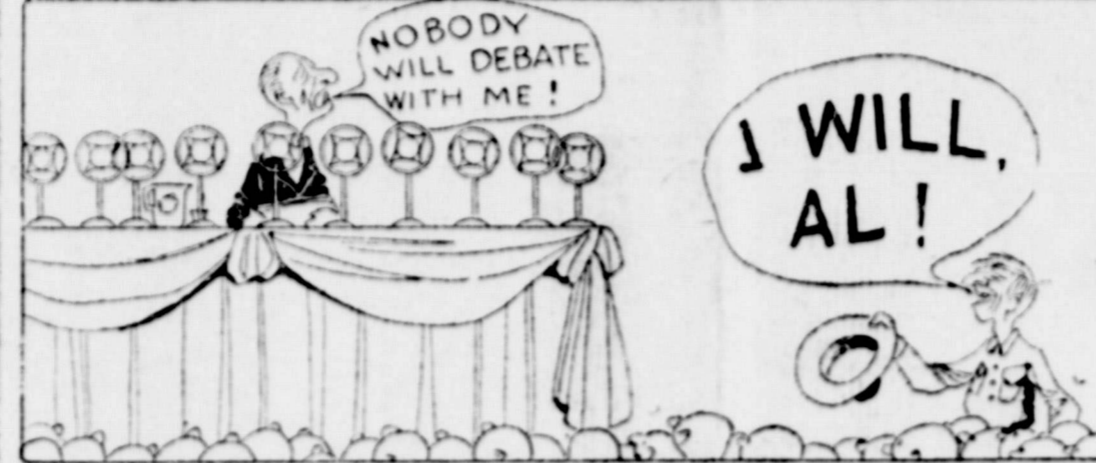

Brother of Second Defendant in Murder of Two Shooks, Testifies for State When Charges Dropped

With the introduction of one more witness the testimony in the case of Clyde Thompson, now on trial in the 88th district court at Eastland, charged with murder in connection with the death of Ladius and Leon Shook, brothers, was to close this afternoon.

Woodrow Wilson Davis, 12 years of age, brother of Thomas Davis, jointly indicted for the Shook murder, also under indictment for the same offense, testified for the state after the indictment against him had been dismissed.

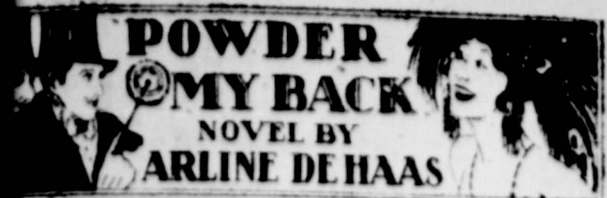

CHINESE NOTE IN WINTER CREATIONS

PARIS, Oct. 15.—The Chinese note has been struck in a large number of winter creations now being shown at the Paris couturiers.

Not only does the general silhouette hint strongly of Chinese influence, but colors, embroidery and smaller details of line, such as collars, sleeves and hemlines. The result is a modernized Chinese costume, made to suit the necessities and tastes of the present day Occidental woman. The idea is ingenious, as well as thoroughly practical and effective.

Charming frocks come in lacquer-red and Chinese greens and blues in bits of embroidery deftly introduced in girdles, neck-bands, single motifs on the skirt of a dark frock, in the sleeves and yokes of gowns and evening wraps.

The Chinese theme is charmingly hinted by a wide sash tied in a flat square bow at the waist of an evening frock. Sometimes there is swathed drapery and very often flowing sleeves. Plain straight little bodices are like a Chinaman's jacket and bits of jade are used for buckles and brooches. A dinner gown in black satin has a deep circle edged with a narrow band of Chinese embroidery extending nearly halfway to the edge of the skirt which is unusually long and tied in a knot at the side of the back.

Bell-shaped mandarin coats are appearing for evening wear. They have round necklines flush to the neck and pagoda sleeves. One in bright blue is trimmed with two shades of blue to match the fabric. LOBOS AND BUCKAROOS OUTSTANDING TEAMS IN OIL BELT

Powerful Punch Displayed by Two; Abilene Champions, Like Old Gray Mare, "Aint What They Used to Be"

Sir Oliver Lodge or Sherlock Holmes might be able to shed some light on who is going to be crowned football monarch of the Oil Belt, but individuals of lesser intellectual endowments can only guess their trembling hands to throbbing foreheads.

The events up to the present demonstrate definitely that only two of the seven members of the district are out of the race. The Eastland Mavericks, who have already played two official games, leading them both, and the Brownwood Lions, who were defeated 58 to 6 by the Cisco Lobos in their first conference struggle, may safely be eliminated from the reckoning.

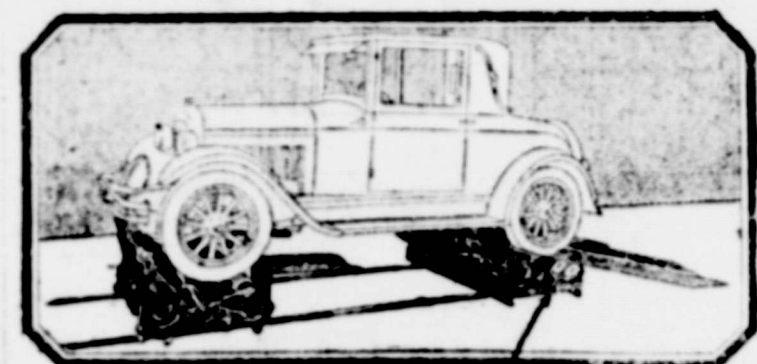

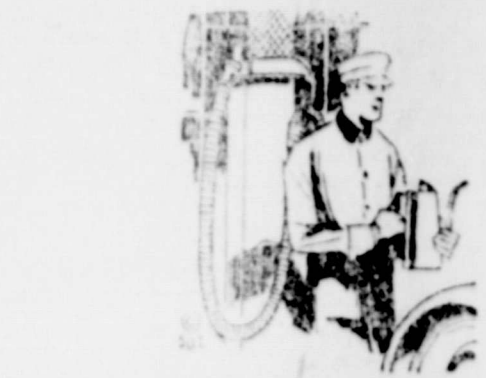

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1500 BBL. WELL BROUGHT IN IN STEPHENS CO.

BRECKENRIDGE, Oct. 16.—C. M. Root of the firm of Root & Rhodes of Eastland, one of the largest independent firms engaged in the oil industry, drilled in his Wilson No. 1 well three miles northwest of town Saturday afternoon. The first, which was drilled in north territory, is now flowing 1,500 barrels with top of the pay sand just entered. The well caused a flurry of excitement locally, sending scores of autos loaded with oil scouts and operators to the scene of the latest Stephens county discovery.

It is understood that the bottom of the hole is approximately 3,200 feet. Oil began coming up in the well late Friday night, backed by a good rock pressure.

The discovery is regarded as being in an entirely new area and probably means the bringing in of an entirely new field.

Seven Known English Survivors of Klondike Gold Rush in 1898 Recount Experiences of Hardship and Daring

LONDON, Oct. 16. — Thrilling stories of hardship and daring were unfolded when seven old-timers who took part in the famous gold rush to Klondike in 1898 met in London recently.

The seven were the only known English survivors of the rush, in which hundreds of men perished in the most famous and tragic trek for gold in the history of the nineteenth century. They included Captain E. R. Murphy, one-time Canadian rancher; Frederick Roberts, old South American miner; William R. Chisholm, formerly a shipping clerk; Robert J. Ballard, a carpenter; and Captain Victor Talbot, at the time of the rush an Oxford University student.

Over cigars they yanked over old times, recounting how they tramped from various parts of the world after they had heard of the strike and became stricken with the fever to gain quick wealth. One by one they recalled individual experiences, frequently producing worn and tattered pieces of paper—the notices of location of "placer claims."

Went Snow Blind

"The best thing I remember," said Captain Murphy, "was when I went snow blind. It was six weeks before I recovered my sight. Afterwards I staked a claim on the big Salmon River and was doing well until I was flooded out and lost everything."

"I fought my way through the White Pass and up the Skagway River with my handful of carpenter's tools," said Ballard, "and knowing nothing about mining worked as a carpenter for a time. I was there in '98 and stayed until the summer of '99 when after various vicissitudes, I became convinced that the gold could not be got out of the earth without the aid of machinery."

Men of all ages, and even women, crowded in the "trek," he said. "They went on and on until a few of them got to the gold areas. They found the ground frozen to a great depth. Some men it is true made a fortune. Thousands came back or stayed there forever."

Bark With Nuggets

"Owing to my fortune being at low ebb, I decided to join the march," he recounted. "That was Christmas, 1897. My companions up the Skagway were a Corsican couple, Count Persidi, and a man named Fox, of Philadelphia. Persidi and I set over Fox's corpse for days to prevent it being eaten by wild dogs. I then started back with Fox's remains, only to be stricken with snow blindness. I was cured by esquinax in the native manner by putting tea poultices over the eyes."

"After a tremendous effort I got to Dawson City via Lake Le Barre, Lake Bennett and Caribou Crossing, to the head of the Yukon river."

"After all this I eventually came back with a pocket full of nuggets. There was no gold to be got there without machinery, and the machinery has not yet been created that can blast a way into that fortress of gold and ice." The other agreed.
