

# MANY VETERANS WILL BE AMONG MISS

## Some Quitting Voluntarily But Most Dropping Out Because of Lack of Votes; Few Are Promoted

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Many faces of veteran statesmen were missing when the seventy-ninth congress convened in March. A score of seasoned parliamentarians, including Republicans and Democrats, will not answer the call.

Three Who Failed. The three who failed to make the senatorial grade are James T. O'Connell, a 70-year-old Democrat of Ohio, and a 60-year-old Democrat of Mississippi, six years the house, and J. D. Beck of Ohio, eight years.

Five Finis Garrett of Tennessee, a 72-year veteran and minority leader, Senator Mayfield of Texas and Senator Locher of Ohio failed of re-election. Senatorial victors were Henry Repton, Representative Connally of Texas and United States war-horse, Representative Burn of Ohio.

There were lost in recent primaries were Representatives Sears of Florida, with 14 years of service, and Representative Black of Texas, a member of the same period.

Representative R. G. Bushong of Pennsylvania, a single-term, and Representative I. G. Hirschy of Maine, 12 years in the house, also went down before men who will enter the house for the first time if they win at the November polls.

Sears was defeated for the nomination by Ruth Bryan Owen, daughter of the Great Commander.

Combs Beaten. Representative Combs of Missouri, the baby member of congress, was not re-nominated. Another picturesque figure who failed in an attempt at a comeback was Representative William D. Unshere of Georgia, anti-Smuth dry crusader. He was defeated two years ago but can run for the nomination in few weeks ago.

Still another colorful member whose vindication fight went wrong was Representative John Sosnowski of Detroit. Defeated two years ago by Representative "Red" Claggett, Democrat and buddy of T. C. Cabaniss, Sosnowski tried hard to out Claggett, but the latter's new found Republican friends put him over by a narrow margin.

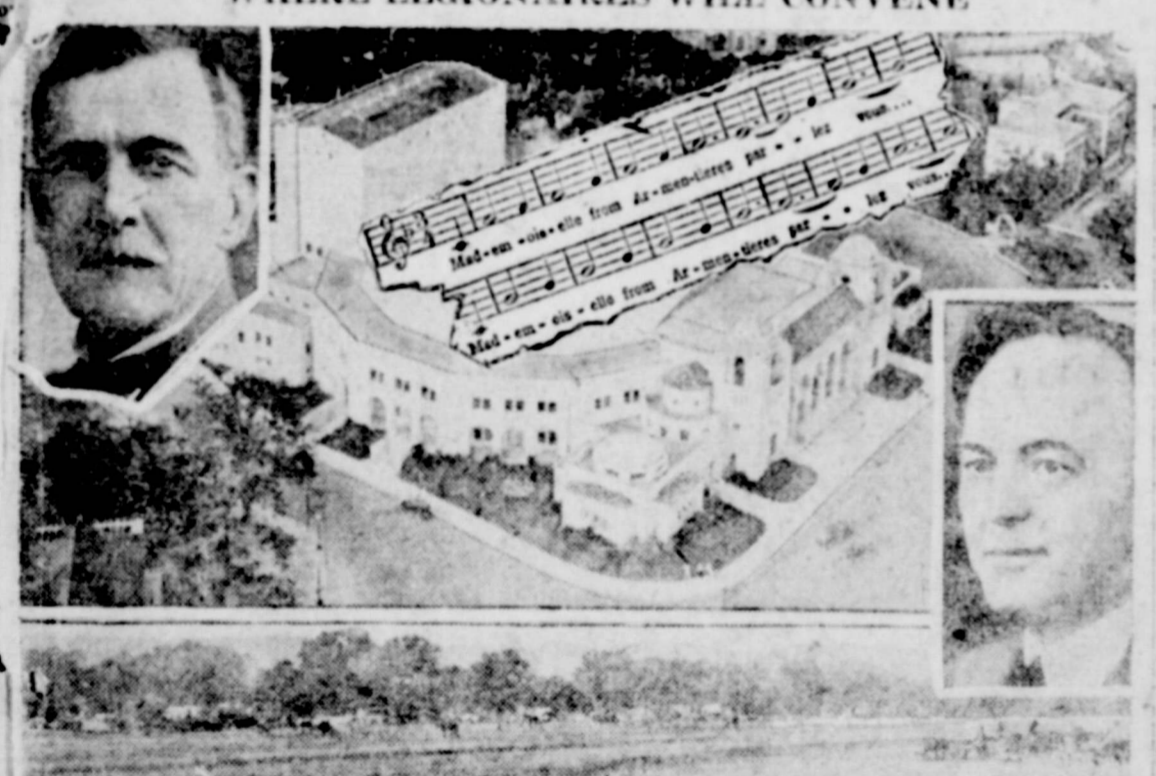
