SOUTH MAY BE INVADED BY HOOVER

Reunion of Arkansans to Greet Robinson

Former Residents Now Living in West Texas Will Gather at Melon Feast with Cisco's Honor Guest

An Arkansas reunion will be held in Cisco Tuesday when Senator Joe Robinson, the most famous "Arkansas Traveler," brings the message of a united Democracy to this city located in the heart of West Texas. Dr. Charles Haie and R. L. Poe, both former citizens of Arkansas who are now naturalized West Texans, will be hosts to all former Arkansans who are now inhabitants of West Texas at a watermelon feast that evening at Lake Cisco. These men constitute the committee appointed to entertain the former Arkansans who are to Cisco to hear the first address of the United States president of the Civil War to honor the West by placing a West Texas town upon his itinerary for a national speaking campaign. Incidentally, Cisco is the smallest town in the United States to be so honored. This statement is upon the authority of the national Democratic committee at New York.

Like the citizens of the "Free State of Vau Zand" the Arkansans are noted for the characteristic of standing together. Judge Eugene E. Lanford, resident of Cisco, who was a former state senator from Davall's Bluff, Ark., extended an invitation to the Arkansas senator, now candidate for the second highest office within the gift of the people of the United States, to visit the Big Dam City and explain to the people of West Texas just why they should support the national ticket in November. Judge Lanford assured the distinguished senator that in addition to being the home of the biggest hollow type concrete dam in the world and the home of the largest concrete bathing beach in existence, that Cisco is at the cross roads of two important state highways and of two important railroads serving West Texas, and that the people of West Texas could be counted upon to attend his speaking in Cisco at least 15,000 to 20,000 strong. Senator Robinson immediately accepted Lanford's statement at face value and placed Cisco upon his itinerary, and will make one of the two speeches he will deliver in Texas at the football field of the Big Dam. Capacity exists at this stadium for 15,000 people and the city chamber of commerce has made arrangements to expand this capacity to care for 20,000 visitors who are expected to hear the message of Democracy which Robinson will deliver.

But returning to the watermelon question, Poe and Haie are arranging to provide entire truckloads of the choicest "Tom Watson" melons which will be sliced for the gustatory enjoyment of the several hundred former Arkansans who are expected to come to Cisco to hear Arkansas's "Favorite Son." Tables will be provided in the canyon below the Williamson Dam, and these tables will groan beneath the weight of the melons which will be provided. Every person who can claim Arkansas as his or her former home is cordially invited to attend the festivities planned in honor of Robinson's visit. The senator will eat watermelon with his former fellow citizens and will make a short address to them at the "feast" which will be provided. The affair will be held at 5:30 p. m. and will be concluded in ample time for all who attend to be able to reach the Lobo stadium in time to secure desirable seats. Dr. Haie states that he will be disappointed if less than 500 former Arkansans attend the function. Plans are being made to provide other entertainment features for the occasion including a six mile boat ride up Lake Cisco, a swim in the bathing pool, and a concert by old time fiddlers featuring "The Arkansas Traveler." Poe announced that he was declaring September 4 a legal holiday for all former Arkansans now residing in West Texas, and he reinforces the invitation to attend the reunion at Lake Cisco to do honor to the Arkansan who has received the highest honor ever bestowed upon a citizen of that state.

Mrs. Clara Driscoll Sevier, Democratic national committeewoman for Texas, will attend the ceremonies here and will formally welcome Senator Robinson to the state, she advised in a telegram received here today. It was originally planned to have Governor Moody deliver the address but he will be unable to attend because of a previous engagement.

FEW WILL SEE HICKMAN HANG, OFFICERS SAY

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Cal., Aug. 31—Only newspaper men and officials will be allowed to witness the execution of William Edward Hickman, scheduled for October 19, prison officials announced here today. Hickman was convicted of the kidnaping and killing of Marian Parker, 12 year old Los Angeles school girl. After her dismembered body had been given to her father after payment of ransom, the most widespread manhunt in the history of the Pacific coast resulted in Hickman's arrest in Oregon shortly before last Christmas. His efforts to escape execution through pleas of insanity have been fruitless in the highest courts of the state and his sole remaining chance now to escape death is through clemency by the governor.

LEAGUE GIVEN PROTEST OVER U. S. POLICY

DUBLIN, Ireland, Aug. 31.—A flurry over the Monroe Doctrine in the League of Nations recently interested Secretary of State Kellogg, who is paying a visit to the Irish Free State enroute home from Paris, where the anti-war treaty was signed earlier in the week. Central American governments show a growing feeling against the doctrine. Costa Rica has made a request for a ruling by the league. Kellogg believes the league will not undertake any action that will affect the doctrine.

CITY BRINGING SUITS TO GET UNPAID TAXES

The city has begun advertising Cisco property for sale to collect delinquent taxes due the city. "It is the purpose of the city commission to continue these publications and force the collection of taxes until the list is cleared up," stated Mayor Williamson today.

"It is not the purpose or desire of the commission to add extra cost to the delinquent tax payers, and where the delinquents show a disposition to pay their taxes by coming in and paying a portion of the tax due, no suit will be filed. It is those delinquents who are making an effort to pay that the commission is now proceeding against. The city needs all the taxes due to make needed improvements, and must collect, even if suits will have to be filed, which the commission is now doing."

RAINFALL OF NEARLY INCH IS RECEIVED

Nine-tenths of an inch rain was registered by the city hall gauge this morning from the precipitation which began about 6 o'clock and continued until 9. The rain was slow but steady, although rather heavy at times. It was not thought that this rain caused any damage to crops, as it was unaccompanied by wind, and the feed crops, which were growing nicely from moisture of previous rains, were not blown down. The rain was rather an advantage, as it placed sufficient moisture in the ground to cause the crops to continue to grow to maturity. Cotton was not benefited, as farmers state this rain will increase the parasites that flourish during wet weather.

MEXICAN TRAIN GUARD IS SLAIN BY BRIGANDS

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 31.—The entire military escort on a passenger train operating between Oaxaca, Morelos, and Cuernavaca was killed when bandits attacked the train near Yaguetec today. The locomotive was derailed and ditches. Soldiers guarding the train fought bravely but were outnumbered and killed. The bandits robbed the express and passengers.

ARM, 2 LEGS OF D. E. PULLEY ARE BROKEN

RANGER, Aug. 31.—D. E. Pulley, telegraph operator for a pipe line company, is in a hospital here in a critical condition as the result of an automobile accident which occurred on the Ranger-Breckenridge highway early this morning. Pulley's car turned over on the wet pavement. Both legs and one arm were broken, and he sustained internal injuries.

Cousin of W. P. Pulley W. P. Pulley, of Cisco, stated that the injured man was his first cousin. D. E. Pulley is about 40 years of age, married and resides in Ranger. His father is a minister of the gospel and resides at Eustace, in Henderson county.

30 INJURED IN CURA AS TRAINS COLLIDE

HAVANA, Aug. 31.—Thirty persons were injured, several of them probably fatally, when two electric trains on the Havana Central railway collided on a curve four miles west of the city Thursday. The motorman of the outbound train was arrested and charged with criminal negligence in taking the curve at an excess speed.

A NEW KING OF PEACE.

Fourteen nations have set their signatures to the Kellogg Briand anti-war treaty and 46 have been invited to do likewise. There is rejoicing on every hand in many different nations.

For the first time, on general plans accessible to all nations, a congress of peace does something else than settle, politically, the immediate conditions of a particular peace.

It is a fit subject for rejoicing and thanksgiving. It is now up to the peoples of the earth, and their leaders, to see that the "beginning" so auspiciously made be courageously and honorably followed to its planned end.

GOLD.

The world's gold famine is relieved. The federal reserve board reports that the central banks of the world have increased their gold holdings \$1,070,000,000 in the last four years.

The United States has not shared in this gain. While other countries, notably France, Germany and Great Britain, have increased their stores by \$1,500,000,000, this country has lost \$363,000,000.

No American need worry about that. We have plenty of gold left for a sound backlog of finance and business. For a while, we had more gold in storage

than was good for us. It threatened inflation and deprived other countries of the backlogs they needed.

The gold flowing abroad in these latter years goes naturally into foreign investments paying a bigger return than domestic investments, and into travel which broadens the American outlook and promotes international business.

With more gold, other nations are able to get on their feet financially, and offer a better market for American products. This is one of the reasons for the big growth of our export trade.
