It is known, however, that R. V. Nichols, chief law enforcement officer of the department, has gone to Kingsville to check up on the heritance tax due by the King estate, and while in that section will proceed to Corpus Christi to inves-

tigate the gasoline situation there First Assistant Attorney General Galloway Calhoun has been assigned by Attorney General Claude Pollard to make an investigation in Houston. Calhoun plans to go to Houston and other points in the state and take depositions from oil companies and filling stations.
