VISIBLES AND INVISIBLES.

nowadays on "invisible trade balances." This phase of international business, which used to be negligible. becomes more and more important. The nature of "visible" foreign trade is well known. It consists of merchandise, and the excess of exports over imports in recent years has ranged from half a billion to a billion dollars. "Invisible" items consist mainly of "services to tourists," interest receivable on international debts, private interest and dividends due our citizens, ocean freights, immigrants' remittances to other countries, motion picture royalties and charitable and missionary expenditures. These really deserve more study now than the mercantile trade items, if one wants to know what is going on and how *our own country stands. The single item of American tourists' expenditure abroad this year is estimated at \$900,000,000. Add to this two hundred to three hundred millions sent abroad to their relatives by our immigrants, \$100,000,000 or so for motion picture royalties, perhaps \$50,000,000 for charity and missionary work, a like amount for ocean freights carried under foreign flags, with a few smaller items, and we have somewhere near a billion and a half of "invisibles" which, according to the usual method of figuring, are on the wrong side of the ledger. Fortunately there are big "favorable" invisibles, too, chief among them being the interest and dividends on our loans and investments, governmental and private, in foreign lands. These will amount to \$700,000,000 or more. And if it were not for the aforesaid unfavor-

It is chiefly this American love of foreign travel which roughly balances our foreign trade items, visible and invisible combined. What it amounts to is that as a nation we are paying ourselves what is due us abroad, with the money we spend in travel. We are enabling our foreign debtors to pay us their war debts without sending us money-which they could hardly have done in any case.
