## EASTLAND-CISCO FRIENDSHIP CEMENTED BY R. Q. LEE

### Differences between Cities Are Buried at Meeting in Honor of Candidate; Go Ahead Together

Eastland and Cisco joined hands to honor R. Q. Lee, congressional candidate, at Eastland Friday night. A spirit of warm friendship between the two cities was everywhere evident. Petty quarrels and jealousies between the two neighboring communities were buried as they united in a common cause. "Buried" is the correct expression, as the differences between the two were more than anything else in years to cement the friendship.

### WILBARGER CO. POOL IS BEING ELECTRIFIED

Electrification of the New Consolidated Pool in Wilbarger county, by the West Texas Utilities Co. is well under way and indications are that this big oil field will shortly join the ranks of the many fields in West Texas which are electrified almost exclusively, according to R. A. Williams, assistant superintendent of District B.

Work of tapping the 60,000-volt high line running from Vernon to Houston, carrying the power into the Wilbarger field over a 22,000-volt aluminum transmission line, has already begun.

The West Texas Utilities Co. also is constructing a 1,000 kva 66-12 kv lattice steel sub-station at the east side of the H. & T. C. railroad property.

The new high line and sub-station will be capable of furnishing an unlimited supply of power to this field. It is believed that within a short time the New Consolidated Pool in Wilbarger will rank electrically, along with the Noeddie Creek field, where of nearly 30 wells, either drilling or pumping, all but three are using electric power.

### FLOYDADA EXTENSION TRAIN SERVICE DELAYED

QUANAH, Aug. 25.—Passenger service on the recently constructed extension on the Quanah, Acme & Pacific from Quanah to Floydada, has been delayed on account of failure of the ballasting crew to complete its work. Plans had been made to start passenger trains over this line by August 20, but officials have now set the date for September 15.

### Al Smith is Challenged to Joint Debate by Will Rogers



New York, August 25.—Will Rogers today issued another den to his political opponents in his campaign for president as the candidate of the Anti-Bunk party, following his challenge to joint debate, sent last week to Herbert Hoover, Rogers has thrown down the gauntlet to Al Smith. In a letter received at Smith headquarters here today, Rogers also challenges the Democratic nominee. His letter follows:

Dear Friend Al: Now this is the open season for Debates, and I believe you and I could put on about as good a one as any of these others. So I hereby challenge you the way I challenged the other fellow last week.

Now the trouble with most Debates, they are confined to a subject. Now we won't let that worry us, we'll just rent Madison Square Garden. All we do is sell tickets, and let the money go to poor Democratic widows who have given their husbands' lives to trying to get elected to some office in the Democratic party. Those are the most despicable women I know of.

And there's Farm relief. You know how a Farmer votes. When he gets to the polls he reaches in his pocket and sees how much he's got. If it's only a few cents why he says "Throw the rascals out," and he votes Democratic. But if he's got as much as a dollar he guesses that the rascals is on his side after all, so maybe he'd better leave 'em in.

I wrote Hoover and challenged him, but he wanted to make it over the radio. Hoover wants to get on the radio where they can't see him, but with you it's different. You want the gang to see you. You want to make your appeal to the common people. Well you can't make any commoner appeal than I can.

So come on, be a good fellow Al, and name the time, place and subject (if any). You and I can pack 'em in.

So long Al, and good luck to you till we meet in debate.

Yours, Will.

In the foregoing words, Will Rogers launches himself as a candidate for President. Imparturbed by a committee of fifteen famous Americans, Rogers has consented to make the race for the purpose of fighting "bunk" in both the old parties.

"Your offer leaves me dazed," he telegraphed Life, the humorous weekly, which conceived the idea of running him for president and offered its columns for presentation of his candidacy to the country, "and if I can stay dazed I ought to make a splendid candidate."

"Anyways, I chew to run," he added.

Rogers' backers, each of whom has formally accepted appointment to the "National Committee" of the new Bunkless Party, are the following: Henry Ford, Harold Lloyd, Nicholas Murray Butler, Roy Howard, Glenn H. Curtis, Judge Ben B. Lindsey, Babe Ruth, William Allen White, Clare Briggs, Grantland Rice, Gen. William Mitchell, Ring Lardner, Rev. Francis P. Duffy, Tex Rickard, Charles Dana Gibson.

"I know after being nominated for anything," says Rogers, in the

Rogers outlines some of his policies in his first appeal to voters. He says:

"There is one thing there won't be in our party and that's party leaders. I think that's what hurt our two big parties worse than anything else in party leaders. No party is as bad as its leaders."

"We are also going to try and eliminate vagrants. Vagrants have been more harmful to the country than Ho-Woods, Larcenous Chaps, Dead Ends, Detours, Convicts and Golf Players."

A word on the woman vote is also given by Rogers, as follows:

"Now we may alienate the entire female vote but there will be no effort for sex appeal. Of course if it unconsciously manifests itself why we can't help it but it will by no means be one of the planks of our platform. In short our platform will be WHAT-EVER THE OTHER FELLOW DON'T DO, WE WILL."

After regretting that he will have no money with which to buy votes, Rogers declares:

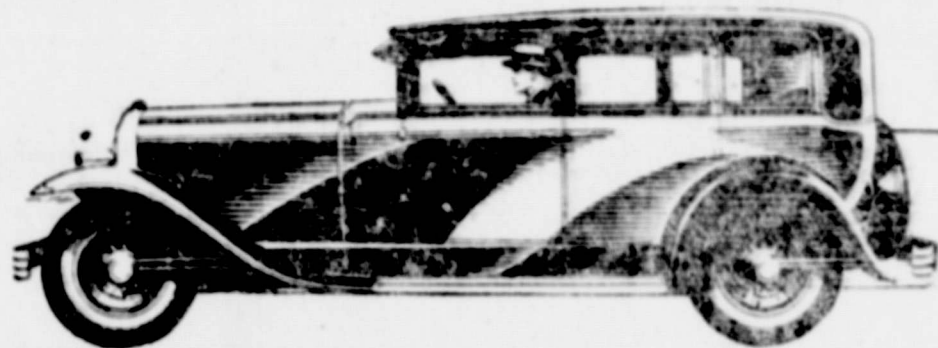
"Our support will have to come from those who want NOTHING and have the assurance of getting it."

# ROBINSON'S ACCEPTANCE TO BE BROADCAST BY HUGE HOOKUP

## 41 Columbia, National Stations Will Join in Carrying Nominee's Words to Nation Thursday Night

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—The entire National Broadcasting Co. radio network in the south and on the Pacific coast, as well as the entire Columbia broadcasting chain covering the east and middle west as far as Chicago, St. Louis, Iowa, has been joined together for the broadcast of Robinson's official acceptance of his selection as the choice of the Democratic party for vice president. It was announced by the bureau of the Democratic national committee.

The program from the steps of the Madison hotel at Hot Springs, Ark., will be broadcast from 8:30 to 9:30 central standard time the night of Thursday, August 30. Radio listeners will then have an opportunity of hearing for the first time a full exposition of the vice presidential candidate's views on national matters.

To bring this radio broadcast into practically every state in the Union, it was necessary to link stations together through approximately 30,000 miles of telephone wires. Nearly 1,000 trained engineers and operators will be watchfully alert in stations throughout the country to see that not the slightest defect mars the broadcast of Senator Robinson's speech. Every wire circuit will have a duplicate held in constant readiness for use in case of trouble.

The National Broadcasting Co. stations carrying the Robinson program will number more than 26, headed by station KTHH, which is located in the Arlington hotel at Hot Springs. To this network will be added a correspondingly selected group of independent stations which will carry the program in the regular network. The entire network of 21 Columbia broadcasting stations, headed by WOB at Newark, N. J., will be connected to the Hot Springs microphones. To accomplish this trunk line will be strung from Hot Springs to the central distribution board in New York where the program can be re-distributed to the network stations. To serve the Pacific coast chain of the National Broadcasting Co. a trunk line will go from Hot Springs to St. Louis, and thence over the regular transmissional circuit via New York to the distribution point in San Francisco.

Senator Robinson made his debut to the radio audience of the entire country as permanent chairman of the Houston convention. His forceful voice and masterly handling of that meeting established him firmly in the minds of the radio public as a real personality at the microphone.

Clara Bowers, the Hooper station, who delivered the stirring address at Houston, will make a speech notifying Senator Robinson of his nomination.

Chairman John J. Rankin of the Democratic national committee will preside over the ceremonies.

Governor John E. Martinson of Arkansas will deliver an address of welcome to all.

The National Guard band of Arkansas will supply the musical part of the program.

Norman Swearer will handle the microphone for the National Broadcasting Co. stations, while Edward B. Huling will announce for the Columbia chain.

Radio fans in New York will tune in on the program at 10:30 p. m. daylight saving time; the central standard time belt will hear the program at 8:30 p. m.; the time of the start is 7:30 p. m. by mountain time, and by Pacific coast time it will be 6:30 p. m. when Chairman Rankin calls the meeting to order.

## NATURAL DAM DESCRIBED BY PROF. BRUCE

Chicago's Big Dam isn't the only one W. F. Bruce, professor at Hamilton college, has discovered in his studies in the white of New Mexico. A natural dam, formed through the ages by the deposit of soda formations, is described by him in a letter to The Daily News. The letter is as follows:

James Springs, N. M., 8-19-28. Dear Editor and Readers:

The past week we have had lectures by Dr. Magellan, of New York University and president of the Archaeological Institute of America. He discussed the work of excavation in Rome and Greece especially. He gave us the incident of a workman finding the Venus of Cyrena for which Masolini of the Italian government said there was not money enough in the world to buy it and another Italian said if some one would offer to pay the big war debt of Italy for this piece of Greek statuary they would not part with it. In excavating in the Pyramid, a lot was dug along the Nile in which the Greeks were once permitted to settle, the workmen dug up and burned one hundred and twenty-five skeletons. That the Egyptians, to whom the animal is sacred, had buried them. Then they found a baby alligator and some one saved it from burning. In it were stuffed lots of waste paper invaluable now in discovering the life of those ancient people. When the Egyptians found that this little animal resuscitated of Greek papers was worth a few thousand dollars, great was their consternation to find that 125 full grown alligators worth as much accordingly had been destroyed. A fortune had been burned up!

## BAYLOR CAUSE IS DESPERATE IN CASH NEED

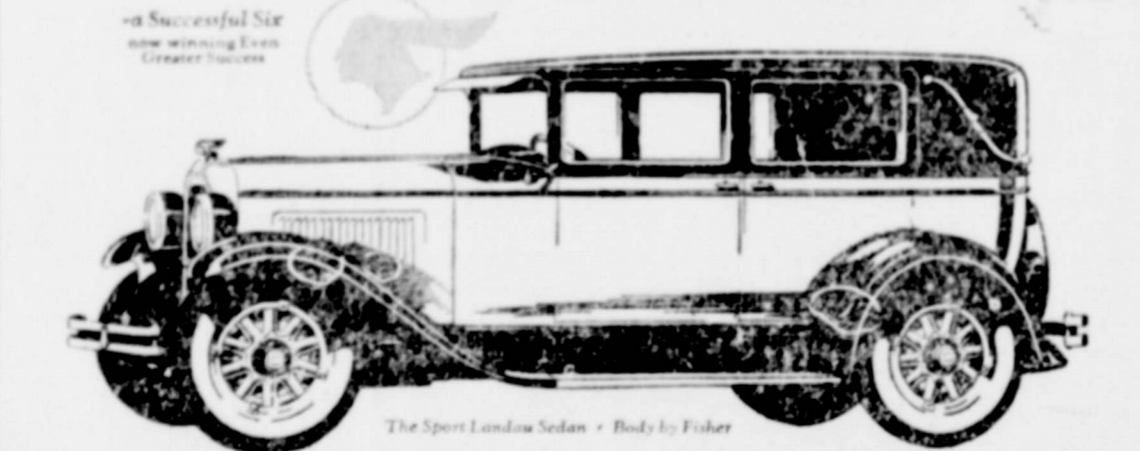

### Geology Developed from Noting by Drillers That Oil Generally Found Under Folded Rock; Now Science

CHITA Kan., Aug. 25.—Fifteen years ago an oil company in the state of Kansas made the first application of the science of geology to the particular purpose of determining the location of oil in the mid-continent region.

Within a number of years geologists had learned the fact that the oil fields of Pennsylvania were found in the folds of folded and arched surface rock formations.

It was not until the oil companies were looking for new fields that they learned the fact that the oil fields in Pennsylvania were found in the folds of folded and arched surface rock formations.

One method, however, is being used to overcome this difficulty. This is the invention of the diamond drill, now in common use wherever oil is being produced. The geologists, upon the assumptions gained from investigations in the neighboring sections, may have a "hunch" that oil or gas is underlying the surface in nearby areas.

With these assumptions worked out as well as the facts will permit, a rather crude drilling is made in the area where the oil may be. Although not so exact as the geologists' work on the rock formations, many good wells have been brought in by this method. Ainsworth states:

In this dissertation on the matter Ainsworth explodes the popular conception that all oil drilling is excessively expensive. He points out that the cost of core drilling is not prohibitive and outside the possible range of operations of the so-called smaller operator. He states that it is a rare case when one year's rentals of a block or even a portion of the year's rentals will not pay for the cost of drilling.

"It is a foolish venture to put up a rig and drill a well costing forty or fifty thousand dollars on just any location where the surface formations are covered when a few thousand dollars spent for core drilling might eliminate a very

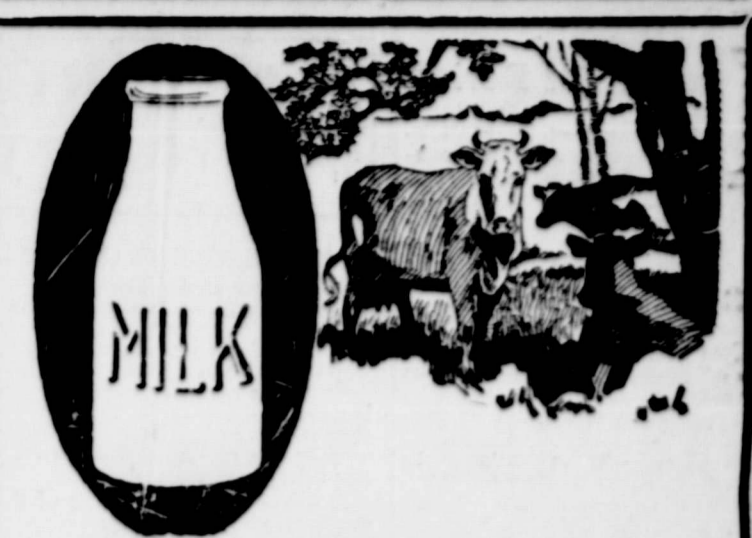
### New Pool of Large Area Is Seen in Cross Plains Field by Addition of 2 Good Producers Near Cross Cut

CROSS PLAINS, Aug. 25.—With the addition of two nice producers to an East extension of the Cross Cut field and with log records and sand thicknesses varying but little from the other producing wells in the vicinity, a pool of a large area seems apparent.

Young Bros. & Alexander have just completed their A. B. Teston test offsetting the Joe D. Burris et al No. 7 J. P. Newton to the east after having drilled 28 feet of sand and shooting with a 12-quart shot. The well is placing 150 barrels daily in storage.

Offsetting the Joe D. Burris et al No. 7 J. P. Newton to the east, Pete Huffman of Cisco is awaiting additional storage before drilling further into the sand on his W. M. Armstrong No. 2. Having drilled but four feet in the sand the well is now making 140 barrels daily. Joe D. Burris et al are very near the sand on their No. 7 J. P. Newton. Patrick Courling survey, two miles east of the townsite of Cross Cut, and is expected to drill in the earlier part of the week. Announcement has been made by Young Bros. & Alexander of their second location which will be 300 feet south of the No. 7 J. P. Newton.

In the Cross Plains field two wells are near the expected sand and will be completed within the next few days. The outcome of these two tests will largely determine activities in the north extension of this field, either well causing several offsets. These tests are being drilled by the Prairie Oil & Gas Co. Their No. 2 E. B. Gillet is located 925 feet from the south end 450 feet from the west line in the George M. Vigil survey. The W. T. Wilson test is located in the extreme northeast corner of that tract. The Prairie Oil & Gas Co. is making a third test in the west field on the G. W. Klutts farm in the southwest corner and is now drilling around 1,000 feet.

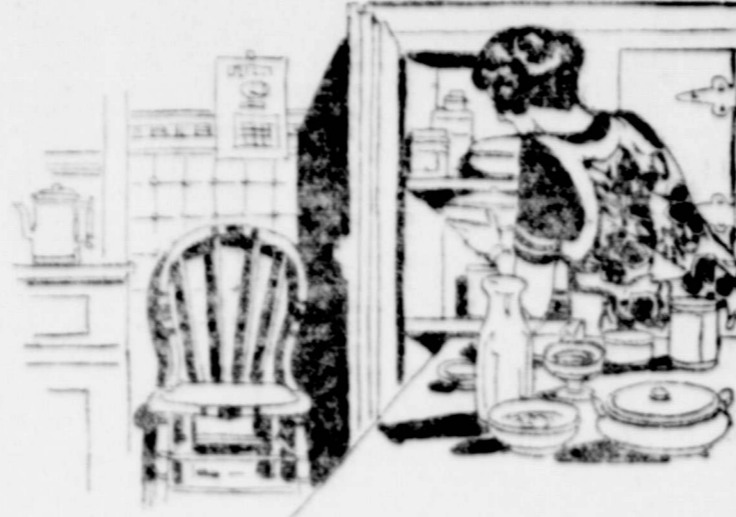

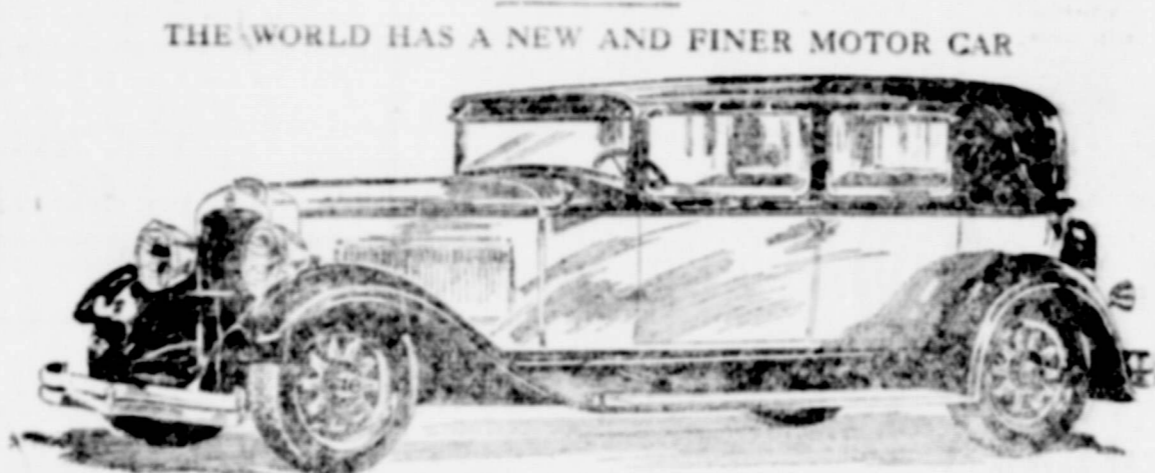


Dry Cold Air Best The type of atmosphere and the temperature of the inside of the refrigerator are of tremendous importance also. A dry-cold atmosphere is preferable to a moist-cold atmosphere, for the reason that moist air, unless it is very cold, is to be avoided. It is the first step toward the formation of bacteria and decay.

Remove the wrapping paper from the meat and place it in a covered container. Keep butter and milk also in covered receptacles. On the next to the bottom shelf store canned goods and the left-over, always closely covered. Always dry-cold air in the refrigerator that preserves food.

# LARGE COTTON INFESTATION IS FOUND IN CISCO COUNTRY

## to 100 Percent of Squares Are Damaged, Inspection Shows; New Pests Appear in Ranks of Insects

J. L. Thomas, state entomologist of the M. college, accompanied by Patterson county agent, was Friday and with E. H. Varney, agriculturalist of the fields of the Cisco County where they found 80 to 100 per cent of infestation of cotton. Varney said, and 75 per cent of infestation of grown bolls in the W. J. Poe place, in the Hill community.

Thomas said, "by plucking of green bolls we came to the number 11 were not damaged, leaving one or more bolls, leaving 32 of the bolls damaged. We found two new pests in half of the bolls and from one to six eggs in nearly every square. I found a few boll worms, the larvae of the 'Careless' worm, which has been causing a concern for we did not know what it was. Dr. Thomas stated that it was practically harmless. We found none of the 'Careless' worms. The millers come from the weeds and are a small dark brown fly, and may be found in most of the feed crops. There was no evidence of the pink boll worm in the fields inspected, of which we have heard some reports of their existence. But they are hard to locate and would hardly be found except in fields where the seed was shipped from infested areas. If any farmers have seed from areas that have been quarantined, County Agent Patterson or I would like to come out and inspect the fields."

Dr. Thomas thought the outlook anything but favorable for a good cotton crop in this section, and stated that he was surprised to find such a large infestation this far west. He has received reports of bad infestation in Comanche county, but had no certain reports from this section.


