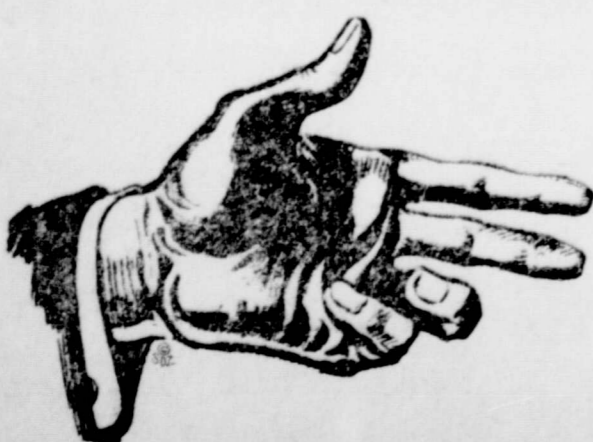

Oil Interest in West Texas in Past Week Centers on Wildcats; Pecos and Llano Get Producers

SAN ANGELO, Oct. 23.—A Pecos county wild cat spraying oil, a 1500-barrel producer in the Llano area of northern Winkler county, a new 3154-barrel producer in the Hendrick pool, and a 10,000-barrel gusher in the Yates pool, made up the outstanding developments of last week in the Permian Basin of West Texas.

A pair of southeastern Howard county wells were swabbing oil from that area's deep line as the main development in that area late in the week, while a close sixth was being made on Taylor-Link's No. 1, Klob, Rumsey & Morgan, which is nearing the bottom from which Henshaw's No. 1A settles, 1700 feet south, is producing.

Henshaw won his first point to secure proration for the three-mile western extension brought about by the well when he was granted a hearing by the proration committee in Fort Worth Wednesday. The committee referred the matter, without recommendation, to the Texas Railroad Commission, which has granted Henshaw a hearing on Oct. 24.

New Mexico Plays Strong.

A gallon of oil, brought up by the hauler while cleaning out preparatory to run a 1-2-inch casing at 1495 feet in line in Fuhrman No. 1 Padgett, west central Crockett county, has caused some excitement in that area. It has been carrying some gas from 1330 feet, but has had no other oil shows. It topped the lime high some picking it at 1440, others at 1430 and some at 1468, though it was unbroken from 1468-95 feet.

Marland's No. 1 Lynn, in section 20-21-36, Lea county, N. M., showed some and anhydrite, showing later oil from 2865-2921 feet. Jones's No. 1 state, in section 34-21-36, increased in gas to an estimated 20 million cubic feet daily from 3342-52 feet.

A mile and a quarter south extension of the Hendrick Pool in Winkler county is assured by Mining Engineering Corp's No. 2 Hendrick, which flowed 126 barrels of fluid, 12 per cent water in an hour's proration test from 3004 feet, where the big pay was topped.

Sid Richardson, Frank Kelley and White Eagle Oil & Refining Co's No. 1 O'Brien gauged 1367 barrels of oil from water, though fresh water did make an appearance later in the week.

Pure Gets Another.

The big producer in the Llano area is Empire's No. 1 Leck, which is 23 feet in the pay at 3141 feet, rating 2500 barrels daily. It is a north effect to Atlantic and Kroeger & Logan's No. 1 Leck, discovered.

empire producer in that area.

The Empire well has shown no water. It has a surface elevation of 2650 feet and topped the lime at 2892 feet. Its location is 2 1-2 miles south of the Texas-New Mexico line.

The big well in the Hendrick pool is Pure's No. 8-C Hendrick, in section 45, block 26, which came in from 2637 feet for 31,544 barrels daily. The company's three Hendrick leases have a potential production of 225,000 barrels daily.

The sensational Pecos wildcat is Alexander & Lytle's No. 1 Soltman, seven miles west of the Yates pool, in section 29, block 2, TCRVCo survey. The lime was topped at 1597 feet. More gas was hit at 1620 feet and big increase at 1623-26 feet. The oil spray developed Tuesday after the well had been standing 12 hours.

Still carrying gas, hit at 2130 feet, but no oil, Taylor-Link's No. 1 Klob, Rumsey & Morgan, in Howard county, was shut down Thursday at 2219 feet.

sented at the State Fair in Dallas, is now being Vitaphoned in Hollywood and will be presented at the Majestic in Abilene at a later date.

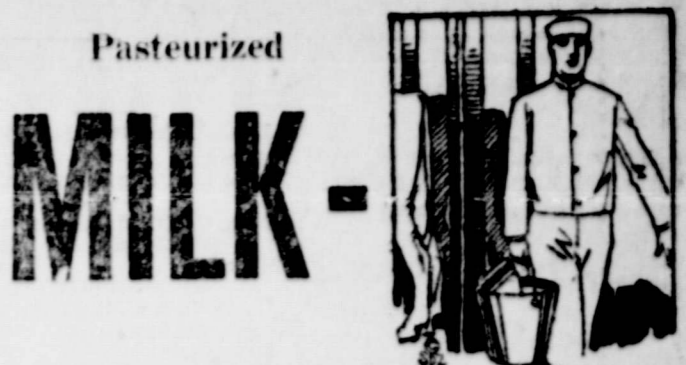
BRECKENRIDGE LEGION POST ELECTS OFFICERS

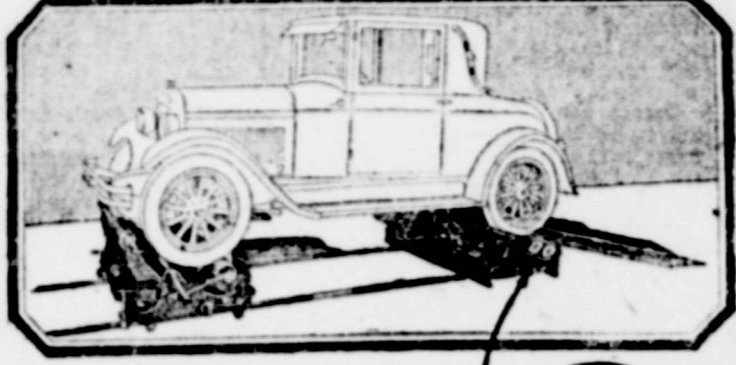

District of Columbia officials recognize the hazard used motor fuel presents. They sent questionnaires to various American and European cities to learn the method used to discard the oil. With this information they are trying to perfect a practical plan.

Garage owners in the district are forced to store the old oil in metal containers and dispose of it the best they might. A quantity still finds its way into the sewers

and the sewer division is constantly trying to trace the source of the "contraband."

Experts thought they had solved the problem with a plan that the worthless oil would be effective to oil roads. The monkey-wrench was hurled into this plan with the discovery the oil is too inflammable to be carried and sprinkled from motor tanks. This danger also eliminates it from use in oil-burning plants, local officials found.

Twenty-eight cities in the United States prohibit dumping of discarded oil in sewers and 23 require installation of garage traps.

Even permit the oil to flow into sewers and ten do not demand that no matter where they collect oil refuse, nineteen commercial firms gather the oil and eight report none of it is collected.
