## HOOPER READY TO INVADE SOUTH AND

### Winning Increase Shown Over Year Ago

#### Has 309 Bales to Date and Eastland Co. 724 against 639 for Bank 1927; West Texas Figures Slump

#### RALLY OF BO BACKERS AT MAINS STREET

Cisco has gained 309 bales of cotton of the 1928-29 crop, according to reports from the Moss Gin Co. Total ginnings of Eastland county as of September 16, were reported by the department of commerce to have been 724 bales, against 639 for the same date last year.

This is a much better showing than most West Texas counties, as some of those that were reported as the largest cotton producers of West Texas last year show a decided falling off from the figures of the previous year. Jones county last year which ginned 10,396 bales at this date in 1927, is credited with only 823 bales. Nolan county had ginned 43, against 2,889 for the same period last year. Taylor county, which last year had to its credit on September 16, 15,269 bales, had ginned only 491 bales for the same time this year. This does not mean the crop is short, but rather that it is late, as parties who have traveled through West Texas counties report the crops as looking fine, but backward. Total ginnings for the state as of September 16, the department of commerce places at 1,635,567, against 1,684,291 for the same period last year.

Comparative figures for the counties bordering Eastland with the exception of Stephens, are as follows: Comanche's figures are 1,396 compared to 1,635; Brown, 3,319 compared to 4,718; Callahan, 1,172 compared to 2,917; Coleman, 8,835 compared to 11,474; Erath, 1,797, compared to 2,378; Jack, 566 compared to 764; Palo Pinto 736 compared to 932; Parker 486 compared to 1,239; Young 636 compared to 2,346.

#### New Grass Roots Field Near Cross Plains Seems Assured by Addition of Second Well

CROSS PLAINS, Oct. 5.—With the addition of a second well in the newly discovered shallow sand field six miles southwest of here promising to be equally as good as the discovery well, a new grass roots field seems assured. Weston and Beddingfield found pay at a 440 foot level in their J. J. Cavanaugh tract. Conal county survey, block 44, and with but four feet of sand drilled, it has produced an average of 43 barrels daily for the past week.

The Grass Roots Oil Co. found the sand near the same level as the discovery well in their G. W. Klatts No. 1 and on the first 24 hour test after placed in the pump placed about 90 barrels in storage. This is the second test to reach sand and is located 390 feet south of the discovery. Only 19 feet of sand has been drilled and according to test of sections has been made to the west of the discovery well to the east. R. O. and D. K. Eubank are moving a machine on their R. O. The Prairie Oil & Gas Co. completed a very small producer on the W. R. Ely land in the Cross Plains west field which is considered good for only two or three barrels.

Drilling near the townsite of Cross Cut, DeLange-McKague et al found more than 100 feet of sand at the Cross Cut depth but had no showing of oil.

#### NOT DRAGGED IN RACE, SAYS F. ROOSEVELT

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—"I was not dragged into running for governor."

This was Franklin D. Roosevelt's emphatic reply today to editorial comment of Republican newspapers charging that Governor Al Smith had not shown proper regard for Roosevelt's health, charges which have started another "whispering" campaign in New York.

Roosevelt's statement was telephoned to Democratic national campaign headquarters here.

"I am amazed to learn that efforts are being made to make it appear that I have been sacrificed by Governor Smith to further his own election," he said.

#### RASKOB DENIES BEING ACTIVE IN 'BULL MARKET'

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—John J. Raskob, Democratic national chairman and prominent stock market operator, in denying any activity in the present "bull market" declared Thursday that security prices have so far outrun the demonstrative values that a "material readjustment" is necessary before they will again be attractive for investment.

This opinion of the former chairman of the finance committee of General Motors Corporation is in sharp contrast to optimistic views he has held for some time previously.

"Newspaper statements and gossip which have accredited recent spectacular advances in certain securities to my activity in the stock market," he said, "are entirely without foundation for two very good reasons."

"In the first place, since I have taken this position as Democratic national chairman I have not been near my office and have not purchased any stock whatsoever."

"In the second place, it is my opinion that security prices have so far outrun demonstrated values, earning power and dividend returns, that a material readjustment is necessary before they will again be attractive to the prudent investor. The course of the bond market is a good indication of where the investor stands in relation to present security prices. Dividend returns are low and bond rates are high."

Mr. Raskob started strong buying speculation that carried General Motors and other leaders up on the stock market. When he sailed for Europe the latter part of March, Mr. Raskob said General Motors shares should sell at fifteen times their earning power. A flood of buying orders was released by this statement.

Speculators in June seized upon his statement that "business, big and little, has nothing to fear from Governor Smith." General Motors, United States Steel, Anaconda Copper, Allied Chemicals and New York Central were all bid up.

#### SPAIN'S PRICES IN WEST PARTS OF WORLD SLUMP

CAGG, Ill., Oct. 5.—With one exception, gasoline prices about the world are dropping, according to information received by the Motor Club. Italy's rate, only 43 cents, but this figure had increased within twelve months, to 53 cents. Spain's price remained nearly last year at 47 cents. China at 42 cents. Belgium, France and Denmark at 32 cents. Germany at 27 cents. Other countries reported dropping from 15 cents to 10 cents.

Britain paid 23 for their "petrol," as did Holland, but Egyptians paid 31. Panama 28 cents, Japanese 32. Argentina 38 cents, Greeks 25 cents and in Sweden the price 4 cents.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—A use has been found for static!

The navy department believes the offensive clatter the radio detects from other waves will some day save the lives and property of fans it harasses.

Static, featured prominently several times a week over the loud speaker, will not play its helpful part by "drowning out" an entertaining orchestra or an interesting speech. Lt. F. W. Reichelderfer, bureau of aeronautics, thinks the mysterious din will warn of approaching storms.

The navy department has already identified static with storms. The noise usually precedes a storm.

To Keep Record

With this knowledge in hand static recorders, similar to radio storm detectors, are to be placed on the Airplane Carrier Lexington or Saratoga within the next six months. The clatter recorders are being installed at the following stations, Anacostia, Va., Hampton Roads, Va., Lakehurst, N. J., and Colon, Canal Zone, and Pensacola, Fla.

The machines will accurately record the static, its volume, probable source and other details. This data will be valuable to the weather bureau in formulating storm warnings.

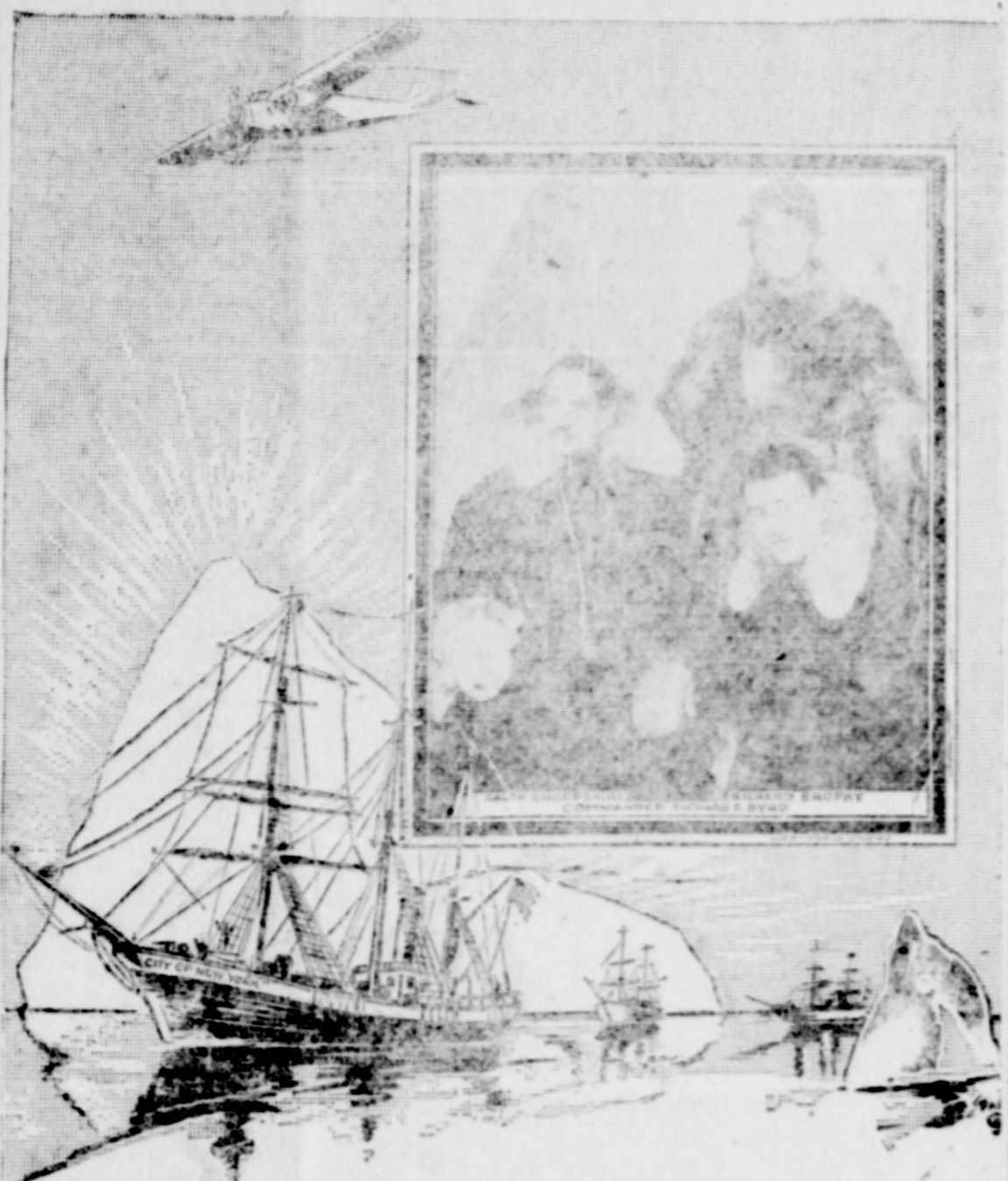
