### Eastland Co. Storm Relief Quota Doubled

#### \$300 ASKED TO AID SUFFERERS OF HURRICANE

The quota of the Eastland county Red Cross chapter for the relief fund for sufferers in Florida and other areas devastated in the recent hurricane has been raised to \$300, it was announced in a telegram today to Mrs. George P. Fee, secretary of the county chapter, from William M. Baxter, Jr., of the Southwestern divisional headquarters of the Red Cross at St. Louis. Contributions may be made to Mrs. Fee or at the office of the Cisco Daily News.

The Eastland county quota was doubled when reports from the storm zone showed that the damage was far greater than at first indicated and that a correspondingly larger sum would be needed in the relief work.

The telegram to Mrs. Fee was as follows:

"Complete surveys in the areas affected by the West Indies hurricane indicate that the Red Cross' relief responsibility greatly exceeds early estimates and that a minimum relief fund of \$50,000 will be required to meet the known needs. On this basis your chapter should increase its present quota to \$300 and exert its best efforts to secure a public response to this appeal."

Although the first appeal for funds locally was issued two days ago, only one contribution has been received to date. It follows:

#### VAGRANTS TO BE KEPT GOING OUT OF CISCO

Sheriff of Early Days Unable to Collect Taxes; Tom Johnson Tells of Election to Congress Years Ago

Two able bodied men were arraigned in city court this morning on vagrancy charges and each was fined \$5 and costs. However, the defendants were told that if they could raise the money to pay their transportation to their destination they would be released. C. Langston, a youth, about 19 years old, was one of the defendants, and J. L. Ash, apparently 40, and seemingly able to do a hard day's work at manual labor, was the other. The boy stated he was on his way to Waco, Worth where he expected to get work, and stated that he had \$2 in cash. Ash's finances amounted to \$4, but his destination was Graham, to which place he purchased transportation while a patrolman detailed by Chief Miller saw that he left town. Both of these defendants claimed Mississippi as their home state.

"I am looking for an epidemic of crime this winter in West Texas," said Mayor Williamson, and am determined to keep this fluctuating population out of Cisco. We must use every endeavor to prevent crime here, and one of the best methods is to act before the crime is committed. This can be done, I believe, by not permitting this band of idle vagrants to stay here. Winter is coming on and those criminals that have been operating further north will be drifting south pretty soon, and Cisco officials are seeing to it that they are not harbored here."

Relatives here had no message from Dr. Stephenson this morning, which was taken as an indication that his condition was improved. She is past 70 years of age, and is the mother of ten children, seven sons and three daughters, all living.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 21.—By unanimous vote in a caucus early today 42 of the 54 members of the Senate passed a resolution favoring the designation of Minister General Elio Portes Gil as the provisional president to succeed President Calles December 1. It is believed that this insures the election of Gil at the joint session of the chamber and senate next week.

#### Nolan Co. Strip of Broadway of America Opened after Paving to Link Road from Coast to Coast

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., Sept. 21.—With the loss of life in the hurricane mounting toward 1,600, relief parties were confronted with a crisis today as an epidemic was threatened. It has been decided to bury the bodies in quick lime or to burn them with creosote oil.

SWEETWATER, Sept. 21—No man's million dollar Broadway of America is now completed and open to the entire country for use. This last section of 138 miles of highway was the culminating of nearly a five-year program, as the bonds were voted in 1923 but the actual paving has not taken that long. The 29-mile stretch west of the city was begun about two years ago and finished a year later. This road is a sledge-stone base with asphalt topping.


The east side of the county has one of the most lashed off highways in the country at this time and is 48 per cent paved and 90 per cent improved from New York to San Diego, and the completion of that stretch of road in Nolan county marks another step forward in making this the best paved road in the country. The road completes another gap and within the next year there will be only one county road between Texarkana and El Paso that is not paved.

Sweetwater celebrated this new road with a 250-car motorcade from that city to Terrell, which is just east of the end of the new pavement and were joined by visitors from Abilene, Colorado, Roscoe, Snyder, Rotan and other parts of this section. Talks were made by Highway Commissioner W. R. Ely, H. W. Stanley, manager of the Broadway of America association, Dr. P. C. Coleman, president of the Colorado chamber of commerce, Mayor C. W. Bryan, County Judge A. S. Mauzy of Sweetwater, and the Sweetwater Gold Medal band and the Musical Gypsies helped out in the entertainment for the evening.

This was a momentous occasion for this city and section, and the name of Broadway avenue by the city commission.

just 600 pleasure automobiles passing over this highway every day, with an average of three passengers each. This does not include local county cars, but are those of other sections of Texas as well as those from nearly every state in the union that pass along this Broadway of America en route to and from California. In fact the tourist trade has been so flourishing along this route that two new hotels have resulted on "Broadway avenue" in Sweetwater. They are the Blue Bonnet, 120-room hotel, and the Marie, 75 rooms, which is now under construction. The streets in the city over which the highway runs was recently given the name of Broadway avenue by the city commission.

spiritual experience was highly interesting to the audience and very consistent with their conception of the temperament of the human disciple.



## ATTACK ON RELIGIOUS GROUNDS HIT HARD BY GOVERNOR SMITH

I repeat that I see in this not only a danger to the party but a danger to the country.

To such depths has this insidious manner of campaign sunk that the little children in our public schools are being made the vehicles for the carrying of false and misleading propaganda.

"At Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the public prints tell us that a number of school girls asked their parents if it were true that there would be another war if Smith was elected. When questioned by their parents as to how they came to ask such questions, one of the girls said, 'We were told at school that Wilson started the war in 1917 and if Governor Smith were elected he would start another war.'

### Kentucky Attack Cited.

As contemptible as anything could possibly be is an article on the very front page of a publication devoted to the doings of a church wherein the gospel of Christ is preached. I refer to the Ashland Avenue Baptist, a publication coming from Lexington, Ky., in which a bitter and cruel attack is made upon me personally and is so ridiculous that ordinarily no attention should be paid to it. It speaks of my driving an automobile down Broadway at the rate of 50 miles an hour and specifically states I was driving the car myself while intoxicated.

Everybody who knows me knows full well I do not know how to drive an automobile, that I never learned it. As for the rest of the contemptible, lying statement, it is as false as this part. On the inside of this paper the morning worship on the following Sunday gives as the subject, "What Think Ye of Christ?"

The man or set of men responsible for the publication of that wicked libel, in my opinion, do not believe in Christ. If they profess to them at least do not follow his teaching. If I were in their place I would be deeply concerned about what Christ might think of me.

### Another Slander Mentioned.

A similar personal slander against me was dragged into the open about a week ago when a woman in the Southern part of the country read what purported to be a letter from a woman in my own state. Fortunately, the names of both women were secured. One of my friends interviewed the woman in New York state and she promptly denied having written such a letter. The woman in the southern part of the country refused to talk about it and refused to produce the letter.

I single out these few incidents as typical of hundreds. I well know that I am not the first public man who has been made the object of such baseless slander. It was pointed forth on Grover Cleveland and upon Theodore Roosevelt as well as upon myself. But as to me, the wicked motive of religious intolerance has driven bigots to attempt to inject these slanders into a political campaign. I here now drag them into the open and I denounce them as a treacherous attack upon the very foundation of American liberty.

"A sin of omission is sometimes as grievous as a sin of commission. They may, through official spokesmen, disclaim as much as they please responsibility for dragging into a national campaign the question of religion, something that according to our constitution, our history and our traditions has no part in any campaign for elective public office."

### Mrs. Willebrandt Exhibition.

"Giving them the benefit of all reasonable doubt, they at least remain silent on the exhibition that Mrs. Willebrandt made of herself before the Ohio conference of the Methodist Episcopal church when she said:

"There are 2,000 pastors here. You have in your church more than 600,000 members of the Methodist church in Ohio alone. That is enough to swing the election. The 600,000 have friends in other states. Write to them."

"This is an extract from a speech made by her in favor of a resolution offered to the effect that the conference go on record as being unalterably opposed to the election of Governor Smith and to endorse the candidacy of Herbert Hoover, the Republican candidate."

Mrs. Willebrandt holds a place of prominence in the Republican administration in Washington; she is an assistant attorney general of the United States. By silence after such a speech the only inference one can draw is that the administration approves such political tactics. Mrs. Willebrandt is not an irresponsible person. She was chairman of the committee on credentials in the Republican national convention at Kansas City.

What would the effect be upon the same people if a prominent official of the government of the state of New York under me suggested to a gathering of the pastors of my church that they do for me what Mrs. Willebrandt suggests be done for Herbert Hoover? It needs but words of mine to impress that upon your minds.
