement in the middle west, Governor Smith made the following statement:

"After my talk with Mr. Peek, I am more than ever satisfied that the Democratic platform soundly declares the fundamental basis for relief of the appalling agricultural distress which not only threatens the farmer himself, but is destroying the farm market of ten million dollars for the industries of the country. Control of the sale of agricultural surplus is recognized by our platform as an essential need, its cost to be assessed on the unit to be benefited. That principle is fixed by our platform on which I stand—only the detail of its accomplishment remains.

"As I have said, I shall immediately, if I am elected, ask the best farm leaders and economists to work out this detail with me. I shall ask them to serve irrespective of locality or party. Republicans like Governor Landon, as well as Democrats who have studied this problem, will be called upon by me for this patriotic service. I shall discuss this question at length in my acceptance speech."

Intellectual honesty if he is elected president.

"Upon the strength of his statement to me as epitomized in his public statement, I shall support his candidacy for president. I have been asked what I think will be the effect of Mr. Hoover's forthcoming statement on agriculture in his speech of acceptance.

Hoover Promises Unavailing

"I think that no campaign promises which Mr. Hoover makes for the purpose of insinuating himself into the good graces of the farmer, will obliterate his past record to the members of grain and livestock producers, many of whom have lost, or are in the process of losing, their homes.

"As food administrator during the war, he is largely responsible for the expansion of agriculture and as the agricultural advisor of the past two administrations he is more responsible for its continuing depression than any other man in the nation.

"To illustrate the reason why his campaign promises should not inspire confidence at this time, I need only call attention to the fact that in 1917, when promoting the food administration bill he said that if such a measure were not passed wheat would go down to \$1.50 a bushel on account of the concentrated purchasing of European countries. While a few months later, in May, 1918, he said before a meeting of grain dealers in New York that had it not been for the intervention of government, he agreed with the contention of some farmers that wheat would have sold for five or possibly ten dollars a bushel.

"Two years later, in the spring of 1919, he is on record as stating his purpose to hold down the price of wheat to the figures prevailing during the war (the minimum price named by contract, while recently some of his supporters, notably Senators Brookhart and Sackett, have claimed that at this period he was active in trying to hold up the prices of the farmers' products.

Juggling the Ratio Prices

"The juggling of the corn-hog ratio prices by Mr. Hoover in 1917 and 1918 is known to every hog raiser. By shifting from Chicago corn to farm corn he attempted to buy hogs at a price of two dollars a hundred below that which the farmer had a right to expect from the previous agreement with the food administration.

"The farmer knows that all the foregoing was in the interest of European purchasers and not in the interest of American farm producers.

"In 1921, shortly after Mr. Hoover went into President Harding's cabinet as secretary of commerce, he undertook to have the bureau of markets of the department of agriculture transferred to his own department. Farm leaders believe this transfer was sought in the in-

terest of dealers in and manufacturers of farm products. In correspondence of record he said: "The functions of the department of agriculture should end when production on the farm is completed and movement therefrom starts, and at that point the activities of the department of commerce should begin.

"In December, 1924, in correspondence of record, Mr. Hoover denied ever having sought to transfer the bureau of markets to the department of commerce.

"In 1925, Mr. Hoover advocated a reduction of production of farm products to the demand of domestic markets within a year or so later one of his bureau chiefs attempted to deny that Mr. Hoover ever had made such recommendations.

"All of these incidents and more have been referred to in the United States senate and Mr. Hoover was invited to join in a request for an investigation of the facts in order that the country might know the truth about his record as a friend of the American farmer as distinguished from the propagandists on his behalf to capture the farm vote.

But Mr. Hoover maintained a discreet silence. He may claim he held down prices of farm products in the temporary interests of consumers but he can hardly persuade the farmers that such a laudable activity was in their interest. It stands to reason I think that in the face of such a record he will find it difficult to persuade the farmers that any campaign promises he may now make can be relied upon or will be carried out by him in the event of his election."

PASTOR WHO FORMED ANTI-SMITH CLUB IS RELIEVED OF CHARGE

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 9.—An organization of "Anti-Smith Democrats," which the Rev. H. D. Knickerbocker was instrumental in forming, is believed to have been dissolved with the pastor sent on an enforced vacation of "several weeks."

The Rev. Knickerbocker was rebuked by action of the stewards and trustees of the First Methodist Church for his attack on Gov. Alfred E. Smith, presidential nominee, and Senator Joseph T. Robinson, vice presidential nominee. Senator Robinson is a member of Knickerbocker's church.

By a vote of 64 to 26, the stewards and trustees of the church decided to rebuke the pastor and

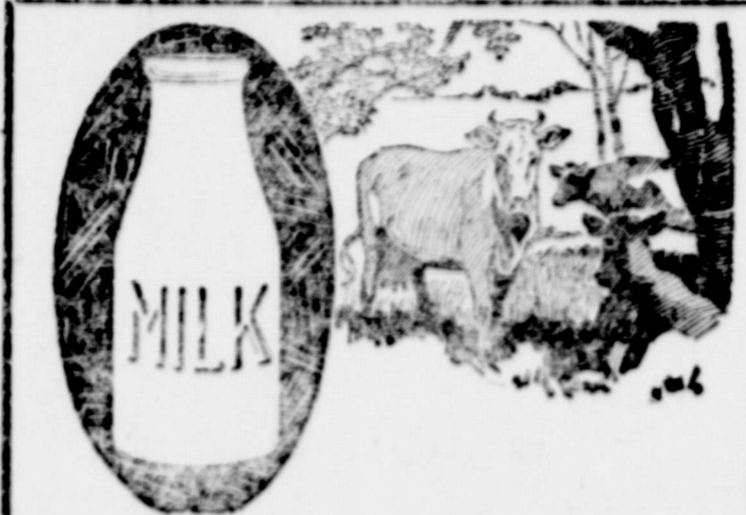

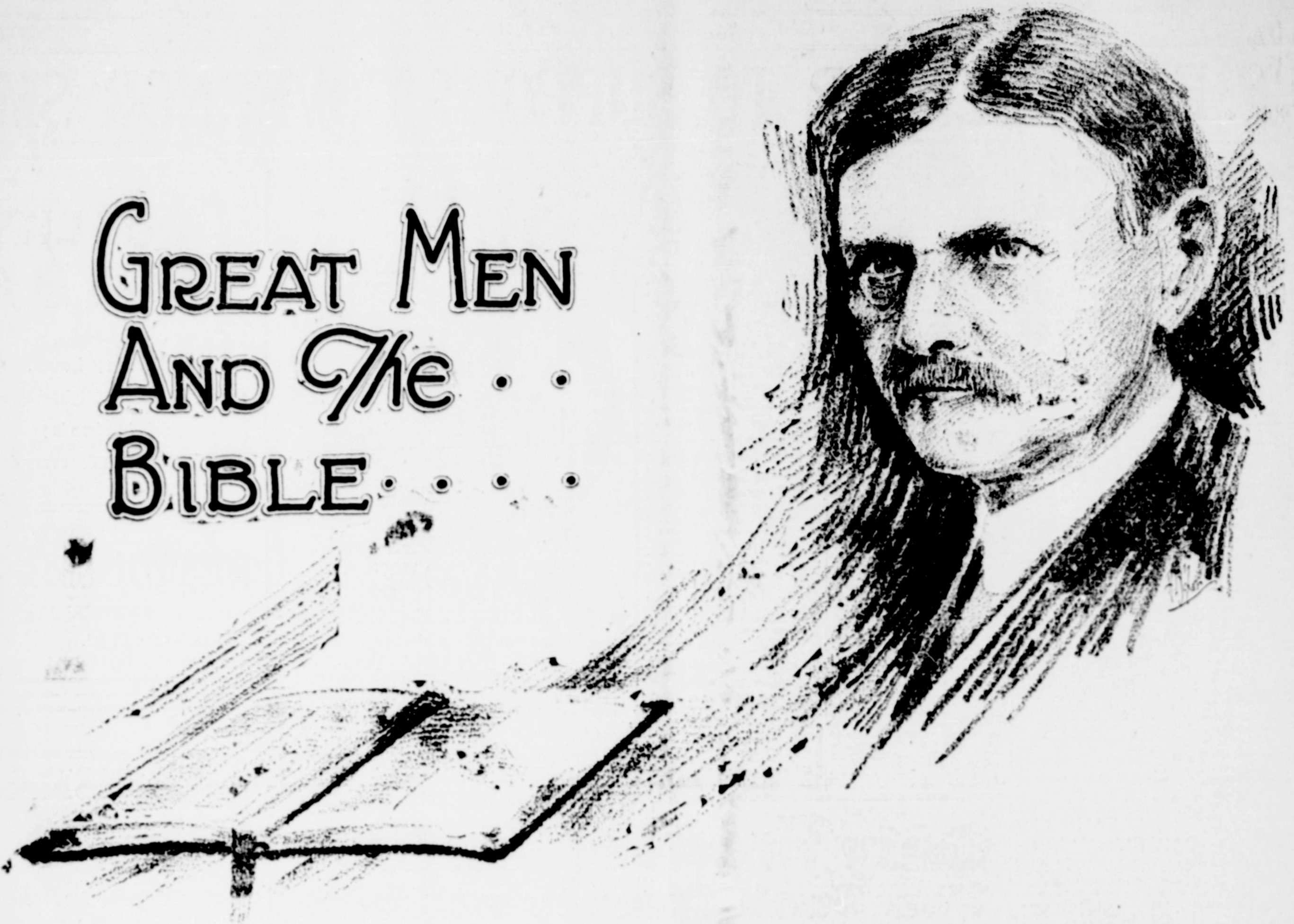

WHEN the late Thomas R. Marshall, former vice president of the United States, passed away, he was reading the Bible, which, during his long life, he had found an inexhaustible source of light, strength, guidance and wisdom.

STON, Aug. 9.—A basis for bringing back fertility will be longer and more costly than in other sections.

The rolling lands of this section must be terraced; also, there must be a permanent system of crop rotation followed through a period of years before soil fertility is restored.

The problem of rotation in most of this section is grave. It is mostly farmed by tenants, who both landlords and tenants are cotton-minded, and is financed by bankers who are cotton-minded. When rotation is suggested it is met by the argument that it takes all the land in cotton to produce money enough on which to exist. The change from cotton to balanced farming requires readjustment in thinking and financing. Much of the black land section has been depleted of its soil fertility to such an extent during the last thirty-five years that its yields have been reduced 30 to 50 per cent. There is but little effort being made to change the system, and the question naturally arises, what will happen in the next thirty-five years?

The black land section has in general a greater community value than has East Texas. The soil is more enduring, and as a consequence individual responsibility does not enter into security to the same extent as in the eastern section.

West Texas Problems.

Practically all of West Texas is new land, and from the standpoint of water erosion differs from East Texas only in the amount of rainfall. Water erosion will not be as rapid because less water falls. On the other hand, heavy rains often fall with such rapidity that soil erosion is great and makes it necessary that rolling lands be protected by terraces. With time, wind erosion will prove to be the greatest menace to sound security in the western section. Soil washes and blows when it has no organic matter to bind it together. When farmers of the West use up the organic matter, in many instances the fields will blow away. There are many fields in the "pea-

nut section" of the state that resemble an old lake bed.

Throughout the West there is but one known method of keeping the land in permanent profitable production. The humus in the soil must continuously be replaced by crop rotation, in which vegetation is turned under. On the whole, soil fertility in the West is not a vital problem at present. Neither will it become a problem for several years if rolling land is protected by terraces and the humus content of the soil is maintained.

Owing to the fact that the western section is productive and many farms have desirable homes and modern and convenient equipment, this section probably will remain for some time safe as to loans. Yet it must be remembered that as soil fertility decreases, desirable home conditions will decrease in like proportion, and securities will eventually be on the same basis as they now are in the older sections. Wind erosion can destroy security in the older fields in this section faster and more completely than can water erosion in the east.

The Plains Situation.

The plains section of Texas is entering into a great stage of development. Kansas, the Dakotas and other sections have passed through similar period of exploitation through commercialized farming. Farming large areas of fertile land with power and large modern equipment is profitable and fascinating, but this method does not build farm homes or desirable communities, nor does it stabilize farm values. In every country, in every state, commercial farming has been tried out, and has, up to this time, met the same fate. New and fertile lands return a profit, with financial disaster later.

Mr. Short does not say that this system will fail on the plains, but only that, if it succeeds over a long period of time, it will be the first instance in agricultural history.

Another trouble is that plains seem to be more easily broken than aviation records.—Beitot Daily News.

GRAPES PROVE GOOD PAYER TO F. L. FLEMING

Grapes from Grapevine were being sold on the streets of Cisco this week by F. L. Fleming, who had an auto load of this luscious fruit parked on West Fifth street at the intersection of D avenue. If all grapes from that section of the country are as delicious as those shown by Fleming, the town made

famous by Joe Bailey and Barney Gibbs' ranch was most appropriately named. These grapes were Black Carmen, large clusters, perfectly formed and of uniform size weighing one-third of a pound to the cluster.

But why grapes from Tarrant county? Eastland county soil is most congenial for grape culture and will produce grapes of even finer quality than the Grapevine specimens. Fleming stated that he had 2,000 plants, cultivated in "finger post" rows, two-thirds of which were bearing, from which he would gather 250 bushels. Fleming was offering his product for sale at 12 1/2 cents per pound. Grapes weigh 40 pounds to the bushel, at this rate would bring \$5 per bushel, or a total of \$1,250 for his crop. A neat sum for the amount of land required to grow them, but in addition a spin-

del yield of other crops could be harvested on the land between these "finger post" rows. Eastland county farmers make the grape culture more profitable than the crops now being cultivated, certainly greater than soil weevil cotton.

land with a slope of one foot in 100 feet, it is hardly probable that a farmer in Texas is in the practice of farming that prevent erosion on land greater slope than one and one-half feet in 100. Land with a slope of three feet in 100 or more is terraced if erosion is prevented. Land with a slope of one foot in 100 has been terraced successfully. As the slope increases, the percentage of land that can be terraced decreases. The length of loan and the average life of the borrower must be based more on the individuals making up the community than upon one individual.

It is hazardous to make a loan on land that has more than five feet in 100. On land of this slope there must be a high community value and an unquestionable ability on the part of the borrower to make good, for security to remain adequate.

Cultures and Rotation.

The average system of farming practiced in the state, and as kept more or less of vegetation throughout the winter and early spring, during the seasons of excessive rainfall, throughout most of the year. During this time erosion is at its height.

Over most of the state the soil is grown as the principal crop. Experience and experimental data have proven that erosion is greater under cotton than under any other crop, with the possible exception of peanuts, when vines and nuts are removed from the land.

Recent station data show that in practical crop rotation, where a cover crop is used, will mean less soil losses. Records show that land with clean culture about any winter cover will wash seven times as much as land with rotation, including winter cover crop.

Land under a one-crop system will remain doubtful security a long period of time, and during land under a permanent system of rotation is fair security over a long period. Well sodded pasture or land to safe security, in so far as soil erosion is concerned, about the life of a loan.

Rotation and permanent cover of necessity brings live into farm operations. Since started there has been no permanent successful system of agriculture without live stock. There may be, because nature's plan is upon animal and plant life, they can not be successful in any plan of operation that depends upon the laws of nature.

East Texas Outlook.

The section of the state maintained east of the Houston & Central railroad the land is rolling sandy loam, which is liable to erosion, and it all within the heavy rain belt. Land, with the exception of creek and river valleys, must be protected for protection. While the land is more subject to erosion than any other, it can be protected at small expense. One crop of cowpeas or other legume, turned into the soil after being plowed, will restore profitable production.

Rapid deterioration of East Texas places a greater value on the individual than in any other section of the state. It may be that in general the need of life may be obtained in East Texas with less ease than in any other section, consequently there is less need for community cooperation.

The black land belt of the state suffered long under the impression that it is the greatest fertile and most enduring that man has ever settled. Extreme view has blinded the nation to such an extent that have butchered the soil and their wonderful natural resources so that now this section grave problem confronting the nation. The black land section and soil robbing longer than any other section of the state, yet the need of reconstruction and

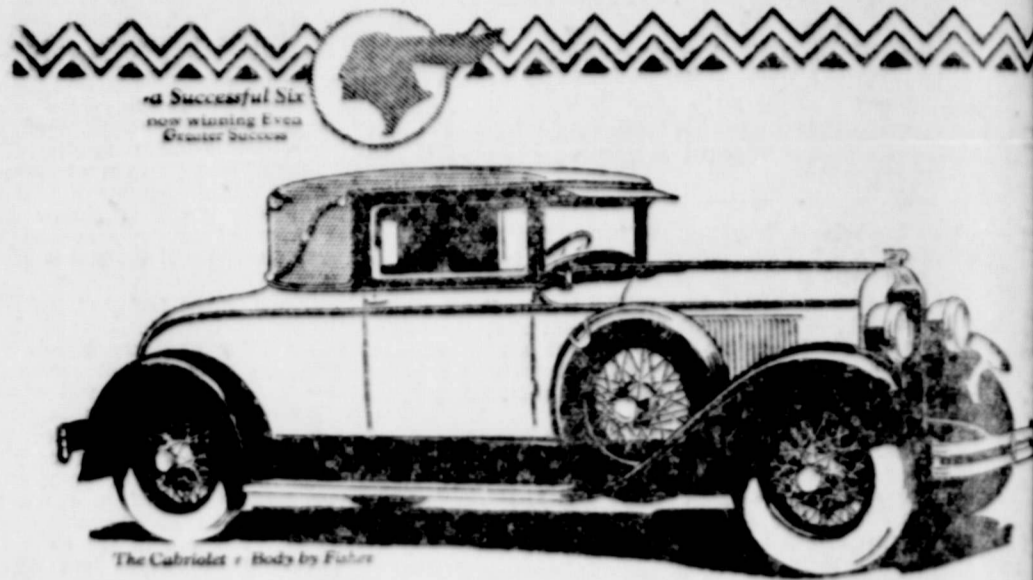

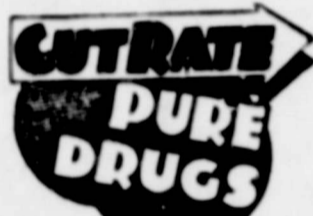

TERRACING FOUND SUCCESS SECRET BY DALLAS CO. FARMER

Diversification of Crops and Balanced Rations for Stock Are Also Found Necessary by Cook

DALLAS, Aug. 9.—Terracing of rolling land is one of the most important practices that a farmer can adopt in order to increase his income, J. W. Cook, farmer living ten miles south of Dallas, believes. He has been successful in his experiments and has been able to increase his income by 50 per cent in the last year.

Cook is one of the best farmers in Dallas county by A. B. Jones, county agent. Jones advised Cook in terracing his farm of 174 acres three years ago. This fall there are three miles of terracing on the Cook farm. Cook's advice, while not extremely high, was highly valued when he decided to terrace it. Now there are no washes on the place and the soil is much better on the spots where washing had made it thin.

Farmers' Problems
"A farmer with a rolling place can either plow his soil with terracing or he can wash it away every time it rains," said Cook. "Some claim that they do not like to terrace their farms because it will increase the cost of their crops. I have found that the cost of the terracing is not so bad as it is claimed to be. It has enabled me to raise good crops. I have not had any washes on my place since I started terracing. I have also been able to raise more crops than before. NEW SPECIES OF BAT FEELS PEACH NEATLY

AUSTIN, Aug. 9.—An exhaustive investigation is being made by J. M. Del Curto, plant pathologist of the department of agriculture, into the new and strange action of the anti-social red bat, a common creature, technically known as *Lasiurus borealis*. Del Curto said the bats have taken to peeling peaches on the trees, leaving the fruit hanging neatly skinned.

The bat, which is fairly well known in Texas, has been regarded as only an insect eater. They pair off like doves and do not congregate like their dark brothers, which infest house eaves and bellies. Several instances of peach peeling by the red bats in Central Texas have been reported to Del Curto. Investigating one report by a woman near Austin, he found several carefully skinned peaches on one tree. The meat of the fruit had not been disturbed. Some of the bats were hanging in the tree by one foot, peacefully sleeping.

This strange practice by the bats has not resulted in any great damage to fruit thus far, reports indicate. Del Curto is continuing his investigations, however. A tropical bat is the only known species that eats fruit.

BOLL WEEVIL MAKES UP MIND OF CISCO FARMER AS TO CROPS

Winge, Reducing Acreage Gradually, Not to Pick Cotton Because of Pest; 'Never Again'

Winge, prosperous farmer, has been gradually quitting his present plans are changed materially. But farming is getting to be a more serious problem each year, as it looks to me. I try to diversify my crops, and this year I have planted peanuts, which were thriving nicely, but a pest has developed that is now threatening this crop. Some kind of grub is working on the roots of the plants. They eat the roots and the plant soon dies. A close examination has failed to locate the pest that is now threatening this plant. The first opportunity I have I shall consult the county agent, and probably may find some solution to a condition that now seems to be a mystery.

"We have a splendid season in the ground and everything is growing fine. A big yield on all crops will be harvested if the insects do not destroy them. Cotton looks fine and would make a good crop, apparently, were it not for the weevils, and the boll and leaf

worm did not ruin the crop. All feed crops are as fine as I ever saw in Eastland county. Lots of feed will be made, even if the cotton crop should prove a failure. I have about 40 acres in feed which I expect to market on foot—feed it to live stock—as I depend more on the livestock I sell than on the crops grown on my farm. I generally have about 25 head of cattle and a bunch of hogs on hand, and try to have something in each shipment sent out by the Cisco Livestock Cooperative association. I have not yet taken up dairy farming, as most of my cattle are beef stuff, but I believe if Cisco could get a milk plant it would be a big thing for the farmers, as many would buy dairy cattle and add to their revenues by producing milk and cream for market. Every time a new market is opened it is of benefit to the farmer.

While in Cisco Winge had a batch of very fine Elberta peaches, each of uniform size and ripened evenly. He stated that he had 100 trees from which he expected to gather about 75 bushels. In addition to his fine Elberta he also has other varieties, that he is delivering to Cisco people.

LEE'S ANSWER TO CALLAWAY

Cisco, Texas, Aug. 7, 1928. Hon. Oscar Callaway, Comanche, Texas.

My Dear Sir: Your letter of the 4th came to me yesterday and I note with interest what you have to say as regards political debates.

I am wondering why you, with a record of six years in congress and on public questions for the last 20 years, pitch your campaign in an attack on me personally and as a business man and private citizen.

I am wondering if, through this means of campaigning, you are not trying to cover up your attitude toward our own President Woodrow Wilson and the government at a time when they needed and were entitled to the support of every patriotic American citizen.

I am wondering whether you are not trying to relegate to the background, your opposition to prohibition; your antagonism to the young manhood of America, who so valiantly gave their services, and many of them their lives to support our glorious government in a time of stress and need.
