TO PLAN RED CROSS DRIVE TOMORROW

Eyes of West Texas Are Upon Lobo-Tiger

Coaches to Get First Real Test of Season Friday from Strongest Team Ever Produced at El Paso

EL PASO, Oct. 3.—When El Paso high school football teams clash with the Cisco Lobos Friday afternoon they will be presenting the strongest eleven in the history of the school. The Tigers have rolled up a 95 to 0 score against three formidable opponents so far this season and coaches of the team are predicting an undefeated season for them.

In their opening game of the year three weeks ago, the Tigers trounced over Artesia high, 38 to 0. The Tigers played the Roswell Coyotes in their second game, beating the New Mexico eleven by a score of 31 to 0. The Coyotes defeated El Paso by a score of 18 to 2 last season, and the result of the score signifies how much stronger the Tigers are this year than in 1927.

Last Saturday, the Tigers defeated the Sul Ross sub-college team from Alpine, 26 to 0, in the first night game ever played in the southwest. A crowd of 10,000 fans cheered the Tigers on to their third straight victory.

The El Paso coaching staff is working on new plays this week for the Cisco game. Although the Lobos defeated the Tigers, 13 to 6 last year here, the rejuvenated Tigers are looking forward to a hard game. It is true the Tigers have improved considerably since last year, but they are not taking the game lightly. It is likely that only two of the four teams will be taken to Cisco for the big game. Coaches Ole, Wafer and Robinson have four strong eleven from which to pick 22 men to make the trip.

Plans are underway to have a special train go to Cisco for the game. A large crowd of Tiger backers are planning on making the trip into central Texas.

Only Four Building Permits in September --- Smallest Number of Year --- But Their Total Is \$43,600

Building permits for September, so far as the number of those securing permission to build, are the smallest that have been recorded for any month of the year, as the records at City Secretary Statham's office show. It is known that this list does not include one-half of the buildings that have been erected during the month, and emphasizes a downward of the regulations requiring that a permit must be secured before the building is erected.

Most cities require that all repairs of every nature, require permits, but only in a few instances are permits sought here for other than original buildings. Other cities penalize contractors for not securing a permit.

While only four permits were issued during September, yet the aggregate cost of the new buildings was larger than the average month, as their total \$43,600. These securing permits were:

H. C. BAGWELL IS ACQUITTED IN LANE SLAYING

BRECKENRIDGE, Oct. 3.—H. C. Bagwell, former Cisco and Breckenridge dairyman, was acquitted late Tuesday of an indictment charging him with the slaying of Otha (Peg Leg) Lane, taxi driver, here on July 29. State prosecutors had charged that Bagwell shot and killed Lane when the taxi driver went to Bagwell's home for a passenger. Bagwell claimed he shot in self defense.

WOMAN SUES HOOVER DIXIE HEAD FOR \$50,000

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—A repercussion of the politico-religious controversy reached the District of Columbia supreme court today when Miss Elizabeth Heiser, special newspaper correspondent and graduate of the state of Florida, filed suit for \$50,000 against Colonel Horace Mann, director of Herbert Hoover's Southern campaign. She charged Mann with describing her as "a female detective and snoper."

The charges are the outgrowth of her visit to Mann's office, which she made an affidavit that she was assisted by Mann's office in obtaining anti-Smith propaganda from the Fellowship Forum, an anti-Catholic publication.

The injection of the religious issue may come under the searchlight of the house campaign funds investigation committee which is to meet Friday.

"I hope that all executive officers will be in attendance," said Mrs. Grace Ashbaugh, field representative of the American Red Cross society, who will be present at this meeting. Mr. Reiman will operate the Mobley alone in the future, giving the patrons of that hotel the same high class service that has been given in the past. Mr. Reiman stated that he had an indefinite option on the lease of the Mobley, and no other change in the management was contemplated.

Mrs. Grant Mason, who formerly conducted the Daniels hotel, departed for Dallas on the termination of her lease October 1, and the Daniels interests have taken over the operation of the hotel with Brown as manager. The Daniels is now conducting a thorough renovation, which will be operated in a manner that will give the traveling public the best of service. Mr. Brown stated.

Carnes offered to pay his own way but John Hudson, assistant solicitor general, refused the offer. Carnes, who is accused of embezzling \$1,000,000, shrank nervously from public gaze while he was boarding a train.

COMMITTEE TO LAY PLANS FOR ARMISTICE DAY

At the meeting of the directors of the Cisco chamber of commerce Tuesday night A. D. Anderson, H. S. Drumm, C. O. Pass, P. B. Glenn and W. J. Leach were named as a committee to arrange for Armistice day celebration in Cisco. No action was taken on the suggestion that the stores close on Friday for the Lobo-El Paso football game.

No matters of importance were disposed of by the directors during the meeting which endorsed the Eastland county exhibit at the Dallas fair. It was stated that Eastland county is now in sixth place in the five-year contest exhibits, and if moved up this year in accordance with past progress, will be in the \$1,000 premium class. At present Eastland county is in the \$900 premium class.

The directors took official recognition of the departure from Cisco of C. G. Gray, who will soon move to San Angelo, and a committee was named to draft resolutions expressing the regret of the directors in the loss of the public spirited citizen and his estimable family.

HELP IS ASKED BY DUTCH SHIP IN HURRICANE

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—The Radio Marine corporation today received a message from the White Star liner Laurotic stating it had picked up an E. C. S. message from the steamship Celeano, Dutch freighter, stating the ship is in distress in a raging hurricane, and asking for help immediately. The ship's position was given as latitude 48.89 north, longitude 23.32 west. The steamship America is proceeding to the aid of the ship.

CONGRESSMAN SPEAKS FRIDAY AT EASTLAND

Congressman Gwinn Williams, of Decatur, representative from the 13th congressional district, will speak in Eastland Friday night in the interest of the national Democratic ticket. It is possible that Cisco will be largely represented at the speaking, stated J. M. Williamson this morning, as Congressman Williams is one of the most forceful speakers of the public men of Texas.

Mr. Williams is familiar with national affairs and will speak on issues pertinent to the campaign now being waged in the approaching national election. He will tell of some of the corruption of the past eight years of administration of the Republican party, notably the Teapot Dome and other scandals, that will probably be interesting to some Texas Democrats who contemplate voting for the Republican nominees for purity reasons. Congressman Williams will speak in plain English, using such language that all will understand," Mr. Williams said.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 3.—Joseph Salev, blacksmith, shot and killed himself today at his brother's home after battling with detectives seeking him for the murder of his wife and the possible fatal beating of his daughter, Emma.

CALLAHAN CO. FARMERS TAKE TO TERRACING

BAIRD, Oct. 3.—The farmers of Callahan county are realizing the value of terracing their lands. This is shown by the fact that there are 3,500 more acres of terraced land now in the county than at the same time last year. During 1926-27 when the first real demonstrations of terracing land were attempted 3,500 acres were handled. During the 1927-28 season over 6,500 acres have been terraced.

The farmers are very enthusiastic over the results and A. M. Cooper, county farm demonstration agent, is receiving calls already from several communities for assistance as soon as he starts the work. Owing to the demand for Mr. Cooper's services when this work starts it is necessary to hold community demonstrations in different parts of the county in order that as many as possible might benefit by the instructions the farmers of the sections in which the demonstrations are given make the work more pleasant by serving an old fashioned picnic "dinner on the grounds."

COO SIMMONS BOOSTERS TO PARADE HERE

ABILENE, Oct. 3.—Over 500 students and 200 downtown fans are expected to entrain for Breckenridge for the special train which will be chartered by Simmons Boosters for the trip to the Simmons C. U. game at the Breckenridge county capital Saturday. The announcement was made today and tickets were placed on sale.

Realizing the importance of the game, the contest at least half the student body of 1,000 will go, according to student leaders who are promoting the sale of tickets. These, together with several hundred exes from over West Texas, will form a routing unit for the Cowboys as they fight for their chance to topple a Southwestern Conference team and strengthen their berth in that organization.

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ODD ISN'T IT?

A comic thing is going on—or it would be comic were it not tragic. The leading nations of the world are getting together and saying out of one side of their mouths, "There will never be another war;" and the same nations are saying out of the other side of their mouths, "How shall we fight the next war?"—yet men say that women are inconsistent.

There is a complete absurdity about the human being when you stand off and look at him: he is so balmy in the crumple, take him up one side and down the other. The wisdom of the ages is his command. The experience of his forefathers, back to the proto-plasmic period, are at his disposal; his own sittings down and gettings up with a tack in the seat of his pants, furnish him pointed proof of cause and effect; but he surveys knowledge with the comprehension of a June bug, then proceeds to toddle right on into trouble.

The human being knows the futility of war: he knows the foolishness of armed conflicts; he realizes that about eighty per cent of the money he puts out for national taxes is to pay for the wars he has fought and to prepare for the wars he is going to fight. And what does he do about it? He talks—talks vaguely, vacuously. He drools out bromidiums about peace on earth, the brotherhood of man and the like, and feverishly builds more warships, more submarines, more bombing planes, and invents more destructive gases.

Who is responsible for war? Yes, who? Is it the man in the street? Is it the woman in the house? Is it the child in the school? The babe in the cradle? No. None of these creatures want war.

When there is a war it is the statesmen who arrange it. The old men quarrel and oblige the young men to fight it out. What a hideous mess!

Men must abandon their businesses, leave their homes and families, go into fith and vermin and slaughter and die or be butchered alive for thirty dollars a month apiece, because statesmen haven't sense enough to get along with statesmen. What about letting the chaps who decree the wars do the fighting?—We the high contracting parties hereby agree that in the event armed conflict be resorted to among us the statesmen responsible for such conflict shall take up the arms and do the fighting, while the peoples of the respective nations shall pursue peaceful paths.

We are willing to bet a four-dollar dog, and throw in a bob cat, that if our political leaders who provide our wars for us were to be the fellows to get maimed and killed and gnawed by cooties there would be no more war.

A YELLOW LINDBERGH.

"Within two weeks, if the weather is good, I shall be flying across the Pacific to China." So spoke Dr. Tien Lai Huang, the other day, on his way across the country to New York by air. It isn't meant as a bluff, either. Dr. Tien, known as the "Chinese Lindy," has done considerable flying and is planning a flight from San Francisco to China via Hawaii and the Midway Islands. He will use a Fokker monoplane called the Spirit of Canton. He wants to do this, he says, for two reasons. First it will help to de-

velop aviation in a country where this mode of transportation is particularly needed because of the lack of railroads and highways. Second, there is a goodwill element—he wants to create better understanding between the East and West. Either reason is sound, but Dr. Tien might have mentioned still a third, if he were less modest. Let the Chinese race prove that it can perform modern feats demanding the utmost nerve and skill, as well as the white race, and it will rise immensely in the world's estimation.
